## Still no home for Magic

The Magic Bus may make an appearance, but not a permanent stop.

The Magic Bus is still homeless. Jeremy Freerks, the manager of the Magic Bus, said he hoped he would have good news for fans on Thursday. That announcement didn't happen. Negotiations had been occurring regarding the tailgate's longtime home at 817 Melrose Ave., but those came to a standstill. "As to nailing something down for Saturday, that doesn't look feasible," Freerks said. However, the Iowa City Ducks Rugby Club, which organizes the bus, is still looking and hasn't run out of options. Team members were working Thursday night, and "friends of the bus" were

## County, UI at odds over land

Johnson County officials hope to present Justice Center plans soon.

It's just a half-acre parking lot on South Capitol Street and an old former school building. But the struggles between the visions of Johnson County and University of Iowa officials for that land have become more prominent as Johnson County Jail officials contend with stepped up alcohol-enforcement efforts by the university. The concerns revolve around overcrowding at the jail. The jail regularly houses between 160-170 inmates, and 80-90 prisoners are sent to neighboring counties daily because the facility is over capacity, county Sheriff Lonny Pulkrabek said. In July alone, the county spent \$124,723 to transport and house inmates in

## Writer Bourjaily dies

Vance Nye Bourjaily taught at the UI Writer's Workshop from 1957 to 1980.

Years ago, in a weathered one room school-house atop a hill near his family's home on a farm several miles from Iowa City, Vance Nye Bourjaily wrote tales of war and music that led Ernest Hemingway to call him one of the greatest writers under 50. "He was a very slow writer," recalled son Philip Bourjaily. "Whenever he was stuck, he

would pick up his trumpet and play. We could hear him playing all the way from the house."

Bourjaily, a former professor at the Iowa Writers' Workshop, died Tuesday in Greenbrae, Calif. He was 87.

Bourjaily, who taught in the Workshop for more than 20 years, leaves behind a lasting

legacy at the Workshop.

"Vance was one of the great teachers of the Workshop," said Workshop Director Lan Samantha Chang. "He fostered so many brilliant students and writers."

Bourjaily began teaching at the UI in 1957.

"There were a lot of writers who came and went in the Workshop, but not dad," said Phillip Bourjaily. "I'd like to think he influenced more than one generation of students."

He said his parents often gave parties for students and anyone else who would come to their family farm. He also remembered a time when Vance Bourjaily took him and a Workshop student — John Irving — to a Hawkeyes wrestling match.

"We grew up among famous writers," said Philip Workshop, 52. "Those people were around so much we didn't think of them as famous."

# Wastewater project on tap

Officials expect the consolidation project will be complete by 2014.

Standing on top of a large silo-like structure at Iowa City's South Wastewater Treatment Plant, Dave Elias, the superintendent of the city's Wastewater and Landfill Division, stared across the 53-acre plot of land.

Intricate mazes of pipes and pools filled with water dotted the area among farm-land on Napoleon Street.

"You get a pretty good view from up here," Elias said, his eyes covered from the sun by a baseball cap.

The plant, which cleans roughly 8 million gallons of water per month, will be responsible for all of the city's wastewater by 2014, approximately 12 million gallons per month. The flood of 2008 damaged the city's other treatment plant, located on South Clinton Street, which already had structural defects, giving officials a reason to close the facility.

In mid-August, the city got a \$2 million boost from the state's infrastructure initiative, I-JOBS, created to recoup losses caused by the flood and funded by the state's gaming revenues.

Thursday, officials from entities around the state met with the I-JOBS board to discuss the second round of funding, as well as to see if leftover money from other projects was available for distribution.

Though no additional Iowa City projects received funding this round, Rick Fosse, Iowa City's public-works director, said a

small amount of leftover money was made available and will go toward the plant consolidation.

In order to accommodate the additional water, con-

struction crews will have to modify the south plant, a job that will include expanding pipes, basins, renewing technology, and increasing energy efficiency. Elias said city officials will spend the next two years completing engineering plans for the for the \$46 million project.

"It's obviously a utility everyone uses," said Sen. Bob Dvorsky, D-Coralville. "It was directly related to something caused by the flood. It creates decent construction jobs. All the criteria it does well on."

And with the money, the city is less than \$11.5 million short of its \$78.5 million funding goal for flood mitigation, which includes three main projects: waste-

water plant consolidation, raising Dubuque Street, and reconstruction of the Park Road bridge.

"We're pretty much through the recovery phase," said Fosse. "We're into the mitigation phase. We do feel good about the funding package we've been able to assemble."

For now, the south plant will continue to operate as usual. The plant, the city government's biggest energy consumer, carries water through a complex cleansing process.

Elias hopes the new plant will include increased treatment safety, energy efficiency, and technology. The plant is staffed 10 hours a day, and computers run the plant during the night.

# Police ready for football weekend

UI police will bring in help from other departments for this weekend.

This weekend, city officials and police will prepare to deal with issues before and after the football game.

While police will a m p u p enforcement e f f o r t s around Kin-nick on Saturday morning, city officials are reminding residents to keep the noise to a minimum at night.

For the first time, officials are distributing fliers, "Partying in Iowa City," to rental units reminding both party hosts and their neighbors of proper etiquette.

"It is probably something we should have done a long time ago, but we have started it now for some reason,"

said City Councilor Mike Wright.

One page reminds people to respect their neighbors and outlines the consequences. The second page advises community members to introduce themselves to student neighbors and advises them to call the police if necessary.

Councilor Connie Champion said she believes that it is "healthy" for students to get a warning, rather than doing something wrong and receiving a citation because they did not know better.

The fliers are just one of a few initiatives to prepare the community for the expected rowdy weekend.

University of Iowa officials are using their new "Think Before you Drink" program to make game day safer for Hawkeye fans. Tailgaters must stop drinking on university property one hour after the game and leave the area two hours after the game.

Charles Green, the assistant vice president for the UI police, said the department has hired police officers from areas surround-

ing Iowa City as well as outside of Johnson County. Green said it is not uncommon for the department to hire officers from other departments, and the UI police do it for every football game.

The UI police will especially crack down on people with open-containers of alcohol, playing drinking games, or acting intoxicated, he said.

But some students aren't impressed with the new regulations.

UI junior Cody Fishwild said he thinks the time limit for tailgaters on UI

property will cause more problems.

"People are going to leave after drinking, and OWIs are definitely going to go up," he said. The 21-year-old said he thinks people are will find other locations to drink in after the game.

Brianna Johnson, a recent transfer student, is expecting an increase in police enforcement but is skeptical about how strict they will actually be. Johnson, an Ankeny native, has been a Hawkeye fan ever since she can remember.

"I think there is going to be a lot more police and enforcement, but there are more people tailgating than cops, so it should be interesting," said the 21-year-old, who has attended Hawkeye games in the past. "It's an Iowa football game."

