PENN VS. S. U. I.

Penn played up to expectations. They had twelve men, one of whom counted more than the others, the umpire. His decisions were not questionable. There was no question about them. It was very apparent that they were rank. Notwithstanding the fact that Penn came here knowing our plays and filled with dirty tricks, they could not win for the reason that they could not play good enough ball.

Our backs, as usual, covered themselves with glory; Edson especially, who made two long runs for touchdowns. "Joe" showed that he was not so poor by making a good place kick.

THE GAME.

Hester kicked off to Morton. Downed on 25 yard line. By a series of line bucking Iowa made 5, 10, 15 yards respectively. These tactics were kept up until the ball was on Penn's 20 yard line. Here Warner tried for a place kick but failed. Penn kicked off from their 25 yard line to Watters. Again Iowa resorted to line bucking. They kept this up all the way down the field until Griffith was shoved over the line for a touch down. Warner kicked goal. Score 6-0.

Hester first kicked out of bounds. He then kicked to Edson who carried the ball to the 20 yard line. End runs were

then tried with as marked success as the line smashes. Warner missed the catch for a punt. Penn's ball. On the first attempt they tried to go around the right end but Edson downed him. On a fumble Iowa got the ball. Morton then scampered down the field for 15 yards. Warner was finally forced to punt. Penn made gains around the end and through center. Through the aid of the umpire they got 10 more.

Hester made 15 yards around the end Iowa finally secured the ball on downs and getting warmed they began moving up the field. Time called. Score 6-0.

SECOND HALF.

Warner kicked off 15 yards. Griffith secured the ball. Morton made 8 yards around right end. By line smashes Iowa advanced the ball to Penn's 3 yard line where Dr. Hare again got in his work and put the ball back 5 yards giving it to Penn. They lost on the first down by a good tackle by Morton. They again lost. Hester punted out 25 yards to Griffith. Springer the captain was forced to retire and Lathrope substituted. Iowa by line bucking advanced the ball to Penn's 1 yard line and Warner was shoved through for a touch down. Warner kicked goal. Score 12-0.

Hester kicked off to Edson who advanced the ball 35 yards. Griffith first went through center for 5 yards and Edson went around left end for 50 yards. Iowa lost the ball on a fumble. Iowa held them for downs. Morton made 25 yards around the end. Warner went through for 15 yards and Eby made a touch down. Warner kicked goal. Score 18-0.

Hester kicked off to Griffith who advanced the ball 15 yards. By line bucking and end runs Iowa gained 15 yards and then Edson went around the end for 55 yards and a touch down, Morton and Griffith giving good interference. Warner kicked goal. Score 24-0.

Dinkle kicked off to Warner and Burrier and Warner made great gains through center and Morton around the end and Edson by a run of 35 yards made another touch down. Warner kicked goal. Score 30-0.

Drinkle kicked off to Morton who passed to Griffith. Griffith was injured by being tackled. Meggars was substituted. Hoover was substituted for Edson and Stratford for F. Williams. Meggars showed he was in the game by making 10 yds. Stratford also made 8 yards. By repeated line smashes the ball was advanced to Penn's 35 yard line where the referee who feared he had been forgotten gave the ball to Penn.

FALL FIELD MEET.

SOPHOMORE MEDICS LEAD IN POINTS FOR CUP.—RELAY RACE OF 20 POINTS YET TO BE RUN.

Ford easily carried off the field honors at the meet yesterday. His title as field champion is undisputed. Between him and Siegfreidt who carried off second honors, the Sophomore Medics almost gained the class cup. They have more than enough points now but the relay race which counts 20 points is yet to be run so the possession of the cup is not finally assured. It is more than probable the cup will go to the Medics however because they have at present 39 points to the Junior Collegiate 10. The relay race will be run as a preliminary to the Rush Medical game.

Heretofore the Freshman Collegiates have always shown up well yet somehow or other they didn't live up to their class record. This fact is to be regretted for it is the freshman who in time make our athletes.

