Schaeffer Memorial Tablet.

Mrs. Charles A. Schaeffer, widow of the late President of the University has placed a tablet in Trinity Episcopal church to the memory of her husband. The tablet is of brass, tastefully lettered, and hung upon a slab of mable on the east wall of the church, opposite the pew which the family occupied during its residence in Iowa City. The inscription on the tablet is simple and dignified. It runs:

In Memory of

Charles Ashmead Schaeffer,

M. A. PH. D. LL. D.,

President of the State University of Iowa,

Vestryman of this Parish,

Entered into Rest the XXIII day of

September,

Anno Donimi MDCCCXCVIII:

His unswerving Loyalty to the highest Ideals of Personal Living made him to be loved as a Friend and honored as a Citizen: The Guardian of the Highest Trusts of the State. His Candor, Firmness, and Gentleness, the Fairness of his mind and the singular Disinterestedness of his Character gave him an influence which does not end with his Life.

His Service to the Church in this Parish and in the Diocese make it fitting that he should be remembered here.

The Northeastern Iowa Teachers Association.

The University was represented at the Northeastern Iowa Teachers' Association, held at Independence, October 19-21, by President MacLean, Professors Wilcox and McConnell. President MacLean was very cordially received by the association. In response to the call of the presiding officer he appeared before the assembled teachers and in the name of the University extended a greeting to the members of the association in his usual happy manner. He placed special emphasis upon the idea that the work of public education from the primary department to the university is one work in which all teachers have a common interest and in which all are co-workers.

Professor Wilcox talked in his characteristically and effective trenchant manner on "Some Fads in Teaching History," and later, before the college section, participated in a discussion on the subject "To what extent should the college professor give free expression to his personal opinions?"

In the college section Professor McConnell discussed an address on "The State, the Home and the School" which had been previously given in the general association by Professor Gillan, of Milwaukee. He also participated in a discussion of the subject "Foundations" in the superintendents' section of the association.

Professor McConnell participated in several interesting discussions in the college and superintendent's sections.

President MacLean and Professor Wilcox enjoyed the hospitality of J. E. Cook, '70, at a dinner at which Chancellor W. B. Craig, '74 of Drake University and President Homer H. Seerley, '78, and Professor L. A. Parish of the State Normal, were among the guests.

S. U. I. Treatment.

Although defeated at S. U. I. last week our boys came away with an increased spirit of friendliness for the University. Never have the boys been better treated when on a football trip to a sister college. From the time they stepped from the train at the depot, where they were greeted by our college yell, till the exchange of yells at the depot in the evening as the train pulled from the city, the boys receive nothing but the best treatment. Ames colors worn by the team and visiting students were respected by University students, the wearer never being insulted by cause of vulgar abuse. Also at the game in the afternoon the first thing that met their eyes was the manner in which the goals were decorated, one in old gold and the other in cardinal and old gold. The treatment the boys received from the crowd was excellent, their appearance on the field being greeted by various Ames yells given by S. U. I. students. Such was the manner in which the boys were treated on every hand, indeed the spirit exhibited by S. U. I. should be appreciated by us, and we are sure we will prove that it is next year when S. U. I. plays on our campus.—I. S. C. Student.

At the Roadside Settlement.

President MacLean went to Des Moines Wednesday to introduce Wm. Dean Howells in his lecture before the Roadside Settlement. He was met at the station at Des Moines by J. B. Weaver, '82, and taken to his house for a luncheon in honor of Mr. Howells and Major Byers, the Iowa poet. G. F. Henry, entertained the President at a dinner, at which J. G. Berryhill, C. '73, Simon Casidy, W. O. Finkbine, '74, C. A. Finkbine, '73, and Lafe Young and Dawson of the press, were present.

In the evening the President introduced Wm. Dean Howells to the audience gathered at the Roadside Settlement to hear him give his own experiences as an author. In introducing Mr. Howells the President acknowledged the compliment paid to the University in inviting him from the Jerusalem of professors to the Jerico of politicians.

"The Roadside Settlement is an outgrowth of University extension," he said, "on the practical side of college life. An extract from a letter was given mentioning the large extent of country from the Mississippi to the Rockies which is without a publishing house or any writers of known literary fame. The University was called on to lend a hand in promoting the literary life of this great region. The coming of Howells was an event which would greatly stimulate this needed literary activity."

Mr. Howells was introduced as one who was born in the year of accession of Queen Victoria and who had shown in America as the star of the brilliant Victorian Era.

After the lecture the President attended a reception given by the Prairie Club.

On Thursday the President visited the State Capitol and paid his respects to the state officers. During his entire stay the President appreciated most heartily the good feelings and interest which the alumni and people of Des Moines generally showed for the University.

C. Nutting of the University of Iowa, whose specialty is the subject of hydroids, in which he has attained a national reputation. Professor Nutting will receive the material as it arrives from the Museums of Yale, Washington and other place and work it up in a scientific manner. The results will be published in book form by Mr. Harriman.

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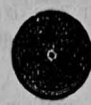
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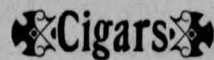
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FACT AND RUMOR.

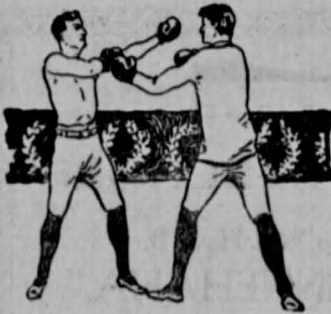
