UI unveils new strategic plan

The plan focuses on building new facilities and boosting fundraising efforts.

In the next six years, University of Iowa officials want to construct new facilities, limit their dependence on state resources, and focus on student success. These efforts are highlighted in a draft of their latest six-year strategic plan, which was released

Thursday as an item on the state Board of Regents' agenda.

The 11-page plan, titled "Renewing the Iowa Promise: Great Opportunities — Bold Expectations" lays out the university's main priorities, initiatives, and areas of focus for the next six years.

According to the plan, the UI will invest, "on an unprecedented scale,"

\$890 million in major new facilities over the next several years. These facilities will include a new art building, a residence hall, and a structure for "biomedical discovery." Outgoing Provost Wallace Loh said the money will come primarily from the Federal Emergency Management Agency,

UI alters tailgate policy

Tailgaters now have three hours after 11 a.m. kickoff games.

The University of Iowa will change the recently enforced tailgating policy in response to community comments and internal review.

Hawkeye Athletics Director Gary Barta said the university "made some mistakes last Saturday" in a press statement released by the university on Wednesday.

"We received feedback, and we're making adjustments," said UI spokesman Tom Moore. He said President Sally Mason personally received at least 50 e-mails in response to the weekend of Sept. 4, a portion of them laudatory.

More dry events on the way

With the bars out of bounds for the younger crowd, the UI increases its late-night and weekend offerings to fill the void.

Roughly 50 people sat on benches and couches on Thursday in Public Space One, waiting for comedian Mike E. Winfield to take the stage during Campus Activities Board's first downtown event.

That was more than officials were expecting. And while some students said they would prefer to be downtown, they came "to cut the boredom," said UI freshman Nathan Smith.

Because the 21-ordinance has effectively eliminated the bars as a weekend destination for the underage crowd, the

University of Iowa Office of Student Life is increasing efforts to provide alternatives to alcohol by launching a new programming and funding new activities.

The university has spent nearly \$100,000 on events that have already taken place this semester, as well as events in

the near future such as the Hellogoodbye concert tonight, and a road trip to Six Flags on Sept. 18, said William Nelson, the director of the Student Life Office.

And for students who do not wish to leave the city, they have

UI retention director begins job

The new director will work with various departments and meet with students.

After a year of intense focus on the University of Iowa's flagging retention numbers, officials have created a new director of retention position to address ongoing concerns.

On Thursday morning, Michelle Cohenour, the UI's first director of retention, sat in her new office in Calvin Hall at

a neatly arranged desk, poised to take charge of the university's retention efforts.

"[My] passion is to assist students in need," Cohenour said.

The position was born out of the Early Intervention Commit-

tee's efforts to tackle the retention goal set by outgoing Provost Wallace Loh last spring.

Cohenour will oversee the retention initiatives set out in the UI's new Strategic Plan, released today, and will assist students on a one-on-one basis.

"We need a designated person to be responsible for coordinating and supporting the work of all these people and units ... that contribute to suc-

cessful retention," Loh wrote in an e-mail.

Those efforts include increasing the number of living-learning communities, adding first-year seminars, and informing students of the resources they can access.

Cohenour will also assist many other departments — such as Academic Advising, Student Affairs, and Financial

Suspended frat is back

The Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity chapter will return after a five-year suspension.

A formerly suspended University of Iowa fraternity will be allowed to begin recruitment again on Sept. 13, following a meeting with UI greek representatives.

Melissa Shaub, the UI assistant director of Fraternity and Sorority Life Programs, said the university has been working with the Pi Kappa Alpha for months. Every year, her office tries to bring a new or former fraternity to campus, she said.

"The UI has a rich greek life, and we're pleased to have the opportunity to be a part of that once again," said Pi Kappa Alpha's expansion consultant Lance Horner.

Phillip Jones, then the UI vice president for Student Services, suspended university recognition of the 32-member chapter for five years in 2004 after a reported hazing incident.

Eight pledges were allegedly given alcohol in the fraternity house — located at 1032 N. Dubuque St. — and then forced to perform calisthenics. One

chapters to support their return," Rigby said.

Fraternity houses went dry in 1995 following the death of UI sophomore Matthew Garafolo from alcohol poisoning.

Rigby said he's only seen a few hazing incidents in his presidency, but all were worthy of harsh penalties.

Last year, Drake University freshman Nathan Erickson was hospitalized with a blood-alcohol content level of 0.50 after Phi Delta Theta members allegedly forced him to drink excessive amounts of Everclear.

This year, UI greek-life interest is high, with more

than 400 men registered for fall recruitment.

Pi Kappa Alpha had the opportunity to take part in formal recruitment this week, Shaub said, but the organization declined.

Shaub said she expects Pi Kappa Alpha to begin its recruitment process next week. The fraternity owns a local property — currently rented to Sigma Pi — but she said she doesn't think the fraternity will move in any time this year.

Though the chapter is empty, Rigby said, next week's meeting could start the rebuilding process.

"All I can say is good luck to them," he said.

Woman wants pets, dead cats returned

An Iowa City woman requested to have the frozen corpses of her deceased cats and her living pets returned to her after Animal Control took possession of them last week.

The frozen cat cadavers — along with the bodies of three unfrozen felines — were removed from the home of Susan Vess, 2816 Wayne Ave., on Sept. 2. Two live American Eskimo dogs and three Siamese cats were also seized, according to court documents.

According to the report, the living animals suffered from heavy flea infestation, and two of the Siamese cats had open wounds.

The report said the front porch of the home was strewn with feces, food, and garbage. The basement

was submerged in 3 inches of raw sewage. According to the court document, conditions inside the residence are uninhabitable for both humans and animals.

Mills' lawsuit moved to federal court

The wrongful termination and defamation trial of Marcus Mills, a former University of Iowa general counsel, has been moved to the federal court.

Mills said the move was prompted by the defendants and their attorneys.

The reason behind the move is still unclear.

University of Iowa President Sally Mason terminated Mills on Sept. 23, 2008, after an investiga-

tion by the Stolar Partnership specifically named him and former Vice President of Student Services Phillip Jones as being responsible for allegedly mishandling a 2007 reported sexual assault.

