ALUMNI GAME.

TO RAISE THE FOOT BALL SPIRIT
IN S. U. I.

Sixteen brawny handlers of the pig-skin, who made the 'Varsity's reputation in the past, will line up against the first team Wednesday, Oct. 12th. They come from all parts of the State and nation, taking a vacation from their chosen occupations and professions, to help the foot ball spirit in S. U. I., and to fill the coffers of the Athletic Union.

W. H. Bremner, of Des Moines, was known as one of the steadiest and most reliable of our old players. He was manager of the team in the fall of '94. Played at the positions of quarter back and half back.

Victor Littig was considered one of the best left ends in the West. He played on the 'Varsity team in '93 and '94. Old students in those years will recall vivid recollections of Littig's famous runs around the end.

"Snowball" Pritchard played right guard on the first team in 1893.

Clymer Coldren, '94, was a quick and snappy player. Noted for his splendid game against Flippin, his opposing player on the Nebraska team at Omaha in the fall of '94.

K. E. Leighton played guard for two years, and then tackle. He was one of our best players in both positions. In 1895 he was captain of the team, and in 1896 he played as tackle on our star team of that year.

"Dad" Walker is well known to the present generation of students as last year's captain. He played for three years at guard, holding that position on our famous winners of the western championship in '96.

"Tin" Klingenberg played at guard and tackle on our last year's team.

R. Kepler is one of the famous full backs of S. U. I. He played two years on that position, and in '95 was recognized as one of the best tacklers and full backs of the West. His brilliant playing when everything seemed lost has added many a score to S. U. I.'s side of the ledger.

Steve Coldren, of Iowa City, played half back in '94 and '95.

L. L. Elliott's ability has long been known in the west. He was captain in '93, and is now playing on the strong Chicago Athletic Association team.

C. M. Thomas, who played on the 'Varsity team in '95 and '96, is known as S. U. I.'s famous punting left end. He was also captain of the base ball team in the spring of '97.

Will Larrabee, of Clermont, played full back in '92. He has been in training for this occasion at Camp Thomas, Chickamauga Park, during the past summer.

Stanton, of McGregor, was a fine tackle on the '95 and '96 teams.

Chas. Dutcher, now a local attorney, played on the 'Varsity team in '92.

J. L. Scripture played half back in '96.

Kinney Holbrook comes up from Tipton, to play again for Old Gold. Holbrook played end in '95, and as left half back, was the star player of the championship team of '96. His famous run around Kansas' left end in '96, when the score stood 0-0, and the game was within ten minutes of its close, is one that will long be remembered by foot ball players in the west.

The alumni game is intended to revive the foot ball enthusiasm in S. U. I. To this end, and especially to inculcate the new students with the contagion that animates the old foot ball admirers; Manager Munger and his associates are directing all their efforts.

Monday night a lecture on foot ball, practical and theoretical, will be given to girls by Dr. Knipe, the 'Varsity coach. This will prove a mine of general information to the young ladies of S. U. I., who should be the strongest supporters of the popular game. It is hoped that Professor Loos' room in the northwest corner of the Central Building, where the lecture will be given, will be packed with young ladies Monday night.

Tuesday evening there will be a mass meeting of students, alumni and friends of S. U. I. at Close Hall. At this meeting all the alumni players of the next day will be present, and will address the meeting. Let all turn out and let the old players know that they are appreciated. The meeting, preliminary as it is to the game the next day, will be a grand opportunity to arouse latent enthusiasm, and to see and cheer the men who have carried and are now carrying the Old Gold to triumph on the gridiron.

The alumni players will be given a dinner in their honor, Wednesday evening at Mimmehaha Park.

GOOD GAME AT DES MOINES YESTERDAY.

DES MOINES, Oct. 7, '98.

About fifteen hundred people saw a very good game of foot ball here today between the Drake University lads and the canvas-clad boys from Grinnell.

Grinnell started in with good gains by Taft and Pierce, but lost the ball on a fumble. Drake forced the ball well down the field by a series of runs around the ends, but was finally held for downs. Foster found a hole in the Drake line and went through for two gains, when a high pass over Pierce's head cost Grinnell the ball. Drake gained steadily by hitting the line, but was finally held for downs, though Grinnell lost the ball again at the first smash. With the ball at Grinnell's 20 yard line, Drake made 10 yards through the left end, then 5 through the center, and jammed McFerrin through for a touch down. Sellers kicked for goal, but failed. Drake 5, Grinnell 0.

Ball in Grinnell's territory. Gains by Drake. A punt, fumble by Grinnell, a few hard smashes, and Drake makes another touchdown, but failed to kick goal. Grinnell gingers up, but Drake won ball when one yard from her goal. Frisbie's shoulder hurt and game delayed. On a fumble Grinnell gets the ball and scores. Score, Drake 10, Grinnell 6.

In the second half Grinnell improved. Foster was hurt and Spaulding took his place. There was much dissatisfaction at this time over a decision of the umpire, Drake receiving the ball. Drake made long gains. Thiel and Taft gave place to Grazer and McGoovan. Grinnell goes around the end for 25 and 35 yards. Held for downs within three yards of the goal. Drake in turn was held, and Spaulding smashed through for touchdown—only two minutes left. Pierce kicked goal. Final score, Grinnell 12, Drake 10.

The game was clean and, except for the conduct of coach Potter, of Drake, gentlemanly throughout. Potter insisted on coaching his team while the game was in progress, and instructed them to "knock the tar" out of them.

Grinnell's play was open and snappy; interference and team-work good considering the time of year. Drake played the heavy Pennsylvania style, and the work of McFerrin, formerly of Simpson, was especially noteworthy.

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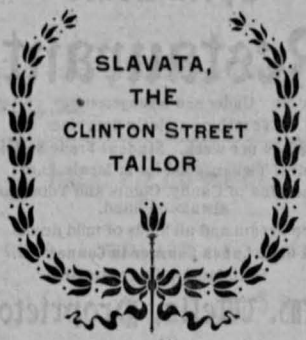
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FACT AND RUMOR.
