The lecture given by Mr. Wendling Tuesday evening closes the course offered by the S. U. I. Bureau this year. It is doubtful if the Bureau has ever supplied us with a number of lectures of equal grade in years past, and the members are certainly to be commended for their efforts. Just how the Bureau will come out financially we are unable to state, but it is certain that it has not been as successful financially as it has otherwise. This is due to various reasons. One of the greatest reasons is that several members of the different societies who are responsible for the financial success of the undertaking instead of doing what they could early in the season toward making the course a success financially, did all they could in the opposite direction by questioning the judgment of the members of the Bureau in securing the men they did. It is very evident that when the members of the two societies will not rely upon the good judgment of the members of the Bureau and attempt to assist in making the lecture a success financially they cannot expect the best results. The Bureau has worked hard and faithful to make the course a success in every way, and so far in their power they have done so. Some members of the societies, however, have not supported their action as they should have done in order to make it a complete success.

"The Man of Galilee."

One of the largest audiences that has come out this year to hear any lecture was that which listened to Geo. R. Wendling deliver his lecture on "The Man of Galilee," at the Opera House, Tuesday evening. Mr. Wendling was introduced with a few appropriate remarks by Dr. Watson. The speaker possesses a rich, mellow voice and a commanding stage

presence which makes him an ideal orator. As a painter of character he has rare ability. Calmly and carefully, he depicted in most beautiful language the peculiarities of the Nazarine. It is a constantly recurring fact that whatever form of government we may find it a is a government of a king. Men are not democratic in their nature. We always have wanted and always will want a king to rule, and this one must be the kingliest man. Napoleon and Caesar were kings in war, Raphael was king in art, Lincoln and others were kings in politics. It is said that the day of the king is over, but the day of the average king is not over. A real king often comes from the humblest walks of life and establishes a state by peace. One of the most interesting parts of his lecture was the description of Galilee. This most historic spot on all the world was so vividly brought before the imagination that it seemed almost a reality.

Christ was not a reformer, but a revolutionist. But what is his purpose and his plans? To answer this it is necessary to analyze his whole mental life, his intellectual processes. The apparent answer to his purpose is simple: to establish a kingdom. There is a disarrangement in society, men are hostile, they know that all must die, and only darkness lies before them. There is a violation of law and this is sin. The man of Galilee comes to found a kingdom, and his motive is love. Without money and without help he founds this kingdom and defies all the powers of earth or hell to destroy his works. His plan was perfect from the start. Christ announces his stupendous plan to the entire world without doubting its success. Mr. Wendling said he hoped the audience would put aside two very mistaken ideas that were prevalent to-day. First, Christ was not a weak and lowly man; those were his spiritual natures; on the other hand he was strong and courageous in character. Second, he was not an unsophisticated peasant, but a cosmopolitan. He mingled with all people, and was fortunate in possessing that genius which enables a man to see all there is to be seen in a certain field. To prove that Christ was egotistical he quoted various passages from the New Testament where he had attributed power to himself. The speaker now proceeded to point out the clear delineations of his character with remarkable acuteness. He was never selfish, never impatient. Love was his mission, and it is this and not charity for which millions are crying to-day. It has been said that he was effeminate, but all of his moral traits go to show that he was strong and manly. He never vacillates and never made a concession in his life. The speaker's tribute to the moral qualities of Christ was exceptionally fine.

As to the mental character of Christ he is the clearest and simplest of all men. The commonest phases form the main part of all his sayings, yet no one has succeeded in improving upon them. He never doubted, was never perplexed, was never afraid of going too far, and never sought for information. He was never surprised, never deliberated and never hurried. He did not grow by experience, nor did he ever make a mistake. He had a penetrating insight which few possess, and never did a general choose his captains with better success than did he in choosing his disciples.

Was he an invention, as is so often argued? The man of Galilee was perfect, and how can man who is prone to make mistakes invent a one without error?

We think it safe to say that no one was disappointed in the quality of the lecture given. It was such a lecture as everyone is profited by hearing.
