

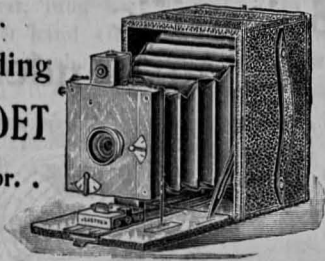

The constitution of the League was amended as follows:

Art. II. Sec. 6. If any team forfeits all the league games of any one season, said team shall forfeit membership in the association.

Art. VIII. Sec. 1. The managers of the competing teams shall agree upon the umpire or umpires at least one week before the league games.

Art. XII. Sec. 2. If any member of any competing league team be found to receive compensation that team shall forfeit all games and its membership in the league. By mutual agreement it was decided that any of the players of the league might use mits in the games whatever the action of the National League upon this point.

The meeting was characterized by a general good feeling among the delegates, and an entire absence of the usual "discussions" and "arguments."

Before adjournment the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: F. W. Darling, Grinnell, President; R. L. Emry, S. U. I., Vice-President; W. O. Clure, Drake, Secretary; Bert German, I. A. C., Treasurer.
