ATHLETIC BOARD MEETING.

FINANCES DISCUSSED — PROSPECT FOR PAYMENT OF DEBT.

The Board of Athletic Control treated itself too rather prolonged session last evening. Every member was present when the meeting was called to order at 7:30 o'clock. As the executive committee had spent the greater part of the afternoon in auditing the bills of the football manager, no time was taken up with this matter. A number of unpaid bills were presented and referred to the auditing committee.

Mr. Walsh for the tennis association proposed that members of the old association be admitted to membership in the Union on payment of the regular fee and that a ground fee of 50 cents be levied on tennis players. After much discussion this proposition was adopted.

The contract for the game with Penn College was presented, read and approved with certain reservations.

The committee appointed at the last meeting to report on a treasurer for the Union, submitted its report. Mr. Fry, cashier of the Johnson County Savings Bank was elected treasurer and the bond was fixed at \$1000. The bond of the assistant treasurer was fixed at \$500. At the suggestion of the football manager, a bond of \$1000 was attached to his position.

It is the aim of the board to provide if possible for the payment of the entire Athletic debt by January 1st, and then for the future to keep the teams on a self-supporting basis. With the cooperation of the students that will be possible. The net proceeds from the Mikado will amount to \$400 (estimated) and Saturday's game gave a balance to the good of a little over \$100. This \$500 will cover the first installment of salary for coach as well as most of the clothing, shoes and incidental bills of the football team to date, the interest on the note due and paid last June and several of last spring's Athletic bills. The outstanding debt today is about \$1000 (estimated). It is expected that the Alumni game Friday will net \$400 to be applied on the payment of aforesaid debt. That will leave \$600 and with good weather the football receipts for the rest of the season will wipe it out.

Hesperian Program.

Saturday evening the ladies of South Hall gave their opening program to a large audience.

The exercises were opened with a piano solo given by Miss Switzer which was highly appreciated by all present.

The retiring president in an appropriate speech introduced the new president, Miss Edna Page, who responded in a pleasing and becoming manner, referring to the history of the society in the past. She said that it was not the past history with its wonderful achievements but the present and future in which they were most concerned.

Next followed a recitation by Imo Moler, "Michael Strogoff," which was well rendered.

Mr. Goodsell gave a violin solo which was a treat and greatly applauded.

The Debate, Resolved, That Municipalities in the U. S. should own and operate plants for light, transportation and water was affirmed by Misses Schuck and Tuttle and denied by Misses Helen Eddy

and Ruby Baughman. All the arguments were clear and to the point, and the question was well discussed.

Miss Slavata followed in a recitation, "A Sisterly Scheme."

Miss Florence Jay delivered a speech on "The girls we met in Songland."

The program closed with a vocal solo by Miss Gay.

THE ALUMNI GAME.

WILL BE PLAYED FRIDAY MORNING.—ALUMNI PLAYERS.

The annual Alumni game will be played at Athletic Park next Friday morning. The game will be called and will begin promptly at ten o'clock, as all preliminary arrangements will be made prior to the appearance of the team on the grounds. There is little doubt that the Alumni game is going to be one of the most popular of our annual games. The Alumni are taking more interest in the University today than ever before, and the University and its friends will show their appreciation of this interest next Friday.

The captain of the Alumni team will be Dr. James ("Dad") Walker, now located at Boone, Iowa. Dr. Walker who was captain and guard on the '96 Varsity team acted as captain of last year's Alumni team. The other players on the visiting team will be Iver Iverson, captain and center '96; Lloyd Elliott, captain and full back, '93; C. M. Thomas, end, '96; Vic L. Littig, end '94; M. G. Meister, end '97; M. McKinley, end '94; Dr. John Gardner, tackle '96; Dr. H. J. Birge, guard '96; T. W. ("Tiny") Klingenberg, guard '97; F. W. Rank, guard '96; Chas. Dutcher, halfback '92; Steven Coldren, halfback, '95; E. K. Maine, halfback, '96 and Roy Hetzel, quarterback '96.

The game Friday will be made the society event of the football season. Governor Shaw and President MacLean have accepted invitations to participate in a tally-ho party to the game. Invitations have also been extended to President Harper of Chicago, President Northrop of Minnesota, President King of Cornell, the Regents, and Mayor Stebbins.

