## Budget pleases regents

Although the governor's proposed supplemental appropriation level is \$7 million less than what the state Board of Regents had asked for, some board officials are ecstatic

In sharp contrast to the state Board of Regents' recent funding slights, the state government has taken its first steps in giving regents exactly what they want — more money.

A recently introduced governor's budget asks state lawmakers to allocate \$25 million in supplemental funding for the regents' operating budget. Although this sum is \$7 million less than the board's original request, it's regardless a monumental victory for state institutions, Regent Executive Director Gary Steinke said.

For example, the state only gave \$6 million to regents two years ago, which was a sliver of what the board had recommended, he said.

"This is absolutely fantastic news," he said. "We asked for \$32 [million], and we got \$25 [million]. This is ecstatically fantastic news."

Both legislative chambers will soon draft their own bills — which would hopefully grant state universities \$25 million more than what they received last year, Steinke said.

Meanwhile, two other pending bills would designate a total of \$14 million for a stem-cell research facility at the UI and supplemental appropriations for regent institution hospitals, said Rep. Dave Jacoby, D-Coralville.

The regents have asked for \$72 million in increased overall appropriations, but said no word has yet come regarding whether the state will come close to funding that recommendation, Steinke said.

The governor's proposed budget is unfamiliar territory for regents; the state Legislature has repeatedly dispensed less in regent funding than what they had requested, Steinke said.

"The appropriations are more than they have been in the last six, seven years," he said. "There is a huge willingness from this Legislature to fund things that need to be funded."

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## College Party wins close one

A single groan of disappointment resounded through Hubbard Commons Tuesday as the Student Elections Board announced third place in the UI Student Government elections went to the A-Team.

Seconds later, screams of happiness erupted as announcers bypassed the Labor Party, and supporters mobbed the newest UISG leaders — Barrett Anderson and

Carole Peterson of the College Party, who garnered 2,125 of the 5,821 votes.

"Carole and I knew we were the underdogs and that we would have to put a lot of work into the campaign to win," said Anderson, who promptly called his mother to tell her the news. "We did things we respected and wanted to have fun through the whole campaign."

The election results prompted an emotional response from the Labor Party, headed by Mark Anthony Dingbaum and Tess Feldman. The group took second place with 2,030 votes, just 95 fewer than the winning party.

"I truly believed we would have been the best, and now we don't get it," said Feldman with tears in her eyes.

The A-Team, headed by UI juniors Atul Nakhasi and Courtney Parker, also expressed disappointment.

"There were so many issues to be


addressed," Nakhasi said about why he decided to run after last year's loss. "We had a strong platform, we did our research and felt our goals were realistic this time."

In this year's election, a record-breaking 29.81 percent of UI undergraduates voted, compared with 21 percent last year — when graduate students also had a voice, said Manish Aggarwal, a Student Elections Board public-relations officer. Graduate students didn't cast ballots this year; they voted to separate from the undergraduate-led senate last year.

### Prez Breakdown



Leah Cohen, a co-head of the Iowa City Alcohol Advisory Board and the owner of Bo-James, is upset about the 21-

ordinance's possible appearance on the Nov. 6 ballot. The ordinance would appear on the ballot if the Committee for Healthy Choices secures the required 3,333 signatures.

"[The Committee for Healthy

Choices members] are very conservative, almost prohibitionists," Cohen said. "I don't even think they are aware of what is going on."

The 21-ordinance would force people 19 to 20 years old to

leave the bars after 10 p.m. or face a \$250 fine. The petition was initiated on Feb. 7, when an affidavit was filed to permit the committee to gather signatures.

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# Coralville may add fire station

*Coralville city councilors will reconsider an additional fire station when they discuss the city's capital-improvement plans later this month*

A new fire station could be in the works for Coralville when councilors address new projects later this month.

A barren area of land on Holiday Court near the UI laundry facility is where the station would be built, pending approval of the capital-improvement plans — a development initiative with a \$2.2 million price tag.

"There are no hurdles right now," said city Fire Chief Dave Stannard. "I think that [the city council is] interested in funding [the station]."

A new station would allow firefighters to respond to calls much more quickly than from its current location at 1501 Fifth St., he said. The ideal response time is less than six minutes, he noted.

The Coralville Fire Department received 740 emergency calls last year. Roughly half came from the area that could be covered by the new building, Stannard said.

The new structure could also reduce fire-insurance rates for residents living north of Interstate 80 near Coral Ridge Avenue within a mile and a half of the proposed station.

The facility would also have live-in quarters for firefighters — an option not available at the department's current station, city administrator Kelly Hayworth said.

Stannard last spoke to the council about the proposed station in January, but councilors told him to provide more information regarding the measure.

Councilor John Lundell said Monday that he had asked if the station could house additional police cars for officers working that beat.

Coralville isn't alone in mulling over the idea of an extra fire station.

Late last month, the Iowa City City Council pondered adding a fourth fire station, to be located on the city's North Side. Officials have said funding for the station is available,

but staffing the location is the main question.

The council asked City Manager Steve Atkins and Iowa City Fire Chief Andy Rocca to list options for staffing a new station by using a combination of volunteers, paraprofessionals, and paid firefighters. Rocca has said the new location would require nine additional firefighters over a three-year span.


The reason Coralville is not dealing with the personnel problem is because the department has 45 volunteer firefighters, while Iowa City pays nearly its entire staff. Stannard said if the new station is approved, 15 to 20 new volunteers will be added.

