21-only petition reaches 500

The Committee for Healthy Choices, which wants to make the bars 21-only after 10 p.m., needs another 2,800 signatures.

Five hundred signatures down, 2,833 to go.

That's the number the Committee for Healthy Choices still needs to force the Iowa City City Council to consider its proposal, which would require people under the age of 21 to leave bars by 10 p.m. or face a \$250 fine.

Mark Martin, one of the petition's sponsors and a pastor at St. Andrew Presbyterian Church, said the group has 15 members, and it has enlisted more than 100 petition circulators to help meet the May 11 deadline.

"The big problem is that underage people come here expecting to be able to drink when they wouldn't have been able to somewhere else," Martin said.


Co-sponsor Rick Dobyns, a UI clinical professor of family medicine, said his main hope for the petition is to create a demand for non-alcoholic alternatives in the downtown area.

"Look, I'm 51 — I wouldn't know fun if you put it in front of me," he said. "But if you don't allow alternatives to drinking to develop in this community, then I don't know how you're going to deal with the problem."

Dobyns said he has gathered 50 signatures by himself and that community response has been largely positive. The committee has garnered approximately 500 signatures after only two weeks of circulation, he said.

OUT OF CLOSET & INTO PROM

The blue and white balloons that scattered the floor were kicked aside as people made their way from the glitter-covered tables to the dance floor at the front of the room. In the back, a small group gathered around the punch and listened as Jon Bon Jovi's "Livin' on a Prayer" blasted from the speakers.

At first glance, it may have looked like a typical high-school prom, but on Sunday, the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Allied Union offered much more than dancing to the area's gay community.

The student organization held its second-ever Queer Prom — and the first since 1999 — in the IMU Richey Ballroom in an effort to promote the local gay community while spreading HIV awareness and acceptance of alternative lifestyles.

UI sophomore Cody Shafer began

organizing the event just over a month ago, and while the attendance wasn't expected to exceed more than 100 people, he said he didn't mind starting small and watching the event grow into an annual event.

"The overall goal is for it to travel among [University of Northern Iowa], [Iowa State University], and here as an outlet for high-school kids who don't feel confident in coming out," he said.

Despite its primary focus on high-school students, UI senior Stephen Berge said he feels the event also gives Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Allied Union members and university students a second chance to have a prom they might not have had in high school.

"Many of our members didn't feel confident in taking someone to their high-school proms," said Berge, who is a board member of the Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Allied Union.

UI sophomore Julia Mohler, who has

previously attended Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender, and Allied Union events, said she feels the organization's presence on campus is great for the community.

"It gives kids a place to go — especially ones who were closeted in high school," she said.

Shafer contacted local businesses and organizations to help with the event and make it more than a dance. Studio 13, a popular downtown alternative bar, provided music, and the Johnson County Public Health Department offered free HIV testing.

"For us to provide an outlet for testing is a great thing to do," Shafer said.

Amy Winkler, a nursing student who works in the HIV division for the Public Health Department, agreed that the event was a great way to reach out to the gay population.

Slaying case to jury

In a "painful" moment, Tom Babcock took the witness stand to testify against his younger brother and publicly detail a confession he never wanted to hear.

And today, the panel of nine women and three men will continue deliberating if — with a dearth of physical evidence — that "confession" is enough to convict Larry Babcock of first-degree murder

in the fatal beating of his then-neighbor Timothy Becker six years ago at the Breckenridge Estates mobile home park. Tom Babcock said his younger brother had arrived unannounced, saying he needed to talk alone during an afternoon in July 2003.

The two got into Larry Babcock's car and drove down a rural Solon road about a quarter of a mile before pulling to the shoulder, Tom Babcock testified.

"He reached over, and he was patting his hand all over my chest and my sides. I looked at him, and I said, 'What are you doing?' And he says, 'I'm just looking to make sure you're not wired,'" Tom Babcock said, with little prompting from Johnson County prosecutor Janet Lyness.

"He said, 'Well, you've probably figured it out by now.'" Larry Babcock stared blankly across the courtroom at his older brother as he testified under oath.

"I said, 'It's Tim Becker, isn't it?' and I said, 'You killed him didn't you?' And [Larry] shook his head and said, 'Yes, I did.'"

Tom Babcock, imitating his brother's actions, clenched his fists, and said Larry Babcock told him: "I beat him, and I beat him bad."

Seven presidential hopefuls will come to Iowa this week, seeking support and discussing their campaign platforms. Some candidates are making their first trip to the state in months, while others are starting to make the Hawkeye State their home.

DEMOCRATS



Just one week after holding a town-hall meeting broadcast on "Good Morning America," Sen. **HILLARY RODHAM CLINTON**, D-N.Y., will return to Iowa. She will make a campaign stop in Iowa City at the Quality Inn and Suites to meet with local residents at noon on Tuesday. The same morning, Rodham Clinton will stop by former Gov. Tom Vilsack's home in Mount Pleasant. Today, she will hold events in Fort Madison and Burlington.



Former North Carolina Sen. **JOHN EDWARDS** will make his 20th visit to Iowa since November 2004, hosting a town-hall meeting at Prairie High School in Cedar Rapids at 5:45 p.m. on Tuesday. The following day, he will head to the Golden Leaf Banquet and Convention Center in Davenport at noon. Later that night, the senator will make his way to Des Moines' Roosevelt High School.



After campaigning in Council Bluffs and Sioux City at the end of last week, Sen. **BARACK OBAMA**, D-Ill., will travel to North Iowa Area Community College in Mason City on Wednesday.



Sen. **JOE BIDEN**, D-Del., will also head to the state for a policy speech at 3 p.m. hosted by the Drake University Law School in Des Moines. On Monday evening, the Delaware senator is scheduled to arrive in Cumming, Iowa, for a house party.

On Wednesday, former Secretary of Health and Human Services and Wisconsin Gov. **TOMMY THOMPSON** is scheduled to speak in Clive at the 7 Flags Event Center. Thompson officially announced his candidacy on Sunday.



Rep. **TOM TANCREDO**, R-Colo., will come back to Iowa after hosting a spaghetti dinner with Johnson County Republicans on March 23. Appearing on WHO AM 1040 this morning, Tancredo will announce details about his desire to seek the his party's presidential nomination.



Making his first visit to Iowa since officially announcing his intention to seek the 2008 Republican presidential nomination, former New York City Mayor **RUDY GIULIANI** will travel to the Hy-Vee Deli on First Avenue in Cedar Rapids to meet with small-business owners and area residents. The event takes place in the late afternoon on Tuesday. After wrapping things up in eastern Iowa, Giuliani is scheduled to hold a rally at Valley High School in West Des Moines later that evening.

