EXPERT WITNESSES AGREE

RECENT AUTHORITY INDICATES HAMLET'S INSANITY

Dr. Bierring and H. S. Porter, State's Experts, Fail to Rebut the Defense's Experts and Corroborate Them at Many Points

The value of expert testimony has been rehabilitated in the junior law court by the agreement of both state's and defendant's experts on the important points of their examinations on the question of Hamlet's sanity and insanity.

The state's expert witnesses failed to substantiate the state's case against Hamlet when placed upon the stand to rebut the evidence offered by the defendant's experts that Hamlet was insane.

In answer to the hypothetical question propounded by the state both Dr. W. L. Bierring and H. S. Porter, a senior medical student, answered that they did not think Hamlet's unsoundness of mind sufficiently proved by the facts stated. On cross-examination by Attorney Whiting, Dr. Bierring stated that he should want to examine the whole life of a man whose sanity or insanity he was trying to determine and that the fact of his having killed three people and boasted of his deeds would make him investigate very closely to see if insanity was not present in its subject.

Dr. Bierring further stated that he had noticed in melancholics a tendency to depreciate themselves to their most intimate friends, and that he would regard a subject's seeing and hearing things which were not as an indication of the disease of delusional melancholia. He also said that it was not impossible that a subject manifesting Hamlet's characteristics was afflicted with melancholia.

Being questioned as to the relative standing of medical works on mental nervous diseases, Dr. Bierring said that Berkley and Hamilton, which have been cited and read from by the defense throughout the expert evidence, were excellent authorities, none better in the English language. He further impeached the authority of medical works cited by the state as being discredited with the medical profession by reason of their age, recentness being an important feature in authorities on mental diseases.

MEDIC AGAINST LAW STUDENT

When R. S. Porter, a senior medical student went on the stand to support the state's position on Hamlet's sanity, it was medic against law on cross-examination. The law student in the case, S. D. Whiting of the defense, succeeded in bringing out the fact that Porter, if an authority on nervous and mental diseases, at least differed sadly with the leading psychological and medical authorities in the United States and Europe.

"Is a mental state a product of

the mind?" asked Whiting.

"What do you mean by mental state?" asked Porter.

"Answer my question," said Whiting.

"I should say it was," responded the medical student.

"Don't you know that Ladd and James both say it is not?" asked Whiting.

"No," said the witness.

"Ever heard of Ladd and James, or their works on Psychology?"

"No," said Porter.

Citations of Berkley on Mental Diseases were read to the witness after he had denied that the reasoning power would reassert itself in the melancholic in the second stage, and the witness then admitted that a person may reason in the second stage of melancholia. He had previously denied this, and had stated that he regarded reasoning as a symptom indicative of sanity.

The defense objected to the hypothetical question propounded by Attorney Cross for the state and succeeded in having a number of things struck out of it as not properly in evidence.

The arguments of attorneys began this afternoon, being limited to an hour for each side of the case.
