Two assaults reported

Officials say April is one of three months with historically high numbers of assaults.

Iowa City police are investigating two assaults — both involving a woman walking while talking on a cell phone — recorded just four hours apart this past weekend.

The incidents bring the tally of reported attacks against women by a stranger to 14 since the fall of 2006. In the first report of the most recent attacks, a woman said she was assaulted at roughly 9 p.m. on April 27 near College Green Park at the intersection of Dodge and Washington Streets, police said.

She told police that she noticed a man following her down Washington Street while she was talking on her cell phone. The man reportedly grabbed her buttocks and pushed her to the ground.


A UI administrator who briefly banned a student from campus April 26 defended his choice to release the student's name and address to the university community, saying he gave out the data "for the sake of openness."

Phillip Jones, the UI vice president for Student Services, said he didn't want the university to be accused of suppressing public information and wanted to clarify which Justin Walker on campus had been involved.

"During these times of jittery nerves, all on campus need to be assured of their safety and know that we are not suppressing anything that is considered public information," he said in a statement. On Sunday, he declined to comment any further on the matter.

UI freshman Anna Schmitz walked down to the River Terrace at the IMU on a sunny, breezy afternoon April 28 to listen to Minus 6 and play games with her friends at the annual RiverFest.

"I didn't really know what to expect," she said on Sunday. "But it turned out to be a really nice day to sit out and watch the band."

This weekend marked the 29th time that the outdoor festival has been held. Schmitz said many turned out for the

event, and she was surprised by the number of families that attended.

"[The attendance] was better than expected," said Kaitlyn Moore, RiverFest's executive director. "There were about 5,000 people. We were really pleased."

Last year, the festival was only able to bring in around 1,000 participants, most likely because of poor weather.

The festival, which began in 1978 as a week-long celebration, now has withered into a two-day weekend event. The Student Assembly Budgeting and Allocations Committee of the UI Student Government has slashed funding for the event in recent years, with the Priority II group receiving \$27,332 in 2003, compared with \$14,225 this year.

In a small office, surrounded by medical journals, homemade thank-yous from patients, and family photographs, Ignacio Ponseti, a UI professor emeritus of orthopaedic surgery, leaned back in his desk chair with his fingers intertwined in his lap. A few specks of plaster decorated his hands, lingering from procedures earlier that

afternoon. Easily recalling names and dates for his many anecdotes, his mind is as sharp as his pressed white jacket.

In more than 60 years as a faculty member at the UI Hospitals and Clinics, Ponseti has collected various plaques and awards for his revolutionary projects. On April 3, he received the Children's Miracle Achievement Award for his work in clubfoot treatment.

"It's important that you don't feed vanity. I take the whole thing with a smile," he said, looking back on decades of being honored for the lives he's touched.

Report: Man tried to lure teen into car

Coralville police are investigating a West High student's report that a man tried to entice her into his car on at least two separate occasions last week, said Lane Plugge, the Iowa City School District superintendent.

On April 27, a female student told school officials that a man asked if she needed a ride near the bus stop by the Iowa Firefighters' Memorial on First Avenue in Coralville, Plugge said. The student also told officials that the same man had asked her if she needed a ride on April 25.

The student reported that the man was in his 30s and was driving a silver car, Plugge said.

"From time to time, we will have reports of someone asking kids for rides," Plugge said. "This happened on multiple occasions, that's what concerned us."

Plugge said the district contacted Coralville police and also "decided to be cautious" and send a telephone message to all parents in the district, adding that officials are reminding students to remain alert and are discussing "stranger danger" issues with younger students.

Blaze causes \$75,000 in damages

A weekend blaze at Tracy Lane caused around \$75,000 in damages when "unattended cooking" caught

"nearby combustibles" on fire, Battalion Chief John Grier reported.

The fire began at 1408 Tracy Lane at 1:34 p.m. on April 28; when firefighters arrived on scene, officials said, they saw smoke coming from the split-level single-family home.

It took 15 minutes to control the fire and the 30 minutes to extinguish the blaze, the department reported. The crews stayed on scene until past 4 p.m., Captain Brian Platz said.

None of the residents, who left the home before firefighters responded, were injured in the fire, he said.

A total of 14 on-duty firefighters responded with three engines, one truck, and the battalion chief. Red Cross also came to the scene and assisted the displaced residents, Platz said.

2 face endangerment charges

Two Coralville residents face charges of child endangerment after Department of Human Services investigations allegedly discovered the couple had exposed two minor children to cocaine in March, police reported.

Officers said the department investigated allegations that Catherine Johnson, 51, and Ernest Brewster, 47, had smoked and dealt crack cocaine in the presence of Johnson's two minor children at an apartment on Fifth Street in Coralville.

Authorities said the Human Services investigation confirmed that both children, whose ages were not released, tested positive for exposure to cocaine and cocaine metabolite.

Brewster's relationship to Johnson and the children was not released.

Both Johnson and Brewster face two charges of child endangerment, an aggravated misdemeanor punishable by up to two years in prison and \$5,000 in fines.

Police charge man with indecent exposure

Iowa City police have charged a 32-year-old man with indecent exposure after they said he masturbated in a downtown bar's booth on April 28.

Officers said Paul Schneider, 420 E. Benton St., was at Deadwood Bar when an employee at the 6 S. Dubuque St. establishment saw him masturbating.

Schneider was later stopped by police, and the employee identified him as the man who had been in Deadwood, according to a police complaint dated April 29.

He now faces serious misdemeanor charges of indecent exposure. If convicted he could face up to a year in jail and a \$1,500 fine. Schneider also faces charges of public intoxication.

Indecent exposure is defined as one who does "expose his genitals to another or commits a sex act which the person knows or reasonably knows that the act is offensive."

Coralville police arrest 2nd junior-high student

Coralville police arrested a second junior-high student for carrying weapons in connection with an 85-minute lockdown at Northwest Junior High on April 20.

A 14-year-old female was the student that officials initially removed from school grounds because she was "uncooperative," refusing to respond to reports that she could be carrying a weapon, said Lane Plugge, the Iowa City School District superintendent, on April 20. Police recovered a pellet gun in her book bag.

The new arrest follows that of 14-year-old Devon Wicks, who was charged with carrying a weapon last week.

After being told another student could have a similar weapon in school, officials locked the school down from 9:15 a.m. to 10:40 a.m. on April 20. They recovered a second pellet gun in a locker after a search.

Both students were suspended, Plugge said.

Officer kills man in Des Moines break-in

DES MOINES (AP) — A Des Moines police officer shot and killed a man police said had broken into a house and was threatening the officer with a shard of glass.

Police said David Stehl, 35, of Des Moines broke into a two-story

Woodland Heights house, smashing several windows in the process.

Sgt. Todd Dykstra of the Des Moines police said Stehl approached Officer Ben Ihde, 44, with a shard of glass from a broken window. After telling the man to drop the shard several times, the officer shot him twice in the chest.

Dykstra said residents of the

house called police early Sunday morning and reported a break-in. At about 1:15 a.m. on Sunday, Stehl forced his way into the house and fought with one of the house's residents, Dykstra said.

Ihde and another officer arrived at the house and found Stehl standing near the front door holding a shard of glass, Dykstra said. Ihde told him to drop the shard.