Coralville's capital-improvement plans allow the council to prioritize projects such as road and trail construction. The council's next meeting is scheduled for March 27.

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# Regents hear good news

Sen. Frank Wood, D-Eldridge, said because the state generated an additional \$360 million last year, giving money to the regents was much easier this time around.

"It is a juggling contest as to what gets funded and what doesn't get funded," he said.

Regent Robert Downer contends that communication is one reason why regents garnered a successful budget proposal.

"We are doing a better job of telling our story," he said. "We are communicating and making the sale."

If the governor's budget is approved, the regents will first address faculty salaries at the regent universities, Downer said.

Iowa State University has the lowest faculty salaries of its peer group, he said. The UI could also improve — coming in the third lowest among its peer institutions in faculty salary.

Steinke said he hopes the augmented allocation, if passed, will service the state's

fiscal development, noting that strong education fosters a healthy economy.

Regent President Michael Gartner said the increased funding will also go a long way to keep tuition low. State schools only have two sources of revenue: Tuition and legislative appropriations, Gartner said.

But he declined to predict whether this trend will continue. "You can only go it one year at a time in politics," he said.

This year's race also purportedly drew more campaign complaints than last year.

"We were flooded with complaints," said election-board Director Jack Sodak, noting the board plans to discuss accusations made during the last two days of voting on Friday. "There was definitely an upsurge in complaints from last year."

When the newly elected College Party takes the helm in April, the members plan to hit the ground running. In addition to implementing a late-night bus route, Anderson and Peterson want to make better budget decisions and get students involved in the UI presidential search.


"The first thing we plan to do is start working on those safety initiatives," Peterson said. "We plan to keep our promises."

## Over the years, voting increases

As enrollment has gone up at the UI, so has the percentage of students voting in the UISG elections. The lowest number of votes cast in the last 16 years was in 1995 — only 1,458 votes elected Tim Williams and Jeremy Johnson. The highest number ever cast was in 2005, when Mark Kresowik and Lauren McCarthy won with 7,038 votes.

# Group pushing for 21-only

If the organization collects the required number of signatures to put the ordinance on the ballot, it would mark the first time registered Iowa City voters would have the opportunity to vote on the ordinance in an election. The committee had a meeting on March 6 to train people to gather the required signatures.

Francie Dallman, a parent of a UI freshman, said she attended the meeting because she was concerned about the culture of underage drinking present downtown.

"If you're 19, you can go into the bar, but you can't drink, and you can't sit 3 feet away from someone who has a drink, so what are you doing there?" she said.

People who sign the petition must be registered to vote in Iowa City and must be Iowa City residents.

Former Iowa City Mayor Ernie Lehman attended the meeting and voiced his dissatisfaction with the Iowa City Council.

"The council in this town has not had the courage to do what is right," Lehman said in supporting the 21-ordinance.

However, some in the community have voiced concerns that the 21-ordinance would do more harm than good.

Austin Baeth, the UI Student Government City Council liaison, said that he is concerned that banning students who are not 21 years of age would usher in a house-party environment.

"I think [the 21-ordinance] would be a terrible detriment to the safety in the minors in

Iowa City," he said.

Cohen is also concerned that an increase in the number of house parties could lead to binge drinking, an increase in assaults, and drug use.

Mark Martin, a co-sponsor of the petition and a pastor at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church, said he perceives the house-party scenario to be more of a threat from 21-ordinance critics instead of a valid issue.

"[Iowa City Police Chief] Sam Hargadine indicated

there's no way that they could get that many house parties on a Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday [to compete with the bars]," Martin said.

Jim Clayton, a co-chair of the Stepping Up executive board and an organizer of the Committee for Healthy Choices, said his group has no intention of banning drinking, but the members are concerned about the safety of minors downtown. He contends that the Alcohol Advisory Board hasn't taken the proper measures to create a safe environment downtown.

"Mostly, [the Alcohol Advisory Board] talks about a lot of things downtown, but I see very little concrete results from what has happened," he said.

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# Iowa City homeless shelter still too small

*A panel discussion tackles area homelessness, trying to solve the problem of overcrowding at Shelter House while addressing the stigma attached to low-income housing*

A formerly homeless man, and client of Shelter House Community Shelter, got a chance to thank Crissy Canganelli, the executive director of the facility, and praise its staff at a panel discussion hosted by the UI Center for Human Rights on Tuesday night.

"I found there were only two shelters that really helped me out a lot, and Shelter House was one of them," Ronald Willet Kinum said.

Kinum is enrolled at the UI, taking a nonprofit management class.

While the number of homeless people in Iowa City may be fewer than in larger metropolitan areas, there is only one area shelter serving the homeless population of Johnson County, and its size is insufficient.

The panel talked about potential solutions for housing and homelessness.

Canganelli said that she believes that more analysis needs to be done to evaluate one's ability to live in the same town where he or she works.

"Something needs to be done to assess a town's housing avail-

ability compared with its number of job opportunities," she said.

She also said that often, there is a stigma associated with the idea of affordable or low-income housing. She said that some people tend to believe that building a low-income housing establishment will negatively affect the value of surrounding properties.

Shelter House, 331 N. Gilbert St., has 29 beds, each one full, and the facility turns away about as many people as it takes in, she said.