UI presidential list at 120

Now that the UI presidential-search committee has collected enough names, the next step is interviewing — though no word has come yet on whether interviews will be open or closed.

The number of names on the list has peaked.

The UI presidential-search committee has amassed a list of 120 candidates vying to become the next UI president, and panel head David Johnsen said on Sunday that the list will shrink as the committee winnows the field.

But Johnsen, the dean of the College of Dentistry, said the committee won't discard any names until a new president is chosen.

"You can't take out the names," the dean said, noting the panel will begin interviewing soon. "We will continue to look at

who would be the best, and we will try to contact people. I would say we have quite a number of highly qualified people."

The panel, now with an adequate number of candidates at its disposal, has begun to mull over whether the interviews will be open or closed to the public, Johnsen said.

Evaluation will begin once the list of names is narrowed to 20, he said.

One committee member exhibited frustration on Sunday about outside pressures to decide on interviewing methods.

Leonard Hadley, the retired CEO of Maytag Corp., stressed that every search for a new president — whether the

endeavor is academic or not — is unique and the decision of how to evaluate candidates must not be rushed.

"This will be a case-by-case evaluation of who we feel are the finalists. ... That is the only way to do it," he said. "And people who keep on pressuring us to make the decision early have the cart before the horse."

Even though the search committee has allowed greater openness than the first presidential-search committee, Hadley said, it may be wise to keep the names of the interviewees shrouded from the public eye.

"As an [open] process, it would not guarantee that it would get the best candidate,"

he said. "The best candidate may say that he or she would not participate in that process. So do you feel so strongly about a[n open] process that you are willing to bypass the best candidate?"

Meanwhile, the number of candidates has eclipsed 100, and the July 1 projected date to have a new UI president is only a few months away. But Johnsen said the committee has no plans to push back the deadline.

"We made quite a bit of progress on Friday," he said. "So we will still hold out with the July 1 deadline and work back from there."

Babcock confession disputed

It wasn't until three months after Larry Babcock's alleged admission that Tom Babcock told police.

"It was the right and moral thing to do, and as painful as it is for me to testify, this is the right thing for me to do," the 50-year-old said, dabbing his eyes with a tissue and exhaling deeply into the microphone.

Kathie McDonald, Larry Babcock's girlfriend of four years, told *The Daily Iowan* that the final day of testimony was the most difficult.

"I've sat here, and I've listened to people lie about things I've been apart of," she said, calling on her own recollection of the afternoon she and Larry Babcock visited Tom Babcock. "I have my own theory why Tom said the things he said."

The prosecution also introduced as evidence a recorded telephone conversation between the two brothers, during which the attorneys allege Larry Babcock's statements refer twice to committing the slaying.

But during her closing arguments, defense attorney Jill Ableidinger repeatedly asserted that prosecutors were trying to make "mountains out of molehills."

"The state is trying to make a whole lot of something out of a whole lot of nothing to justify why

they arrested Larry Babcock," she said, noting that police had knowledge of Babcock's alleged confession for nearly three years before they arrested him.

"This is simply a prosecution by default," she said.

The defense attorney asserted that the two key pieces of physical evidence — a bloody, unidentified palm print from a closet door and an apparent blood-mixture substance with two unidentifiable donors taken from the bathroom sink — are clearly more important than what the prosecution had alleged.

"We have evidence that points in another direction, away from Larry Babcock," she said gesturing toward her client. "That someone else committed this crime."

After closing arguments, jurors deliberated for less than an hour before requesting copies of the taped telephone conversation, its transcript, and the trial transcript from Judge Denver Dillard. The judge allowed prosecutors to supply the portion of the conversation heard during proceedings.

Deliberations will resume at 9 a.m. today. If convicted, 41-year-old Babcock would spend the rest of his life behind bars.

Babcock murder trial

The following events have been submitted as evidence in Larry Babcock's trial for the slaying of Timothy Becker.

- June 30, 2001: Authorities say Timothy Becker was bludgeoned to death.
- July 1, 2001: Becker is found face down in his bedroom by Larry Babcock.
- July 3, 2001: After performing an autopsy, medical examiner Julia Goodin rules Becker's death the result of numerous blunt-force injuries to the head.
- July 2003: Babcock allegedly confesses to older brother Tom Babcock while the two are parked along a Solon road.
- April 12, 2006: Authorities arrest Babcock and charge him with first-degree murder near his Highlandville, Mo., home.

Panel names 4 nursing-dean finalists

Four finalists for dean of the UI College of Nursing were announced March 31 by a search committee.

UI faculty members Rita Frantz and Keela Herr, Sara Torres, formerly of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, and Faye Gary from Case Western Reserve University were selected as the final four.

"We were looking for people who will have respect of faculty," said Dean David Johnsen of the UI College of Dentistry, who led the search panel.

Former Dean Melanie Dreher announced her resignation January 2006, and the nursing school has been under the direction of interim Dean Martha Craft-Rosenberg since June 2006.

The search committee began its search process late last spring with phone and preliminary off-campus interviews.

Frantz and Herr were interviewed last week, and Torres and Gary are scheduled to be interviewed this week. Johnsen said the committee hopes to collect all evaluations by next weekend.

The candidates have yet to be reviewed by UI Provost Michael Hogan before negotiations take place. UI interim President Gary Fethke will make the final decision.

UIHC, Muscatine facility sign agreement

The UI Hospitals and Clinics and Unity HealthCare of Muscatine signed a memorandum on March 31 that formalized a relationship between the two establishments.

The goals of the formal affiliation include improving care, increasing educational programs, and adding service lines between the UIHC and Unity HealthCare, which primarily serves the six counties surrounding Muscatine.

Bob Lundin, a marketing consultant for Unity HealthCare, said the two establishments had always maintained a good relationship. The UIHC has provided services such as the use of the UI sleep laboratory and visiting cardiologists.

"The question is, now that we've signed, what are the kinds of things we can do to expand services on the quality side?" Lundin said about future projects between the UIHC and Unity HealthCare.

Unity HealthCare can now enjoy financial relief with discounts on technology and pharmaceutical expenses.

Though the UIHC has other affiliate facilities, Unity HealthCare is the first community hospital to have permission to officially use the UI logo. The combined banner was unveiled in the Unity HealthCare lobby.

Discussions began more than a year ago, and on March 31, two representatives from each establishment addressed the audience and signed the memorandum — Jean

Robillard, the dean of the UI Carver College of Medicine, and Donna Katen-Bahensky, the UIHC director, signed on behalf of the university.

Man charged with stalking

Iowa City police have charged a 22-year-old man with stalking, accusing him of violating a no-contact order more than 50 times.