Coming as it does on the day of the inauguration, the game will be largely attended by visiting Alumni and others who are expected to be here in hundreds.

At nine o'clock conveyances carrying the guests of honor, the two teams, and the band, starting from the postoffice corner will proceed north on Clinton street, returning on Dubuque street to College, and thence east on College street returning on Iowa Avenue to the starting point, and will then be driven to the grounds, arriving in time for the game to begin promptly at ten o'clock.

The game will be an excellent one as a preparatory to the Chicago game of October 7th. "Dad Walker, Vic Littig, Lloyd Elliott and others will remain here to assist Dr. Knipe with the coaching until the team leaves for Chicago. Sam Hobbs will also continue to be of great assistance in this work.

Normalites For Clean Athletics.

Last spring, as many of our readers will remember, Drake University won first place in the State field meet, mainly through the efforts of Holland, one of her representatives. At that time Grinnell and the State University brought charges of professionalism against Holland which have been sustained by the Games Committee at their meeting Tuesday of last week. The Athletic Committee of Drake University at once drew up resolutions protesting against the decision and threatening to withdraw if this should stand and has declared of her games with S. U. L., Grinnell, and Ames—and now she wants a game at Cedar Falls. This is the second proposal we have had from Drake University. In the spring a letter was received stating that they would play football if we paid \$350 for expenses. In this second proposal she places her expenses at \$100. Drake is very kind to forego her profit of \$250, but Normal desires to let its influence be with that of S. U. I. Grinnell and Ames, for clean athletics and manly sport.—Normal Eyte.

Freshman Banquet.

The class of 1903 has shown itself to be an enterprising class, by meeting early in the term and getting the work of organization well under way in the first few weeks of the year. We suppose that of course, they are going to give a banquet, and that it will be as brilliant an affair as that of any previous class.

It is a custom of the University which has fallen somewhat into disrepute of late years, that the Freshman Banquet shall take place in the fall term. When a freshman banquet is postponed until after the Christmas holidays it usually loses, it has seemed to us, something of the sparkle and attractiveness that attends a similar function held in the fall term. Besides, the Banquet held over adds one more to the already full list of the winter terms attractions and makes professors and students alike feel that events in that term are crowded too closely upon one another's heels.

Hold your banquet this term, Freshman and get acquainted, both among yourselves and with your Sophomore friends. You will not regret it.

Athletic Finances.

The Athletic Union may be said to be in a very PROMISING condition financially.

Saturday's game was satisfactory considering the fact that it was the first game of the season. The proceeds of this game have enabled the management to meet some of the more pressing obligations incident to the football season. The proceeds from the Mikado were larger than had been hoped. Although the settlements have not been made, it is estimated the net proceeds will be between \$375 and \$400. This money will be used to pay for the clothing, shoes and other incidentals expenses of the football team. With these expenses paid and an appropriation from the regents to pay salary with, it will be strange if the Union is not out of debt by New Year's.

The Athletic Union will owe every member of the Mikado Company a debt of gratitude beyond its power to repay.

Every man and woman in the caste made personal sacrifices for the sake of the success of the entertainment that entitles them to an everlasting place in the esteem of friends of S. U. I. Athletics. Not as a distinction from the devotion of the remaining members of the company, but merely as an instance thereof, we cite the case of the leading lady, Mrs. Hubbard, who had planned to go east in August, but who remained till this week for the sole purpose of taking part in the Mikado. As another instance, not a distinction, we refer to Dr. Knipe, who spent his days with the football team and the better part of his nights drilling the chorus. And so we might go on had we the space, naming each member in the company and telling of some personal sacrifice made. One other we cannot refrain from mentioning—the business manager, Mr. Howard N. Powers. The business manager of an affair of this kind is too often forgotten in the presence of the heroes and heroines behind the footlights. It is due to the untiring industry and the shrewdness of Mr. Powers that the performances show a credit balance of \$400 rather than a very possibly smaller sum.

It is evident that the people of Iowa City are determined that the debt of the Athletic Union must be raised. It can be done, if everybody will lend a hand. The citizens of Iowa City and the faculty members have already done so by their patronage at the Mikado and purchases of season tickets to games. The students can do so by joining the Athletic Union and patronizing the games.

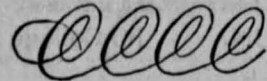