The shelter is in a residential neighborhood and cannot expand. In an attempt to create a larger shelter for Johnson County, Shelter House has purchased land at 429 Southgate Ave., but it cannot build there because of a zoning lawsuit. The debate has been going on since the land was bought in 2004; the Waterfront neighborhood fears that the facility would be detrimental to its residents.

The case was heard Monday by the Iowa Supreme Court. Canganelli said that the ruling could take as long as a couple months.

The Southgate facility could have as many as 70 beds, sepa-

rate rooms for families who have small playrooms, and small study rooms for children.

"There's so much that we can do better just by changing the place in which we work," Canganelli said.

When the Shelter House cannot accommodate everyone, it organizes for those individuals to be taken to overflow shelters.

Christine Mullen, the head of the Interim Homeless Overflow Shelter Task Force, works with local churches to provide shelter for those who are turned away from the shelter.

"We have probably more than 500 volunteers in the area, and we have gone to great lengths to make sure that we do not have to turn people away from the overflow," Mullen said.

While homelessness in Iowa City tends to be caused by a combination of events, one reason is the area's lack of affordable housing. Canganelli said Johnson County has one of the most expensive housing markets in the state.

At its Monday night meeting, the Iowa City City Council nixed a proposed ordinance banning panhandling, with Mayor Ross Wilburn saying that he had reservations about removing a source of income for the homeless when the Shelter House's future is uncertain.

Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, recently announced that Shelter House would receive \$448,318 of the \$7.2 million allotted to the state by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Canganelli said that this money will go to the shelter's STAR program, which helps the homeless to get back on their feet by assisting them in finding and maintaining a job and making sure that children can stay in school.

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

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# Mandatory health insurance for UI students backed

*In a unanimous vote, the Faculty Council supports an advisory panel's recommendation*

Although a proposal for mandatory health insurance for students is nothing new, support from a prominent faculty group could help make the proposal a reality.

UI Faculty Council unanimously voted to endorse the Student Health Advisory Committee's proposal to require all students to get health insurance during Tuesday's meeting.

UI sophomore A.J. Cannon, the committee's chairman, presented the suggestion to the council hoping that it would be supported throughout the campus.

"We're trying to demonstrate this as universally as we possibly can," he said. "We want to show that everybody

is in favor of this."

Students without health insurance — roughly 10 percent of the UI enrollment — would be required to either have the UI's Student Health Insurance Plan, which would cost \$85 a month or another health-insurance provider.

"Students who need such a thing would be better equipped," Cannon said, adding that students without insurance are vulnerable to unexpected medical bills.

Students would also only save \$3,000-\$4,000 without insurance but could potentially face \$10,000 to \$20,000 in medical bills if an accident occurred, he said.

Because health insurance would be mandatory, it would factor into financial aid as well. The insurance would be good worldwide and include mental-health and substance-abuse treatment with an additional \$10 co-payment. The proposed plan wouldn't discriminate based on age.

Faculty Council Vice President Victoria Sharp, a clinical

associate professor of urology and a member of the Student Health Advisory Committee, said she thinks the proposal would benefit the community as a whole.

"I think it will help us work toward a healthier campus," she said.

Some council members were concerned about students having to pay for health insurance as well as the annual Student Health fee.

"I think it's a good idea," said Catherine Ringen, a UI linguistics professor. "But I wonder about two obligatory things when the broader health insurance might cover [everything]."

Council member Steve McGuire suggested that Cannon get input from local legislators about the proposal.

Cannon said the idea was sent to the state Board of Regents two years ago but was rejected when the regents asked for more student support on the issue. Currently, Cannon is taking the issue to UI employee and student

groups around campus to gain support.

"Students as a whole would be healthier because they could pursue health care," he said.

The UI isn't the first school to come up with such a plan. The University of Oklahoma, Michigan State University, and Penn State University are just a few of many others across the nation that require students to have health insurance. Neither Iowa State University nor the University of Northern Iowa has such a plan.

"We're hardly ahead of the curve," Cannon said.

# Study looks at panic disorder

*A UI team finds different environmental DNA patterns in people suffering from the disorder*

A UI professor and his research team could be on the verge of a major discovery that could prevent some major mental disorders.

Robert Philibert, a UI associate professor of psychiatry, and a team of scientists have uncovered a method of possibly curbing symptoms of some panic disorders by performing blood tests.

The study concluded that people with panic disorder had noticeably different environmental DNA patterns of gene expression from those of people without the disorder.

"Through studying the DNA environment, we are able to possibly stop the symptoms of panic disorder by doing blood tests," Philibert said.

Through testing blood and evaluating DNA responsiveness to change, Philibert studied DNA environmental and behavioral traits of more than 23,000 genetic samples to help patients reduce the risks of panic disorders.

As part of a UI research project, which will be published in the *American Journal of Medical Genetics*, Philibert studied immature white blood cells culled from 16 participants with panic disorder and 17 participants without the disease.

The research also examined DNA traits over time in patients who had reoccurring genetic disorders in their family and developed a fingerprint for each illness.

"Just because patient A's whole family has a disorder does not necessarily mean that the patient will have the disorder as well," Philibert said. "Therefore, environment does matter in determining if a disorder will develop into outright symptoms, which we can detect, because each illness has its own fingerprint."

He stressed that a person who has a genetic makeup predisposed to panic disorder may be able to minimize or stop the symptoms.

"If we determine a person has DNA of panic disorder, then we can instruct them to stop drinking coffee, because it plays a large role in increasing the likelihood of a panic attack," he said.

