STATE FIELD MEET.

Drake First, University of Iowa Second, Grinnell Third.

Fully four thousand people witnessed the field meet at Des Moines, yesterday. The weather was a little threatening in the morning, but the afternoon was an ideal one for the meet. The sun came out from the flakey clouds, and fans were plied continuously to allay the heat.

There were delegations of from to 300 500 from Grinnell, Ames, and Cedar Falls. The gang of rooters from S. U. I. numbered about twenty, but what they lacked in numbers they made up in noise. Holland, the Drake wonder, carried off four firsts. Twenty-seven of Drake's points were obtained by his prowess. Every event in which Holland, Pell, and Sellars entered, was protested last evening, after the meet. The protests come up before the rules committee, this morning, and a stormy time is anticipated. Very clear and convincing affidavits of professionalism against these men have been obtained, and will be presented to the committee. Should the protests be allowed, the University of Iowa will be advanced to first place.

But this much is certain, professional or amateur, Holland is a wonder-sprinter, hurdler, jumper and master in all.

The other schools of the State put up a magnificent fight. The S. U. I. athletes were in the fight from the first event to the finish. Williams, in the mile walk, put up a magnificent struggle. With Ringler, of Grinnell, a little in the lead, Williams rushed him to a record of 7:06. Even at the very scratch, with the agony of the terrible strain depicted on his countenance, he spurred to close the distance. Williams does not claim to be a mile runner, but in the face of those immense odds, he put up the greatest exhibition of grit and nerve displayed on any track in Iowa. Brackett fought finely for third place, and is highly complimented by the Des Moines papers for his performance.

The high jump was perhaps the most taking event of the day. Louis, Holland and Sellars cleared at five feet and ten inches. Schroeder made five feet seven and one-half inches. The bar was raised two inches, and as Louis stepped to the bar, the people rose in their seats. A short run, an easy, gliding leap, and Louis cleared the bar. Holland and Sellars failed. The distance was raised to six feet, and Louis cleared it on the first trial.

Wilson, in the mile run, paced the entire field off its feet. His pace was hot and he kept it up, finishing fully 50 yards ahead of the second man in the magnificent time of 4:39. Brown had already won the quarter and half-mile run, and after a gamey attempt to win a point for Iowa in this event, fell out after the first lap.

In the half-mile run, and the 440 yard run, Brown completely out-classed his opponents. What Wilson accomplished in the mile, Brown accomplished in the half-mile and 440 yard runs.

It is possible to mention many other Iowa men who deserve especial credit for their work. Call in the hurdles, Smith in the 50 yard dash, Scott in the two-mile bicycle; Warner in the hammer throw, Backett in the pole vault, Schroeder in the 220 hurdles and the high jump, were especially noted for their work. Maxon, in the half mile bicycle, had the misfortune to be thrown by collision with another rider at a time when he held a fine position for the finish.

THE NEBRASKA GAME.

NEBRASKA'S MEN DEFEAT IOWA BY A SCORE OF 5 TO 1.

Nebraska's men proved their ability to play good, clean ball, Thursday, by taking Captain Lowry's men into camp with a score of 5 to 1. The visitors appeared determined to redeem themselves for their defeat on Wednesday, and with the exception of two wild throws, they played league ball. Their stick work was good, and the base hits were made at the most opportune time, while Iowa, though she succeeded in finding the Nebraskans for two singles and two two-baggers, was not able to make a base hit at the time when it would have been of avail. Moss, as twirler for S. U. I., was easily superior to Gordon, and succeeded in striking out five of the victors. The clean fielding of both teams was a prominent feature of the game.

The visitors were first at the stick, and through an error and a stolen base, Moore succeeded in reaching third. Reeder failed to locate the sphere, McDiamrid's short hit put him out at first, and Gordon retired the Nebraskans through his inability to solve Moss' curves.

Williams opened the campaign for Iowa with a safe hit, and soon stole second. Sargent went out at first. Lowry succeeded in finding first. Williams was thrown out at second. Storey's hit failed to put him on first, and the score stood 0 to 0.