When he refused and continued to walk towards Ihde, the officer fired two shots at Stehl, killing him.

"It's very much a justified shooting," Dykstra said. "It definitely is the last recourse an officer wants to be involved in."

Stehl's parents declined comment through lawyer and family friend Paul Tyler.

UIHC wants fee hike

A 7.9 percent increase in patient admissions in fiscal 2007 has escalated the demand for direct labor by nurses and physicians at UIHC.

The UI Hospitals and Clinics is asking the state Board of Regents to approve a 6 percent patient-fee increase for fiscal 2008.

The increase would give the UIHC an extra \$7.4 million to keep up with inflation rates, rising patient volumes, and lack of reimbursement for many of the hospital's current programs, officials say.

UI interim President Gary Fethke said the fee hike is realistic.

"Medical costs go up faster than the rate of inflation in the U.S.," he said. "I wish it weren't the case, but it's happening. If we're to maintain operations, attract physicians, and pay bills, we must cover those costs."

As the state's premier specialty and academic hospital, the UIHC saw a 7.9 percent increase in patient admissions in fiscal 2007, escalating the demand for direct labor by nurses and physicians.

Hospital Director Donna Katen-Bahensky attributed the increase to demographic changes as well as a demand for more specialized care.

As an academic medical center, the biggest cost driver — making up more than half of the facility's expenses — is total cost in salaries and benefits for the numbers of staff and professionals-in-training, such as resident physicians and fellows.

"When you multiply individuals by the thousands, it becomes a \$25.6 million increase," Katen-Bahensky said. "Medical education is really not something that's funded by anybody."


Aside from ballooning patient volume, the UIHC also must fill gaps created by insufficient reimbursement for its programs — IowaCare, Medicare, and free care for prisoners — issues not seen in private hospitals such as Mercy Hospital and St. Luke's Hospital, Fethke said.

"We receive approximately \$28 million, maybe more, for treatment of people who can't pay," Fethke said. "But the only thing that the money covers are direct billings from the hospital."

The UIHC is not reimbursed for pharmaceutical programs, medical equipment, trans-

portation, or physician services.

"Private hospitals are not treating at no charge," Fethke said. "It would be nice for patients in Iowa if all hospitals had such a program."

UIHC is one of only two facilities with access to IowaCare, which provides low-cost health care for uninsured or low-income patients. At Medicaid rates, the UIHC's two-year program has the lowest rate of reimbursement compared with Medicare, Wellmark, and other commercial payers — covering only around one-third of the charges required for any medical procedure.

"There are so many components that don't pay, whether for historical or political reasons," Fethke said during the April 18 regents meeting with the UIHC committee. "Those historical rules are making us less competitive."

The 6 percent fee increase would fund new technology and other maintenance costs of the 3.5 million square foot facility.

"It takes \$2 million a day to run [UIHC]," Katen-Bahensky said. "We take it very seriously. We want to remain financially strong."

Questions swirl around Iowa Student Loan

DES MOINES (AP) — The organization responsible for most student loan business in Iowa is facing increasing scrutiny from every level of state government, including Gov. Chet Culver.

Culver is refusing to appoint anyone to the nonprofit Iowa Student Loan Liquidity Corp.'s board of directors until his office believes that a number of issues have been "satisfactorily addressed."

According to a copyright story in

the *Des Moines Register*, the student loan organization is also facing pressure from the attorney general, the state auditor, and lawmakers — all at a time when Iowa college students are dealing with one of the highest debt loads in the country.

Culver recently asked Attorney General Tom Miller to start gathering information about the private loan corporation, which was created by the state in 1979 but is not subject to open records laws. The organization holds about \$3.9

billion in assets.

Steve McCullough, the president of the West Des Moines-based Iowa Student Loan, defends the organization, and says its loans help students who otherwise would not be able to go to school.

"We provide a tremendous benefit to students and families of Iowa," said McCullough, who, according to the *Register*, grew visibly upset during an interview last week by some of the questions being asked. "I don't understand where all this is coming from."

Iowa City's true wheels of fortune

As nice weather draws people to outdoor activities, the Bike Library is a solution for those looking for affordable bikes.

On a sunny Saturday morning, customers flowed steadily through the Iowa City Bike Library, browsing through the rows of used bicycles available for checkout. Among tires, old chains, and piles of helmets, three college-aged volunteers tinkered with old bikes as they answered questions from curious shoppers.

The patrons had visited the 2-year-old library hoping to find bikes for such activities as RAGBRAI practice and outdoor exercise.

The Bike Library, 408 E. College St., was created by Brian Loring to help promote bike use for children and adults in Iowa City. It works

differently from a traditional library — customers check out bikes by paying a deposit, which can range anywhere from \$20 to \$80. Renters are given a helmet, and they can keep the bike for up to six months, at the end of which, they can either return the bike and get their deposit back or keep it.

Iowa City," Loring said.

He pointed to a number of ways that the operation helps improve the community, including promoting exercise, burning less fossil fuel because of decreased car use, and providing bikes to those in Iowa City who can't afford them.

UI senior Michael Saul said he prefers using his bike to his car.

"I like to use my bike to get places so I'm not contributing to pollution," he said. "That's something that's important to me."

The library obtains most of its bicycles through donations and repairs any that may be damaged. UI senior Zach Kmiec has worked at the Bike Library for the past two years fixing up bikes.

"It's a job that never gets old because there are so many dif-

ferent bikes," he said. "It really is a continuous educational experience."

He also credited the Bike Library with bringing him closer to the local community. The library hosts and participates in such events as Ladies' Night at the Bike Library, during which women volunteer at the library on the first and third Thursdays of every month. It is also sponsoring Bike to Work Week from May 14-18, which will include a number of events such as pancake breakfasts and races.

UI senior Christina Nguyen visited the Bike Library April 28 hoping to find a bike for recreational use.

"The weather's really warm, and I'll want to take it to Lake Macbride to bike on the weekends," she said.

Dan Caprar, a UI graduate student, said he hoped to find a bike to participate in RAGBRAI, a seven-day bike tour across the state that draws cyclists from all over the world.

"The Bike Library is such a cool place," he said. "I wish there were more places like this in Iowa City. It's such a great concept."

Judge to rule on fate of Gilchrist suit

A jury should have the opportunity to weigh the facts in Mary Gilchrist's case, her attorney argues.

The fate of Mary Gilchrist's lawsuit against two top UI officials is now in the hands of a judge, who could either dismiss her case or allow her a jury trial.

Attorneys for the former UI Hygienic Laboratory director and those for UI interim President Gary Fethke and Meredith Hay, the UI vice president for

Research, appeared in court on April 27 to argue whether the case should proceed.

Gilchrist sued the UI administrators shortly after she was ousted from her post, in October 2006. She claimed the officials illegally tried to quiet her concerns about "insufficient" funds for the new state Hygienic Lab, then fired her when she allegedly refused to be "muzzled."

Pat Ingram, Gilchrist's attorney, asked for an injunction in

February to restore the former lab director's job while court proceedings are pending, but Judge Denver Dillard shot down the request following two days of testimony.