When dealing with an extremely large number of people inside the stadium and out, it is difficult to know what to expect, Green said.

"Whenever you're in charge of an event like this, it would be foolish to not have concerns," Green said.

### Some companies recovering

New survey results show that interstate commerce companies in Iowa may be recovering from the recession.

The Iowa City Area Development Group released its results from a survey, conducted during the second quarter of 2010, of seventy-two companies.

The results show that 760 of the 1,370 jobs lost during 2008-09 have been recovered, resulting in a 6 percent increase in employment from last year to this year.

The companies also expect to

collectively create 1,100 new jobs in the near future.

"Ninety-one percent of the companies we interviewed anticipate adding new products or services in the next two years," said Joe Raso, the group's president, in a press release.

Almost 70 percent of the companies that were surveyed also reported their sales had increased over last year. This is a 16 percent increase from last year's survey.

"We haven't been immune from the global recession," Raso said. "But our area has shown remarkable resilience."

### Summit deal on hold

The Summit's change of ownership deal has been delayed.

Andrew White, who applied for a liquor license for the Summit Restaurant & Bar, 10 S. Clinton St., said he doesn't plan on purchasing the bar in the near future.

"At this point, it's done," said White, who owns AKA White Inc. "I don't see it moving any further."

White applied for the liquor license in early August, and the item just recently made it on the Iowa City City Council's budget.

Since then, a deal between White and Mike Porter, the bar's current owner, came to a halt.

City Clerk Marian Karr said the council received an "intent to purchase," but it still needs a signed copy of the lease before the council can send the paperwork to the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division to make the final decision.

But White said there is no current deal pending on the downtown establishment.

"I've moved on to other ventures," he said.

He said he and siblings didn't think of their father as famous, either, but their father's work garnered critical acclaim.

*Brill Among the Ruins*, Bourjaily's sixth novel, is probably his best known said daughter Robin Bourjaily.

The story of a middle-aged lawyer from Illinois was nominated for a National Book Award in 1970 and also saw favorable reviews from the *New York Times Book Review*.

In his lifetime, Bourjaily wrote 10 novels. Robin Bourjaily, 45, said she remembers the first book she read, *The Hound of Earth*.

"I was a teenager when I read most of his work," she said. "I got to look into another world. This was a different guy from the one who was usually making rules and telling me what not to do."

Vance Bourjaily's parents were both writers, said Philip Bourjaily — his father a newspaper reporter and mother a general storyteller. Philip Bourjaily, now a writer for the outdoors magazine *Field and Stream*, said

writing was second nature to his dad.

Some of his work was influenced by his love of music, Robin Bourjaily said, specifically jazz. He moved to New Orleans in 1987 and taught up the road at Louisiana State University.

"He'd just returned from a trip to New Orleans speaking with people about Katrina," said daughter-in-law Pamela Bourjaily. "He made a trip to Iowa City and saw the family, and we're so grateful to have had that final visit."

The Bourjaily family is planning two memorial services in California and Iowa City. No further details regarding either were available Thursday.

reaching out to different people.

"We're the kings of winging it," Freerks said. "We've been winging it for 15 years."

Freerks stressed that the team still has one more day. He would not release the possible locations for this weekend's event but did confirm the tailgate would not be held at 817 Melrose Ave.

Doug Boothroy, the director of Housing and Inspection Services, said he would be informed of any change.

"The only thing I know is that they don't have a new location," he said. "It's getting pretty late for this weekend."

But the rugby team will tailgate this weekend, Freerks said, even if it has to rent a space.

A statement on the Bus's fan page — "dedicated to all the fans and bands that have ever walked on the sacred ground south of Kinnick Stadium that was 817 Melrose Ave." — said briefly the Magic Bus found a new home for seven games this year, but that was an overlooked mistake, according to Freerks. Its current location is marked as "homeless."

Iowa City City Counselor Connie Champion said she's heard little public comment on the issue.

"People generally always have something to say about every-

thing," she said. "It just hasn't happened."

The Magic Bus lost its traditional location on Melrose Avenue when the Barkalow Associates Realtors purchased the property in August 2009. The rugby club applied for temporary permits for the 100 block of Woodside Drive and the traditional Melrose location — both were denied.

Boothroy said the team had moved on to search for other options, but Magic Bus organizers are still looking for a spot near Kinnick.

"It feels like it wouldn't be the Magic Bus without putting it up toward the stadium," Freerks said.

The club will know soon if there will be a spot for the Magic Bus.

If not, it could still make an appearance, just not serving its normal purpose.

Until things are decided, Freerks said, the bus sits in a parking lot by the Eagles Club — waiting for orders.

neighboring counties.

That cost increases during the football season, when the county must ship 20 more people to other jails before games to make room for tailgating-related arrests — to the tune of \$3,000.

There is a simple way to ease the overcrowding problem, officials said: Add to the current jail. But that means the county would have to buy a parking lot owned by the UI. And the university isn't selling.

According to documents obtained under the Freedom of Information Act by *The Daily Iowan*, county officials have been interested in the School District administration building since 2005 and the UI parking lot since 2006.

The county attempted to purchase the lot in 2006, documents show. The letters say the UI decided not to "sell or encumber" the lot, which officials said provided much-needed East Side employee parking space. At the time the university considered the land a possible site for a parking ramp or academic building.

UI Business Manager George Hollins said the property is used for valuable parking for the new Campus and Recreation Facility as well as university staff.

"It has been a very heavily used part of our parking program over the years," he said. "It should serve that function for a long time."

Hollins said that staff parking was "pretty much at equilibrium" and not limited at this time.

County officials decided to build a justice center, which would include a jail and a courthouse, in a new location after the UI decided not to sell the property, Johnson County Supervisor Sally Stutsman said.

E-mails from 2009 show that the county and the university — who have mutual needs south of Burlington Street, Sullivan said — entered into talks with Sen. Bob Dvorsky, D-Coralville, in September 2009 to discuss land purchases in that location.

An e-mail on July 19 from Johnson County Supervisor Rod Sullivan to UI President Sally Mason and others said Johnson County officials had thought the UI would contact them before purchasing land south of Burlington Street, and they were "shocked" when the university offered to buy the School District administration building.

"They could solve our jail problem for us tomorrow by selling us less than half an acre," he said.

But UI officials said they were waiting on a proposal from the county.

"Had the county provided a specific proposal, we would have been very happy to discuss it with them," university spokesman Tom Moore said.

An upward expansion of the jail is cost-prohibitive, Sullivan said.

After UI officials announced their "Think Before You Drink" tailgating campaign, Johnson County Sheriff Lonny Pulkrabek expressed concern the tighter anti-alcohol measures may generate more arrests and even more crowding in the jail.

The UI's new cite and release policy — which allows people to be ticketed but released — eased his concerns.