The 100 yard dash was run in preliminary-semi finals and finals. Ford won out in the finals by about 8 inches. Time 10 1/2.

The half mile run was won as usual by Brown; Boardman, second and Brackett, third. Time 2:10 1/2.

In the pole vault Weiland came out in his football clothes and won, Brackett, second and Kettlewell and Stevenson tied for third. Height 9 feet.

Weiland also won the shot put, distance 35 ft and 2 in. Siegfreidt, second and Meggars third.

The mile run was of course won by "Paddy" Wilson. There were four entries but only Wilson and Brackett finished. Time 5:17 1/2.

The 220 was a good race but Ford showed his running qualities by winning with a slight margin over Coy. Dye, third. Time 23 1/2.

On the high jump there were three entries. No one but Siegfreidt could clear the bar at 5 feet 2 inches. Stevenson got second and Banschbach third.

Ford also won the 440 in 56 seconds, Speidel, second and Rule, third.

Eighteen feet and three inches was the distance Stevenson had to jump to win the running broad jump. Siegfreidt got second and Weiland third.

Siegfreidt closed the meet by winning the hop step and jump. Distance 40 feet and 5 inches. Louis who bids fair in time to equal the old "John J." got second and Norman third.

The meet was encouraging and speaks well for a good team in the spring. The number of entries in some of the events was remarkable as well as gratifying. Considering the fact that but little training has been done by the contestants the records were good.

The Drake Game Cancelled.

"At a special meeting of the Athletic Council last Thursday evening, it was voted to cancel the football game scheduled with Drake University for Nov. 11, at Des Moines. The following letter was sent to the manager of the Drake team:

'Ames, Iowa, Oct. 6, 1899.

MR. CHANNING SMITH,
Manager Drake University Football Team, Des Moines, Iowa

DEAR SIR:—I am authorized by the Athletic Council of the Iowa State College to cancel the game of football scheduled with Drake University for November 11th. Our council feel that the Athletic Authorities of Drake University are not properly observing the rules of the Iowa Inter-Collegiate Agreement regarding athletics. We will enter no controversy in the matter, but so long as Drake Athletics are conducted as they are at present, our Council will not permit any contests at Drake University.

"The council did exactly right. If we are to require our Athletes to maintain a strict standing of Amateurism, it will not be doing them justice, nor will it enhance self-respect for us to play teams whose pretended amateur standing is clouded by the proof that stands against Drake University. The letter above published is considerate and sensible. Our council is perfectly willing to play Drake so soon as she shows willingness to be fair and honest."—Ames Student.

It is fortunate for the future of Athletics that such an institution as Ames joins with other institutions in the fight for purity and honesty.

Join The Union.

Not over 150 students have yet joined the Athletic Union. The membership fee, \$1 is so small that every student in the University should be able to join. The Union at present owes \$1,100 of old bills. It is essential that these old bills

be entirely paid by January 1st, 1900, in order that we may expect continued help from the Regents. The Athletic grounds are in such miserable condition that they must be entirely reconstructed before another season, and if we hope to accomplish anything in Athletics. The grounds must be graded and respectably fenced and a grand stand and a track must be built. All this the Regents will be asked to provide for. It is not probable that they will accede to the request until the students show enough interest in the matter to pay of the old debts. Moreover we need an active Union with a large membership back of the teams if we expect their successes to continue. We won the State Meet last spring. We are winning football games this fall. Indications point to the organization of a strong base ball team and track team for the coming spring. The success of these teams will depend largely upon the financial backing of the Union and the spirit generated among its members. Beginning next week an organized canvas will be made of the entire University by classes. Let no student refuse to become a member of the Union. Pay your dollar on the old debt that has been hanging over us so long and become an integral part of a live organization that shall glory in the successes of our teams and cheer them in possible defeats.

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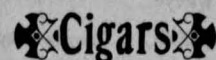