Police said Daniel Jason, address unknown, spent 20 days in jail for harassment in February. Since his release on Feb. 27, he breached orders not to contact his victim 51 times, according to a police complaint dated March 22.

Officers said since Feb. 27, Jason confronted his reported victim and sent that person numerous threatening e-mails.

Authorities said quotations from his e-mails included, "I'm in control now, once I get my money back I'll do everything I can to embarrass [sic] u and cripple u, ure poor have no money, and I will God Bless be a martyr!"

Jason was booked into the Johnson County Jail at about 11:20 p.m. on March 31. He now faces a Class D felony charge of stalking as well as charges for violating his no-contact order.

A Class D felony is punishable by up to five years in prison and \$7,500.

UI cook charged

A cook at the UI Hillcrest Marketplace has been accused of soliciting sex in an online chat room and via telephone with someone he thought was a 14-year-old boy, according to the FBI.

Richard Alan Lang of West Branch was arrested March 14 at a Robbinsdale, Minn., McDonald's and charged with crossing the state line with intent to engage in a sex act with a minor, authorities reported. FBI officers and the Minnesota Cyber Crime Task Force apprehended him at 3 p.m., officials said.

Lang, who used the screen name Rockzmyhead1 to chat with an undercover agent, reportedly admitted that he was planning to meet the boy with whom he had been in contact with since Feb. 1, according to KSTP-TV, a television station in Minneapolis-St. Paul. The ABC network affiliate also reported that Lang described online the sex acts he would perform on the boy.

Phillip Jones, the UI vice president for Student Services, confirmed that Lang is employed at the UI but declined to comment further.

Robbinsdale is roughly 300 miles from West Branch.

Lang, 44, could not be reached for comment late Sunday. Neither managers at the Hillcrest Marketplace nor the FBI could be reached for further comment, either.

Both Martin and Dobyns said they knew some critics of the proposal worry the 21-year restriction would only increase student attendance at house parties. But they said the passage of legislation, such as the keg-registration bill and enforcement of existing city noise ordinances, would be enough to keep house parties under control.

UI Student Government City Council liaison Austin Baeth disagreed. Although he commended the committee members for attempting to do something about the underage drinking problem, he argued there is no way house parties would ever have as much supervision as bars.

"They just don't know how house parties work," he said. "If

they don't have kegs, they're going to be drinking jungle juice."

Iowa City police Lt. Jim Steffen agreed that a 21-ordinance would not solve things as easily as the committee hopes.

"I think the keg registration is going to help, but we're still going to have problems with house parties that we're going to have to look at," he said.

If enough signatures are acquired, the council would either have to enact the change or hold a public referendum in November, which would require a simple majority vote for passage.

IRS, Taste of China mum about probe

Three local Taste of China restaurants are still under investigation by the Internal Revenue Service, authorities have confirmed.

John Nunez, a special agent with IRS criminal investigation, confirmed that agents were sent to the eateries — located at 1705 S. First Ave. and 208 N. Linn St. in Iowa City and 2018 Eighth St. in Coralville. The raids were conducted simultaneously with Iowa City and Coralville police officers.

Though Nunez would not comment on the inquiry, he said

the criminal-investigation branch is responsible for examining income-tax fraud, money laundering, and currency crimes.

The Iowa City police confirmed that officers were dispatched to the Linn Street and First Avenue establishments and 701 Arlington Drive, the residence of one of the owners.

"All the IRS asked of us is that personnel be assigned," Iowa City police Sgt. Troy Kelsay said, adding that the presence of Iowa City police was to provide manpower. "Our jurisdiction is recognizable."

Kelsay said Iowa City police

notified the restaurant owners and delivered warrants, but the local police are not part of investigations.

The Coralville police were dispatched to assist at 2018 Eighth St., but officers were not available for comment.

Employees from the three establishments refused to be identified or give details of the situation.

"[Lawyers] told us they are still discussing [the matter]," said an employee of the First Avenue restaurant. "It may be nothing."

Workers at the Coralville and Linn Street establishments also

stated they were advised by attorneys to remain quiet about the situation. They would not provide the names of their legal counsel.

"I'm not sure what's going on," said an employee from the Linn Street location, which was closed for several days when the investigations began. "Our English is not good, and we need things translated. We're still looking for a lawyer."

Nunez said he cannot disclose further information until the public records become available.

Loebsack's PAC funds raises some eyebrows

The freshman 2nd District representative has raised \$100,000 since Nov. 7.

A staunch supporter of campaign-finance reform, Rep. Dave Loebsack, D-Iowa, has raised more than \$100,000 in political-action committee money since Election Day, records show.

Following the recent spate of scandals — one of which sent former Rep. Duke Cunningham, R-Calif., to prison — Loebsack called changes to campaign-finance laws "one of the most important reforms we could enact as a nation." His fundraising totals are almost three times more than fellow Democrat and freshman Rep. Bruce Braley of Iowa's 1st District. "I've taken money from people who believe I'm going to vote in their favor," Loebsack said on March 24 at a Democracy for America seminar in Cedar Rapids. "I'm not going to do that. It's against who I am."

Sources contributing to Loebsack's political war chest range from the American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations to the Independent Community Bankers of America.


Former Rep. James Leach, whom Loebsack ousted in November 2006 after 30 years at the Capitol, was known for refusing PAC contributions and donations from outside the state.

Peverill Squire, a UI political-science professor, said it's "somewhat realistic" to assume that the financial donations have no effect on the way the congressman votes in Washington. Each contribution seems like a drop in the bucket when politicians raise so much money, he said.

"[PAC fundraising] may disillusion some Democrats. But they must face the question — what's the alternative?" the professor said. "Most 2nd District Democrats would still rather vote for Loebsack than a Republican."

Leading the PAC

Rep. Dave Loebsack has recently spoken out about PAC money and how it affects politicians' votes. Campaign contributions in Iowa vary greatly from district to district.

Acquiring money in this manner remains a reality of modern campaigning because candidates need thousands of dollars to compete in their races, Squire said. It would prove to be nearly impossible to retain political office if PAC money

was eliminated from Loebsack's campaign strategy altogether, he said.

"The more money he stashes away, the more intimidating he is as an opponent," Squire said. "I'm sure Rahm Emanuel [D-Ill.] and the Democratic leadership are coaching newly elected congressmen to position themselves to get re-elected."

One group giving \$5,000 to Loebsack — the National Air Traffic Controllers Association — said it doesn't expect anything in particular from the congressman.

"We support those candidates that are willing to stand up for the issues we believe in," said Doug Church, a spokesman for the group. "Anyone who is opposed to the [Federal Aviation Administration] imposing its will on us would certainly be an appealing candidate and one whom we would likely support."