Gilchrist was "attempting to usurp control from the president and vice president and operate as an independent department answerable only to the Board of Regents and the Legislature," the judge concluded in his written judgment, disregarding

Gilchrist's contention that she was acting as a whistleblower communicating substantial risk to public health.

Dillard's ruling was a clear indication of the merits of Gilchrist's lawsuit, said state Assistant Attorney General George Carroll, who is representing the UI officials, on April 27.

"Because the plaintiff has been declared not to be a whistleblower, there's nothing left in this case," he contended.

The Iowa Attorney General's Office said it believed the case was concluded after the injunction ruling, but Dillard said the decision wasn't final.

Carroll then asked for a summary judgment, seeking closure in the case based on Dillard's reasoning that Gilchrist was not a whistleblower.

Carroll's motion was unfounded, Ingram argued.

"It's saying that Judge Dillard found facts in the matter of law

that my client would not prevail, and I don't think that's what he found," he said.

Because several facts are being disputed, Ingram said Dillard's ruling should not be final.

"The fact finder, ultimately, in this case should be a jury," he said.

Judge Mitchell Turner, who heard the attorneys' arguments, said he will issue a written ruling on the case.

Rice: Bush will veto war bill with conditions

WASHINGTON — President Bush will not sign any war spending bill that penalizes Iraq's government for failing to make progress, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice said Sunday, a fresh warning to Congress about challenging him.

Bush is expected to veto a bill this week that would order U.S. troops to begin withdrawing from Iraq by Oct. 1. Lacking the votes to override a veto, the Democratic-led Congress is considering a revised plan to pay for the way while requiring Iraq to meet benchmarks for progress.

Congress has not decided whether to punish Iraq for falling short. Rice sent lawmakers a clear message, saying Bush would not agree to a plan that penalizes the Baghdad for insufficient progress.

"To begin now to tie our own hands — and to say, 'We must do this if they don't do that' —

doesn't allow us the flexibility and creativity that we need to move this forward," Rice said.

Democratic lawmakers, eager to wind the war down, showed little appetite for establishing goals without consequences. Iraq has struggled to keep its own promises for distributing oil wealth, refining its Constitution, and expanding democratic participation.

"The benchmarks — the Iraqis agreed to it, the president agreed to it," said Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa., who heads a House subcommittee that controls defense spending. "We're saying to them, 'Well, let's put some teeth into the benchmarks.'"


Even if they agree to scrap a troop-withdrawal timetable, Democratic lawmakers say they want to link U.S. support to Iraq's performance in some way. But they must find an approach that would win Republican support to pass a new bill that Bush is willing to sign.

Bush is expected the veto the war bill by Tuesday, then meet Wednesday with congressional leaders on the next steps. The current legislation would provide \$124.2 billion, more than \$90 billion of which would go for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Making the rounds of the Sunday talk shows, Rice said Iraqi leaders know U.S. patience is worn. Still, she said deadlines for progress could undermine the work of Gen. David Petraeus, the top U.S. military commander in Iraq, and Ryan Crocker, the new U.S. ambassador to Iraq.

"The United States is paying in blood and treasures," Rice acknowledged. "The Iraqi leadership is being told, and I think they understand, that the kind of Iraq that there is going to be is up to them. We can't give them a united Iraq."

Iraq's Foreign minister, Hoshyar Zebari, said Iraqi leaders have gotten the message.

Report details traffic-stop data

WASHINGTON — Black, Latino, and white drivers are equally likely to be pulled over by police, but blacks and Latinos are much more likely to be searched and arrested, a federal study found.

Police were much more likely to threaten or use force against blacks and Latinos than against whites in any encounter, whether at a traffic stop or elsewhere, according to the Justice Department.

The study, released Sunday by the department's Bureau of Justice Statistics, covered police contacts with the public during 2005 and was based on interviews by the Census Bureau with nearly 64,000 people age 16 or over.

"The numbers are very consistent" with those found in a similar study of police-public contacts in 2002, bureau statistician Matthew Durose, the report's co-author, said in an interview. "There's some stability in the findings over these three years."

Traffic stops have become a politically volatile issue. Minority groups have complained that many stops and searches are based on ethnicity rather than on legitimate suspicions. Blacks in particular have complained of being pulled over for simply "driving while black."

"The available data are sketchy but deeply concerning," said Hilary Shelton, the director of the NAACP's Washington bureau. The civil-rights organization has done its own surveys of traffic stops, and he said the ethnic disparities grow larger the deeper the studies delve.

"It's very important to look at the hit rates for searches — the number that actually result in finding a crime," Shelton said. "There's a great deal of racial disparity there." He called for federal legislation that would collect uniform data by race on stops, arrests, use of force, searches, and hit rates.

"This report shows there are still disturbing disparities in terms of what happens to people of color after the stop," said Dennis Parker, the director of the American Civil Liberties Union's ethnic justice project. He also said better reporting is needed.

Like the 2002 report, this one contained a warning that the disparities uncovered "do not constitute proof that police treat people differently along demographic lines," because the differences could be explained by circumstances not analyzed by the survey. The 2002 report said such circumstances might include driver conduct or whether drugs were in plain view.

Traffic stops are the most frequent way police interact with the public, accounting for 41 percent of all contacts. An estimated 17.8 million drivers were stopped in 2005.

Black, Latino, and white motorists were equally likely to be pulled over by police — between 8 percent and 9 percent of each group. The slight decline in blacks pulled over — from 9.2 percent in 2002 to 8.1 percent in 2005 — was not statistically significant, Durose said, and it could be the result of random differences.

The disparities showed up after that point:

- Blacks (9.5 percent) and Latinos (8.8 percent) were much more likely to be searched than whites (3.6 percent). There were slight but statistically insignificant declines compared with the 2002 report in the percentages of blacks and Latinos searched.

- Blacks (4.5 percent) were more than twice as likely as whites (2.1 percent) to be arrested. Latino drivers were arrested 3.1 percent of the time.

Among all police-public contacts, force was used 1.6 percent of the time. But blacks (4.4 percent) and Latinos (2.3 percent) were more likely than whites (1.2 percent) to be subjected to force or the threat of force by police officers.

People interviewed described police hitting, kicking, pushing,

grabbing, pointing a gun or spraying pepper spray at them or threatening to do so. More than four of five felt the force used was excessive, but there were no statistically significant

ethnic disparities among the people who felt that way.



Ponseti was born June 3, 1914, on the Spanish island of Menorca. A lifelong interest in biology led him to the University of Barcelona at age 16, where he earned a degree in biology and also received an M.D. After graduation, the Spanish Civil War broke out. Ponseti served in a medical fashion, repairing fractured soldiers' limbs. A photo of him posing in front of the base hospital with many of his recovering patients still hangs in his Iowa City office.

After coming to UI in 1941 to finish his residency, Ponseti became a faculty member in 1944. He said that working with his watchmaker father as a child taught him "a great deal of training and precision," which he has applied to his long medical career.

His work with clubfoot began after he learned that many patients were miserable when contacted for follow-ups. Ponseti researched the birth defect, which he says affects approximately 3,000 newborns in the United States every year. He explained that for a long time, doctors didn't fully understand

the joint or the condition.

"A clubfoot is a normal foot," he said, using a foot model that showed no bones or ligaments missing — they were simply twisted.