But other officials said they would like to see more cooperation between the county and the UI on the overcrowding issue.

"I think that [the university has] been pretty non-involved in the issue," Stutsman said.

Moore said the UI remains willing to discuss issues with Johnson County.

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Committee continues to study the jail issue and is close to presenting an option to voters, supervisors said.

## Kinnick cameras, while beneficial, raise civil-liberty concerns

Kinnick Stadium boasts some pretty impressive numbers: 70,585 seats, a record 36-straight sellouts from 2002 to 2008, and an \$89 million renovation in 2006, according to the University of Iowa athletics' website.

But here's an additional "fun fact" you don't hear quite as often: The stadium and surrounding area boast 27 cameras whose footage is watched by some 300 security officers policing the crowd from afar.

The Editorial Board believes this monitoring is both necessary and beneficial in keeping the peace and preempting violent outbursts in such an impassioned atmosphere. However, we support limiting this video oversight. There is a threshold at which gains from physical protection no longer outweigh losses to privacy concerns, and the inclusion of 27 cameras approaches — if not surpasses — that tipping point.

Charles Green, the assistant vice president for the UI police, said officials use camera recordings solely to identify problematic situations or review footage upon request. The visual records are not kept permanently, he said, but he would not specify how long they are kept.

"We attempt to identify problems that present themselves during the game; this could be anything including fights, medical emergencies, smoking, alcohol consumption, et cetera," Green wrote in an e-mail. "If we notice something amiss, we send the appropriate personnel."

The system was implemented four years ago, and it has not prompted any complaints, Green said. Perhaps this is because of a general acceptance of

heightened security rather than a lack of widespread fan awareness.

As UI senior Tom Harmon said, "I don't think there's an expectation of privacy in a place like Kinnick — too many people in one place. And if there weren't cameras, there would just be more cops walking around the stadium."

Still, it's only fair to inform all fans and tailgaters of their new stardom on police officers' silver screens. Surreptitious monitoring doesn't increase security, and it unnecessarily infringes on personal autonomy — you can't object to something you don't know about, after all. In addition, notifying fans and tailgaters that cameras are actively recording could serve as a

crime deterrent.

We also suggest that security officers manning cameras put an "expiration date" on the recordings, ensuring future abuse doesn't occur. Officers should tackle legitimate problems as they arise in real time, not retain hours of irrelevant footage.

Many of you will fire up the tailgating grills, purchase fizzy, concession-stand beer, or cheer on the Hawkeyes in the student section this weekend. Most of you will be courteous fans; some will forget this editorial, forget that a "higher power" is at work in the stands of Kinnick Stadium.

But though there is an inherent asset to having 27 lenses and 300 pairs of eyes on the beat, it's still important to ask: How much is enough, and when do individual freedoms trump airtight security?

Your turn. Do the 27 cameras at Kinnick concern you?

## American revivalism

"God dropped a giant sandbag" on Glenn Beck's head, he announced prior to his rally last weekend. It was a stunning alarm clock. Beck, who had previously planned the Aug. 28 "Restoring Honor" event as a political outcry, decided to change his tone.

"For too long, this country has wandered in darkness, and we have wandered in darkness in periods from the beginning," Beck said at the event. "God is the answer."

Compared with more secular Tea Party rallies in the past, the event exposed the rich soil fertilizing right-wing dissent: not necessarily racism, not necessarily xenophobia, and certainly not academic, intellectual political arguments.

It's religion, stupid. Or, more specifically, the furor over America going off track, the calls to "take America back," and even the continued insistence that President Obama is a Muslim are all about the same religious revivalism I've studied in my time as a religious-studies major.

You see, America, as the "Restoring Honor" crowd would have it, has lost its way. The appeals to the Founding Fathers, the men dressed as Ben Franklin or American revolutionaries, all point toward one thing: We used to be so righteous.

This is not a new concept. The GOP has long trafficked in 1950s glossies repackaged for a nostalgic present. But now there's a steely sense of the sacred behind all that retrograde dreaming. Last summer, some Unitarian Universalist friends and I had a most unusual experience, attending the Spirit and Truth Apostolic Fellowship evening service in Marion. We sat respectfully as Senior Pastor Dennis Krog called for an end to the corruption of the sexual revolution and a new Great Revival.

While the Pentecostal church does not represent the majority of religious Americans, I now suspect that the Spirit and Truth Fellowship was simply more honest in its call for a revolution than many other denominations.

In a Gallup poll released earlier this week, 65

percent of Americans said religion plays an important part in their daily life. Of that 65 percent, the majority identifies with some form of Protestant Christianity, and many self-identify as evangelical Christians. But being a Christian means more than simply believing that Christ died for the sins of humanity; it means understanding life through a series of narratives and ideological precepts.

First among these is the story of the Garden of Eden and the concept of original sin. Humankind, the Book of Genesis explains, used to live in an idealized world. But because of our disobedience and our straying from God's will, we fell from grace. Since then we can only aspire to grow as close to God as we once were and recreate parts of Eden that we have lost.

This narrative of a golden age lost bears striking similarities to Tea Partiers' cries to restore the Constitution. Glenn Beck's 9/12 Project calls for a reinstatement of God, as though America has somehow forgotten what God might mean to its religious citizens along the way. This postlapsarian ideology — that we live after the fall of humankind, or after the fall of America, and we need to return to the good times — is necessarily conservative, because it looks ever backwards.

Of course, when Americans idealize the Revolutionary War, the Founding Fathers, or even the postwar decade, we calmly erase the downsides of those times: slavery, racism, rape, patriarchy, and religious persecution. But it is a soothing narrative in times of economic downturn, loss of faith in secular institutions, and mass uncertainty over everything that seemed so simple.

People who are secular, or who come from traditions that do not inspire conservative ideals, are wrong to discount religion's influence on politics as sheer indoctrination. Karl Marx's description of religion rings true: "It is the fantastic realization of the human essence since the human essence has not acquired any true reality."

To understand Beck, Palin, and the "Restoring Honor" crowd, progressives have to speak their language — and their language is the language of the Pentecostals I met in Marion. It is the language of the sacred. ■

Disabled American Veterans offers a \$15,000 scholarship for volunteers who provide at least 100 hours of service to local VA Hospitals in a year.

- Share your passion. My department runs Job Corps, one of the country's largest networks of residential educational/vocational training programs. Many of the 123 Job Corps centers in the country have volunteer opportunities. Find a Job Corps student who is interested in the

same career as you are (our programs range from culinary arts to computers to construction) and become a mentor or tutor.

The Serve.gov site can also help you find other volunteer opportunities where the needs are greatest. The unemployment rate for people with disabilities is more than 16 percent. Hundreds of organizations that serve this important community need your help in a variety of job skills and readiness programs. This is a great way for you to put your unique talents to work, hone your own skills, sharpen your focus, and help others.