Jones filed a lawsuit against the UI, Mason, and the regents for due-process violation and defamation in 2009. His trial is set for January.

Mills' lawsuit names the UI, the state Board of Regents, Mason, Regent Bonnie Campbell, Stolar, and former Stolar partner James Bryant.

UI reaches several settlements

A former University of Iowa student who sued the university following an alleged sexual assault involving a professor set-

tled with officials for \$130,000 in January, according to documents from the state Board of Regents.

Melissa Rose Walding Milligan sued the UI and oboe Professor Mark Weiger in 2008 after she claimed Weiger touched her inappropriately. Weiger committed suicide after the suit was filed.

According to the documents, the state of Iowa, the UI, and Iowa State University also settled their case with Madison County Winery for \$8,000. The company sued the universities after they attempted to prohibit the Winery from selling bottles of wine imprinted with the schools' colors.

The report also shows that UI Hospitals and Clinics has settled 12 different lawsuits since July 2009 for a total of \$6.25 million.

PAULA numbers down for businesses

Iowa City police released its August PAULA report on Thursday.

Out of the 194 visits police made to businesses last month, only 12 PAULAs were given out to patrons at seven businesses.

Citations decreased compared with last year. In August 2009,

police made 94 visits to businesses and handed out 59 PAULAs.

However, PAULAs cited in non-business related locations have increased. This August, 38 PAULAs were reported, compared with 21 in 2009.

In August 2009, police had reported 603 year-to-date PAULAs. So far this year, 409 PAULAs have been reported.

Looking for a ride

UISG is trying to find a solution to students walking home alone at night.

University of Iowa Student Government officials said they are working to expand late-night transportation availability to neighborhoods, which are seeing more traffic since the 21-ordinance went into effect.

The migration of underage students from the Pedestrian Mall into surrounding neighborhoods has raised concerns about people walking alone at night because such services as Cambus and Nite Ride are out of reach.

So UISG is working to come up with a solution soon.

UISG President John Rigby said he and Brian McClatchey, the Cambus manager, have been discussing bringing back the East Side Loop bus.

After noticing a lot of people on the East Side, Rigby said he believes there is a very good chance the route could be running within a few weeks, if not by next weekend.

The route, which was created in the fall of 2009, wasn't restarted this fall because of a lack of riders and a cost of around \$13,000 a year, Rigby said.

As of right now, officials plan to run the bus between 11:30 p.m. and 2:30 a.m., and the route could stretch to Governor Street, as well as pass popular locations, such as the new Recreation Center.

"It could be a big benefit to students if they know about it and use it," Rigby said.

He's ready to expand the route, he said, but needs to work out the "logistical stuff," such as drivers and a schedule.

If this does not work, he said, he hopes to contact UI police to discuss the possibility of expanding Nite Ride.

However, UI Crime Prevention Officer Brad Allison said that as of now, the Nite Ride system is working just fine.

"Expanding would mean a slower turnover," he said.

Allison said that if the van, which picks women up at the Main Library and a downtown location, went all over the place, it would take a lot longer for people to get picked up and would raise issues of staffing.

In the absence of either of these options, many underage students said they've resorted to walking home on weekend nights.

UI freshman Christina Dorizas said she walked home to Rienow from a house party on Johnson Street with three friends.

"We figured that we might as well just walk because we were already half way there when we could have taken Nite Ride, but it can be scary to walk across the bridge [on Burlington Street] at night," she said.

UI sophomore Sarah Jankovich said because she is 19 and can't go to the bars, Nite Ride is out of reach, so a lot of her friends take taxis, stay at a friend's house, or just walk home.

"I live all the way by Mercy Hospital so it would be awesome if there was something like Nite Ride to pick you up where you wanted," Jankovich said.

Until the situation is fixed, Rigby said, students should use their street smarts.

"The most important thing is to have a walking partner, someone you trust," he said.

Layne Sheetz said everything was running behind before their performance, and the musicians hardly had time to take it all in but never felt out of place.

concertgoers to take a one-mile walk with them.

The next day, Sheetz and the band hosted their first "Take The Walk" charity event for the fight against poverty and HIV/AIDS in Africa.

The band was able to round up 200 participants and raised \$200 in donations for Africa.

But Sheetz said happygolovely's opportunity to raise money for charity is

only a small portion of what drives the members to perform.

UI-sponsored student blogs have questionable benefits

University of Iowa officials are hoping their Experience Iowa Blogs will stand out from the saturated environment that is the blogosphere.

Staffed by a team of 10 students ranging in rank from freshman to senior — and three admissions counselors — the blogs offer links of interest to potential students and provide readers with a (sanitized) glimpse of life at the UI.

Though the bloggers are not paid monetarily, the students receive cameras for their assignments, and their submissions are “reviewed” before being posted. So while the student perspective is beneficial in promoting the university, we’re skeptical these blogs will offer potential students a genuine look at student life.

“The posts are not edited for content. ... We want to keep the blogs as authentic as possible,” Scott Fiddelke, the Admissions Office application supervisor, wrote in an e-mail. “There are no ‘off-limits’ topics outside of being respectful, civil, and constructive in criticism.”

No doubt they won’t offer a full account, however. Are readers supposed to naively assume a given blogger woke up early on game day, for example, yet didn’t partake in any tailgating activities? And will they really tell us about their drunken escapades at a house party over the weekend?

More likely, the student-bloggers will regale us with their sordid tales of doing laundry in the residence halls, staying awake through the early morning hours to finish homework, or biking up a large hill.

There are already hundreds of blogs available online that highlight the area’s culture, describe real-life happenings at the UI, and tout the assets of Iowa City. As an added bonus, we can presume

the authors write purely of their own volition and aren’t motivated by a recruitment goal.

Examples abound: UI junior Ash Bruxvoort, the founder of the blog “English Major’s Junk Food,” has maintained her online award-winning account since October 2009. Nearly all the big players in downtown Iowa City — including the Public Library, Public Space One, the Bike Library, bars and restaurants, arts spaces and galleries, *Little Village* — have up-to-date blogs.

For those looking to get an edge on the Iowa City music scene, founders of the Mission Creek Festival sustain a year-round presence on their “Mission Freak” blog; nearly all local venues’ lineups are available months ahead of time online.

