same track, the only way a prediction can be made is by comparing the records made at the home meets this Spring. By this it appears that S. U. I. has at least even chances, if not a decided advantage in the coming contest to-morrow.

Our boys are in good condition, and we hope for success. They will be well supported by a large and enthusiastic crowd of S. U. I. rooters. The prospect for victory was never brighter. The only thing in sight at present which will prevent a jollification second to none in the history of the University is the large prospect for a rain looming up in the direction of Des Moines.