UI Assistant Professor Tracy Gunter, one of the study's co-authors, said until recently, many psychiatric disorders were considered to be problems of moral weakness or evil.

"If we can better understand the biology of a symptom or disorder, then we can better understand how to intervene in the disease process to prevent disability," Gunter said.

Roughly 3 percent of people in the United States suffer from panic attacks, according to the National Institute of Health. Symptoms include shortened breath, feeling of loss, and palpitations, among others.

Even as the research is still being developed on DNA environments and their effects, Philibert and his team believe the study will aid future similar endeavors.

"The research we are doing can be compared to a new hammer on the market; society must choose the best way to use it," Philibert said.

— TO LEARN MORE ABOUT THE 'BOOK IT!' PROGRAM IN IOWA CITY SCHOOLS.

Reading a book and eating an extra-cheese pizza may be synonymous in some students' minds, but some dietitians and Iowa City School District officials say a 22-year-old program that links reading with free food promotes unhealthy eating habits and is unwarranted corporate advertising.

"Book It!" — a Pizza Hut-sponsored program that awards individual-sized pizzas to students who meet reading goals — is "simple, flexible, and fun," according to the bubbly, female voice on the program's hotline.

But it may not be that clear-cut for nutritionists who work to instill healthy eating habits in children.

"If I had my preferences, I would like to tie increased reading to intake of healthy but good-tasting foods," said Jean Ryan, a UI Hospitals and Clinics dietitian.

She said she's concerned about the free pizza, because children already eat high fat, sodium-packed foods. The dietitian

added, however, that she wouldn't name pizza as the sole contributor of students' weight gain and that pizza is OK sometimes.

Forty Iowa City School District classrooms are using the program this year, according to the Book It! website, including 17 classrooms in eight area daycares and prekindergarten schools, as well as 23 elementary-school classrooms.

Pizza Hut distributes materials, such as pins and reading charts, free of charge to schools. And the program, which lasts from October through March, gives students

the chance to earn six free personal-pan pizzas.

Pam Ehly, the director of instruction for the district, said few classrooms offer the program in the district because the central office does not encourage it.

"It's not our mission to advertise for a corporation," she said, adding that while the reading aspect of the program is beneficial, "students are a captive audience" and district officials don't endorse any corporate programs that influence them.

Instead, Ehly said, school principals decide whether

they want to offer the program, and teachers normally have the last word in their classrooms.

Regina Inter-Parish Catholic Education Center and Grant Wood Elementary are the only two local elementary schools using the program this year, according to the Book It! website.

Gail Hensch's fourth-grade students at Regina encompass one of the 21 classrooms participating in the school. Hensch, who has been teaching for 10 years, said she's "just always done" the program because it's a nice incentive to motivate her students.

While she said it's difficult to know if students read more because of the incentive, she thinks it probably increases the number of pages students read.

The teacher also dismissed the notion that it could contribute to students making unhealthy choices in their diet, because the program lasts for just six months, and it only awards students with one small pizza per month, she said.

"The only disadvantage I see is in fourth grade, I have kids more selective in where they want to eat," she said, explaining pizza sometimes isn't enough to motivate those students to read.

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# Suicide bombers kill 130 Shiite pilgrims

BAGHDAD — Two suicide bombers turned a procession of Shiite pilgrims into a blood-drenched stampede Tuesday, killing scores with a first blast and then claiming more lives among fleeing crowds. At least 106 were killed amid a wave of deadly strikes against Shiites heading for a solemn religious ritual.

Hours after the attack in Hillah — in the Shiite heartland south of Baghdad — boys used long-handled squeegees to push pools of blood off the road. The victims' shoes and sandals were gathered in haphazard piles.

"In an instant, bodies were set ablaze, people were running and the ground was mixed with teapots, kettles, and other supplies for pilgrims," said Mahdi Kadim, one of the survivors.

But there was also a louder message in the carnage that left at least 130 pilgrims dead throughout Iraq: U.S.-backed authorities remain virtually powerless to stop suspected

Sunni insurgents trying to push Iraq toward a sectarian civil war.

U.S. forces, too, continue to tally losses at the hands of extremists despite signs of more successful raids against bases and weapon stockpiles. The military said nine soldiers

were killed Monday in two separate roadside bombings north of Baghdad, making it the deadliest day for U.S. troops in Iraq in nearly a month.

"A brutal massacre against people who are only practicing their faith" was how Shiite lawmaker Sami al-Askari described

the Hillah attacks, which wounded at least 151 people.

Dr. Mohammed al-Temimi, at Hillah's main hospital, said some of the injuries were critical and the death toll of 106 could rise.

The Hillah strike came after gunmen and bombers hit group after group of Shiite pilgrims elsewhere — some in buses and others making the traditional trek on foot to the shrine city of Karbala, approximately 50 miles south of Baghdad. At least 24 were killed in those attacks, including four relatives of a prominent Shiite lawmaker, Mohammed Mahdi al-Bayati.

This weekend, huge crowds of Shiite worshippers will gather for rites marking the end of a 40-day mourning period for the death of Imam Hussein, the grandson of the Prophet Muhammad. Hussein died near Karbala in a seventh-century battle.


In Hillah, southeast of Karbala, a long line of pilgrims marched toward a bridge checkpoint on the edge of the city. Food and cool drinks were distributed at nearby tents.