- Get "green" now. Earn

green later. Get involved in the efforts to "green" your campus or community. We're making significant investments in a whole new American industry: clean energy. Our goal is to reduce our dependence on foreign oil and re-energize our manufacturing sector, creating jobs today and jobs tomorrow.

I hope that you will make Labor Day 2010 a day on, instead of a day off. There's nothing wrong with making time for barbecues and the big game, but let's make time for each other, too. Let's all do the work that will get America working.

## Back to the 'real' rock 'n' roll

Local musicians look back to the music of their youth.

The stereotypical jam band is a college-town staple. Paying homage to the rock 'n' roll of the '60s and '70s, there are plenty of bands whose members were decades away from birth when the Grateful Dead and Allman Brothers were setting the music scene on fire.

Iowa City residents are some of the lucky few who have a jam band with musicians who are old enough to have experienced the music during its heyday. That band is the Beaker Brothers, and it will play at 9 p.m. today at the Mill, 120 E. Burlington St. Admission is \$7.

The members of the band are Steve Grismore on guitar and vocals, Dan Bernstein on guitar, Jim Dreier and Dan Hummel on drums and percussion, John Shultz on keyboard, and "Uncle" Ed English on bass and vocals.

Grismore and Dreier, both faculty members at the University of Iowa School of Music, had

talked at length about starting a classic-rock band.

"We thought it'd be fun if it were mostly older guys who were all from the same generation," Grismore said. "So we started calling some people up, figured it out, and finally got a band together."

The name of the band came from one of English's favorite radio shows, "Beaker Street." Hosted by DJ Clyde Clifford, the show aired from 1966 to 1977 on KAAZ, an AM radio station in Little Rock, Ark.

"Beaker Street" was actually a reference to LSD, a psychedelic drug that was created in a laboratory beaker, and the show, fittingly, featured a type of music called acid rock. The jam-band style of music that the Iowa City band plays eventually evolved from this music genre.

One of the guys' favorite groups to cover is the Allman Brothers. Grismore often spent hours listening to the group, and it inspired him on the guitar. He was even lucky enough to catch the band twice in Iowa City,

once before guitarist Duane Allman died and once after.

Though the group is a cover band, the nature of a jam band means the performers improvise on most of the songs. Sections may extend anywhere from a few minutes to half an hour during a show, which makes for some long jams and segues into other songs.

English finds this particular form of rock 'n' roll fun to play because the musicians can stretch out parts of the song in jams.

"Every time we play a song, it could be somewhat different because of the

improvisational nature," he said.

Grismore also thinks it's fun to play music musicians can jam out to.

"There is a freedom to that that's fun," he said. "It's not pop-oriented, it's more jam-band-oriented."

The group will sometimes change a song based on how the tune is going,

English said. But when something is working, the band keeps it. For example, when a solo is really grooving, the group will turn the soloist loose, letting him play as long as it works.

Unlike a traditional cover band, the Beaker Brothers doesn't attempt to play songs note for note; instead, it tries to recreate

the spirit of the original recording. For the band's members, it's not about making it big, it's about appreciating the music they all grew up on.

"People will ask us 'Do you have records for sale?'" Grismore said. "We always tell them to go back to the source documents."

## For Three Years Hollow, it's all about the fans

# Dancing to stardom

This year at the 51st-annual Bill Riley Talent Search at the Iowa State Fair, Isaac Stauffer wasn't dancing for a title. He was dancing for his great-grandmother.

"This year has been extra special and bitter-sweet," he said.

While driving to the fair, he received a call that his 94-year-old great-grandmother had died. That, he said, set this year's competition apart from others.

"I definitely felt her on stage with me," he said.

The inspiration that Stauffer gained from his personal loss was enough to propel him through the competition into first place. Performing a tap routine to the song "Kiss Me," he won this year's talent search.

The 21-year-old University of Iowa student is a seasoned veteran in the contest, winning the junior division at age 9 and continuing with fifth-, second-, and first-place trophies throughout his years of competing.

"The reason I do the fair isn't for the money or to win anymore, but to entertain and inspire," Stauffer said.

His inspiration didn't come only from his great-grandmother. Cousin Kerri Alvine inspired him to start dancing.

"Hearing that means the world to me," Alvine said. "We are as close as brother and sister, and to know that I had any influence to help him get to where he is today is just an amazing feeling."

The two both grew up dancing at Stairway to the Stars dance studio in Wayland, Iowa, where they primarily studied ballet, tap, and jazz.

Something that sets Stauffer's dancing talent apart from others are the tumbling moves that he choreographs. Tumbling since age 3, and dancing since he was 4, he is confident when doing flips and tricks, despite the little grip and traction that his tap shoes provide.

That was apparent at this summer's fair. His performance impressed many, including his former dance instructor, Melissa Wesphel.

"He was wonderful," she said. "He's really born to be on the stage, and it's more than just his dancing, it's about his personality and everything he brings to the stage."

Winning the Talent Search was only one dance highlight for Stauffer this

"It was about crossing borders politically, personally, and geographically," Stauffer said. "There was a huge collaboration between us and the directors."

As well as studying dance at the UI, he is studying elementary education. He hopes to combine both of these majors to teach dance in his future.

"It's nice to be able to pass along any wisdom I can," he said.

# 'Sustainable' a key word

Officials hope to attract 500 students to the sustainable living community in the next four years.

Kristina McLaughlin decided to pursue a certificate in sustainability after witnessing the effect that the 2008 flood had on her hometown of Cedar Rapids.

McLaughlin, a senior and intern at the University of Iowa's Office of Sustainability, is one of 60 students obtaining the certificate — up from 40 last year, the first year of the program.

UI officials hope to keep expanding the program, saying they want to provide students a broader scope on how to embrace the sustainable lifestyle.

"Students are becoming more aware," said McLaughlin, referring to increased student interest in sustainability.

The trend is picking up all over campus. This year, the UI Student Government named senior Christopher Page to be its director of sustainability and increase the student organization's focus on the topic.

And on Monday, the UI's new sustainability living-learning community held its first meeting in a park. The Mayflower community houses 45 students.

Craig Just, a UI associate research scientist and faculty liaison to the sustainable living-learning community, said he felt "overjoyed with the energy" stu-

dents displayed at the gathering. They brainstormed ways to increase recycling and other sustainability methods at Mayflower and beyond.

Just said his ultimate goal is for students to be able to define what it means to be a sustainable student and citizen.

He hopes to increase the living-learning community to 500 students within the next three to four years.

Nikki Larson, the community's resident assistant, first felt moved to live a sustainable lifestyle after watching an educational program on television about an architect using various resources to create the ultimate "green" house.

President Sally Mason outlined a policy of increased focus on sustainability, an approach that played a major role in the university's success in sustainability expansion, Just said.