Ponseti found a way to manipulate the foot using casts to achieve proper positioning without surgery in the 1950s. At the time, however, doctors and textbooks still promoted the surgical treatment. Ponseti, who loves working with young patients, credits the Internet and vocal mothers for the fame of the "Ponseti method."

"I admire the bonding between mother and baby," he said, noting that when a mother finds the answer to her child's problem, she is endlessly thankful.

Ponseti teaches his method to pairs of visiting students in

two-week tutorials nearly all year long. He said as many as eight procedures are generally scheduled on every Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, with patients from around the world. He takes pride in showing his method to studying doctors and notes that the success of a doctor lies in constant study and a love of people.

"You must be devoted and conscious of the things you're doing," he said. "This is a magnificent profession."

Outside the hospital, at home in Iowa City, Ponseti and his wife of nearly 50 years, Helena, enjoy local art, music, and writers.

"It's so easy to communicate with really outstanding people," he said. "We have a wonderful time."

Ponseti loves literature, music, and gardening but says that his work as a doctor truly brings him joy. As his 93rd birthday approaches, he hasn't thought of hanging up his lab coat.

"I have a wonderful secretary and a wonderful nurse," he said. "If they retire, I'll have to. But if they stay, I may stick around a little longer."

UI defends its actions

Officials say the university was striving to be open with the public about the incident when it released a student's name and address.

Iowa City police confirmed that releasing the name and address of individuals before they face criminal charges is legal, though it is not a common practice.

Justin Walker was banned from campus on April 26 after he wore a ski mask into a lecture at Macbride Hall. UI police originally took the junior into questioning after another student called 911, reportedly uneasy about Walker's appearance.

Walker, who said he wore the mask because it was cold outside, was unarmed and was held by police for two hours. He was released that day without formal charges, but he was given a trespass warning that barred him from campus for five months.

UI officials said on April 27 that charges won't be filed against Walker, and they lifted the ban on the economics major, enabling him to return to classes.

Despite the incident, Walker said, he still plans to take summer classes and will return to the university in the fall. He added that he is considering legal action against the school, although he wasn't sure when he would move forward.

"During these times of jittery nerves, all on campus need to be assured of their safety and know that we are not suppressing anything that is considered public information."

"My family, at the moment, is currently discussing what we will do," he said. "My rights were violated, and I think the school could have given out a description of me instead of putting my family's life in danger by putting my address out."

Right now, he wants to focus on "finishing the semester strong," he said.

He has been in touch with the American Civil Liberties Union of Iowa, as well as several lawyers, who, according to Walker, have supported a move against the UI. Jones declined to comment Sunday on a possible lawsuit.

Charles Green, the assistant vice president for the UI police, said he was flooded with e-mails and phone calls following the incident and was unable to respond immediately to requests for interviews.

"These are not normal times, and I am certain things will improve in the future," he said in an e-mail.

In the April 26 incident, authorities briefly locked down the Old Capitol and Macbride Hall. Iowa City and Johnson County authorities sent officers to the campus.

Walker said he thought the situation was handled "horribly" by the UI.

Before he was apprehended, he was planning a trip to Illinois to bring his girlfriend and 10-day-old baby for a visit, he said. He added that after the incident, he was afraid to leave the state because he didn't want to look like a flight risk.

The April 26 lockdown was the second the UI faced last week. On April 24, UI officials locked down the Hardin Library after officials received a series of threatening e-mails, saying a bomb had been placed on the premises. Jessup Hall was also closed because of the threats.

Dutch propose tough rules for importing biofuel

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — A Dutch commission has proposed a system aimed at ensuring that

Although RiverFest has experienced a decline in attendance overall, the event has been able to make a profit for the past couple of years, Moore said. "We budgeted for what we had and made it work," she said, noting that the festival has gained sponsors. The festivities were supported by two platinum donors — the IMU and First-line — each giving \$2,000 or more, according to the RiverFest website. The website also noted three gold sponsors — Coca-Cola, Toyota of Iowa City, and Zephyr Copies and Design — paying out

between \$1,000 and \$1,999 to the festivities. Prize donations were also donated to the event by various sponsors. Michael Vanmeter, RiverFest finance director, said the official costs of the event would not be available until today. Moore feels that the RiverFest organizers effectively promoted the festival to college students' interests. "The marketing team did a great job of getting the word out," she said. Ten musical performances, appearances by the UI Step Team and the Cheer Squad, and a pie-eating contest were just a few of the activities that attracted partici-

Meanwhile, inflatables, including a jousting arena and a Velcro wall as well as a speed pitch, basketball game, and mechanical bull were free to all participants who signed a waiver, Moore said. "Inflatables were probably

Two women report assaults

He then tried to remove the woman's clothes, but she screamed, kicked the attacker, and managed to escape uninjured, according to police reports.

Iowa City police Sgt. Troy Kelsay called the assault "serious" and "certainly alarming."

In another incident, at roughly 1 a.m. on April 28, a woman reported that she was walking south near the 800 block of Summit Street and talking on her cell phone when a man grabbed her right side, according to police reports. The woman screamed, causing the assailant to flee south on Summit Street.

Police classified both cases as "assaults" rather than "sex assaults" in incident reports. But police haven't ruled out the possibility that they are sex assaults.

"They could be coded either way, depending on which dispatcher takes [the call]," Kelsay said.

He note that it is not uncommon for assaults to occur close in time.

Karla Miller, the executive director of the Rape Victim Advocacy Program, said that while talking on cell phones could make women more vulnerable in the eyes of an attacker, it could also serve as a "lifeline" by being a "deterrent."

In any case, she said, it's difficult to draw conclusions because offenders choose their victims for many different reasons.


"Regardless of what women do, say, wear, drink, or think ... it doesn't matter," she said. "They should be free to do that, just as men are free to go about the world."

Miller stressed the importance of focusing on the offender's behavior in sex-assault cases, which would help increase the community's preparedness to combat assailants. She also encouraged women to pay attention to their surroundings.

"[Women should] be aware that offenders are going to look for

Miller said April, May, and September typically have the highest number of sex assaults.

In the April 27 incident, the victim described the assailant — who was wearing a baseball cap, khaki jacket, and blue jeans — as a slender white male with dark hair in his 30s or 40s, according to police reports.

The woman involved in the April 28 incident described her attacker as a white male with a small build, wearing a backwards baseball cap, a button-down shirt, and blue jeans, according to police.

# Iran agrees to attend conference on Iraq

BAGHDAD — Iran agreed Sunday to join the U.S. and other countries at a conference on Iraq this week, raising hopes the government in Tehran would help stabilize its violent neighbor and stem the flow of guns and bombs over the border.

In an apparent effort to drive home that point, Prime Minister Nuri al-Maliki told an Iranian envoy that the persistent violence in Iraq — some of it carried out by the Shiite militias Iran is accused of arming — could spill over into neighboring countries, including those that are “supposed to support the Iraqi government.”

Iraq’s other neighbors as well as Egypt, Bahrain, and representatives of the five permanent U.N. Security Council members have agreed to attend the meeting Thursday and Friday in the Egyptian resort of Sharm El-Sheikh.

The Egypt conference will also include Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, raising the possibility of a rare direct encounter between high-level U.S. and Iranian officials.

