M. MABILLEAU COMING

LA CERCLE FRANCAISE SECURES NOTED FRENCHMAN

Our Relations With France Socially, Historically, and Literary will be the Theme

Under the auspices of La Cercle Francaise M. Leopold Mabileau of Paris will lecture at the University of Iowa on the evening of May 7. The general theme of the lecture will be treated from a historical, social, and literary standpoint. The lecture will be the first one ever delivered at Iowa in the French language.

M. Mabileau, who is the official lecturer of the Alliance Francaise Federation, will have delivered a hundred lectures before universities and other institutions before his return to France. Among others, the most important are the Hyde lectures at Harvard, under the auspices of La Cercle Francaise. He will speak at all the leading universities, and in all the principal cities of the United States.

M. Leopold Mabileau is about fifty years old. He is a graduate of the Ecole Normale Superieur, upon leaving which he won a fellowship in the French School of Archaeology in Rome. He was called from there to the University of Toulouse, where for some years he was Professor of Philosophy. Subsequently he also taught at the University of Caen, the College de France, and the Conservatoire des Arts et Metiers.

M. Mabileau is now especially interested in social science, and has been for several years director of the Musee Social, founded by the late Count de Chambrun. He is also one of most brilliant contributors to the Revue de Paris and the Gazette des Beaux Arts, and is the author of many well known books on art, literature and especially on philosophy and moral and political sciences. Among the best known might be mentioned the exhaustive work on Cesare Cremonini, the Philosophy of the Italian Renaissance and the monograph on Victor Hugo in Hachette's Serie des Grands Ecrivains Francais.

M. Mabileau is one of the greatest economists of contemporaneous France and few men in his country combine his exactness and solidity with his eloquence and brilliancy.

Walter Camp on "Betting"

Betting as a feature of college life was condoned by Walter Camp of Yale at the annual dinner of the Yale Club in Chicago. Gambling among the students, he asserted, was not so much the result of excitement over football games as it was the effect of example set by men of the business world. "When they want the dangers eliminated from football," he continued, "we, perhaps, might amend the rules so that the boys might not be hurt, but it is doubtful whether the boys would get so much out of the sport. You cannot eliminate danger from the life of a boy from the time he gets his first knife or falls out of a cherry tree until he gets to playing golf."

LAW IN LANGUAGE

THERE IS A WELL DEFINED LINGUISTIC LAW

Dr. Eastman Proves That Language Has Definite Laws and Is not Made by Grammarians

Dr. Clarence Willis Eastman, who spoke last night upon the "The Law in Language" said, "phonetic change is the most noticeable feature in a study of language. The main cause of this phonetic change is indolence. This is seen in the silent letter in such a word as KNIGHT. The K formerly being sounded.

The laws of linguistic science are no more made than the laws of the natural sciences. They are discovered. The exceptions to the law are growing fewer, and newer and truer laws are being discovered. Many of the so called exceptions as in the case of plurals, are now found to be the relics of older inflections, that followed definite laws. Besides the changes of the present are few and have not been radical. This has been the result of the wide spread increase of reading among the masses. The modern novel has been a great agent in founding correct grammatical forms.

"The reason, that advocates of phonetics have not generally succeeded, is because they have asked too much. Their changes have been too radical.

"The function of the lexicographer and grammarian is to record not to dictate. They must follow the usage of the majority of the best writers; and must deduce their laws from the language as they find it. Purists have always objected to the introduction of new words. Pottenham in 1889 objected to AUDACIOUS; Johnson opposed the use of CLUMSY and Swift would not sanction MOB. But purists cannot overcome the fact, that language is the tool of those, who use it.

"The two chief laws in language are Grimm's, formulated in 1820 and Verner's, which in 1877 explained many of the exceptions to the former.

"Identity in sound, even when accompanied by some similarity in meaning does not prove an identity of origin. This however accounts for the popular etymology of many words. So some attempts, to explain the origin of words by those unfamiliar with the laws of language, are not always successful."

TO PREVENT FOOTBALL

Illinois Legislature To Make Game Unlawful

Representative Underwood yesterday introduced a bill into the state Legislature to prohibit the game of football in the state. The bill fixes the punishment at a fine of from \$10 to \$100, for each offense. According to the terms of the bill it shall be unlawful for any person to engage in the game and unlawful for any person in charge, wholly or in part of any of the state's institutions, universities, normal schools or reform schools or other institutions supported in whole or in part by the state to permit, encourage or to allow pupils, students or inmates of such institutions to engage in the game.

The Wisconsin legislature is also drafting an anti-football law.

RHODES' SCHOLARSHIP

Iowa to Have One Next Year—President Angell's Opinion

It is probable that Iowa will receive one of the Cecil Rhodes' scholarships next year. The next year there will be another and the third year none. Then two will go every third year. This will establish an American colony at Oxford. President Angell has questioned the wisdom of the Rhodes' bequest. Owing to the fact that none of the sciences are taught at Oxford, Mr. Angell thought that it would be a great deal better if the terms be revised to permit the attendance of English students at American institutions.

The typhoid at Cornell, (Ithaca,) is not yet under control. A number of town people and nine students have already died.

Through the influence of Congressman Haugen the war department has offered to establish a military post at Upper Iowa University. The offer will probably be accepted.

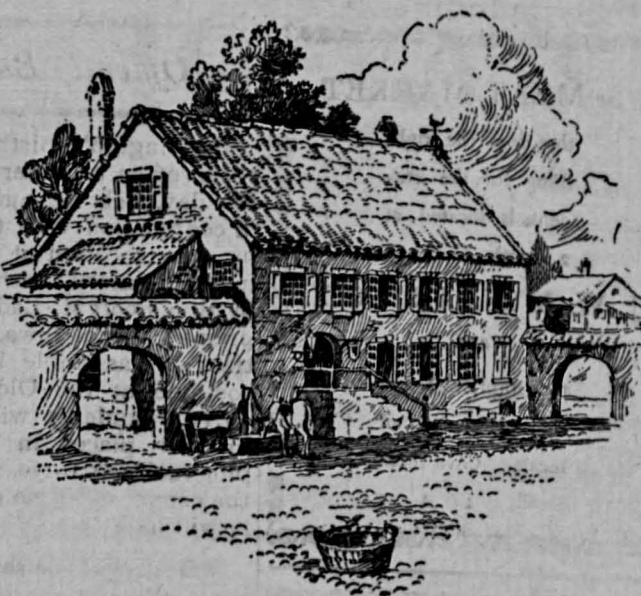

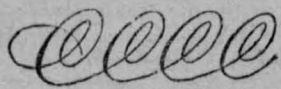

Scott M. Ladd of the Supreme Court of Iowa. The faculties will assemble in academic costume at the Old Capitol at 10:15. Students will please be in their places in the Armory punctually at 10:30. In view of the convocation, no other assembly will be held next week.

Members of the senior class and those intending to make application for appointment to fellowships or scholarships should give the matter immediate attention. The latest date at which such applications may be submitted, if action upon the same is desired at the April meeting of the Board of Regents, is Monday, March 2. If submitted later, final action cannot be taken before Commencement.

After Saturday, February 21, students who have not paid their tuition, and completed registration are not entitled to be in attendance upon classes.