Sustainability is a trend seen in other colleges and universities as well. Iowa State University has over 350 courses alone in its undergraduate college that focuses on the sustainability theme.

The courses offered at Iowa State touch on all aspects of sustainability, said Merry Rankin, director of sustainability, and all majors have courses that tie in to sustainability.

For Larson, sustainability is about the bigger picture.

"My life isn't just about being sustainable," she said. "It's also about seeking ways to improve the world around me."





increased \$250,000 to \$1.87 million; his annual supplemental compensation increased \$80,000 to \$1.48 million; and starting this year, the university will pay Ferentz "annual longevity compensation" which starts at \$325,000 and increases every year.

Further details of the contract were not available Thursday because it was not yet official, said

Associate Sports Information Director Steve Roe.

If Ferentz completes the duration of his new contract, he will become the longest-tenured coach in Iowa football history. He's one of eight Football Bowl Subdivision coaches to be employed at the same school since 1999.

"The continuity and leadership he brings as our head coach and the same among his staff of assistant coaches provides us a great foundation and important stability," Barta said.

Fewer than 14 months ago, Ferentz completed an

extension that paid him \$3.02 annually through the 2015 season. Last season, the head coach led the Hawkeyes to the best start in school history, capping it off with a 24-14 win over Georgia Tech in the Orange Bowl.

It was the fourth time in the Ferentz era that an Iowa team won 10 or more games in a season. Ferentz is 81-55 in his 11 seasons with the program, including two co-Big Ten championships.

He's a three-time winner of Big Ten Coach of the Year award, and in 2002, the Associated Press named Ferentz National Coach of the Year.

But taking the Panthers lightly would be a big mistake.

Eastern Illinois finished 8-4 last season and has high hopes for 2010. The squad is ranked No. 18 in the Football Championship Subdivision top 25 preseason poll, and it is picked to finish second in the Ohio Valley Conference.

Last season taught the Hawkeyes not to overlook any opponent, offensive lineman Julian Vandervelde

said. Seven of Iowa's 11 victories last season were decided by 10 points or fewer.

"We certainly know that every opponent is going to be dangerous and every opponent is going to be tough," Vandervelde said. "At this point, all we can really hope is that we've matured to the level that we now know that nothing is going to come easy for us at any point in time during the season."

While Eastern Illinois has proven to be a strong program in the past, inexperience and injuries at key positions could hamper the Panthers' chances of pulling

off an upset Saturday.

Redshirt sophomore quarterback Brandon Large will make his first career start, and a knee injury will keep running back Mon Williams out of the game. The Florida transfer led the Panthers' rushing attack last season with 870 yards and nine touchdowns.

To make matters worse, three Eastern Illinois players have already been suspended for violating team policies. Head coach Bob Spoo refused to comment on a rumor that more suspensions could be forthcoming.

Spoo said he was envious

of Northern Iowa's near-upset last season, and he plans to mention it to his squad before game time. But Spoo knows his team has a slim margin of error.

"We can't give them turnovers, interceptions, penalties, fumbles," he said via teleconference. "Hopefully, we can make [the Hawkeyes] work for what they get. To give them opportunities would not be in our best interest. We have to execute to our highest level and hope for the best."

not pulling her share because it's going to be very noticeable," Griesbaum said. "There aren't going to be players they can look to, to be like, 'Pick up my slack,' there's going to be a real team emphasis. There always has been in our program, but we don't have those two to four players who can take a game over."

Sure, this is the Hawkeyes' first team during Griesbaum's tenure without an All-American, but the Black

and Gold isn't out searching for a new go-to-player.

Senior and co-captain Chelsea Miller said the entire 17-player roster holds each other accountable on the field and the group's camaraderie is constantly improving with experience.

"It's a lot different from any other team I've been on here," she said. "I think that it probably makes the playing field a little more even because we need everyone. There's no one on the team we can just depend [on], there aren't one or two girls pulling us through tough games, so it really takes 11, 12, 13, girls,

and the whole squad to execute a game plan."

After squaring off against the nation's elite last weekend, the Hawkeyes returned to Iowa City better aware of what needed some fine-tuning.

Griesbaum's group spent the week studying film and hitting the practice field, zeroing in on their overall physical stamina, team defense, and organization on the playing field.

Senior cocaptain Sarah Pergine said the games this weekend are extremely important in regards to not only tallies in the win col-

umn but also as confidence boosters for the youngsters.

"We played really difficult teams [last weekend] that exposed some weaknesses," Pergine said. "We improved on a lot of things, too, and we need to keep improving on those as well as fix some things. This weekend is going to tell a lot about who we are as a team and see what changes we can make in this week of practices and actually apply them in the game."

The Hawkeyes are set to hit the pitch against Miami (Ohio) on Sunday at 1 p.m. and then will take on Brown on Monday at noon.

mer team's strengths and weaknesses.

"[Loyola is] pretty strong defensively, but we have some good forwards," the Omaha native said. "They always work hard, and they're a team that can surprise you on any given day. They haven't had a great start, but they can surprise a team."

"I have a few ideas I think could really help us out."

Whether the team will actually need the help is debatable. Iowa pounded Loyola, 4-1, when the teams met last year.

More recently, the Hawkeyes scored three goals in last weekend's two shutout wins over Northern Illinois and Central Michigan.

While Iowa's offense has been rolling, Loyola's has been stagnant. The Ram-

blers have scored just one goal thus far.

Iowa head coach Ron Rainey said the Hawkeyes know they will be challenged despite Loyola's ugly record.

"They have a lot of technical, skillful players that — with time and space — can put you under pressure," Rainey said. "They can connect passes. We need to have a really high tempo against them and be able to match their possession to try to break their back line down."

Directing the tempo will be the primary responsibility of attacking midfielder Morgan Showalter. The

junior from Cedar Rapids is the linchpin of Iowa's attack, and she stressed the importance of playing as a cohesive unit.

"Goals for the weekend are to improve on the mistakes we made [last weekend] and to capitalize on those small, little things to make the score larger than just a 1-0 game," she said. "Staying connected in the midfield, staying connected in the back line, getting the runs and timing down for the forwards — just keeping all of us connected as one team."

A unified team could lead to the Iowa offense having a big game — Loyola has given up at least two goals in each of its losses, including a 5-0 thrashing by Creighton on Aug. 29 — but Rainey cautioned against overlooking the Ramblers. This weekend marks the first time this season Iowa will play in a road environment, and

Loyola's artificial turf is something the Hawkeyes have little experience with.

"It's not as effective to play balls over the top of defenses. You definitely have to possess in front of a back line before trying to play balls through seams. The field's a little bit faster. We play out here on grass, but [before the game] we'll get a short little walk through on their field just so the players get to see the speed of the field."