The first suicide bomber killed dozens and touched off a

mad dash away from the bridge, said witness Salim Mohammed Ali Abbas. As the fleeing crowd grew thicker, another suicide bomber among them blew himself apart.

A police commander, Brig. Gen. Othman al-Ghanemi, said the attackers joined the procession outside Hillah and waited until it reached the checkpoint bottleneck to try to maximize the damage.

"The government bears some responsibility for this," com-

plained a Shiite Parliament member, Bahaa al-Araji. "It has not provided enough security to protect the pilgrims."

In the past two years, the powerful Mahdi Army militia watched over pilgrimages to Karbala. But the group agreed to put down its arms under intense pressure from the government, which wanted to avoid any confrontations with U.S.-led forces during a Baghdad security crackdown launched last month.

# More contact-lens solution recalled

ROCHESTER, N.Y. — Bausch & Lomb Inc., already humbled by a worldwide recall of its ReNu with MoistureLoc contact-lens solution, said Tuesday it is recalling about 1.5 million bottles of ReNu MultiPlus because trace amounts of iron could cause the cleaner to lose effectiveness earlier than normal.

The optical products maker also reported a modest drop in fourth-quarter and full-year sales in 2006, citing sluggish contact-lens sales amid a slower-than-expected recovery from last spring's recall of MoistureLoc, which was blamed for an outbreak of severe fungal eye infections.

The company said it has carried out a limited voluntary recall of 12 lots of its ReNu MultiPlus solution after get-

ting three customer reports of discolored solution.

No one was reported hurt, and the company believes that virtually all of the solution, made about a year ago at its plant in Greenville, S.C., has already been used by lens wearers.

Approximately 1 million bottles of the popular brand were distributed in the United States and another 500,000 in Canada, Korea, Taiwan, and Latin America. The company has notified the Food and Drug Administration and regulators in the other affected countries of the recall.

"I want to emphasize that this is completely unrelated to and different from the MoistureLoc

recall," company spokeswoman Barbara Kelley said.

"There have been no serious adverse events associated with this occurrence, and the possibility of a serious adverse event is remote."

Bausch & Lomb determined the discoloration was caused by trace amounts of iron found in a single batch of raw material from an outside supplier. As a result, it said, the affected lots could have a shorter shelf life than the two-year expiration date.

"From what they're describing, the event that occurred was relatively minor," said Penny Asbell, a professor of

ophthalmology at Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York. "It's definitely a different story from MoistureLoc. We now understand that certain conditions led that solution to be a very poor disinfectant. And it seems obvious now but quite honestly it wasn't obvious at the time."

"The take-home message from this event is most people do very well with contact lenses, but there are some risks, and

they can cut down those risks by following the manufacturers' recommendations. One thing they often don't realize is not only does the bottle have a shelf life in the store, it has a shelf life once it's opened, which is under their control."

Of the more than 30 million Americans who wear contact lenses, approximately 2.3 million used MoistureLoc, which was introduced in late 2004 and accounted for \$100 million

in global sales in 2005. At least 11 million people use the MultiPlus solution, which was launched a decade ago.

In May 2006, Bausch & Lomb permanently withdrew its new-formula MoistureLoc multipurpose cleaner from markets around the world when federal regulators called the product the "potential root cause" of an outbreak of Fusarium keratitis infections.

# Shelter House provides vital services, deserves expansion support

Iowa City's Shelter House has been fighting since early 2005 to build a new facility on land in a commercial district in the southern part of the city. A district court judge previously denied the special exception granted by the Iowa City Board of Adjustment in 2004 to the shelter to build in a commercially zoned area. The case is now before the Iowa Supreme Court. The Shelter House provides a valuable service to Johnson County and deserves the support of the local government in upgrading its facilities to assist a segment of our community that is in dire need of attention.

As the only facility of its kind in the county, it has a mere 29 beds, which the Shelter House asserts is woefully inadequate to serve Johnson County's homeless. Shelter officials estimate that, on average, 10 people are turned away from the shelter every night. Despite these limitations, the facility was able to assist nearly 1,600 homeless people in Johnson County during 2005.

The reasons people become homeless run the gamut from unemployment to marital problems to mental illness, and the shelter exists to help clients work through the issues that are the root causes. Contrary to prevalent public perception, the Shelter House is not a flop house for vagrants. Rather, it serves the vital purpose of rehabilitating members of society who have, for whatever reason, been left behind. The Shelter House's clients have access to a variety of counseling and therapy programs that are mostly run by volunteers. These programs are largely successful. The Shelter House reports that 60 percent to 90 percent of all clients, depending on which program they

take advantage of, leave for permanent housing.

A coalition of businesses in the Southgate neighborhood, in which the shelter hopes to relocate, have mobilized vocal opposition to the zoning exception and any attempt to construct a new homeless shelter in the area. The coalition was successful in getting the exception overturned in 2005, citing concerns regarding the shelter's possible effect on property values and the lack of parking spaces around the proposed site. The most vocal opponent has been the Hilltop Mobile Home Court. Concerns regarding crime that the shelter might bring to the area are unfounded, however, and other reservations should not outweigh the need for the vital service provided by the shelter.

The Shelter House has strict policies in place that prohibit entry to people who are intoxicated. Background checks are conducted on all potential residents, and no one identified as a convicted child predator is allowed to stay in the house. As to the worry of increase crime, testimony elicited during April 2005 proceedings that were to decide the shelter's fate showed higher arrest rates in the Hilltop Mobile Home Court are than at the Shelter House or the neighborhood surrounding its current location.