In Washington, Rice would not rule out a meeting with the Iranians, whose delegation will be led by Foreign Minister Manouchehr Mottaki.

“But what do we need to do? It’s quite obvious. Stop the flow of arms to foreign fighters. Stop the flow of foreign fighters across the borders,” Rice told ABC’s “This Week.”

Hours earlier, al-Maliki’s office announced that Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad had telephoned to say a delegation from his country would attend the conference.

Iraqi leaders had been pressing for the Iranians to attend the Egypt meeting for weeks, but Iran refused to commit, in part because of fears that it would come under pressure from the U.S. and others about its nuclear program.

In addition, the Iranians have been lobbying for release of five Iranians held by the U.S. in Iraq since January. The U.S. has accused the five of links to an Iranian Revolutionary Guard unit that arms and trains Shiite extremists in Iraq and elsewhere in the Middle East.

The decision to attend “came after consultations between Iraqi officials and the Iranian president,” Foreign Ministry spokesman Mohammad Ali Hosseini said in an interview with Iranian state television.

Senior Iranian envoy Ali Larijani flew to Baghdad on Sunday for talks with al-Maliki and other senior Iraqi officials — the highest-ranking Iranian official to visit Iraq since the collapse of Saddam Hussein’s regime in 2003.

During their meeting, Larijani told al-Maliki that all countries that want stability in the region “have no choice but to support Iraq’s elected government.”

# Report: China still abusing rights

BELJING — China has failed to live up to promises to improve human rights for the 2008 Olympics in Beijing despite reforms to the death-penalty system and more freedoms for foreign reporters, Amnesty International said in a report Monday.

The report catalogues a wide range of persistent abuses, from extensive use of detention without trial to the persecution of civil-rights activists and new methods to rein in the domestic media and censor the Internet.

The London-based group welcomed the new rules for foreign journalists and the referral of all death sentences to China’s Supreme Court since the start of the year.

“Disappointingly, they have been matched by moves to expand detention without trial and house arrest of activists, and by a tightening of controls over domestic media and the Internet,” Catherine Baber, a deputy Asia-Pacific director of Amnesty International, said in a statement.

No Chinese official was immediately available to comment on the report. China has denounced previous Amnesty reports, saying it was fulfilling all the commitments made in its bid for the Games.

The report called on the International Olympic Committee to push Beijing more to improve its human-rights record, especially on issues relating to the Olympics.

“The IOC cannot want an Olympics that is tainted with human-rights abuses — whether families forcibly evicted from their homes to make way for sports arenas or growing numbers of peaceful activists held under house arrest,” Baber said.

The report said if private discussions were not working, the “IOC should consider making these concerns public, especially with the Olympics little more than a year away.”

Many of the ills cited by the group have been endemic for years in China. But in bidding for the Games back in 2001, Chinese leaders promised IOC members that the Olympics would lead to an improved climate for human rights and media freedoms.

IOC members have said they expect Beijing to keep its word. The organization, whose top officials just returned from two weeks of meetings with the Chinese government in Beijing, said they needed more time before commenting on the Amnesty report.

“It’s clearly comprehensive and we want to take the time to digest it before making any further reaction,” said IOC spokeswoman Giselle Davies.

Andrew Nathan, the political-science department chairman at Columbia University, said it wasn’t a surprise that China hadn’t lived up to its commitments since winning the bid.

“Those who have been tracking China’s implementation of commitments to improve its human-rights record know it hasn’t been improving,” said Nathan.

He said the government had made a few “cosmetic changes,” including loosening restrictions on foreign media, but generally they’ve been “tightening rather than liberalizing” rights restrictions.

Nathan, who chaired the advisory committee of New York-based Human Rights Watch in Asia from 1995 to 2000 and continues to serve as a member, said he believes China could still bend under pressure if organizations and companies continue to speak up in the coming year.

“We still have a year to go, so it is extremely important that Amnesty International join other organizations looking at this to say what they’ve found,” he said.

China has tightened the rules over the application of the death penalty following a series of high-profile cases involving wrongful convictions and tor-

ture. Starting Jan. 1, lower courts were prohibited from approving executions on their own.

Amnesty International put the recorded number of executions in 2006 at more than 1,000 people. But it said the true figure is believed to be as high as 8,000.

In December, China announced the temporary abolishment of decades-old rules requiring foreign reporters to obtain government approval for all travel and interviews. Under the new rules, in place until mid-October 2008, only the consent of the person to be interviewed is needed.

But the change was announced at the same time a Beijing court took five minutes to reject an appeal by Zhao Yan, a *New York Times* researcher, of his three-year prison sentence. Zhao was convicted of fraud, but press advocacy groups saw his case as a political vendetta for Zhao’s pre-*Times* career as a crusading investigative reporter and as a warning to Chinese journalists.

The different signals underscore China’s conflicting treatment of the media. The communist government hopes the Olympics will burnish China’s international image and knows positive foreign reports will help. At the same time, it has clamped down on domestic media and Internet essayists, fearing unfettered reporting would weaken the Communist Party’s authority.

“The failure to ensure equal rights and freedoms for both foreign and domestic journalists smacks of double standards — China has yet to meet its promise to ensure ‘complete media freedom’ for the Olympics,” Baber said.

The report was critical of the continued use of the “re-education through labor” system. In place since 1957, it allows police to jail a crime suspect for up to four years without a trial. Critics say it is misused to detain political or religious activists, and violates suspects’ rights.

"I'm going to fucking stab you," yelled Matthew Dellapina, played by UI student Jeff Worden. "I'll put a butter knife through your skull."

Ah, brotherly love. The two continue their ram-bunctious bickering, chasing each other around the Mabie Theatre, rolling around through spilled cereal, and pinning each other underneath kitchen chairs.

While it might seem as though they hate each other, it's this antagonistic love that provides the basis for many relationships, UI playwright Sean Christopher Lewis said. Drawing from his own experiences with his best friend from college, Matt, and the crazy stories he heard about Matt's brother, Lewis used these anecdotes as the foundation of his play *The Brothers Dellapina*, which will premiere tonight, kicking off the annual Iowa New Play Festival.

Originally written in short comedic scenes, Lewis penned the ridiculous interactions to cheer himself up after learning that his estranged father was dying.

"As I was writing them, my own dad kept crashing into the play," he said. "Like I'd be writing a scene, and suddenly their father — pretty much my father — would burst in and take over the scenes. And every

time he showed up, he would be a magician."

Eventually, the father (literally, a magician) became a main character in the vignettes, providing the brothers with both a foible and common ground. But just because a dying father is a main character doesn't mean he puts a damper on the fun.

"I always look at the plays I write as an event, a party. I see myself as the host of a party, and all the audience members are my guests, so I make sure they have a good time," he said. "And you can have different kinds of parties — a nice dinner party or a tea party, where it's a little quieter and more intellectual. This is a frat party. I want people coming and having a raucous time. It's going to be loud, abrasive."

Although the antics of the brothers — screaming, running, wrestling, spitting — is very action-driven, director Sean Paul Bryan said he recognizes that the annual play festival is meant to highlight the writing — thus, the set and spectacle are kept to a minimum. With the exception of a flying coffin, only a table, four chairs, and a bland couch are onstage during the 80-minute performance.