For those students feeling a little homesick, perhaps “A Los Angeles Girl in Iowa City” can provide some commiserative comfort. Sports fanatics can get their fix on any number of Big Ten-theme blogs, and

this season, a number of Hawkeye football discussion boards are up and running.

The Editorial Board hopes student blogs will successfully reach their target audience and compel them to start their own “Iowa Experience.” But for those seeking genuine online analysis of the school and city, perhaps it is best to look beyond university propaganda.

Prospective students are understandably anxious about starting anew in a college town. But reading a few admissions blog posts — student-written or otherwise — won’t offer them the unhindered information they need to make the right decision.

UI shouldn’t embrace temp faculty

I was dismayed by the statement in Wednesday’s *Daily Iowan* attributed to Graduate College Dean John Keller concerning the use of temporary faculty by the University of Iowa. He was quoted as claiming significant benefits to students from using temporary faculty: “From an efficiency standpoint, more teaching effort can be obtained from nontenure-track individuals who do not have to concern themselves with research or service work.”

On the surface he is correct: If faculty only teach, as is done at community colleges, then they will interact with more students. On the other hand, one of the primary distinctions among institutions of higher learning is that university faculty are personally involved in research or creative effort.

Faculty who spend time in studios, libraries, and laboratories teach differently from faculty who are involved only in instruction. That difference is one reason the costs, including faculty salaries, of running a research university are higher than at other schools and why, one would like to think, many

parents prefer to send their children to a research university.

While circumstances may sometimes require temporary faculty, their use should be short-lived, and the faculty positions should be converted to tenure-track as soon as possible. Otherwise the university risks converting itself into a large community college, albeit one with a first-rate football program and a Marching Band to match.

More than any other value, responsibility is the signature American characteristic.

To be honest, I’m not terribly upset about that last bit. In fact, I don’t even really mind not being able to legally consume alcohol. I do, however, take umbrage when my government, the one I support with my tax dollars, tells me

Why Roxanne Conlin should win Senate seat

It’s always frustrating to see people painted as something they’re not. Such was the case with the column “Why Conlin will lose” in Wednesday’s *Daily Iowan*. It is certainly columnist Zach Wahls’s right to disagree with Democratic senatorial candidate Roxanne Conlin’s view on the bank bailouts. However, a senator who sways with the mood of the times is what we have in Sen. Charles Grassley, R-Iowa. His staunch views on many of today’s most pressing issues were at one time completely the opposite. In the 1980s, Grassley

supported amnesty for illegal immigrants in this country. Now that this is an unpopular position with the Republican base, he feels differently.

As recently as 1993, Grassley spoke in favor of universal health care. However, in August 2009, he told Iowans a different story, falsely claiming that Obama’s health-care plan would allow the government to “pull the plug on grandma.” This obnoxious political posturing is exactly the thing Iowans are sick of, and in Conlin, they find an alternative.

Of course there will be

voters who disagree with Conlin’s views — such as her opposition to the bailout — but she maintains and defends the things she believes in. While Grassley is embracing a sound-bite campaign of rapid-fire press releases and high-dollar television ads, Conlin is making a real effort to reach out to the people of Iowa, hear their views, and explain her own.

She articulates her beliefs in a manner that is straightforward and unabashedly honest, and she acknowledges disagreements with voters where they exist. Conlin’s integrity, compas-

sion, and independent mind are exactly the reasons she should, and will, win in November.

The best part about Conlin’s grass-roots candidacy is that voters across the state get the chance to engage with her one-on-one, ask their questions, and voice their concerns. In fact, she will visit our campus at 1:30 p.m. Sept. 14.

I’d encourage Mr. Wahls to come chat with her. She’s always up for lively conversation with those who disagree.

It starts out with saxophonist Pierce belting out a smooth, jazzy solo with a reverb that seems to come from a large concert hall. According to the press release, security will increase the number of people inspecting bags in order to speed up entrance to the stadium. Moore said the university will distribute security differently and not hire additional personnel.

UI officials also expanded the rule allowing tailgating on university property two hours after the

clearing of Kinnick Stadium to three hours for games with 11 a.m. kickoff, according to the press release.

This change will not apply to the 2:30 p.m. game against Iowa State this weekend.

UI officials announced new tailgating rules before the start of the football season. Police said they would be more vigilant in enforcing open-container laws and limiting tailgating hours.

Police doled out 146 citations during the first football game against

Eastern Illinois.

Officers ticketed Rachel Furman, 23, at 8 a.m. Sept. 4 for open alcohol container. She said eight to nine police officers saw her crossing busy streets before ticketing her when she crossed a sidewalk.

"They saw me in worse situations, and I got stopped in what I thought was a designated tailgating area," said Furman, who is from Marion.

She said she knew little about the new tailgating policy and thought the open-container law only applied to Melrose

Avenue. Furman plans to challenge the \$127.50 ticket at her court date, Sept. 16.

Furman said she thought the expanded time for postgame tailgating was a good idea for morning games.

"I wouldn't expect them to do it for the night games at all," she said.

At last weekend's game, she said police told her and her friends in the main stadium lot that they had 10 minutes to stop drinking and one hour to leave.

Junior journalism and

psychology major Audrey Kittrell, 21, noted the increase in police presence.

"I saw a lot more police officers on golf carts and on foot," she said. "They were everywhere."

Furman said she has friends who said they received warnings instead of citations, as police said they would do for the first games.

"The philosophy all along has been to educate our fans about the guidelines," Moore said. "We will continue the process."

UI tailgating policy adjustments

The changes announced Thursday include:

- Increasing security personnel to conduct bag inspections to speed up entrance to Kinnick Stadium
- Allowing three instead of two hours to leave university property after the game for 11 a.m. kickoff games only
- The three-hour rule will not apply to this weekend's game against Iowa State

with university fundraising accounting for roughly 10 percent.

School officials will focus on four core academic areas: student success, knowledge and practice, the arts, and an improved future for Iowans.

The plan, which will go to the regents for their approval at their Sept. 16 meeting in Cedar Falls, also includes recommendations from six task-force reports released last

spring after they were asked to find ways to combat statewide budget cuts. The information in the plan is a culmination of eight months of work from nearly 80 faculty and staff.