Local Dems hear hopefuls

Johnson County Democrats heard a series of presidential speeches this past weekend, and more candidates are slated to visit eastern Iowa this week.

As leading presidential candidates cascade through Iowa this week, one dark-horse candidate said if he's elected in 2008, local Democrats may be surprised with some posh perks.

"You're all invited to spend a night in the White House," said Sen. Chris Dodd, D-Conn., to Johnson County Democrats munching on low-sodium chili and cherry pie while listening to candidates stump during a March 31 luncheon at Old Brick Church, 26 E. Market St.

While various politicians commended one another at the fundraiser, Dodd said it was time for the United States to change its place in the world.

Specifically, he said, he'll attempt to reverse the Military Commissions Act, which was signed by President Bush in October 2006 to try unlawful enemy combatants and alleged terrorists. He said he would also find a method for getting troops out of Iraq.


Dodd said he felt politicians may not be holding the public's best interest in mind regarding Iraq.

"Members of Congress ought to be listening to the American public on this issue," he said.

But as Dodd focused on foreign relations, one senator from a nearby state spoke on behalf of his junior colleague — who is one of Dodd's more formidable challengers for the Democratic nomination.

Sen. Dick Durbin, D-Ill., campaigned for fellow Illinois Sen. Barack Obama while also criticizing the president.

Durbin listed seven words that he believed "define the

presidency" — "Sadr City," "Lower Ninth Ward," and "Building 19."

He used the first phrase to criticize the Iraq war, saying President Bush's decision to go to war resulted in more than a loss of U.S. prestige, citing the nearly 3,250 American deaths.

"That is the legacy of a failed policy, which we have to address," he said. "The president never understood the cost of this war."

He also criticized Bush for not mentioning Hurricane Katrina in his Jan. 23 State of the Union Address.

Then Durbin touted Obama's experience as an Illinois state senator and the first black pres-

ident of the *Harvard Law Review*, while likening Obama's appeal to that of Robert Kennedy, saying Iowans have a "rare opportunity to pick someone who can lead this generation forward" in the caucuses.

Amid the slew of stumping, praise for another Democratic contender surfaced during the three-hour event.

Delaware Attorney General Beau Biden, speaking on behalf of his father, Sen. Joe Biden, D-Del., said that although his father initially voted to support using force in Iraq, he has since stood up to the Bush administration to "call it like it is." Beau Biden specifically touted his father's seven visits to the country.

"I would argue that one man in Congress got the ball rolling to stop this war in Iraq," he said.

Mari Culver, the wife of Gov. Chet Culver, thanked local state lawmakers for their work on passing a state minimum-wage increase and repealing a state measure that effectively banned embryonic stem-cell research, among other measures.

"The Democrats have been delivering on those commitments," Culver said.

UISG members must show up

On March 29, the UI Student Government's Student Assembly met in an attempt to pass a budget for the third and final time. On two prior occasions, UISG was unable to pass the budget. First, the meeting had to be adjourned because of time constraints, while the second meeting was unable to make quorum and could not review the proposed budget. Had the Student Assembly failed to have enough members present again or pass the budget March 29, the group would have had to turn over the proposed budget for fiscal 2008 to Phillip Jones, the UI vice president for Student Services. After three hours and excessive bickering, the assembly was able to pass the budget. This close call exemplifies the need for UISG to improve how it functions and enforce its attendance policy.

The budget process is immensely important, and UISG is responsible for deciding how to allocate student-activity fees to various student organizations. UISG is charged with dispensing a budget of more than \$800,000 to the 400-plus university organizations. In order to advocate for these groups as intended, the senate needs to be able to amend and vote on the budget, which at the very least requires senators to show up. The actual process of amending and voting on the budget is discouraging, as was evident during the March 29 meeting. The meeting started late and ran longer than needed. There were some in attendance who didn't seem particularly focused on the task at hand and others more

concerned with amending items to the budget that were not germane — such as a disagreement with how the Student Assembly Budgeting and Allocating Committee has operated. This was the last chance UISG had to pass its budget recommendations, and the main focus should have been amending allocations as necessary and passing said budget.

Attendance problems are also evident and must be addressed. There is a rule that senators may be removed from office if they miss two meetings, but UISG is still having trouble ensuring its members show up. Individual senators are responsible for enforcing the policy and must take this seriously.

For new UISG President Barrett Anderson and Vice President Carole Peterson, one priority should be stricter enforcement of the attendance policy by pressuring the three senates to demonstrate increased regular attendance. If necessary, those who consistently fail to show up should be removed, as the policy allows. Student Assembly meetings are held just once every three weeks, and senators should be prepared to attend each meeting. Members of UISG occupy elected positions; failing to show up reflects a lack of respect for the students who voted for them. Senators are aware of the responsibilities their positions entail, and they must strive to fulfill them. Anything less is a disservice to the students of this university, whose interests UISG members were chosen to represent.

America's allegory

Today marks my favorite day of the year. Opening Day, the beginning of a new season for America's favorite pastime, evokes nothing but pure joy in my heart. If it were not for a test today, I'd be mysteriously ill.

Many sports fans like to knock baseball for being slow, boring, or devoid of action. They have every right to hold these opinions, ignorant as they may be. Baseball's seeming passivity hides an extreme intensity. It is more than merely the "thinking man's" game. It represents a greater allegory for the American experience.

The political sphere is often thought of as a completely defined, specific realm. But the experiences of politics lend themselves to more attributes of life than just elections. Our politics are innumerable. Similar to conventional politics, baseball is a much more nuanced sport than its detractors argue. Baseball divides Americans as bitterly as left-right ideological splits.

Most visible these days are the raging debates over steroids. Extreme purists absurdly claim that it is reasonable to place every player under suspicion. Worse, they argue that a baseball great such as Barry Bonds does not belong in the Hall of Fame — though Bonds has never been found guilty of taking performance-enhancing substances. It speaks to the central role baseball has in American culture that prominent ballplayers of the 1990s were called before Congress to testify to prove their innocence. America is a country in which those charged with breaking the law are assumed innocent until proven guilty — unless their biceps grew, head enlarged, or home-run numbers spiked throughout their careers.

I am not overstating my argument. Baseball has woven itself into moral debates since its conception. The gambling scandals of its early era — culminating in the 1919 fixing of the World Series by the Chicago White Sox — to the racial barriers broken by Jackie Robinson and Larry Doby were not isolated, contained events. They showed the public struggles America faced throughout the 20th century. Unsurprisingly, both these problems surfaced again — the all-time hits leader, Pete Rose, is banned from the Hall of Fame because of gambling on his team, and Hank Aaron received countless death threats in his pursuit of Babe Ruth's home-run crown.

