WISCONSIN GETS PLAYERS

O'BRIEN AND "SIOUX" JONES GO THERE

Strong Football Players Attracted to Wisconsin—Henry O'Brien of Minnesota and Capt. Jones of the Normal

The University of Wisconsin will have a number of strong football players next fall for Arthur Curtis to work with when he begins his first season as Phil Kings' successor.

Henry O'Brien, the fast half-back of the Minnesota football team, also crack hurdler and sprinter, will leave Minnesota's medical school for that of the University of Wisconsin. He will complete his medical course there.

It is understood that he takes this course "on account of the superiority of the Wisconsin medical school."

The instance will recall the case of Carter, the big man from Maine, who, says S. C. Jones, "came to Michigan from Maine on account of the superiority of the Michigan law school."

"SIOUX" JONES

S. C. Jones, the captain of the normal football team who was picked as halfback on the Illinois College state team for 1902, will also attend Wisconsin next fall. Captain Jones better known as "Sioux" Jones, is a dashing, heady player who scored on Iowa by his strong line smashes and a long 60 yard run from a fumble.

GRINELL 15, IOWA 13

Iowa lost to Grinnell 15 to 13 in the basketball game at Close Hall Saturday afternoon.

Iowa's poor throwing for baskets both from the field and from fouls was responsible for the defeat. Throughout the game, the play was principally confined to Grinnell's territory. The Iowa forwards were able to try plentifully at the baskets but scored baskets once in five or six trials. Grinnell had few opportunities compared with Iowa, but when she did get chances, they usually counted baskets. In the matter of throwing from fouls Iowa lost materially, scoring but one goal. Grinnell threw five goals from fouls. Iowa threw six field goals, Grinnell four.

The score at the end of first half stood 7 to 7. At the call of time it stood 13 to 13. On the play off, Grinnell threw the first goal, the basket being made by Wilson, Schenck's opponent.

INDOOR MEET IN MARCH

GOOD SCHEDULE OF EVENTS MADE

March Twenty-first the Date—Many Men Using Gymnasium—Some Irregular in Attendance.

The proposed indoor meet is an assured fact and will be held in the temporary gymnasium on the evening of Saturday, March 21st.

This announcement will be gladly received by the mass of the students who will welcome an opportunity to see what the track men are doing and can do in a contest. The date selected is a fortunate one and everything points to a most successful and interesting meet.

While the program of events is subject to change, it is the present intention to have it consist of a twenty-five yard run, 300 yard run, 600 yard run, 1,000 yard run, 16-lb shot put, running high jump, pole vault and two relay races. In the relay races the sophomores will be matched against the freshmen and a team from the college of liberal arts will run against one from the professional colleges.

Entries should be made to Capt. Anderson at any time till within three days before the meet.

There were thirty-five men at work in the gymnasium Saturday afternoon in spite of the fact that many attended the basketball game. There have been altogether eighty men at work in the gymnasium, though some are not regular in attendance. Prof. Eastman, Mr. Bush and Captain Anderson continue to devote their time to the squad and already see improvement in many of the men.

FOR CO-OPERATION

COLLEGE AND HIGH SCHOOL WORK TOGETHER

State University the Clearing House for the Work—All Reports Sent Here

At the secondary school's committee meeting which was held Friday beginning at 10 o'clock the official sanction of the committee was given to the regulation that reports from all standard colleges in Iowa should be made to the University Examiner of the students coming from high schools and failing in English. The present University Examiner is H. C. Dorcas.

It was also voted that reports should be made from every standard Iowa college of students failing in their college work, together with the high schools from which they came. The High School Inspector was named as the central authority to whom these reports should be made, and who should pass the results to the colleges. The present High School Inspector is Professor J. F. Brown.

The scope of these motions is to bring all the colleges of the state into co-operation and to aid the high schools, by showing them by the work their students do in the colleges, where their courses are weak. The selection of the University examiner and high school inspector to receive the reports on this matter, virtually makes the University a clearing house through which all this business will be transacted.

Saturday representatives from high schools and normals met with the secondary schools committee. At this meeting there was a general discussion of the matter of entrance requirements including the entrance examinations in English and the case of those graduates of accredited high schools who do not decide to go to college till late in their high school course. It was decided that the latter should be received into college with conditions in the subjects which they had passed by.

After the meeting had adjourned the members repaired for luncheon to the Burkley Imperial after which the following toasts were given: Prof. J. H. T. Main, Grinnell, "Co-operation;" Prof. Wirtz, Parsons, "The College;" Prof. Kinney of Woodbine Normal, "Secondary Schools;" Dean Currier, the "University Servus servorum;" Miss Abbie Abbott, Cedar Rapids high school, "The School Woman and Man."

Carnegie Institute has granted \$10,000 to the University of Chicago for research work, \$6,000 goes to the department of geology and \$4,000 to Yerkes observatory. The University has also received a gift from Sir William Van Horne of Canada consisting of a collection of carboniferous fish remains and limestone formations. The collection is valued at \$25,000.

TEN MEN IN CONTEST THIS YEAR

Judges on Thought and Composition—Small Number of Contestants as Compared With Other Years

Saturday was the last day for filing orations for the home oratorical contest with Pres. J. W. Fish of the Oratorical league.

There were ten men who hand in their printed productions. These will be submitted at once to the judges on thought and composition who are: Judge H. E. Deemer, of Red Oak, Rev. C. E. Moore of Davenport and Judge S. F. Prouty of Des Moines. The decision of these judges will be given out in two weeks and the names of the six men who will contest in the final will be announced then but the standing of the contestants will not be published till the decision in the delivery contest is also arrived at. The final contest will be held on Tuesday evening, March 17, at the opera house.

Pres. Fish stated that the number of contestants this year while one more than last year was somewhat below the average, the records showing that in '99 there were thirteen contestants, in 1900, sixteen and in '01, fifteen.

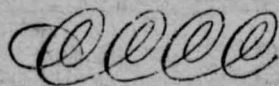