Because all five plays debuting this week are written by students in the Master of Fine Arts program in playwriting, they are able to join in on the production process. Bryan and Lewis, both

graduate students, have been friends since they started the program three years ago.

"It is collaboration, and it is a marriage," Bryan said. "We negotiate. We work together. We say the hard things to each other so that we can serve the play."

While *The Brothers Dellapina* is described as a "dark comedy," Bryan said the play is not from the school of Wes Anderson-esque plots that might pop into many undergraduate minds, which is often "weird for weird's sake."

"They're very strange [characters], but they're not subtle. These boys have no filter," he said. "They say what they want, and they say it how they want. They say sometimes what we want to say ourselves. Sometimes it's like, 'Wow, I can't believe they went there.' It's all out there."

# UI's response to ski-mask incident irresponsible; Walker deserves public apology

Two weeks after the biggest school shooting in U.S. history and two days after a bomb threat shut down two buildings at the UI, campus fears rose again, this time because Justin Walker, a UI student, wore a ski mask during a lecture. Many people are on edge, and it is understandable that this led to a student in Walker's Environmental Science lecture to leave, call police, and report a suspicious individual. This reaction is not unreasonable, but the absurdity is evident in how the university handled Walker's case after police confronted him.

On April 26, Walker was interrogated by police about why he had worn and continued to wear a ski mask in class. Walker told authorities and later the media that he never thought of it being a problem and didn't have the tragedies of Virginia Tech on his mind — it was just a cold and rainy day. While the wisdom of Walker's decision to continue wearing the ski mask during class is up for debate, the action did not merit a criminal-trespass warning. Walker was charged for explosives and weapons, and, as Iowa City police Sgt. Troy Kelsay reported, was innocent. His five-month ban from campus, though rescinded the next day, was completely unwarranted. Phillip Jones, the UI vice president for Student Services, defended the action, saying this would help prevent students' anxieties of seeing Walker on campus. In that case, a day or two would have been sufficient, but a five-month ban, especially with finals so close, wasn't.

The decision to release Walker's name and living information in a mass e-mail to faculty, staff, and students of UI and the media is another foolish action by

the university. Jones explained that in the wake of Virginia Tech, he felt this information shouldn't be kept from the public. Kelsay said that while the release of Walker's name and living address was not illegal, it is not something the Iowa City police usually do.

During the April 24 bomb threat, some felt that they weren't given enough details on why the Hardin Health Science Library was evacuated and Jessup Hall locked down. Information was released later to avoid panic. It was irresponsible for the university to hold back this material but release a mass e-mail giving detailed information on a student not yet charged with a crime. The repercussions of this action appear to not have been seriously thought over by the UI, and more appropriate measures should have been taken.

The appropriation of the measured student and the response of police should not be faulted. Erring on the side of caution is important, now especially, but the university's reaction to this incident needs to be seriously evaluated. Jones said that if anything is perceived to be threatening, the school will act on it. It is good to know that safety is a top priority, but if the university is allowed to react in similar and unjust ways as with this case, it is not a comforting thought. Justin Walker did not deserve this treatment, and the UI must seriously assess how the situation was handled and, at the very least, offer a public apology to Justin Walker.

# Identity crisis

Home is where the heart is. But where is home?

Allowing myself a much-needed respite from the insanity of Iowa City, I journeyed to Cedar Rapids for the weekend. The drive up the corridor was all-too familiar, but the "Hello Linn County" I was so accustomed to uttering hadn't left my lips in quite a while.

I wondered where I was leaving and where I was going. Who I once was and what I have become overrode all other thoughts.

Taking the Eighth Avenue exit, a feeling of distanced attachment ran through my heart. The drive down Mount Vernon Road,

passing the streets my hometown friends lived on and the Hy-Vee I worked at for little under six months — one of the wisest decisions of my life was quitting —

wasn't — unearthing many memories.

Onto East Post Road my father turned, and we traveled the short jaunt downhill to Cottage Grove Parkway. I arrived at the olive-green structure where I spent my first 19 years. A neglected basketball hoop blocked my door, and only my skinny frame allowed for my narrow debarking in the garage.

My first car — a 1997 Chevy Blazer — has been gone for years, sold to a partner in my dad's law firm. My recently redone bedroom, full of old books, and my small bed remained vague memories of my past.

The identities of university students, constructed from formative years of our lives, are similar in nature yet different in practice. The influence of our myriad parents from our primary education's range the entire spectrum. Subconsciously, the experiences of our aging process mold our characters.

Returning south down Interstate 380 Sunday morning brought similar emotional confusions. The streets I've been acquainted with for years, but never completely knew, passed under the belly of my parents' minivan. The Public Library and coffee shop, where I spent countless hours, bring the comfort that spending time in Barnes & Noble and late night forays to Wendy's once provided.

After I pushed my already written piece to next week, I wondered what to tackle. But once I left Cedar Rapids and entered Iowa City I inevitably focused on my identity as a college student. Though it is close enough to my hometown when I need an escape, yet distanced enough to remain removed from my childhood home, the UI was not my first choice. But would life have been so different in Ann Arbor, Washington, D.C., or Boston? The longing might have been stronger, but the independence may have matured faster.

Was this college town now home? Had my mixed feelings about Iowa City replaced my related beliefs for Cedar Rapids? The nostalgia replaced by the present?

The pathetic drama of Iowa City and the boring life of Cedar Rapids are drawbacks, though the maturation in the new, and the reminiscent memories of the old, do create a sense of equilibrium. The passion for Iowa City in the summer and the desire for Cedar Rapids during tumultuous weeks butters my soul.

But other cities mold my feelings toward eastern Iowa. My spiritual hometown of Cleveland — what a draft the Browns had on April 28 — and my painful longing for Jerusalem, a city of unmatched historical and religious importance, remove me from eastern Iowa. My wanderlust, constantly running wild and longing for the distant world, keeps me from developing strong attachments. The visions of Istanbul, Damascus, and Mumbai loom inevitably in my future. But while they may become residences, I am not "from" those locales.

But they cannot match the familiarity of Cedar Rapids and Iowa City. My sister, after moving to Seattle, told me my Midwestern upbringing — which I so desperately wish to cast off — will never disappear regardless of future endeavors.

The estranged hometown, the current living quarters, the intense desire to live elsewhere — they create a lack of bearing I'm stuck with. But both are the necessary and inevitable consequences of university life. Torn in different directions, I remain in constant flux. Though at times I feel lost, and homesick — for both Iowa City and Cedar Rapids — I know both will remain lodged in my heart and mind for the next 60 odd years of existence. ■

In regards to the UI arming its police officers, it is often pointed out that the Virginia Tech campus police had guns and were no help, which is exactly the point. The police in Iowa City do not carry at Columbia or Pennsylvania or anywhere else where a mass murderer was met by unarmed victims.

The only people who are always at the scene of the crime are the victims and the criminals. Perhaps if the victims were given the equal ability to defend themselves, they could level the playing field and limit the carnage.