Regardless of the Supreme Court's decision, Shelter House must be afforded the opportunity to expand, either to the location on Southgate Avenue or a different site. Though the homeless are often the portion of society most overlooked, they are also in need of the most basic assistance.

### Troops need real support


I have some serious concerns about what Rep. David Loebsack has said regarding his troop support for Iraqi Freedom.

# MEXICO'S OWN 'MIGRA'

When House Republicans last year sought to make the mere presence of illegal immigrants in the United States a felony punishable by one year in prison, the odious legislation sparked international condemnation. No country was more loudly indignant than Mexico. Then-President Vicente Fox called the legislation "shameful" and its targets "heroes" who make a crucial contribution to the U.S. economy.

Yet Mexico is hardly in a position to criticize. Since 1974, foreign immigrants in Mexico illegally have been subject to prison sentences of two years, plus a fine. Immigrants who are caught re-entering Mexico after deportation face 10-year prison sentences, compared with two years here.

Until now, Mexican President Felipe Calderon has decided to tackle immigration reform of his own, and he is seeking the repeal of Article 123 of the General Population Law, which makes illegal immigrants the Mexican equivalent of felons.

The vast majority of the 185,000 illegal immigrants caught, detained, and deported by Mexican officials each year come from Guatemala and Honduras, and many of them are in transit toward the Rio Grande. Human-rights advocates have documented a lengthy list of abuses faced by these migrants — threats, extortion, violence — stemming in part from their status as felons. In addition to amending Mexico's draconian and hypocritical law, Calderon's

government is vowing to improve living conditions and medical services at the 48 detention centers in which illegal immigrants are held pending deportation. Proposed upgrades include the addition of hot water and telephone service.

In a recent report, Mexico's National Commission on Human Rights accused immigration agents of numerous violations, citing one instance in which 78 migrants were crammed into four cells, each designed to hold only five people, and denied food and water for more than 24 hours.

These reforms would certainly improve the plight of detained migrants and also Mexico's relationship with its southern neighbors, as well as giving Mexico more moral standing to agitate against laws affecting its citizens in the United States. Those in the United States who oppose guest-worker programs and a pathway to citizenship for illegal immigrants often cite Mexico's own harsher policies as the ones we should adopt or at least complain about first.

Mexico can devalue that argument by closing the gap between its advocacy for Mexican nationals in the United States and how it treats illegal immigrants within its borders. Mexico is under pressure from the United States to block the flow of migrants heading north, and recent crackdowns, in part, have been to that end. Ensuring the human rights of its migrant population, however, is not only the right thing to do, it's good politics.

So, by now, you've cast your vote for student government. Congratulations. Do you have the warm fuzzies that come with exercising your democratic rights? Is there a greater sense of participation, of belonging, of being master of your own destiny?

Well, if history is any guide, roughly four out of five of you didn't vote, so probably not. Last year's election — complete with news-making minor scandals that raised its profile somewhat — only managed to tear about 21 percent of you away from your studies and festivities long enough to cast a ballot. The highest turnout ever was the year before that, with a whopping 25 percent. Put simply, most of the UI students think about UISG about as often as Michael Jordan thinks about shampoo.

Who can blame them? Out of an annual university budget of \$2.1 billion, student government gets \$800,000 — around .04 percent. If the university budget was the populace at large, UISG would be the people who find Carrot Top funny. Most of what it does seems to be allocating that money toward student groups and initiatives. This is a fine thing, but it's certainly not something that justifies calling the organization a "student government." Funding things such as door hangers for residence halls to remind students of their rights isn't exactly earthshaking stuff.

Now, I'm certainly not laying the blame for this at the feet of the people who make up UISG. They're public-spirited folks, and they really are trying to do nice things for the students in general. However, they're kidding themselves if they think that they can accomplish much beyond the cosmetic within the current structure of the organization. One of their biggest problems is that nobody knows anything about them.

UISG seems to realize this. Two of the seven "current initiatives" listed on the group's website deal with trying to increase UISG's visibility around campus, through display cases in the IMU and website upgrades. This is important, because the low profile of the organization can't be changed without the weight of the students behind it, but it's a Catch-22. To gain more cash and recognition, UISG would have to accomplish bigger things. To accomplish bigger things, it needs more cash and recognition. Until something gives, candidates are going to be confined to running on platforms that deal with micro reforms about alcohol policy and recycling bins and trying to accomplish those little goals with little money.

I transferred to the UI from a small liberal-arts college. The school had around 1,400 students at the time and a policy of "self-governance" toward the students. This meant that student government was, in no uncertain terms, a big deal. Its budget allowed for per-student spending of around \$122, more than three times what we have here. If you had an idea for a group or an event that you thought would make the campus a better place, all you had to do was ask. The student government also had the responsibility for setting most of the campus rules and regulations, and the fact that the rule-makers were elected from among the ruled made the dorms there amiably tight-knit communities.

That's a bit of a pipe dream for a school as big and complex as Iowa. But student government, as it stands, is a formality rather than a force. Like the appendix, nobody really knows what it's for. ■

## Essaying electricities

**Anecdotal lead:** Ander Monson and I are connected through electromagnetic microwaves, voices hovering zigzagged somewhere between a cold Iowa morning and an Atlanta airport. After the cell-phone interview, he'll find himself strapped into a flying tube with a system of wires and airwaves guiding him back to the Midwest.