Adam admitted the game holds a special degree of importance to her but also said her goals remain the same no matter who the opponent is.

"It'll be weird, [being] on the other side of things," she said. "I don't think it's necessarily nerves, I think it'd be more excitement and more incentive to play well. [I just want] to win — to score and to win. That's about it."

**Harriers stress unity**

The women's cross country team will rely on teamwork to come back from a disappointing 2009 season.

Rule No. 1: Put the Team First.

"Cooperation is a thorough conviction that nobody gets there unless everybody gets there."

Meeting together once a week to discuss the book *Pulling Together: 10 rules for High Performance Teams* is just one of Iowa women's cross-country coach Layne Anderson's training techniques that encourages teamwork.

Coming off of a substandard end to a promising 2009 season, Iowa leans on team cohesion for help.

"If anything, it drew this team closer together," Anderson said. "I think it motivated the group just a little bit more. And I really

believe that they have the attitude this year."

"We're going to take control of our own destiny and run our way into the meet."

After three-consecutive years of earning an at-large bid, from 2006-08, Iowa failed to qualify for the NCAA championships in 2009.

"I think missing [the NCAA meet] was a really big disappointment but also a blessing, because we are more motivated now," junior Betsy Flood said. "And we don't really have a [stand-

out], but knowing we can all be that together is great."

Without a front-runner, senior Lauren Hardesty said, there has been an emphasis on the value of teamwork.

Promoting cross-country through teamwork enhances the ability of each individual runner, Anderson said.

"If the team does well, then that means each of the individual components have done very well," he said. "People are actually going to achieve even more individually than they ever would because now they are doing it for other people."

With last year's top five scorers returning and a talented recruiting class coming in, Hardesty is confident the Hawkeyes will be successful this year.

"We train as a group, so it will carry over into the race

because staying with that group as much as you can will make your race that much more consistent," she said.

Anderson said he would not be surprised if different people led Iowa in each meet, and he foresees a variety of runners taking the initiative.

The roster includes 26 runners. Twelve will compete in races; the top five will count in the team's score. Although the scoring process shrinks the team down to a small number, Anderson said, there are other ways to add to the overall success.

"Be a difference maker," he said. "Find a way to contribute. If you're not in uniform and you're not racing, be a good teammate. Be a great supporter. Come out and cheer."

# V-ball faces challenge

The Iowa volleyball team will try to remain undefeated in three more games this weekend.

## Iowa (3-0) vs. Wake Forest (2-1)

The Hawkeye volleyball squad seeks a 6-0 start for the second time in as many years, but it appears Iowa (3-0) has made the schedule for the experience, not its record.

The squad will face ACC-tested Wake Forest (2-1) today and regional rival Creighton (1-2) along with 2009 NCAA Tournament qualifier St. Louis (1-2) on Saturday in the Active Ankle Challenge in St. Louis.

While many teams schedule lowly Division-I opponents to build up the win column early in the season, it seems the Iowa players and coaches want to take on competitive opponents.

"Playing an easy team isn't going to do anything for us besides boost our confidence," said junior setter Paige Stevens. "And we don't need that."

Last weekend, Iowa faced two tough tests in its first three games, winning in four sets against Alabama and five sets against Southern Illinois. After a sweep of Green Bay, the Hawkeyes felt they had hit their groove, but now the team faces its first road challenge of the season.

Because the team's lineup appears set with just one returning starter from last season, Iowa will have to face not only the opponent across the net but also the first road starts for a number of players.

While some coaches would fret about an uncertain environment,

Iowa head coach Sharon Dingman thinks the experience will be valuable.

"Traveling and having to compete in someone else's gym, not having your fans to get you fired up ... I'm looking forward to that," the third-year coach said.

In the first game of the weekend, the Hawkeyes will need to be fired up quickly, lest they fall victim to the outstanding hitters of the Deamon Deacons.

Junior outside hitter Kadija Fornah has 46 kills in three matches this season, and sophomore right-side player Andrea Beck has 38.

Last weekend, Iowa withstood a number of intense attacks from opponents to amass 38 team blocks, a number that will need to be repeated — if not topped — for a successful weekend in Missouri.

And players understand that in order to repeat a three-game sweep, it will take a full effort.

Sophomore middle blocker Lauren Friedman put this week's team goal simply, as it applies to Iowa's hopes to leap from mediocrity into the NCAA Tournament this season.

"We've been saying that good teams can repeat performances," she said.

# UI extends Ferentz contract

Coach Kirk Ferentz is expected to sign his new contract, which will pay him \$3.675 per year until 2020, today.

The UI extended head football coach Kirk Ferentz's contract through the 2020 football season on Thursday, according to a university release.

Ferentz is expected to sign his new deal today —

a day before the Hawkeyes' opener against Eastern Illinois.

The 12th-year head coach will receive a total annual com-

pensation of \$3.675 million under the new contract — a raise of more than \$650,000 per year. The deal makes Ferentz the highest-paid coach in the Big Ten and one of the richest college coaches in America, the release said.

Ohio State's Jim Tressel — whose contract was

extended through 2014 in March — makes about \$3.5 million a year.

"I've said publicly, and privately to Kirk, that it would be my goal to have him retire at Iowa," UI Athletics Director Gary Barta said in a statement. "This contract is a statement supporting that commitment."

Ferentz said, "I am grateful to the University of Iowa and thrilled to begin my 12th season as head coach and 21st overall with this world class institution."

UI Sports Information Director Phil Haddy said Barta wouldn't have any further comment Thursday evening, and a phone mes-

sage left for Mark Abbott, the UI's associate athletics director for legal affairs, was not immediately returned Thursday night.



**Breakdown:** With Broderick Binns suspended for the opener, Ballard will make the move outside from defensive tackle to defensive end. It's not an unfamiliar position for the 6-5, 297 pound defender; he started at defensive end most of the 2008 season. The ability to make the switch speaks to Ballard's versatility on the field, Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said.

"Christian Ballard has just been very accommodating and works hard where he lines up," Ferentz said.

Gaining individual recognition isn't easy when playing on the same defensive line as Adrian Clayborn, but Ballard has shown tremendous playmaking ability for the Hawkeyes. He started all 13 games last season, accumulating nine tackles for loss and five-and-a-half sacks.

## offense

**Name:** Brandon Large  
**Year:** Redshirt sophomore  
**Position:** Quarterback

**Breakdown:** Going up against the Hawkeye defensive line is no easy task for any quarterback. But for Brandon Large, the difficulty could be ten-fold. He has never taken a snap at the Division-I level; in fact, Eastern Illinois doesn't have a single quarterback on its roster with any Division-I experience.

Large's only previous collegiate experience is at Scottsdale Community College.

"He's a poised guy," Eastern Illinois head coach Bob Spoo said. "But he hasn't faced that caliber of defensive front."