## Policies only serve to disarm victims

Jon Gold and Judith Pascoe demonstrated their naïveté regarding guns and victim disarmament in the pages of the *D/I* on April 25. It reminded me of words I wrote in these pages on Jan. 24, 2002, in response to a shooting on the campus of Appalachian School of Law that was stopped by armed students: "Our myopic view of guns leads too many of us to believe that if we disarm people, we will be safer. Unfortunately, mandatory disarmament only disarms those who are interested in obeying the law. Laws against

gun ownership and possession are ineffective against those who would do us harm ... No one would believe that people in Iowa City don't smoke marijuana or that underage college students don't find ways to procure alcohol. Why should we be any more naive when it comes to rules against firearms?"

When I attended Iowa, I legally carried a firearm, except when on campus. The UI is a victim disarmament zone, for both students and university-employed police officers.

Virginia allows ordinary citizens to carry firearms for self-defense ... but not on college campuses. It is likewise that one of the many victims or witnesses at Virginia Tech would have been armed if not for the policy.

Mass shootings happen in such areas (schools, places of employment, post offices, etc.) precisely because everyone is legally disarmed. More than any other type of crime, mass killings are deterred by laws allowing the carrying of concealed weapons. Such laws maximize the lethal threat against a perpetrator who expects to face many potential victims.

As it was, the perpetrator of this heinous crime rampaged unimpeded for approximately half an hour as he shot, maimed, and killed everyone he could. The

victim-disarmament policies of this state, in combination with the specific victim-disarmament policies of this campus, create an ideal environment for mass murderers.

# Prairie Lights shows off Granta winners

*Tonight's reading at Prairie Lights features three of the best young American writers (officially), each reading from her or his latest short stories.*

Kevin Brockmeier, Christopher Coake, and Yiyun Li write with intensity that is all but lighthearted.

The three writers were selected, along with 18 others, as *Granta* magazine's Best of Young American Novelists. Tonight, they will read from their published and forthcoming short stories at 7 p.m. at Prairie Lights Books, 15 S. Dubuque St.

Brockmeier, a graduate of the Iowa Writer's Workshop, said the Granta nomination,

along with the recent publication of his novel *The Brief History of the Dead*, had kept him busy and on the road. "It's finally wound down," he said.

A writer of both children's and adult fiction, Brockmeier's narrative is dream-like and blurry, a balance of prose and poetry. The novel begins with profiles of the living-dead, each telling her or his own death story.

"It straddles the divide between literary fiction, science fiction, and fantasy," Brockmeier said.

One line in the book illustrates his point perfectly: "The

girl who liked to stand beneath the poplar tree in the park said that she had died into an ocean the color of dried cherries."

James Loewen's *Lies My Teacher Told Me*, which featured notions of African folklore, inspired *The Brief History of the Dead*, Brockmeier said. Loewen's categorizing of humans into those living on Earth, those in "sasha" waiting to be forgotten, and those in "zamani" who have passed into the afterlife, caught Brockmeier's attention. He was most intrigued by the "sasha" stage.

"It was the spark, the germ," he said.

The Arkansas native said his favorite writers range from Italian novelist Italo Calvino to junior fiction author Daniel Pinkwater. Brockmeier said he follows up every adult fiction story with one for children.

"I can let one field lie fallow while I turn to another one," he said.

Li, originally from Beijing, moved to Iowa to pursue a master's degree in immunology.

"I took a non-credit writing class, and it changed my life," she said.

While immersed in the Iowa City literary scene, she started writing and eventually received an M.F.A. from the Writers' Workshop.

Li's collection of short stories, *A Thousand Years of Good Prayers*, is full of life-changing moments. Her characters, while continually obli-

gated to please parents or even whole towns, are complex, introspective, and self-realized.

Now living in Oakland, Calif., the Mills College creative-writing professor credits her time in Iowa City as her writing foundation.

"I really felt there were a few teachers who made me," Li said, referring to James Alan

McPherson and Marilynne Robinson. She also includes Irish writer William Trevor as an influence on her writing. "He's my teacher on the page," she said.

Coake, a creative-writing teacher at the University of Nevada-Reno, is the author of *We're in Trouble*, a collection of short stories. Reminiscent of conversations in Raymond Carver's stories, Coake's characters lie in bed next to each other or break into cabins, revealing memories of joy and pain.

In addition to Brockmeier, Li, and Coake, this year's Granta winners include such well-known writers as Jonathan Safran Foer, Nicole Krauss, ZZ Packer, and Daniel Alarcón.

# Bland meditations on fraud and lies

*James Frey betrayed America's trust, and now Hollywood is out for blood. Richard Gere and Alfred Molina star in The Hoax, a '70s period piece on literary con artist Clifford Irving.*

*The Hoax* is a film critic's nightmare. Systematically inoffensive, the film generates only the lukewarmest of emotions — slight laughter, slight boredom, slight

intrigue, slight annoyance. We critics like dealing in triumphs or travesties, masterpieces or debacles. With *The Hoax*, we have few glaring flaws and few tangible highlights. Try writing a punchy, DVD-cover-plastering zinger for that.

It's no surprise to see a well-crafted, speedily forgettable film from director Lasse Hallström, the helmer of such middle-brow staples as *Chocolat* and *The Cider House Rules*. Here, Hallström capitalizes on America's newfound fascination with literary con artists (how could anyone lie to Oprah?) with the true 1970s story of Clifford Irving (Richard Gere), a struggling writer turned charlatan.

His books underperform on the shelves and attract only fleeting interest from publishers. Irving needs an eye-grabbing gimmick. He concocts a plan to "co-write" an autobiography of whack-job recluse Howard Hughes, penning fake contracts from the billionaire without ever speaking a word to him.

What starts as a scheme to score millions from McGraw-Hill warps into a political tiff elevating to President Nixon and Watergate.

For the most part, Hallström avoids *Ocean's 11*-style buddy caper comedy. Irving's connection with his friend and fellow swindler Dick Susskind (Alfred Molina) rises above inane banter, focusing more on the charac-

ters themselves and less on how cool they look and sound mid-crime. When on the road, for example, Irving feels tempted by Nina, a former lover, and meekly asks Susskind, "Keep an eye on me, will you?" Much of the thanks here goes to the two lead actors, particularly Gere, who plays Irving as a wily though oddly endearing writer starving for fame.

Hallström uses effective stylistic tricks throughout *The Hoax*, blending fiction and fact in ways both clever and psychologically sound. When Irving recounts a fake encounter with Hughes, Hallström cuts to black-and-white fantasy footage, splicing in arbitrary images from earlier in the film to visualize Irv-

ing's story. This, we gather, is much how a cornered man spins lies, grabbing random bits of fact to fashion complete fiction. While not groundbreaking, such flourishes give the film a marked visual style, separating it from Hallström's insipid work.

*The Hoax* recalls 2003's *Shattered Glass*, biopic of the serpentine *New Republic* journalist Stephen Glass. Where *Shattered Glass*' naturalistic style unnerves the viewer with raw tension, *The Hoax* relies on Hollywood contrivances and false pep to build suspense. Too often, Hallström asks us to have fun with his characters, blasting Creedence Clearwater Revival tunes as cars race

down highways. Would these men, knowing McGraw-Hill could sue them at any second, really lead such fun lives? *Shattered Glass*, the far superior film, doesn't ask us to have fun; it asks us to be scared shitless for Glass and for modern journalism.