Baseball demonstrates that societal progress is neither constant nor inevitable. Baseball displays both the good and bad of America, the beliefs that while we move toward a greater human condition, the road will be rocky and not linear.

Both the heart and mind are engaged in lovers of the great sport. Numbers, theories, tactics, determination, and character — the richness of baseball is immeasurable. Insider-outsider debates rage, demonstrated most recently by the disciples of sabermetrics and its prophet, Bill James, fighting the traditional views held by many analysts and commentators. Twenty years ago, James was ignored and disdained by the baseball establishment. In 2004, as a special adviser to the Boston Red Sox, his work helped spur the Red Sox to their first World Series title in more than 80 years.

But it is not fair to say this intelligence — which I largely adhere to — has found the key to the sport. It remains a sport decided by players on the field and managers in the dugouts. Though general managers may search for ways to improve their teams, ultimately, the men on the diamond determine the winners and losers. Cold, distant rationalism is not always the determinant of events. It would not be a stretch to say that the drastic momentum swing after David Ortiz's walk-off home run in Game Four of the American League Championship Series in 2004 propelled the Red Sox to their eventual title.

The idea that baseball lovers can blindly throw themselves into the souls of their favorite teams is unmatched in other team sports. Baseball teams have histories, emotions, strengths and weaknesses in character. While Jerry Seinfeld famously declared that baseball fans "root for a uniform," in reality, devotees support intangible ideals of hope and love.

Quite apparently, my love for baseball runs through my blood, sometimes in absurd ways. If Grady Sizemore — the center fielder for the Cleveland Indians — ran for president on a fascist ticket, I'd canvass for him. Baseball — and the Indians — has an insurmountable stranglehold on my heart. It is a part of who I am.

It's a great day for baseball. Let's play two. ■

On March 20, a bill known as the Safe Climate Act of 2007 was introduced to Congress by Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif. The bill calls for a gradual (2 percent) reduction in emissions every year beginning in 2010, as well as the creation of a Climate Reinvestment Fund to develop new energy technologies, protect consumers from energy-cost increases, and safeguard wildlife and water resources. Dave Loebbeck, the representative of Iowa's 2nd District, has yet to voice his support for this important piece of legislation. As a congressman, Loebbeck has a moral responsibility to take action on this issue, and as voters, we have a moral responsibility to encourage him to vote in favor of this bill.

The United States emits more than 20 percent of the world's global-warming pollution but contains only 5 percent of the globe's population. Despite there being a mass of scientific evidence illustrating the grim realities of global climate change and humankind's role in it, American industries and government have been reluctant to make the changes necessary to counter the problem. Domestic violence murders: One is too many

There have been 155 domestic-violence murders in Iowa over the last 10 years. Twenty of the victims were children. As domestic-violence victim, Heather Fredrickson recently said when she was informed of these sad facts, "That is too many. One is too many."

In Iowa, it is possible for someone who has been convicted of the crime of assaulting a spouse to possess a gun without violating Iowa law, even when the assault was committed with a firearm. Possession of firearms by domestic abusers is prohibited by federal law, but federal laws cannot be enforced in state court, and our federal courts do not have the capacity to handle more than a tiny fraction of these violations of the law.

I have asked the Iowa General Assembly to pass a law this year that would fill this enforcement gap by making it a state crime for a domestic abuser to possess a firearm. Such laws are already on the books in 24 other states.

Senate File 491, if enacted, will not take guns away from law-abiding citizens. The prohibition on purchasing or possessing guns only would apply to those convicted of domestic abuse and those for whom a no-contact order prohibits contact with a spouse or intimate partner. It is important to note that this only would apply to orders for which the alleged abuser was given notice and an opportunity to appear at a hearing (the firearm prohibition could not occur

without due process to the gun owner.) And when the no-contact order expired, the gun would be returned upon demand.

This law would simply provide some measure of safety to spouses and children during the most volatile and dangerous time. This legislation makes common sense. It would make Iowa a safer state.

This is a nonpartisan public-safety issue. Disarming domestic abusers has been a top priority of both the Clinton and Bush administrations. In the U.S. Senate, the federal law received overwhelming support, including that of Iowa Sens. Tom Harkin and Charles Grassley. Former U.S. Attorney Charles Larson Sr. joined me recently in visiting the State Capitol to urge lawmakers to support this bill. The bill passed the Iowa Senate Judiciary Committee with bipartisan support, but it still faces an uncertain future in the Legislature.

I ask you to urge Iowa lawmakers to give our peace officers and courts the tools necessary to disarm domestic abusers. Preventing domestic abusers from possessing firearms will save lives. Far too many avoidable murders have occurred already. It is too many to have 155 murder victims. Twenty murdered children is too many. One is too many.

The heart of a poet, a memoir about murder

In March 1969, 23-year-old Jane Mixer, a first-year law student at the University of Michigan, caught a ride home with a man she had met through the campus bulletin board. She was making the trip home to tell her parents that her boyfriend had proposed and that she would soon be married. Mixer, however, never arrived home that night. Her body was found the following morning lying on top of a gravestone in a small cemetery 14 miles away. She had been shot twice in the head and strangled with a pair of pantyhose.

Mixer was believed to have been another victim of serial killer John Norman Collins, so Michigan detectives closed the case for 35 years until a startling DNA match was found in November 2004. This discovery

led to the reopening of the case and the conviction of Gary Earl Leiterman.

The trial was documented by Maggie Nelson, a professor who at the time taught in Connecticut and who had long been obsessed with the murder of a woman she had never actually met — her Aunt Jane.

Nelson, now a creative-writing professor at the California Institute of the Arts in Valencia, will read from her book *The Red Parts: A Memoir* today at 7 p.m. at Prairie Lights Books, 15 S. Dubuque St. In the memoir, she recounts the intimate details of her life leading up to and after the reopening of her aunt's murder trial 35 years after the fact.

Aunt Jane's death has haunted her since childhood. Nelson's grandfather nicknamed her "Janie" after his murdered daughter, and only after finding newspaper clippings tucked

away in a bookshelf did she grasp the pet name's cryptic undertones.

This is not the first time Nelson has used her aunt's murder as literary inspiration. In 2005, *Jane: A Murder* was published, a book of poetry in which, using research, Nelson told the story of her aunt's murder. Just a few months before this biographical collection of poems was supposed to be published, Mixer's case was reopened, leaving Nelson in a peculiar situation.

"When [the case] was

reopened, it just seemed like a natural thing to keep writing about," Nelson said. "*The Red Parts* ended up just being a chronicle of my psychic landscape over a year period. I think that a lot of things that I wanted to say in *Jane* didn't really end up belonging in the poetry."