**Quotation introducing theme:** "Technology informs the way I think about the world — I think about it in terms of systems, weird interlocking systems."

**News peg:** Monson will read from *Neck Deep and Other Predicaments*, a new collection of essays, today at 7 p.m. at Prairie Lights Books, 15 S. Dubuque St.


**"Essay," as defined by Wikipedia:** "A short work of writing that treats a topic from an author's personal point of view. Essays are nonfictional but often subjective; while expository, they can also include narrative."

**"Essay," as viewed by Monson:** "I was frightened off by nonfiction originally; it seemed like this genre with only learned people who knew a great deal about their subject to put forth some point. But it became increasingly obvious to me in "Index for X [and the Origin of Fires]," that I was working in an essayistic world."

**Elaboration:** "Index for X" is the piece that converges most with his previous publications — his novel *Other Electricities* and collection of poetry *Vacationland*, both of which work as an exploration of tragedy and community in his Upper Michigan home. Originally conceived to appear as the last 50 pages of *Other Electricities*, "Index for X" uses each letter of the alphabet to generate questions and observations of everyday life (see his website, [other-electricities.com](http://other-electricities.com), for a multimedia-injected version). It was chosen by UI Assistant Professor John D'Agata as the 2002 winner of the Anne Dillard Award for Creative

car-wash foam, may seem as disjointed as the aforementioned mannequins (see?), Monson asserts that all are connected by a common theme. "It's about form. Some of them are explicitly formal, looking strange, but it's really about the idea of form and how it conduces or not — technology, obsolescence, snow, mining, information."

Nonfiction, and it spawned a frenzy of essaying leading to *Neck Deep*.

**Quotation by D'Agata:** (None found. Kindly discount failings of reporter to speak to easily accessible source. Insert portion of book endorsement): "Unapologetically smart, unexpectedly emotional, and playful in ways that most nonfiction never attempts, Ander Monson's *Neck Deep and Other Predicaments* is what we mean when we say *essay*."

**Relevance of above, with quotation:** While these 12 essays, with topics ranging from shady computer hackers to the varying colors of

**Explanation of form:** In addition to a particular obsession with modern, electronic technology (one essay details a teenage run-in with various levels of U.S. government for the dubious modification of electronic systems at his elite private school), Monson is also fascinated by the technology of the writing process, as displayed in an essay written entirely in Harvard Outline format (I.a.i.l., etc.). He's also interested in the book itself. "You have the dedication, index, all this kind of crap that you can make part of the text, part of the tech of its codex."

**Kicker:** For those who insist on taking their essay with a heap of standards and light on exploration, Monson's work will only provide frustration. The rest will, perhaps, remain in the "Index for X" entry for Q: "Questions, of which you have many, of which I have many ... is there anything we can say to stand up to the machinations of the text, or will it have its way with us, will it knock us to the ground."

## Hit or miss manners

It's my first formal dinner, and I'm cutting up a neon-orange plastic goldfish with a butter knife. No, it wasn't part of the meal — I was simply bored and fed up with the cheesy décor. Dressed in a hand-me-down suit coat, unimpressed with banquet formality, my barely 16-year-old self decided upon an act of inanity that greatly upset my table- and classmates, who vowed never to eat with me again.

Five years later, little has changed. Etiquette and I have always had a poor relationship. Perhaps it was growing up with an autistic brother who was granted great levity: If he could always demand canned ravioli, eat with improper utensils, and feed napkins to the dog, why couldn't I? It got the job done; food was in his belly, taste buds satisfied.

Or maybe it was rebellion, an adverse reaction to my father's declaration after seeing me eat Tater Tots with my hands: "There are rules in life!" Apparently, these rules don't take easy ketchup access into account. "For my own good," apparently, but not good for efficiency or deliciousness. Without them, I am nothing.

Fast-forward to an

argument with my favorite high-school English teacher, who claimed she wouldn't hire someone who performed poorly at dinner. Rhetorical brilliance aside, if applicants couldn't cut steaks properly or ate salad with the wrong forks, they were out on the street, proofreading research papers for nickels and leftover mashed potatoes.

But last Sunday, I decided to give etiquette another chance. Learning to fake it would probably be to my advantage: an ex-girlfriend has described my eating habits as "kinda really annoying," and with the popularity of the utensil-inspired practice of "spooning," I figured that acquiring these skills might be essential to finding a mate not robotic or mail-ordered.

The meal being discussed is the Russian Global Etiquette dinner sponsored by UI International Programs. If you want more detail about Russian culture and the event, see Matt Nelson's March 5 *DI* article; it's spiffy. The following is a semi-detailed account of my own confused musings.

Unfortunately, another woman skewed our table's victory by placing her elbows consistently on the linen — and she claimed to be cultured, a traveler. I was about to throw an excess fork in her direction, but I figured it would be impolite. Foiled again.

All in all, I suppose the experience was simple: rules of etiquette, domestic or global, are easy enough to follow — but I'm not letting them off the hook in inherent absurdity. Toward the end of dinner, the same woman told a story to the group about traveling to a poor area, being offered an abundance of food when she knew that the children were lacking in nourishment. She said it was more polite just to accept the food than complain, which is stupid. I'd rather hand feed the young'uns myself, fending off the hosts with a dripping soup ladle and be considered to lack all sense of etiquette. There are more important rules in life.