It's not a good sign when the word "meh" comes to mind when discussing a film. Hallström is no provocateur, and it's hard to shake the suspicion that a focus group of middle-age/brow viewers cultivated much of *The Hoax*. He leaves us with nothing to love and nothing to hate. One can find dim satisfaction, I suppose, in crafting the innocuous.

### Burke finishes breakout season

As only the third Iowa gymnast to ever qualify for the national championships as an individual, Katie Burke capped off a breakout season at the NCAA championships on April 26.

The junior started her rotation on vault and posted a score of 9.7 to place 41st. On bars — an event the entire Hawkeye team struggled on this season — she fell, which resulted in an 8.8.

Head coach Larissa Libby and Burke were optimistic she could advance to an event final on beam. She put up a 9.7 but was well short of finishing in the top four in 34th. Burke ended the competition on floor with a 9.525 to finish 41st.

She placed 25th in the all-around in her session with a score of 37.725. Georgia's Courtney Kupets took the all-around with a 39.750, and two-time defending champion Georgia won its seventh national championship.

### Baseball earns 1st Big Ten sweep in 16 years

A 14-10 win Sunday capped a historically successful weekend for the Iowa baseball team.

The Hawkeyes earned their first series sweep of a Big Ten opponent in 16 years, knocking off Northwestern four times in Evanston, Ill. Iowa's record improved to 22-15 (11-8 Big Ten) and its winning streak extended to seven.

### Men's golf finishes in cellar

Interim men's golf coach Adam Kaufman couldn't have asked for a worse start to the Big Ten Tournament. The team's opening round score of 315 put the Hawkeyes in last place — the same spot they finished in 2006 — and eventually led to a second-straight finish in the conference cellar.

One of three golfers to finish in the top-50 individually, sophomore Cole Peevler fired a final-round 78 to finish 27th and lead the Hawkeyes. Junior Dan Holterhaus carded four rounds in the 70s — one of only two Iowa players to do so — and rode a final-round 76 to tie for 34th place.

Competing in his first Big Ten championship, junior Adam Miller shot a third-round 76 and finished tied for 48th. Sophomore Zack Anderson competed in place of senior Jon Feldick — a late scratch because of a rib injury — and finished 54th, with junior Scot Glasford one spot back in 55th.

Carding a team total of 1,256 strokes for the weekend, Iowa finished well back of co-champions Minnesota and Michigan State (1,192), and 33 strokes behind the next closest teams in Michigan and Illinois (tied for ninth).

## Women ready for Big Tens

The Hawkeyes proved they can succeed on the big stage at this past weekend's Drake Relays.

With solid performances from top to bottom, the Iowa women's track team looks ready for its next meet, the Big Ten championships, on May 11.

Senior Tiffany Johnson won the 100-meter hurdles for the second-straight year with a school-record time of 13.20. She is the only Hawkeye athlete to win an event in consecutive seasons at Drake.

Her time not only breaks her previous school mark of 13.24, it shaved off almost four seconds from her regional qualifying time.

In a meet with competition spread over a few days, the three-event athlete benefits from the time off.

"She doesn't have to run one right after each other," assistant coach Victor Houston said. "She has time to recover and refocus."

Diane Nukuri was the Hawkeyes' other event winner, coming up with a regional-qualifying and personal best in the 5,000 meters in 16:15.28. She previously earned a regional spot in the 1,500 and a provisional place at the national championships in the 10,000.

Iowa also could have added titles in the high jump and 1,500, but Peaches Roach and Meghan Armstrong competed in the special invitational events, which pits them against the elite athletes, many of whom are professionals.

# 3 HAWKS DRAFTED; 3 OTHERS SIGN

Three Hawkeyes landed on Super Bowl contenders, while the rest — including three-year starting quarterback Drew Tate — waited for free-agency and found success on Sunday.

Iowa's Marshal Yanda and Scott Chandler slipped in last weekend's NFL draft, but both landed on Super Bowl contenders. Mike Elgin, too.

Yanda, an offensive lineman, was selected in the third round by Baltimore after a strong recommendation from Iowa coach Kirk Ferentz, a former assistant with the Ravens.

Chandler, a tight end projected by some experts as a first-day pick, slid to San Diego in the middle of the fourth round. The senior

marks the fourth tight end selected in the last five years from Iowa, and he will join ex-Hawkeyes Nate Kaeding, Derreck Robinson, and Mike Goff on the Chargers.

"It was a dream come true getting drafted," Chandler told the *DI*. "To go out to a great team, and to be playing with other Hawkeyes as well, I'm so excited."

While he said the move from the college ranks to the pros can be intimidating, having some familiar faces in the locker room will be a bonus.

"It makes it easier," he said. "I know they'll be there for me if I need help. It will help ease the transition having them as teammates."

New England snagged Elgin with the No. 247th overall selection. Last season, the Chargers and Ravens finished with the two best records in the AFC.

Baltimore traded up three spots to select Yanda, who could play guard or tackle at the pro level, with the 86th overall pick. The Anamosa, Iowa, native became the fourth Hawkeye offensive lineman selected on the first day of the draft in the last nine years.

"We felt like, with the number of picks that we had on the second day, that moving back into the third round to get Yanda provided

**Hawkeyes win 1, then lose**

Going into the Big Ten championships on April 27, the Iowa women's tennis team liked its chances at earning another meeting against the top-seeded Northwestern Wildcats.

The Hawkeyes' only hurdle was a quarterfinal matchup against Ohio State — a team that the Hawks had easily beaten beforehand on the women's home court — and coach Daryl Greenan knew an identical outcome would not be likely.

His prediction was as precise as his team's style of play, and the women managed to snag a 4-2 victory over a Buckeye squad that not only was ranked higher than Iowa nationally but played tough coming off a road trip.

Even though Ohio State began the contest with a win in doubles play — a point Greenan said his team gave away — Iowa solidified its advancement to the semifinals by going 4-1 in singles.

"Even after losing the doubles point, I knew we would be in good shape [to win] because we've been playing well," Greenan said. "We played a little bit of a clumsy doubles, made too many mistakes and gave away too many free points. Our women did a really good job of staying focused and getting it together [afterwards]."

With the score tied 2-2, junior Jacqueline Lee, who was named to the All-Big Ten team this past weekend, defeated her opponent in the

first singles spot to give Iowa the lead before sophomore Merel Beelen clinched the victory in the fourth spot.

Over the course of the season, Lee accumulated a 7-3 record in the team's top spot.

"I'm definitely proud of what she's done in the last few years since she started playing sixth in our lineup," Greenan said. "She deserves every bit of it. She's worked hard."

No. 1 Northwestern awaited in the semifinals the next day, and the Hawkeyes that the only way they could advance was to play their absolute best.

Despite a favorable beginning with leads on several singles courts, when the final ball bounced, five players were handed losses in a 4-1 defeat.

Senior Hilary Mintz was the only one to earn a win after overcoming Northwestern's Alexis Prousis in three sets (0-6, 6-1, 6-4) in what could potentially be her final collegiate tennis competition.

Two matches went unfinished against the Wildcats. Beelen and junior Milica Veselinovic had tough fights, which Greenan explained could have transformed into a closer 4-3 loss.

Regardless, the outcome had significantly better effect on the squad's outlook