"We did the best we could with as much input as possible," Loh said.

Loh, who will take over as the president of the University of Maryland in November, said he was unable to comment on specific parts of

the plan before the regents approve it.

"Some of the initiatives are already underway," said Beth Ingram, the associate provost for undergraduate education, who served on the Task Force on Undergraduate Education and Success. "The reason [the initiatives] made it into the strategic plan is the recognition from many people on campus. They work and are good for students."

The final section of the

report discusses the university's plans for the campus' nonacademic areas, such as financial development. It states private gifts will "play a critical role in the university achieving new levels of distinction and excellence." Furthermore, it stresses the importance of the UI Foundation in garnering funds from alumni and others.

Despite the plan's budget concerns, Regent Robert Downer had a mild disagreement with the UI's "pessimistic" view of the federal economic situation.

"I was pleased with product," Downer said. "My belief is that it will get a very positive reaction from [the Board of Regents]."

The last time the UI constructed a strategic plan was in 2005, when officials created "The Iowa Promise 2005-2010." The plan set 44 goals in five different areas — undergraduate education, graduate education, diversity, vitality, and engagement. However, last year, when officials realized they wouldn't meet their goals in time, Loh announced that the new plan would allow the goals to be met.

options, too.

SCOPE, a student organization that puts on concerts throughout the year, is pushing for more weekend shows, but it's difficult because acts prefer to be in bigger cities Friday and Saturday nights.

Tom Rocklin, the UI interim vice president for Student Services, attended a recent SCOPE production and noticed the large turnout.

"I was at the Big Boi concert," he said. "It was packed."

The Bijou has also added two additional free late-night shows on Friday and Saturday, Nelson said.

But all of these activities come at a high cost.

The Bijou's and SCOPE's standard funding, drawn from student

activity fees, is \$53,000 and \$160,000, respectively, for this year, an increase over last year's numbers. The two organizations will receive more funding later.

The Student Life Office is considering expanding events downtown.

"We are also trying to work with venues that have liquor licenses but are willing to suspend the use of the license for a night," Nelson said.

UI officials are keeping the Campus Recreation & Wellness Center open late on some nights.

The Campus Activities Board is showing movies

in the leisure pool on various weekends, said Kerry DuBay, a program associate for Recreational Services, extending pool hours past the usual 10 p.m. closing time.

DuBay said officials would love to hear students' suggestions about keeping the pool open later more often.

But some students said they didn't know about that option.

"I definitely wasn't aware," said Sarah Krause, a UI sophomore who tried to enter the lazy river after 10 p.m. "If the rec center is open to people talking about leaving it open longer at night, I think it is very important, because it gives people a good alternative to the drinking and party scene."

Others had mixed feelings about the UI's offering of late-night activities.

"If you're a big drinker, then probably not," said UI freshman Alli Vanderpool. "But if you are looking for a substitute, then campus activities are a good idea."

Noah Silvey, a member of the Iowa City Ducks Rugby Club, which hosts the tailgate, said members of the team walked around the West Benton Street neighborhood and talked to residents in order to find a spot for the bus.

He said the homeowner allowing the Magic Bus to set up on his property, who couldn't be reached for comment, is excited about hosting the event.

Many UI students are fond of the bus.

"I liked how it always had live bands, and it was close to the stadium," said UI senior Zach Doyle. "It was one of the main spots [to tailgate]."

Doug Boothroy, the director of Housing and Inspection Services, said he is not sure if the location is permanent. The life of the location could be extended, depending on how this weekend goes, Boothroy said.

But no one knows if the new location will be as

popular as the old location on Melrose Avenue due to the distance.

"I'm doubtful I'll go to the new location," Doyle said. "It's not as close to the stadium, and I'm not sure I could find enough people who would want to go with me."

But some students said they are interested.

UI senior Kristin Schiller said she normally tailgates in parking lots with friends. While she has never tailgated at the Magic Bus, she said, she might start now because she is 21.

The Magic Bus lost its former Melrose Avenue location after the Barkalow Associates Realtors bought the land in August 2009, which required the Iowa

City Ducks Rugby Club to apply for a temporary-use permit on Woodside Drive. The neighborhood opposed the move, and the Magic Bus was left homeless.

Kraft Foods will sponsor the Magic Bus this weekend, and it also paid for the grill that the Magic Bus staffers will use. They will give out free samples of Kraft Macaroni and Cheese.

A limited amount of parking will be available for tailgaters near the Magic Bus, and the entrance fee will go toward local charities. In past years, the rugby club has donated to the Variety Club, Make A Wish Foundation, and numerous people suffering with illnesses.

Silvey said that the local charities are excited the Magic Bus is back to start donating again.

While the new location did not come in time for the season-opener, the founders of the Magic Bus said they're hoping to see a large crowd this weekend.

"We're taking a gamble because we're farther away from the stadium that we used to be, so hopefully, people will show up," Silvey said.

Aid — with specific retention efforts.

When sitting down with students, she said, her main concerns will be helping with any issues, including financial, social, and academic. In the past, students received a letter if they received numerous failing grades. But now, Cohenour will sit down with them personally to address any needs.

Even before Cohenour's began, the university's retention numbers had improved, increasing to more than 86 percent this year, up from a 10-year average of 83 percent.

The former Residence Life program associate learned of the position in early June, and a search committee chose her from three final candidates. Beth Ingram, the UI associate provost for undergraduate education,

named her as the director in August. Cohenour will receive a salary of \$59,000.

Her enthusiasm, time spent with students, and experience with living-learning communities made her right for the job, Ingram said.

Next on Cohenour's to-do list is reaching out to other schools' directors of retention to learn their best practices.

One of those schools is

the University of Kentucky, which created a similar position two years ago. Though no retention numbers are available since the first director of retention was hired, officials in Kentucky say retention has improved since 2008.

"[You] have to watch incoming freshmen early in the semester," said Chela Kaplan, the Kentucky director of retention.

It is a good idea to watch for early warning signs of potential struggles and to catch them before they develop into major problems, she said.

Similar to the UI, the University of Kentucky implemented a number of programs, including an early alert system in which any university employee can fill out a form citing a problem and possible solutions.

