University Convocation.

The first University Convocation was held at the opera aouse, Thursday afternoon, beginning at 4:00 o'clock. Previous to this the students formed on the campus by departments and marched to the Opera House. Acting President Currier presided over the opening exercises and with appropriate remarks introduced his successor, President MacLean, pledging to him hearty co-operation of faculties and students.

President MacLean in his remarks thanked first of all the citizens of Iowa for their interest in the State University. Following this he explained that the convocation was a simple family meeting for a family talk. In this little talk he touched upon application to study, military drill, athletics, referring to the University as the Christian college of the state, in a manner that appealed forcibly to all. After the introduction of the new men of the instructional staff, 14 in number, the resignation of Dr. Gilchrist as Battalion Surgeon and the appointment of Dr. A. A. Knipe in his stead was announced. This was followed by the announcement of the faculty members of the board of conrrol, appointed by the President Professors Nutting and Loos of the Collegiate department, Chancellor McClain of the Law department, Dr. Harriman of the Medical department and Dr. Hosford of the Dental department. Our President then asked that all classes and departments give their yells. This they did with a will, closing with the 'Varsity yell in a glow of good feeling. President MacLean then said we would close this convocation as all others by singing "America." Following the singing; which was led by Dr. Knipe, Ex-President Pickard pronounced the benediction and the first convocation was ended.