Combine Large's inexperience with Eastern Illinois being without Mon Williams — the team's leading rusher from last season — and it could be a long day for the Panther quarterback.

# What drives Ferentz

Kirk Ferentz's past failures keep him from being complacent

In 1999, no one envisioned *this*. No one foresaw a top-10 national ranking. No one predicted the national-championship hype. Heck, no one expected head coach Kirk Ferentz to last more than a few years in Iowa City — at least no one outside the program. A 1-10 record can do that to people.

While he still has fond memories of his senior year, former cornerback Joe Slattery called Iowa's 1999 season, Ferentz's first at Iowa, "The absolute worst of times." At that time, Ferentz wasn't Iowa's \$3 million man. He wasn't widely considered one of the country's top coaches. He wasn't being courted by NFL general managers. He was just Hayden Fry's successor. The guy replacing the legend. Sure, he had coached at Maine, been Fry's offensive-line coach, and worked under Bill Belichick with the Cleveland Browns. But even then, Bill Belichick wasn't *Bill Belichick* — at least not yet.

That was then. This is now. **The down years**

Ferentz remembers the down years. The 1-10s, the 3-9s, the 6-6s. They haunt him. Drive him. Keep him on edge. Even after all of his team's success from 2002-04, even after the Year of Shonn Greene, even after last year's Orange Bowl win, Ferentz won't allow himself to look back at the transformation his program has undertaken over the last 11 years. "I just know it can go right back real fast," he said Tuesday. "I don't spend much time thinking about it." Ferentz never wants to go back.

Not after the 19-18 dip from 2005-07. Not after two-consecutive upsets over Penn State. And especially not after last season's 11-2 campaign. He tells his players that. He talks about the struggles, the ups and downs, what went wrong. Everything is fragile, he says. Everything. His hope is that they learn from the past. His hope is that 1999 never repeats itself. "It's important to understand why those certain dips happen," senior quarterback Ricky Stanzi said. "Why did we have a couple

"I feel that way, yes, just because of all the weapons I have around me," he said at Big Ten media days in Chicago on Aug. 3. "From the wide receivers coming back to the

offensive line, I feel we have a very special offense."

He returns from a sophomore season in which he carried the ball nearly 300 times for 1,517 yards and 18 touchdowns. With Clay poised to face a UNLV defense that surrendered a horrendous 220.6 rushing yards per game last season, expect him to pick up where he left off.

stretches of ball games in a season when we didn't win? If you don't learn from those things, you're doomed to repeat it."

Stanzi remembers the down years, too. More specifically, he remembers 2006 and '07 — his first two seasons on campus. The Hawkeyes went 12-13 over that span. No bowl wins. Four-game losing streaks in each season.

Ferentz talked about those seasons at Iowa media day earlier this month. He worried aloud that his younger players would take the 2009 season for granted. He wondered if they had been spoiled too soon. He feared they didn't realize all the work that goes into a BCS bid.

As Ferentz said, "That ain't the real world."

**The experience to repeat**

For every freshman who views the Orange Bowl as a rite of passage, the Hawkeyes have countless players at the top who know just how hard it is to repeat.

Stanzi, Adrian Clayborn, Chris-

tian Ballard, Julian Vandervelde, Brett Greenwood, Derrell Johnson-Koulianos, Allen Reisner — they've all experienced the down years in one form or another. They know all the trial and error, the work, the film sessions that went into last season's success.

They know that ain't the real world.

"For us to be there when [the down years] happened can only help us with our mindset and how we pass that along to the younger guys," Stanzi said.

It's this experience — and the Hawkeyes' plethora of returning stars — that has the national media buzzing about Iowa's chances to win the Big Ten.

ESPN's Ivan Maisel recently picked Ferentz's squad to play in the BCS championship game. *Sports Illustrated* pegged the Hawkeyes No. 6 in its preseason poll. College-football pundit Phil Steele predicted Iowa would play in the Rose Bowl.

The program is ranked No. 9 by the Associated Press — its highest since that preseason slot since 1988.

"If we end up not ranked, no one's really going to care that we

started off in the top 10," said Vandervelde, a senior offensive guard.

But the Hawkeyes' preseason hype isn't without reason. The team's experience is seemingly unprecedented. So, too, is its playmakers on both sides of the ball.

Highlighted by preseason All-American Clayborn, the defensive line returns all four of its starters, leading many experts to call it the best unit in the country.

And Marvin McNutt and Johnson-Koulianos both return at wide receiver, perhaps giving Ferentz and offensive coordinator Ken O'Keefe its most explosive tandem on the outside in their 12 seasons in Iowa City.

As Johnson-Koulianos said at Iowa media day, "I think it's going to be fireworks all year."

But Stanzi cautioned against crowning Iowa too soon, saying, "Just because we have experience doesn't mean that we're going to capitalize on it."

The quarterback, who's going into his third year as a starter, knows the line between success and failure is razor thin. He, like Ferentz, learned that from the down years.

It's the team's attitude, Stanzi

said, that ultimately will be the deciding factor.

"I think that's the root of all evil almost when it comes to sports," he said.

**1999 still a driving force**

Slattery doesn't quite remember when it happened. Maybe it was the fourth week of camp; maybe the fourth week of the 1999 season.

But Norm Parker — having served as Ferentz's defensive coordinator for only a short time — told a meeting room full of players, "This is the best coach I have ever worked for."

Funny thing is, Ferentz's supposed failures have perhaps made him an even better coach.

At a recent press conference, the 12-year head coach was asked if there were any similarities between Iowa's 1985 Rose Bowl team and the 2010 squad.

He didn't even want to acknowledge any comparison.

Ferentz knows there's so much that can go wrong in a season, so much that can derail a seemingly unflappable team.

Indeed, the down years still drive him — now more so than ever.

*Which true freshman will make the biggest impact for the Hawkeyes this season?*

**C.J. Fiedorowicz**

C.J. Fiedorowicz is a freak of nature. Whether he likes that phrase associated with him, it's true.

The Johnsbury, Ill., native lit up the Illinois high-school record books, catching 44 passes for 921 yards and 15 touchdowns as a senior.

In addition to playing wide receiver and tight end throughout his prep career, Fiedorowicz lined up at quarterback, running back, linebacker, safety, kick returner, and even long snapper.

So it's not a stretch to think he can absolutely be in the mix this season as a true freshman.

His athletic ability and versatility on both sides of the ball tells football observers he's agile, capable, and a team player.

With Tony Moeaki now playing in the NFL and Allen Reisner taking the reins as starter, Fiedorowicz can certainly contribute at tight end.

Iowa frequently uses two-tight end sets in its offense, adding more blocking for the running game, which is a crucial part of the Hawkeye attack. Brad Herman is second on the depth chart for Saturday's game against Eastern Illinois.