Cohenour has experience with that type of personalized student help.

"Student success will always be at the forefront of the work we do," she said.







Field hockey off to Kent

After earning its first win of the season, the Iowa field-hockey team heads to Ohio to take on No. 19 Stanford and Kent State.

The Iowa field-hockey team had an entire week to prepare for last weekend's games against Miami (Ohio) and Brown.

The seven days off proved to be beneficial in the second of those games, as the Hawkeyes (1-3) cruised to a 5-0 win over Brown on Monday and earned their first win of the season.

One day off and a practice later, head coach Tracey Griesbaum's squad is set to hit the road for Kent, Ohio, to take on Stanford (2-1) on Saturday and Kent State (2-2) on Sept. 12.

After a solid offensive performance in Monday's contest in which Iowa racked up 27 shots on goal, Griesbaum said her team will try to maintain its possession time in the offensive third of the field this weekend.

"When we can actually sustain an offense and keep it in our offensive half for longer than a few seconds, it allows someone such as Jess Barnett, who is so athletic, to go on attack," Griesbaum said. "When she's defending the whole game, she's really hesitant to go on attack because she's always thinking, 'Oh, I'm going to have to run back.' So it's kind of a snowball effect."

Iowa hosted Stanford last year and fell in overtime, 3-2. The Hawkeyes' game against Kent State will be the two teams' first meeting since 2006, when they topped the Golden Flashes, 5-1.

The Stanford and Kent State coaching staffs feature two recognizable faces.

Stanford's coaching staff showcases ex-Hawkeye standout Caitlin McCurdy (volunteer assistant coach), a 2008 graduate, and Kent State's features 2006 graduate Heath Schnepf (assistant coach).

Iowa is looking to overcome its penalty-corner woes and improve upon its 19 missed attempts in last weekend's games.

Sophomore forward Sarah Drake said she had a good guess of what the week's limited practice time would be dedicated to.

"Penalty corners, I think, is on the top of our list," Drake said. "Our coaches were telling us it's not just one thing that goes wrong. Everyone has to play her role correctly and execute together, so I think it's just a matter of practice makes perfect."

Junior Becca Spengler echoed her teammate, saying the team needs to fine-tune its mechanics and increase its number of conversions.

"We just need to get our push, trap, and hit more consistent," she said. "And just [get] everyone having good readiness and executing her skill on the corners."

Griesbaum's squad leads the all-time series against Stanford 12-3 and is undefeated (3-0) against Kent State.

The Hawkeyes are set to take Murphy-Mellis Field at noon Saturday and at 11 a.m. Sunday before they return to host Ball State on Grant Field on Sept. 18.

"I don't think either team is going to get swept in three [sets]," said head coach Sharon Dingman, noting that the first set in front of a large crowd will be crucial. "Both teams are going to be a little anxious, but the team that can settle down and let its skills take over can win the first set."

The teams are similar with two dominant kill tandems. Iowa middle blockers Husz and Becky Walters have combined for 153 kills this season, and Cyclone outside hitters

Victoria Henson and Carly Jensen have totaled 182 kills.

Combine the offense with stellar individual defenders on both sides — such as Bethany Yeager for the Hawkeyes with 137 digs this year, and Ashley Mass for the Cyclones with 97 — and tonight's match has plenty to keep an eye on.

The players believe it could be intangible factors that will decide the outcome.

"It's going to take a lot of energy," Hawkeye cocaptain Megan Eskew said. "We just have to focus on our side first."

If either team has an energy advantage from the outset, it's likely going to be the Hawkeyes. Although the team played 10 sets in a day on Sept. 4, the team had two days off after and no game this week. The Cyclones defeated the Panthers on Wednesday night.

Also, the Hawkeyes expect a large crowd — last season's match was Iowa's second-most highly attended match of the year with more than 2,000 people filing into Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Factor in the two schools' football showdown looming on Saturday afternoon, and in all likelihood, there will be a

large crowd to motivate Iowa.

"When we make a kill, and not only our team's cheering but all the fans are cheering, that only doubles our excitement," Husz said.

Her coach agreed, saying the Hawkeyes have benefited from large crowds this season, such as when they fell behind early against Southern Illinois, then took a five-set victory.

"When we were down 2-0 to Southern, I think part of the reason we won was our fans," Dingman said.

"It's a great start to the weekend."

with every member returning from last year. The five golfers who will travel to Wayzata for the Black and Gold this weekend will be senior Brad Hopfinger, Kelpin, India, and juniors Chris Brant and Brad George.

berth for the second year in a row. Despite last season's accomplishments and their pre-season ranking, the Hawkeyes aren't intimidated by the added pressure.

"This summer, we had a lot of guys play really well, so that's an easy way to improve," George said. "And I know everyone on the team is better this year than he was last year."

India said, "I think we

have the potential to have a top-30 ranking. We definitely want to win a tournament in the fall and put our names on the board."

After this weekend's tournament, the Hawkeyes will host *Golfweek's* Conference Challenge Sept. 19-21 at Spirit Hollow Golf Club in Burlington.

Soccer heads to Charleston

The Iowa soccer team will travel to South Carolina to take on a pair of Eastern schools in the College of Charleston Tournament this weekend.

Tournaments are familiar territory for the Iowa soccer team. After all, the Hawkeyes just hosted their own competition just two weeks ago.

This time, however, Iowa won't have home-field advantage.

The Hawkeyes (4-1) will travel to South Carolina to participate in the College of Charleston Tournament this weekend. The team will open play against the host school tonight and will face Davidson (2-3) on Sept. 12.

Iowa is riding a school-record streak of four-consecutive shutout wins, but the streak is in serious jeopardy tonight. Charleston (2-3) boasts an effective attack despite its losing record.

Cougar midfielder Maryam Buazza leads Charleston with three goals and a pair of assists. Forward Sloane Levin and midfielder Morgan Benz are close behind with two goals apiece.

All told, the team has found the net 10 times this

season and has scored more than one goal in four of its five games.

The bulk of Charleston's offensive production has come in the second half of games. The Cougars have scored six goals in the second period, and they are just a week removed from a 2-1 overtime win over Xavier.