Once Mixer's case was reopened and Nelson dealt with the legal system and the newly reinterested media, the murder became more of a reality as opposed to the research project she had done in order to write *Jane: A Murder*. Still, Nelson considers the two works "sister projects."

While *Jane: A Murder* detailed Mixer's death through her own eyes, *The Red Parts* intertwines very personal details of Nelson's life, such as the breakup with her boyfriend and the death of her father, with scenes from the rigid courtroom where she is made to

watch gruesome pictures of her aunt — dried blood caked on her face and her jumper pulled up around her waist.

Nelson explains in *The Red Parts* that she has developed what she calls "murder mind." She cannot stop thinking, dreaming, or reading about murder and death. Now that

she has published two books on the subject, she would like to move on to other topics — like closure.

When asked if her new work is her last on the subject, Nelson replied, with a sighing laugh, "I hope so."

Skating around gay blades

Once, I had someone ask me if, because I was a journalist, I really loved the movie *Anchorman*. So let me begin by asking: It's pretty clear you don't have to be a fan of figure skating to enjoy *Blades of Glory*, correct?

If you can only vaguely remember Nancy Kerrigan's clubbed leg, you're probably better off, actually. An encyclopedic knowledge of the sport is less

important to the enjoyment of the film than, say, a healthy appreciation for heavy-handed homoeroticism.

Because, basically, this is a love story. It's two-dimensional and simple, true, but as the *Blades of Glory* trailer makes abundantly clear, such things as "plot" and "character development" aren't really the point.

I have a theory there is a boardroom someplace in Hollywood in which the ideas churned out are no more complicated than "Will Ferrell as..." Here, he plays renegade figure-skating champion Chazz Michael Michaels, a nymphomaniac, cocky athlete who favors using lots of fire in his act. Unlike Ferrell's other, more fully realized jerky characters, Chazz remains fairly unlikable through most of the film.

Thankfully, the burden of the laughs no longer rests on Ferrell's beefy shoulders. Hedging their bets by attempting to tap into that sad populace still not over *Napoleon Dynamite*, the moviemakers have Jon Heder fill out the other half of the bill as the wildly effeminate Jimmy

MacElroy, as precise and by-the-book as figure skaters come, with a tragic family background that leaves one announcer describing him as "little orphan Awesome!"

After a post-match blowup between the two winds up getting both of them banned from the sport, each of the skaters is prepared to hang up his one-pieces, forever (and kudos must go out to the costume designer here, who does more character work with a shirt than an entire page of dialogue), until a loophole presents itself, handily enough — they can still compete, but as the world's first male-male pair. Hilarity ensues.

No, really. While neither Ferrell nor Heder are strong enough to carry *Blades of Glory* on their own, their varying styles of line delivery keeps the movie light and funny, and the addition of several hilarious minor characters allows the film to stray into the truly farcical every now and then to great effect. As a bonus, it contains a sublimely ridiculous chase sequence near the climax of action.

Unfortunately, a rather

shoehorned-in romance between Heder and Jenna Fischer (lately of TV's "The Office") does neither actor good, remaining stilted and pointless from beginning to end. It seems clear that this is only tossed in to potentially distract from the glaring obviousness of the romance between Ferrell and Heder.

It's difficult to write off *Glory* for being homophobic, exactly, though the majority of the laughter in the crowd seemed to be coming from dudes in groups much too large to be dates. For the most part, the film seems content in its status as current quotable flick and a pleasant diversion on a Saturday afternoon.

And, because I have gotten through this entire review without a lame pun: *Blades of Glory* is indeed graceful on the ice, but the landing leaves something to be desired.

UI grad programs ranked high

The UI garnered acclaim after 21 graduate programs ranked in the top 10 among national public universities, according to newly released rankings from the *U.S. News & World Report*.

The annual report on graduate schools in the United States included a number of new categories in which the UI scored highly among public and private universities. The full, detailed report will be available today, including more than 1,000 programs in the nation.

"We're at very, very good rankings," said UI Provost Michael Hogan. "We are the smallest public university in the Big Ten, but we're at the very top of these programs, and that means we have a good academic reputation."

The physician's assistant, speech language pathology, and nursing service administration programs ranked No. 1 among both public and private institutions.

In addition, the UI ranked first among public universities for its gerontological/geriatric nursing and audiology programs, second nationwide.

Printmaking and social psychology were additional areas the UI ranked within the top five nationwide.

"[The rankings] are something we pay attention to," said interim President Gary Fethke.

"They're an external validation in some sense of what we do."

The difficulty in distinguishing between lower-ranked programs — such as the computer science and earth sciences doctorates, both ranked in the 40s among public universities — and the ease with which the ratings could change from year to year give less statistical validity to lower-ranked categories, he said.

And to improve ratings further, Fethke said, the UI would have to make tough decisions.

"The way you're going to become more highly ranked as a public university is to concentrate your focus," he said. "You're going to have to be focused on fewer areas."

But the higher rankings serve

as a support to the university, Hogan said, noting the economic crisis the UI faced in the previous five years. The rankings show how the university has protected its academic strengths, thanks in part to the deans of the various colleges within the UI, he said.

Because the UI is looking at a better budget picture in the next couple years, he said, officials will be able to invest in some of the academic programs that have been shortchanged over the past few years.

"I'd like to see even more programs ranked at the top," Hogan said. "We're always seeking those kinds of improvements."

Court splits in Oakdale cases

The Iowa Supreme Court finds different judgments in similar cases dealing with escaped inmates at the Iowa Medical & Classification Center.

The state may now be held accountable for injuries that a visitor to the Iowa Medical & Classification Center sustained after two prison escapees assaulted him during their April 2003 getaway.

The Iowa Supreme Court has ruled that Myron Raas, who was visiting his stepdaughter at the Oakdale facility, can sue the state for damages because he was "reasonably foreseeable as a victim" as a guest.

But that rationale didn't apply for Mark Trunecek, who had also sued the state after he was attacked by Oakdale inmates Jeffrey Hershberger and Omar Wilkins during their

escape from the medium-security prison. The duo reportedly assaulted Trunecek while he was fishing in the Iowa River.

"Even giving his petition the most favorable interpretation, [Trunecek] has not alleged the status of a foreseeable victim, but only a member of the public at large," Justice Jerry Larson wrote in the ruling, which overturned an earlier decision to allow Trunecek to sue. "As such, he may not claim a special relationship sufficient to establish a cause of action."

In April 2003, Hershberger — who was behind bars on theft and forgery charges — and convicted murderer Omar Wilkins attacked Raas in his car, stole it, later found Trunecek fishing, and assaulted him. Authorities said Hershberger and Wilkins reportedly scaled two security fences topped with barbed-wire.

