UNIVERSITY OPENS.

PRESIDENT MACLEAN ARRIVES. — INCREASED ATTENDANCE IN ALL DEPARTMENTS.

President MacLean arrived in the city shortly after the first of the month and since his arrival has been looking into the condition of the University and acquainting himself with the faculty and student members. To extend this acquaintance our president has invited the faculties and students of all departments to meet him at the Opera House this afternoon. At this time he will also introduce the new instructors to the students.

Although it is as yet too early to form definite conclusions, all signs in the registration offices of the various departments of the University point to an enrollment fully one-third larger than that of last year. In 1898 the VIDETTE-REPORTER ascertained the registration in the departments on Saturday of the first week. Comparing the enrollment on this day of the opening week last year and on this (Thursday) morning of this year, the number of students this year is in every department larger than last year, the excess often reaching one-third or more. Adding to this the large number of old and new students who will register the last of this week and the first of next, we may confidently look for an attendance approaching the two-thousand mark this year.

In the Collegiate department, 160 Freshmen are registered, about 30 more than last year. Many old and new students have not registered as yet.

The Law department is one-third ahead of last year. 99 Juniors are enrolled, as against 75 on Saturday of last year.

The Medical department has broken all records; 83 Freshmen and 60 Sophomores are on the Secretary's books. The department is now 40 ahead of any previous attendance.

The Homeopathic Freshmen are 6 stronger than last year, and all the old men are back.

The Dental Freshmen are 56 in number, with more to come—this being 11 in excess of last year's entering class.

The Pharmacy Department shows an excess of 7 over last year, with the enrollment very incomplete.

The call for rooms in the city is larger than last year, and on every hand comes indications that our lines have indeed fallen in pleasant places.

FOOTBALL.

THE EARLY TRAINING—THE CANDIDATES. THE SCHEDULE.

With over forty candidates working desperately for places on the teams, the prospect of a season full of victories was never so promising as this year. Seventeen of the men, as is well known, have been in training at the camp at Linder's boathouse for three weeks. These men are Captain Eby, Captain Hobbs of last year's team, Joe Warner, Emmett Burrier, Ray Morton, Fred Williams, John Griffith, Jim Brockway and Mark Baker all of last year's first team; Lin Butler, captain of the '98 second eleven; H. B. Walters from the Academy; G. E. Ingham who played on the Wilton College team two years ago; C. E. Hoover, half back and captain of Midland College, Atchinson, Kansas, '98 team; C. E. Herbert who played on a team at Adair, Iowa. Fred Wilson, full back on the Burlington Athletic Club team; and Simon Hestor who played for years on the Penn College team. This aggregation, though perhaps lighter, is altogether the fastest that has appeared on the 'Varsity gridiron in years. The boys broke camp Tuesday morning and the same afternoon of the same day saw them at work on the 'Varsity grounds.

The inspiration of an actual football practice on the opening day of the term brought out a rush of recruits, most of them however, old performers and yesterday afternoon over thirty men were at work in two squads, under the direction of Dr. Knipe, who is able assisted by Captain Hobbs.

Among the new men out are S. E. Edson, the famous Ames end; McKean; center rush on the Lenox College '97 team; H. F. Weiland, South Dakota's old full back and 220 yard man; Ned Middleton; who played on the '98 Varsity team; F. C. Carle, the 208 pound guard of last years State Normal team; Macy, Deeters, Lehey and Marshall of last years second eleven; and Lloyd Howell a sub-tackle on '96 'Varsity team. In addition to the thirty candidates out yesterday, some fifteen more will appear on the grounds tomorrow.

While in camp the men practiced passing and falling on the ball, tackling the tackling bag, punting, signal work and in fact everything that goes to make a football player. The boys boarded at the Linder house, where the fare was excellent, with the result that they are in superb physical condition. The early training will tell for good in the early games of the season, the first of which with the State Normal, is now about a week in the future.

The schedule which follows is a long and severe one, but with the quantity of the material on hand it will be strange if S. U. I. doesn't give a good account of the season.

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A beginning Latin class, for the benefit of University students, begins Thursday, Sept. 14, at 1:15 P. M., at the Iowa City Academy.

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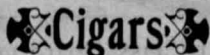
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FACT AND RUMOR.

HOLLAND A PROFESSIONAL.

AND S. U. I. WINS THE STATE MEET WITH 38 POINTS.

At the meeting of the game committee of the State Inter-Collegiate Athletic Association held in the office of S. U. I.'s, member of the committee, W. H. Bremner, in Des Moines on Tuesday last, the charges of professionalism made by representatives of S. U. I. and Grinnell at the state meet last spring against Homer Holland were sustained. This action makes S. U. I., winner of the meet with 38 points, Grinnell a close second with 34 and Drake following with 27 points. Six colleges and Universities were represented at the meeting, the Upper Iowa being absent. The committee will not disclose the vote by which Holland was declared professional. The charges against Pell and Sellars were not sustained.

DRAKE PROTESTS.

The athletic committee of Drake University yesterday adopted resolutions protesting against the decision in the Holland case. The resolutions threaten that "Drake University will withdraw, as others will, if such action is allowed to stand," and adds that "Drake University will refuse to play football with Grinnell this fall under any consideration."

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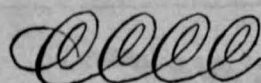
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