Iowa head coach Ron Rainey said he has seen things his team can prepare for during his scouting, including defending against the long, attacking throw-ins that Charleston favors.

"We're working on some things like not letting people behind us in possession — that's always going to be key," he said.

He also addressed the Cougars' propensity to score late in games. The fifth-year coach said the statistics show consistent, 90-minute pressure, and the Hawkeyes must be prepared to be active the entire game.

Iowa defender Jenna Aleo agreed, saying playing as a strong unit will be vital.

"We need to play well as

a team, especially the defense," she said. "We need to communicate to keep goals out, and that starts with [goalkeeper] Emily [Moran], goes through the midfield, and includes the forwards."

The Hawkeyes are taking the same approach for the game against Davidson.

Unlike Charleston, the Wildcats have struggled to get anything going offensively this year. The reigning Southern Conference champions have scored only four goals in five games. Senior midfielder Allison Drutchas has been involved in three of them, scoring one and assisting two others.

Slow starts are not unusual for Davidson, though. It entered conference play in 2009 with a mediocre 5-7-0 record and



Hawks ready for ISU bowl game

Iowa defensive end Adrian Clayborn expects Saturday's game to be anything but a blowout.

Embarrassment.

That's what Adrian Clayborn said he and the rest of the starting defensive line felt when they watched footage of last season's Iowa-Iowa State game Tuesday night.

The Hawkeyes won that game, 35-3. But surrendering 190 yards to the Cyclones' rushing attack constituted a loss in the eyes of the now nationally lauded Iowa line.

Clayborn said the group's overall effort was lacking during last year's clash in Ames.

"It's one thing just to get beat physically, but it's another thing to cave into your opponent," he said. "I feel like that's what we did last year."

"We feel like we played like crap, and nobody wants to play like that."

The offensive line that Clayborn said

outplayed his unit last season has only gotten better.

Returning for the Cyclones are three players who started all 13 games in 2009 — left tackle Kelechi Osemele, left guard Alex Alvarez, and center Ben Lamaak.

Additionally, right guard Hayworth Hicks played in every game for Iowa State in 2008 before missing last year because of academic ineligibility, and sophomore right tackle Brayden Burrell played in 12 games as a freshman.

Those five starters are a combined 381 inches tall and weigh more than 1,500 pounds — or an average of 6-4, 300 pounds per lineman.

"They executed very well last week [in Iowa State's 27-10 win over Northern Illinois], and they played well against us last year," Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said of the Cyclones' offensive line. "You don't stumble into 190

yards rushing."

Accounting for 100 of those yards against the Hawkeyes last year was Iowa State's Alexander Robinson. The 5-9 senior will try to improve upon those numbers in his final crack against Iowa.

But Robinson, who Ferentz called a "good, tough back," is perfectly capable of doing that — especially behind his seasoned offensive line.

"You'd better tackle him, and if you leave him a seam, he's going to find it," Ferentz said.

The 12th-year head coach is certain of one thing: 190 rushing yards is far too many to allow for a second-straight season. A duplicate effort from his rushing defense would most likely result in a loss unless the Hawkeyes score "about 50 points."

Iowa certainly can't count on forcing six turnovers as it did in last year's

meeting, either. Senior quarterback Ricky Stanzi may have thrown for four touchdowns, but he was also intercepted twice. Without a gaping margin for error produced by six turnovers from the opposing team, the Mentor, Ohio, native's decision-making will need to be much better.

Iowa State's aggressive defense makes that a difficult task, though.

"You have to make your decisions even quicker than you're used to," Stanzi said. "You can't set your feet and get rid of the ball in a calm fashion. You

The Iowa men's golf team will tee off its season on Sept. 12, when the Hawkeyes will compete in the sixth-annual Golden Gopher Invitational at Spring Hill Golf Course in Wayzata, Minn.

Spring Hill has been a premier golf course since it opened in 1999, and it was voted one of the top-five courses in Minnesota in 2006.

The course's aura has mesmerized members of the Iowa team who have competed there. Junior Barrett Kelpin and senior Vince India both named Spring Hill as one of their favorite places to compete.

India's familiarity with the course stems from last year's one-under par finish to tie for fourth place at the 2009 event.

The reigning Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week went for a school-record 383 yards of total offense while leading Michigan to a 30-10 victory over the Huskies in Ann Arbor.

"For a guy in his first start, his decision-making was really

good," Rodriguez said in Tuesday's Big Ten coaches teleconference.

The third-year head coach even went as far as comparing Robinson to Pat White - easily Rodriguez' best quarterback during his tenure at West Virginia.

"He showed a real sense of maturity today, like Pat [White], in that the game slowed down for him - and was faster for everybody else."

That performance may have

slid Robinson ahead of teammates Tate Forcier and Devin Gardner for a more permanent position as the team's starter, but he'll have to ramp his game up considerably this week when the Wolverines travel to Notre Dame Stadium to take on Brian Kelly and the Fighting Irish.

Maintaining a rivalry

With Big Ten expansion looming, officials want the yearly in-state football game to continue.

College football's landscape is shifting. Nebraska will join the Big Ten. The conference is splitting into two divisions. A Big Ten championship game is imminent.

With a championship game comes more money and exposure for Big Ten members, including Iowa.

But what if — just if — in the midst of the Big Ten's golden age, a rivalry is allowed to expire? What if Iowa is forced to cut back on nonconference opponents? And what if that opponent is Iowa State?

The two schools are contracted to play each other until 2017, but the contract has a clause that states if either the Big Ten or Big 12 made a change in the way it schedules conference games, both schools would be able to get out of the agreement without penalty.

While Iowa Athletics Director Gary Barta said he has no intention of utilizing the clause, there are no guarantees the in-state rivalry will continue through 2017. The Big Ten is commit-

to play seven home games every year, and it could pose a potential problem.

Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz said he thinks the two schools will be able to keep the series going but noted that he hasn't put much focus on the matter at present.

"I haven't studied it, but it sounds like it's a possibility, that it's going to be doable [to keep Iowa State on the schedule]," Ferentz said. "Hopefully, that's the way it'll go, and it'll be a non-issue."

But it wouldn't be the first time the two schools had a break from playing each other on the football field.

to play seven home games every year, and it could pose a potential problem.