## Haluska's wild hoops ride

*With the regular season complete, Adam Haluska's days as a Hawkeye are numbered. After a basketball career at Iowa's two major state universities, his greatest challenge begins this weekend.*

Adam Haluska keeled over, exhausted, crying out in pain.

It's a sight almost beyond imagination after watching him tear his way to a first-team All-Big Ten selection with composure a steady-handed surgeon couldn't match.

But to Larry Eustachy, the former Iowa State men's basketball coach, it's no dream or hallucination. He saw it during Haluska's one year as a Cyclone, before he transferred to Iowa in 2003.

"At times I can remember him just dropping to his knees saying, 'I can't do this,'" said Eustachy, now head coach at Southern Mississippi. "... He was almost anemic at times. We worried about that and had him tested for it."

"He burnt so many calories so fast, we were literally shoving food down him. He was the only player we had eat something during breaks."

In addition to struggling through Eustachy's infamous brutal workouts, Haluska battled illness as a freshman.

"He got really sick with a terrible flu," said Adam's father, Steve Haluska. "I can remember as well as I'm sitting here right now. He was rundown, had lost some weight, he was vomiting, diarrhea, the whole bit."

"I think he lost 12 or 14 pounds. Yet, he never missed a start during that time. It was hell there for a while."

If that was hell, Adam Haluska's current situation is about as close to heavenly as one could get. The 23-year-old is engaged to his longtime girlfriend, Kendra Bengtson, he's worshipped by teammates, fans, and his head coach, Steve Alford. He can't even escape accolades in the classroom.

Haluska already has a degree from his time as a finance major, and he is working on a second in marketing — for his efforts he was named Academic All-American of the Year by *ESPN the Magazine* in February.

"When I came in, it was just a whole new world for me," he said. "You're playing at a big-time level, trying to keep up on school. I was trying to do the best I could in all the areas of college life."

"I just think as you get older you know how to prioritize."

He has spent four years at Iowa, three as a player — he sat out the 2003-04 season with an obligatory redshirt, abiding by transfer rules — and he's witnessed a lifetime of drama on and off the court.

Haluska was there for Pierre Pierce's crimes and banishment from the team, assistant coach shuffling, and a last-second loss to Northwestern State in the

first-round of the NCAA Tournament.

During the play that lost Iowa the game, Haluska was defending the shooter.

Somehow, his biggest burden still may await him as he tries to will Iowa back into March Madness this weekend at the Big Ten Tournament in Chicago.

"There's much, much more pressure on Adam as a senior than what there was for some of the seniors we've had in the past," Alford said. "That's what made this year so special for Adam. He's gone well beyond any of our expectations."

# Kleffman's back a concern

*Iowa men's gymnast and co-captain Curtis Kleffman has been battling a sore back lately, which has hindered his performance. Monday's X-ray results remain uncertain, as well as the team's strategy for the situation.*

What began two weeks ago as a seemingly nagging back muscle has gradually transformed into an injury for Hawkeye gymnastics co-captain Curtis Kleffman.

Describing it as a minor soreness, he says it has continued to tighten while simultaneously creeping up his back. On Monday evening, his back was X-rayed. The results remain inconclusive, but the All-American said he doubts whether any diagnosis will be forthcoming, largely because of his past experiences with back problems — X-rays have failed to identify the cause.

"It comes and goes," he said. "I thought I shook it, but this is something a little different that couldn't come at a worse time. It's something you have to work through."

Against Illinois on March 3, Kleffman attempted to bite the bullet, but a poorly heated gymnasium left him stiff after warming up, and head coach Tom Dunn made the call to restrict his all-around competitor to the pommel horse — an event in which there is less strain on the back.

As a result of the intensifying pain, Kleffman said, he wasn't able to train to the best of his ability last week, and it has mentally set him back.

"Everyone is doing his routine, and I'm not able to get them all done, which affects me a lot," he said. "When you come in wanting to do everything, taking a step back and just doing one event is kind of different. You're out of the flow."

The soreness, he said, has been inconsistent and has varied each day. Kleffman is

currently considered day-to-day, and he will compete in whichever events he has felt most comfortable on during practice.

"We probably won't make a decision until warm-ups for the meet again on Saturday, I'd imagine," Dunn said regarding the squad's upcoming meet in California. Dunn said Kleffman's likely substitute will freshman Reid Urbain, who competed well for the Hawks in their last competition.

"We'll just have to juggle a little bit and do the best we can," Dunn said. "We don't have a lot of options. It just depends if [Kleffman] can do one event, two events, or no events."

"If he can do a couple events, he'll be in. If he can't, we'll put someone else in the best we can."

The break to the Sunshine State will be great for the Hawkeyes, Kaufman feels, and he thinks the chance to leave the artificial turf behind and start chunking some real grass is especially important. The coach also hopes that with the lengthy break from frigid Iowa City will come renewed confidence as the golfers start to get into their routines. The chance to watch the full flight paths of shots and deal with the layout of a golf course should help the Hawks as well, he said. "You're not surrounded by water hazards in the Bubble," Kaufman said.


Senior Jon Feldick said it is much easier it is to improve one's game when out enduring hazards and course conditions. "There's only so much you can do indoors in a room, playing on an artificial green, or hitting golf balls that only go 100 yards," he said. 