While Herman is not undersized, Fiedorowicz is noticeably bigger. His 6-7, 250-pound frame dwarfs most linebackers and almost everybody in an opposing secondary.

With that said, there is no reason Fiedorowicz can't get some reps early in the season. Let him play and see what he can do, and then the coaches can make a decision if they want to put him on the depth chart for Big Ten games. With his size, the *USA Today* high-school All-American can quickly become a favorite target of Ricky Stanzi's, especially over the middle.

Reisner is poised to have a breakout year, but Fiedorowicz, although young and inexperienced, can be an impact player, too.

Hawkeye fans will get to know Fiedorowicz as he continues his collegiate career, but they'll be just as familiar with him by Saturday. He should be in the regular rota-

tion by Week 3 against Arizona – at the latest. Mark it down.

James Morris is a winner, pure and simple. During his tenure at Solon High School, he did it all. He played linebacker, running back, and quarterback. He even dominated on the mat as a wrestler and ran track.

Morris led Solon to 41-consecutive wins and was named Gatorade Player of the Year in Iowa in his final two prep seasons. With more than 2,000 yards rushing as a senior, he solidified himself in the top 10 for career rushing yards for an Iowa high-school back.

Though he was only a three-star recruit according to Rivals.com, Morris was listed as the second-best prospect in Iowa.

If you look back on Kirk Ferentz's recruiting classes from years past, it becomes obvious that recruiting rankings don't necessarily translate into future success.

Jake Christensen was a four-star recruit from Illinois, and he ended up begging Eastern Illinois for a second chance after countless failures at Iowa.

Though not listed as a starter on the depth chart, Morris will help the Hawkeyes in a number of ways. He should sub in at linebacker, where Iowa is inexperienced (minus Jeremiha Hunter). He'll also be deployed on special teams.

Additionally, Ferentz made it clear during his Tuesday press conference that Morris was one of a few true freshman who will see the field. By the time Iowa travels to Ann Arbor, Mich., on Oct. 16, Morris will be a key contributor for the defense.

Outside linebacker Tyler Nielsen is inexperienced, and it's not clear if he can fill in as a solid replacement for A.J. Edds, who was drafted by the Miami Dolphins in the fourth round of the NFL draft.

While Morris probably won't get any starts this season – assuming the linebacker corps stays healthy – he will be rotated in on a regular basis and should rack up his share of tackles.

# Reisner finally gets his turn

Allen Reisner played behind two NFL tight ends in his Iowa career. Now he gets his chance to put his mark on Hawkeye tight end history.

Dallas Clark, Brandon Myers, and Tony Moeaki. Three former Iowa tight ends now play in the National Football League.


Allen Reisner wants to be next. Reisner's ride from late-committing prospect to starting Hawkeye tight end began with an unexpected speed bump. The Marion native was fitted for a redshirt his freshman year and informed by head coach Kirk Ferentz he would be an emergency backup. Reisner expected nothing more than scout-team duty and a year to absorb the playbook.

Four games into the 2007 season,

Moeaki suffered an injury. Reisner's redshirt was lifted, and he stepped onto the Kinnick Stadium turf against Indiana on Sept. 29, 2007 — his 19th birthday.

"I think it helped [my development]," he said. "I definitely had to learn the offense early and that helped my growth. Although mentally, it was pretty scary being thrown in there with a bunch of grown men when I'm just a young boy."

Reisner's mental rehabilitation began that day when he recorded one catch for 25 yards playing behind Myers. During his sophomore year, he again backed up Myers, recording 11 catches for 200 yards and a touchdown.



## 2001

### September 1

Iowa set the tone for a strong season by dominating Kent State, 51-0. Hawkeye kicker Nate Kaeding's 15 kicking points broke former Iowa placekicker Rob Houghtlin's record for kicking points in a game. Also, running back Aaron Greiving tied an NCAA record by scoring touchdowns on three consecutive carries.

## 1987

### September 3

A future Hawkeye is born - Iowa quarterback Ricky Stanzi. The Hawkeye signal-caller is 18-4 in his career as a starter. Stanzi ranks sixth all-time in Iowa history in career passing yards (4,373) and passing touchdowns (31).

## 1999

### September 4

No. 5 Nebraska traveled to Kinnick Stadium to face the Hawkeyes in Kirk Ferentz's first game ever as Iowa head coach. The Huskers, who went on to win the Fiesta Bowl, blew the Hawkeyes away, 42-7. Iowa finished the season with only one victory, the worst season ever under Ferentz.

## 2002

### August 31

The Hawkeyes scored a school-record 37 points in the first quarter, going on to beat Akron, 57-21. Senior quarterback Brad Banks completed 5-of-8 passes for 125 yards and two touchdowns in his first career start for Iowa.

## 2003

### August 30

For the third-straight season, Iowa faced Miami (Ohio). Hawkeye running back Fred Russell ran for 161 yards, Iowa quarterback Nathan Chandler tossed two touchdowns, and Redhawk signal-caller Ben Roethlisberger threw four interceptions as Iowa defeated Miami, 21-3.

Last year, Reisner found himself second on the depth chart behind Moeaki but still posted 14 catches for 143 yards and a touchdown.

But the senior is no one's back-up this year.

And Ferentz — though still not happy he had to throw the young Reisner into a pit of grown men three years ago — noted the 6-3, 248-pound tight end fits right in with Myers and Moeaki.

"We just ran out of players. That's unfortunate," the 12-year head coach said of playing Reisner in 2007. "He made the most of it. He really competed well, and he's caught up physically."

"He very quietly has played very well."

Reisner won't be satisfied with an under-the-radar season, though. His tutelage under Myers and Moeaki — whom he referred to as brothers — allowed him to harvest "everything he knows about college football."

But Reisner isn't Moeaki or Myers, and Hawkeye quarterback

Ricky Stanzi said Reisner isn't trying to become one of his productive predecessors.

"Allen is a guy who has experi-

ence," Stanzi said. "He has played in this offense, and he has played in Kinnick, and he has played on the road for a good three years

now. The guy knows what he's doing, and now he's at that point where he's just got to go out and improve.

"A guy like Allen plays a huge role with our offense."

Seven Iowa tight ends have been drafted into the NFL in the past decade. Clark has gone on to have an All-Pro career. Myers has developed into a special-teams terror for the Oakland Raiders. Moeaki will take his first-team All-Big Ten selection with him as he tries to prove himself on the Kansas City Chiefs.

Reisner will spend his senior year searching for the end zone in such places as TCF Bank Stadium, Michigan Stadium, and Kinnick. He will aim to spread the field, squat down in coverage, or clear the way for a Hawkeye running back — all while trying to find his place in the rich tradition of Iowa tight ends.

"That's the ultimate goal for me, but I just have to compete at the highest level I can and see where that takes me," Reisner said. "I have to try to do everything that I can to help the team."