"Through 2014, I don't anticipate anything changing. Then we just have to see between the Big 12 and Big Ten schedules how those shake out," Barta said on Sept. 1. "[Iowa State Athletics Director Jamie Pollard and I] both have indicated we want to continue; we just have to see how that shakes out in the future."

This potential shift in schedules could jeopardize the Cy-Hawk rivalry — which began in 1894 and has been played annually since 1977 — because a nine-game conference schedule means Iowa will only play three non-conference games.

Compound that with Iowa wanting



Breakdown: Sash has played two games against Iowa State. He has intercepted four passes in those contests, three of which came last season. For the third-consecutive season, Sash and Cyclone quarterback Austen Arnaud will go head-to-head.

Sash, who has 11 career interceptions, hasn't picked off a ball in his last five games. He has, however, made his presence felt in the running game. Against Eastern Illinois, the safety was in on seemingly every play. The Panthers only gained 157 yards in total offense.

The play of Iowa's secondary – and Sash, in particular – will be a key on Saturday. Iowa State has thrown the ball 25-plus times in 10 of its last 14 games. Over that same period, no one has defended the Cyclones' passing attack better than Norm Parker's defense.

offense

Name: Austen Arnaud
Year: Senior
Position: Quarterback

Breakdown: Arnaud remembers Sash and the rest of Iowa's secondary from last year. It's hard to forget throwing a season-high four interceptions in one game. His final stat line – 10-of-22 for 79 yards – was less than desirable. In fact, in his career, Arnaud has tossed six interceptions against the Hawkeyes.

"If you know anything about Iowa's defense, there are not a lot of things that are going to be there," he said on Monday. "You can't force anything; they'll capitalize on turnovers. They're a great defense, and they always have been when I've played them."

Arnaud was explosive – and still mistake-prone – in the Cyclones' season-opener, putting up more than 300 total yards but throwing two interceptions. His ability to take care of the football could decide Saturday's contest.

Broken up and reunited

Bump Elliott remembers when the Iowa-Iowa State series resumed in 1977.

The College Football Hall of Famer was the Iowa athletics director when the series restarted. Several years earlier, Elliott said, longtime Hawkeye football coach and previous AD Forest Evashevski hashed out a plan with Iowa State AD Clay Stapleton to resume the Iowa-Iowa State football game, which hadn't been played in more than four decades.

The Hawkeyes won the first game of the "new" series, 12-10.

But controversy arose soon after that first game.

Elliott said the Iowa athletics board had agreed to only play one game against Iowa State and nothing more beyond that. Eventually, the state Board of Regents hired an arbitrator to handle the situation, and ultimately, Iowa did schedule more games against the Cyclones.

Elliott said he doesn't recall who the arbitrator was, noting that anyone who still remembers has probably passed away. What the former Iowa AD does remember is that the Iowa athletics board was "probably less in favor" of maintaining the Iowa-Iowa State

rivalry than Iowa State was.

But he's pleased with what the game has become — a strong, wholesome

rivalry with no bitter feelings.

Working out an agreement shouldn't be an issue if the two schools truly

September 9

The Iowa defense withstood seven-consecutive Syracuse plays inside the 2-yard line to beat the Orange, 20-13, at home in double overtime. It was the beginning of a down year, though. The Hawkeyes were under .500 for the first time since 2000.

1979

September 8

For someone who went down as the greatest Iowa football coach ever, Hayden Fry's Hawkeye career got off to a rough start. Iowa lost, 30-26, to Indiana, as the Hoosiers went onto their first bowl appearance in 13 seasons.

1981

September 12

Hayden Fry opened up what turned out to be his first Rose Bowl season as Iowa's head coach with a 10-7 upset over No. 7 Nebraska in Kinnick Stadium. The Cornhuskers went 9-3 that season, with their only other losses coming against No. 3 Penn State and No. 1 Clemson.

1983

September 10

The highly ranked Hawkeyes trounced Iowa State, 51-10, in their season-opener. It was the first of 15-consecutive victories against the Cyclones, and it marked the third-largest margin of victory in the series.

1992

September 5

The Hawkeyes hosted No. 1 Miami, losing to the Hurricanes, 24-7. It was the first night game in Kinnick Stadium. The university has hosted seven night games in its history, posting a 4-3 record.

aren't succeeding in the Big Ten, or in the overall schedule, it's worth it to play the game," he said.

The Cy-Hawk series today

With the Hawkeye football program rising into the national scene, it's easy to question the validity of the rivalry — at least on paper.

The contest has swayed heavily in the Hawkeyes favor, and the Iowa program has arguably reached greater heights in the college football world than Iowa State.

The facts speak for themselves.

Iowa has won 20 of the last 27 contests against Iowa State.

The Cyclones were Big 12 North division champions in 2004, but haven't won a conference title since 1912, when the squad was a member of the Missouri Valley Conference.

Iowa has more bowl wins (13) than Iowa State has bowl appearances (10).

But the Iowa State program has been on the upswing since the hiring of second-year head coach Paul Rhoads.

Rhoads led his team to an Insight Bowl victory against Minnesota in 2009, becoming the first Iowa State football coach to have a winning season in his first year at the helm since 1931.

Iowa and Iowa State have had their share of dominating performances in the rivalry, and the two schools remain committed to the game.

"The concept of pride and bragging rights throughout the state means too much to too many people.

"I couldn't see Iowa State not playing Iowa," said Cyclone quarterback and Ames native Austen Arnaud. "It's just one of those games I was born around, and it's kind of embedded in me."

Both coaches have been around the rivalry for several years and have seen the ups and downs.

Ferentz was part of the Iowa coaching staff that started a 15-game winning streak against the Cyclones, while Rhoads was a member of the Cyclone staff that snapped the losing streak en route to starting a five-game winning streak of its own.

Having the opportunity to take part in the Cy-Hawk rivalry means a lot especially to an Iowa native such as Rhoads. The second-year head coach, who's from Ankeny, has been around the series for seven seasons as an assistant coach and now head coach for the Cyclones.

"It's important to me because I grew up with it," Rhoads said Sept. 6 during his weekly teleconference. "I grew up as a high-school player in this state. My dad was a high-school football coach in this state. I was a part of the staff that

ended a long time losing streak versus the University of Iowa in this game. It's a very important game to me."