In the second inning Lehmer went to first on a base hit, stole second, and crossed the plate on Bliss' three-bagger. Rhodes found the sphere for a single, and Bliss scored. Yates threw Rhodes out at second, and Bolen fanned the air. A base on balls gave Rhea first, and Moore being hit by the pitcher, moved him up to second, where he was left by Reeder's strike out.

In this inning Iowa's men went out in one, two, three order.

The third inning netted one more score for the visitors.

During the fourth inning, Sargent was the only man to reach first, and on an attempt to steal second was thrown out by Gordon.

At the beginning of the fifth inning, Moore was given first, stole second, and advanced to third on Reeder's single. McDiamrid flew out to Reynolds and Gordon fouled to Lowry. Lehmer made first, and Moore scored on an error at home plate. Bliss's fly to center field retired the side.

Affairs began to look desperate for Iowa, but prospects brightened up when Reynolds crossed the plate. Lowry went out at first. St. Clair reached first, Yates went out from shortstop to first, and St. Clair was left on third by a fly to right field.

In the sixth both sides went out in one, two, three order, and no one passed third in the seventh.

Two strike-outs and a fly to Storey retired Nebraska in the eighth.

For Iowa, Yates went out at first, Moss got a base on balls, but was thrown out at second. Williams ended the inning by a fly to center field.

The visitors found it impossible to reach first base in the ninth.

In our half, Sargent flew out to left field, and Lowry went out at first. Storey awakened the rooters with a three-bagger, but Reynolds hit to Gordon, which closed the inning and game.

High School Athletics.

The resolutions passed by the Iowa City School Board, lamenting over the fact that there are in the Iowa City High School some individuals who have attained "remarkable physical achievements," make rather curious reading. It is not usual in this day and age of the world to hear such a diatribe against athletics, nor is it usual to behold a school board which holds such exaggerated and preposterous conceptions of high school athletics.

We believe that the school board is laboring under a misapprehension of the state of athletics as they exist in their own high school. We know of no instance where the undue amounts of exercise, extraordinary physical achievements, gambling, exaltation of field meet points, or demoralization of school work, which the board in its resolution so deplores, have occurred in the case of the Iowa City High School. It is our impression, based upon acquaintance with the Iowa City High School boys on

Athletic Park field, that the boys have simply been taking that moderate amount of exercise which is needful for growing constitutions; that the home High School Field Meet was entirely uncontaminated by the influences which the Board so deplores; that the effect of this mild, voluntary training on the part of the High School lads, has been most beneficial.

We believe also, although this part of our information may not be so authentic, that those High School pupils who have been engaging in athletic contests have not harmed their scholarship by such competition, and that the athletes are by no means the worst scholars in the High School.

Of course, the school board has an entire right to hold such beliefs—we are surprised that, expressing them as they have, they should not forbid the meet entirely. If the school board does not allow the scholars the right to raise money for the State Meet in the name of the High School, how can they represent the High School at Davenport? The board seems to be inconsistent; it barks very loudly, but bites not at all.

We do not believe that the board acted wisely in adopting these resolutions. High School athletics have too many favorable features which commend themselves to anyone who seeks to become acquainted with them. We do not think that the member of the board who drew up the resolutions can maintain the propositions which he lays down, and that a farther acquaintance with the athletes of Iowa City as they really are would convince a fair-minded person that the adoption of the resolutions of the Iowa City School Board was unwise.

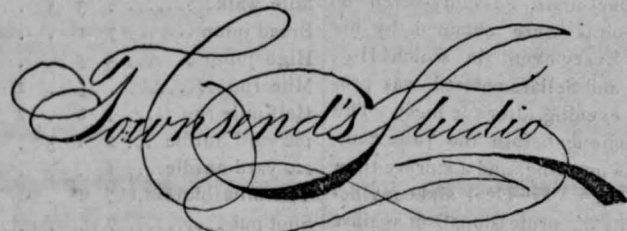

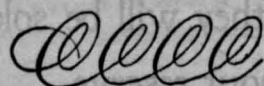