Both Trunecek and Raas had sued because they alleged that

state officials were negligent and did not properly supervise their inmates nor keep a secure facility. Both cases were dismissed by lower courts.

The decisions are based largely on the requirement of the men proving they have a "special relationship" with the state, meaning the state must protect a citizen when they are reasonably foreseeable as victims.

To win the case, Raas and Trunecek needed to prove the state owed them care and did not follow through, causing injuries and damages. Though Raas and Trunecek filed separate lawsuits, the cases were later consolidated for ruling.

UISG election fines revealed

UI Student Government candidates' campaign violations, budgets, and fines for the elections period are completed.

Nearly four weeks after the UI Student Government Student Elections Board announced the College Party's victory, board members have ceased deliberating over campaign budgets and violations.

With only three days before the March 6 election announcement, board members were bombarded with complaints of campaigning violations, as well as unethical conduct by certain parties.

Board director Jack Sodak said that despite a rush of complaints at the last minute, his department saw fewer fines from last year.

"On the day before and the two days of the election, the complaints flooded in all at once," he said.

Candidates Atul Nakhasi and Courtney Parker, who headed the A-Team, racked up the largest amount of fines, ranging from early campaigning to violating residence-hall procedures with door-to-door campaigning.

The ticket, which placed third in the election, was penalized \$140.

"We know there was an unauthorized e-mail sent out, but we are still collecting evidence on it," Sodak said, noting the party's fine could increase.


Nakhasi said his ticket plans to appeal some fines to the Student Elections Board, but he didn't want to comment on any specific complaint until the confusion was cleared up.

"Some of our campaign violations were before we signed the bonds agreeing to the rules," Nakhasi said. "We signed bonds that had no dollar amount, so that is unfair."

College Party leaders Barrett Anderson and Carole Peterson, who became the new UISG president and vice president, received \$80 in fines — the lowest amount.

Violations cost a pretty penny

Finally, the results are in for 2007 UISG campaign finances. UISG Student Elections Board is strict about spending and requires each party to record how it spent the allotted \$1,500. The election board monitors violations and then fines each party accordingly. This year, the biggest violations were campaigning in an ITC, use of unapproved campaign material, and early campaigning.

"I think that [having the lowest amount of fines] is an indicator that we ran the cleanest campaign we could," Anderson said.

Labor Party candidates Mark Anthony Dingbaum and Tess Feldman fell in between the two with \$97 in fines for a total of nine violations.

"I think some of the complaints were valid," Dingbaum said. "But some people were going undercover with cameras to catch people violating policies, and it is sad to see the campaign go in that direction."

The Student Elections Board dismissed other campaign violations, such as name calling and unethical language, Sodak said.

"The [board] doesn't condone this behavior," he said. "But we don't really have jurisdiction over it."

Dingbaum acknowledged that he experienced such harassment.

"Several of my supporters let me now that some individuals were saying, 'Vote straight, not gay,'" Dingbaum said. "It's upsetting that these statements were being made when the UI campus is known for being open-minded and inclusive."

All tickets were also required to turn in campaign budgets by March 8 to ensure they stayed within their \$1,500 limit.

The A-Team only spent \$945, and the College Party spent \$1,367.22, both staying within the acceptable budget range. Sodak said he has yet to see a campaign budget sheet for the Labor Party ticket, though Dingbaum said he himself filled one out.

Baseball drops three of four

The Iowa baseball team snapped Ohio State's 15-game winning streak but lost three out of four games in Columbus to open Big Ten play. The Hawkeyes (11-8, 1-3) were outscored 34-24 in the series and allowed 55 hits.

In Sunday's series finale, Dusty Napoleon blasted his fourth home run of the season, and Justin Toole hit a three-run homer in the first inning, but Iowa fell to the Buckeyes, 16-7.

On March 31, starter Nick Erdman threw 5½ shutout innings to give Iowa an 8-0 lead. Jason White led off the fifth inning with a home run.

The Hawkeyes committed five errors in the series' opener on March 30, losing, 17-12. Ben Geelan went 2-for-3 with four RBIs and helped Iowa jump out to an early lead before Ohio State tallied seven runs in the sixth inning.

Iowa will return to action Wednesday with a home game against Wisconsin-Milwaukee.



The Hawkeyes headed into this past weekend's Big Ten championships ranked last. Through three events, they were in third.

All they needed was a solid performance on the beam — considered the great equalizer — and the GymHawks would end their season on a high.

As it turned out, it just wasn't meant to be. Three falls dropped Iowa into the sixth spot, mirroring its conference finish of a year ago. The Hawkeyes posted a score of 192.750, only 0.1 ahead of last-place Michigan State.

Rowers beat Jays, fall to Minnesota

The Hawkeye women's rowing team hosted Minnesota and Creighton at Lake Macbride on March 31; while the Hawks defeated the Bluejays in four of the five races, they were shut out by the Gophers.

In its only home event of the spring season, Iowa competed in both varsity 8's, the varsity 4, and both novice 8 races. In varsity 8 events, Iowa finished second to Minnesota. The varsity boat finished with a time of 6:45.56, and the second boat finished in 7:06.28.

In the varsity 4 race, the women finished third in the time of 8:37.13. In novice action, Iowa finished second in 7:06.14 and 7:13.77.

"I'm disappointed we didn't win any events Saturday," said head coach Mandi Kowal. "We have made so much improvement so far this season that I thought we could have won some of the races."

"As a program, we made up 88 seconds from last year's races. I'm pleased with the progress of the team, but as always, we want to be winning our events."

The first varsity 8 and varsity 4 teams have dealt with lineup changes all season, because illness and injuries have caused the boats to have an ever-changing roster.

"All season we have been trying to find a solid group in the first 8 and 4," Kowal said. "We have people with injuries, and they have been sick, so we have

had a changing group in some boats.

"The women have adjusted well to the changes. They were able to keep moving forward during the trial time. Both groups were able to stay up and work together Saturday."

In the opening novice 8 race, the Hawks rallied to keep themselves in contention.

"The first novice group came from behind and stuck together," the coach said. "They didn't crumble under the pressure and just gave a big push during the race."

Two Hawkeye rowers made noticeable improvements so far this season and at the March 31 meet. Junior Brittany Keyes and sophomore Melissa Wordelman helped the varsity 8 boat to the second-place finish, and Kowal said the duo has provided a solid core of leaders for the rowers.

"Those two are the ones who come into practice and get their work done every day," she said. "They are focused and show some great leadership."

"They have worked hard to improve themselves since last season. They were still optimistic after the losses but are aware that we have to concentrate on next weekend."