Iowa safety and Oskaloosa native Tyler Sash agrees with Rhoads.

No matter how dominant the Hawkeyes have been, no matter how stratified the two programs have become, and no matter how many BCS bids Iowa has earned, the rivalry matters to those involved — and

everyone in the state will watch it.

"[This rivalry] means everything to me," Sash said. "Growing up as an Iowa kid, I know how the Iowa-Iowa State game is — it makes or breaks everybody's season. It either makes Iowa's season or it makes Iowa State's season. Growing up, my whole life all I knew was the Iowa-Iowa State game was the most important game of the year for each team."

myself that I'm as good as everyone says I am before anyone tells me that."

Probably more telling than outside hype is the praise Donahue receives from teammates and coaches. Hawkeye coach Kirk Ferentz said Donahue was on top of his game last year, pointing out that the numbers don't do him justice.

Paki O'Meara said, "You can look at his stats and everything, but I think what says it the most is the confidence we have in him."

His confidence isn't misplaced, nor is he alone in his faith in Donahue. The Hawkeye fans who fill Kinnick Stadium each week have created a buzz around a position Donahue admits "nobody really likes."

O'Meara said fans will scream Donahue's name before the Hawks run on to the field to boot the ball to the opposing team.

"I was surprised," Donahue said. "I don't think anyone loves a punter as much as Iowa City loves a punter. I really love it. If people are happy with what I'm doing, that gives me a little incentive to do it better."

Right in the kick of it

Ryan Donahue almost quit football his freshman year of high school. He's now one of the top punters in the nation.

Ryan Donahue's love for football was gone.

A backup role on the freshman squad at St. Rita High in Chicago didn't endear itself to Donahue, and he decided to cut football out of his life. He finished out the season on his father's orders, then didn't participate in any summer workouts.

While Donahue tried to turn his back on the sport, he couldn't escape it. Today, he is considered by some observers to be the top NFL punting prospect in the nation.

But not long ago, he was a frustrated kid who had to be persuaded to give football one more shot.

St. Rita assistant coach J.J. Stranding approached Donahue at the end of that summer without workouts with a simple proposition: Give kicking a try. Stranding — a former punter for Northwestern — said he would turn Donahue from a straight-ahead kicker into a soccer-style kicker.

Donahue admitted he likely wouldn't be much help but agreed to give it a try. A week of training occurred before he scheduled to be in front of coaches and teammates for a tryout. He was nervous, yet he walked away with the varsity starting kicker and punter job.

But passion didn't spark immediately. "I didn't love it at first," Donahue said. "I hated punting and kicking, but I figured it'd be cool. I was a sophomore on varsity. The first few months, especially punting, were just horrendous."

A punter's goal is to kick the ball in a spiral, then have it turn over on landing.

When the ball didn't turn over for Donahue, his frustration mounted.

But when he started seeing results, it became an addiction.

He couldn't go more than a couple

days without punting. He said a week deprived of booting the leather ball into the sky drove him crazy. His newfound addiction led him to high honors — first-team *USA Today* All-American, second team *Chicago Tribune* all-state, and a state record for the longest punt in a playoff game (90 yards).

Donahue's love had become obsession. Now, he sits near the top of the college punting world.

The Iowa senior has been rated by ESPN's Mel Kiper Jr. and the National

Football Post's Wes Bunting as the top punting prospect in the nation.

"For a pure punter, he's right up there. He's up there with the top of the bunch," Bunting said. "I'd say if there's one senior that definitely has solidified himself as a late-round pick — a sixth- to seventh-round guy — it'd be Ryan Donahue."

"I feel pretty confident in putting money on this guy is going to be starting for an NFL team."

Despite all the hype heading into the season, Donahue's focus remains tight.

He said he has yet to have a really good season, and he has his sights set on a top-five punting average and the best net-punt average in the country.

The Evergreen Park, Ill., native said he's trying to improve his distance — a weakness Bunting noted — but he's not trying to prove anything to Kiper or Bunting.

"I have to go out and prove myself, to myself, that I can be the best punter in the country," he said. "Punting is kind of an art form, so I have to prove to

Cy-Hawk series renewed

- 1 Saturday's game marks the 58th time Iowa has clashed with Iowa State. The Hawkeyes hold a 22-10 advantage over the Cyclones since the Cy-Hawk Trophy has been awarded to the victorious team, starting in 1977.
- 2 The school that wins the annual football game is awarded three points in the Hy-Vee Cy-Hawk series, which is in its seventh year. Iowa and Iowa State have each won the series three times since its inception.
- 3 Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz has more than 10 times as many wins at Iowa (82) as second-year Iowa State coach Paul Rhoads has in his career (8).
- 4 Iowa is 1-1 when playing Iowa State on Sept. 11. The Hawkeyes defeated the Cyclones, 31-28, in 1993 but lost in 1999, 17-10.
- 5 The Hawkeyes allowed Eastern Illinois just six first downs last week, the second-fewest number since Syracuse moved the chains just five times in 2007.
- 6 This is only the second time Iowa and Iowa State enter the showdown after winning bowl games the previous season. The last time was in 2005; the Hawkeyes had defeated LSU in the Capital One Bowl, and the Cyclones had beaten Miami (Ohio) in the Independence Bowl.

He plays a bit high, but at 6-3, he's shorter than most offensive tackles, and he weighs 285 pounds, making it hard for blockers to get under him and drive him back. It's not just size and natural leverage, either. Clayborn's excellent arm strength and active hands are what truly make it so difficult to block him both as a run-stuffer and pass-rusher."

Iowa State's secondary coach, Bob Elliott, is the son of former Hawkeye Athletics Director Bump Elliot.

Cyclone defensive coordinator Bob Elliot was a Hawkeye defensive back from 1972-75 and also served as a defensive coordinator under former coach Hayden Fry.

Iowa State head coach Paul Rhoads is the first Cyclones coach to win seven games in his debut season since 1907 and the first to record a winning season since 1931.

Iowa holds the series' longest winning streak, with the Hawkeyes capturing 15-straight victories over the Cyclones from 1983-97.

The two schools didn't play between 1935 and 1976.