The Hawkeye women will compete Friday and Saturday in the George Washington Invitational in Washington, D.C. The start time for the races is 4 p.m. on Friday and 8 a.m. on Saturday.

Florida/Ohio State redux

ATLANTA — It's no accident that they are meeting again for a championship. Calling it pure coincidence might not be totally right, either.

Florida and Ohio State are dominating marquee college sports like no two programs ever have. Their meeting today for the basketball title comes three months after they played for the football championship. Regardless of the outcome, the Gators already go down as the first program to hold the men's basketball and football titles at the same time.

The programs are products of two mega-sized athletics departments awash in money, fan support, strong decision makers at the top, and good coaches interspersed throughout their respective campuses.

"When you have resources, that usually means you have the wherewithal to have good facilities," said Chuck Neinas, the well-respected leader of a search firm that finds football coaches and athletics directors for big-time programs. "You build a tradition of success that attracts talent, and that allows you to pay for good coaches."

Though the schools operate in different sections of the country, these power programs have more things in common than not. Most notably, these are —

or at least once were — schools where football was king.


Nothing against the basketball programs, but success in football drives success in everything else at most universities. It's the sheer fact of numbers. With the exceptions of a few elite basketball programs, there's simply more money to be made by filling 105,000 seats in the Horseshoe, or 90,000 at the Swamp, than by filling a basketball arena one-fifth their size.

"The correlation between 105,000 people on a Saturday afternoon in the Shoe definitely helps all programs," Ohio State coach Thad Matta said. "I think it's helped us through the recruiting process. The fame of the football program is something we try to work hand-in-hand with."

Thanks in large part to revenue from the football program, Ohio State led the NCAA in revenue last year, bringing in nearly \$105 million. Florida brought in \$78 million. Both programs made enough money that they were able to donate to their schools instead of having the school supplement them.

The days of basketball coaches defending their programs' status on these campuses are long gone. Instead, they bask in the football teams, taking recruits to games and bringing those coaches in for motivational speeches to their students.

"It's everything at Florida

that's good," Gator coach Billy Donovan said. "Certainly the Donovans program is terrific. As I said earlier, I think where

there's problems on campuses with coaches is when all the focus is totally just on one sport."

Nukuri shines in 10,000 meters

The Iowa women's track team provisionally qualified its first athlete for the NCAA meet and added four to its list of regional qualifiers.

At the Stanford Invitational, Diane Nukuri provisionally earned a spot in the national championships in the 10,000 meters with a time of 33:31.69. She barely missed the automatic berth, which requires a 33:30.

Meghan Armstrong and Racheal Marchand both ran personal bests and qualified for the Midwest Regional in the 5,000. Armstrong

posted a time of 16:18.74, an 11-second improvement over her top time. Marchand bettered her best mark by seven seconds with a time of 16:40.27.

At the Missouri Relays, Peaches Roach earned a regional spot in the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.64 in the preliminaries. She finished second in the event.

In triple jump, Renee White out-distanced herself from the rest of the field by more than five inches. Her jump of 40-7¼ places her in regionals.

Tiffany Johnson improved her qualifying mark in the 100-meter

hurdles to 13.66 with a second-place finish in the event.

Calamity ensued. "The injury and the change in lineup freaked them out, and they couldn't get it together," said the third-year head coach, who has had the

team practice in its routine order the past few weeks. "It was a lapse in mental focus."

Simbhudas couldn't explain why the squad fell apart to close out the contest.

"We knew it was the last event, and we wanted to hit it real bad," she said. "Maybe we just wanted it too much."

The GymHawks' team score of 46.725 was one of their lowest of the season. With an average score, they would have finished the meet in third. With one fewer fall, they would have been fourth.

"All we had to do was not do anything outrageously great," Libby said. "It was not a great end to a really great meet. We had the meet in the bag."

"Best" is a word that several Hawkeyes could use to describe their individual performances on March 30 and March 31.

Senior Jacques Bouchard drew the curtains on his Big Ten career in a manner fitting of the outspoken ringmaster's lofty expectations.

The Rio Rancho, N.M., native broke the school record for the rings on March 30 with a 9.65, and he finished the evening in a five-way tie for first place. There would be no ties the second time around for Bouchard, as he broke his school record the night after

he had set it with a 9.725 that earned him sole possession of the No. 1 spot.

"I think he [Bouchard] expected it more than many of the rest of us," Dunn said. "He had a very positive attitude, and he has trained several years for that moment."

Another senior, Matt Beiler, also turned in a stellar rings performance. The Ontario native produced a career best 9.55 on the rings to finish in sixth behind the first place log-jam, and he once again adopted the sixth spot the following night, scoring 9.35.

Dunn heaped high praise on the two seniors, stating there is, "no doubt about it" when considering Beiler and Bouchard among the best gymnasts on the rings.

Bouchard and Beiler weren't the only highlights for the Hawks; junior Jacob Becker finished second on the pommel horse with a 9.05, and

freshman Joel Snyder finished in sixth place with a 8.925 on the horizontal bar.

Dunn felt the performances turned in by those four gymnasts was important for the mentality of the team as it moves away from the Big Ten championships and toward the national championships.

The head man said the outstanding individual efforts help set a good tone for the upcoming weeks' practices, adding that the weekend has helped clarify what corrections the team must make to achieve that first great performance the coach is seeking.

If it comes at nationals, the Hawkeyes may be looking down at such teams as Michigan and Illinois instead of up.

but now the Hawkeyes find themselves on a four-game losing streak, which keeps a goose egg in their conference win column.

"As a team, we need to know that we are in there with every match and have the confidence that we can go out there and compete and beat anyone out there," Dwyer said.

J.P. Ritchie, who typically plays with van Monsjou on the 53rd-ranked doubles team in the nation, spent his weekend alongside Dwyer. And like the other patchwork doubles teams, the two had their initial struggles against Penn State, but they started to gel when they played Michigan.

It still wasn't enough. "The first day, when we played Penn State and I was playing with Patrick, he would do stuff that I'm not used to Bart doing," Ritchie said. "He'd

do something different, so I was out of position, sometimes."

The junior learned fast that you can't replace chemistry in just one weekend.

"It's difficult, because Bart and I have played together the majority of time in the last three years," Ritchie said.

His struggles didn't end there. In singles, he moved up from his typical No. 3 spot to fill van Monsjou's top spot. There, he went 0-2, losing two hard-fought matches to a pair of nationally ranked opponents. His teammates faced similar situations but on a smaller scale.

"I thought I played well," Ritchie said. "It's just little points here and there ... that's the big difference."

If Iowa hopes to secure its first Big Ten win in the near future, it would appear that van Monsjou's health is the key.
