## VARSITY LOSES AGAIN

ROCK ISLAND 17, IOWA 3

In Fifth Game of the Series Iowa Loses Through Errors and Weak Batting

Rock Island won the fifth game of the practice series by a score of 17 to 3 on Iowa field, Friday afternoon. Several of the men were played in different positions than in the previous games and two new men were tried out, Bowers at second and Moffat at right field. Both played good games, being, however somewhat weak at the bat.

In the first inning Green and Doll both flew out to Bowers and Graham fell prey to Sutherland's curves. For Iowa Adams hit safe and stole second but got no further, as White, Moffat and Melzner were soon retired.

In the fatal second, after Grey had struck out and Rebsman reached first on an error by White, the professionals "found" Sutherland with five singles, three doubles and a home run, scoring eleven men, before Shier retired the side on a foul to Montgomery. Moss, Seerley and Sutherland reached first but could not score, Bowers going out to Green at short, Seerley was caught at second on Southerland's hit and Montgomery struck out.

In the third, Sutherland struck out Case and Doll, while, Green hit to Bowers and was thrown out at first. Adams, White and Moffat were unable to reach first, hitting to the infield only.

In the fourth, Graham scored on a hit and a stolen base, coming in on a fly caught by White. Melzner and Bowers reached first on errors but were both caught at third, Montgomery flying out to Rebsman.

In the fifth Shier, Case and Doll were thrown out at first by Bowers and Melzner. Seerley made the first score for Iowa on an error by Grey and a hit by White, but Southerland and Moffat both struck out. In the sixth Graham hit for two bases but was put out on a double in the next play. Adams and Seerley co-operating in a very pretty feature. Rebsman was hit by Sutherland, secured second and third on an over-throw by Montgomery and second on a hit. The next man was easy, retiring the side. Melzner hit safe but got off first too far and was thrown out in a double when Bowers sent a pop-up to Green. Moss hit safe but Montgomery was thrown out at first.

In the seventh the professionals ran in two scores on bunched hits, while Iowa went out in quick order. In the eighth Rock Island scored again. Iowa sent six men to bases but only one, Moss was able to score.

The ninth was a repetition of the eighth, each team scoring one man.

Miss Quaintance who has performed the duties of registrar for the past three years will take up work in the department of English as an assistant with special supervision of the theme readers. Dean Young will continue to perform the duties of dean of women in connection with her new position which will in fact give her opportunity for a wider acquaintance with the students. The courses in the department of English given by Assistant Professor Young, viz., Bible Study, Milton, Tennyson and Teachers, course, will in all probability not be offered next semester.

The baseball team leaves Monday morning at 6:10 on a four days trip in northern Iowa.

The first game is with Luther College at Decorah on Monday afternoon. Upper Iowa at Fayette which will be a hard game, follows Thursday. The next day, Wednesday, the teachers at Cedar Falls will be given a chance at Johnnie Vos' twirlers. After the game at Fayette the team returns to play Drake for the second time in the same week, this time on Iowa field.

The team is confident of winning a good percentage of these games, Captain Vos expressing it as his opinion that we would take three at least and hoped for all of them.

## GREAT SOCIAL SUCCESS

JUNIOR PROM ARRANGEMENTS ELABORATE

Annual Function of the Junior Class Given at the Armory Last Night—Out-of-Town Guests

The eighth annual junior promenade was held last evening at the armory.

The programs, decorations and music all shared in exciting the admiration and praise of the pleased guests. The programs were embossed with the university seal on the first leaf and on the back with the class numerals. The names of the committee appearing thereon were J. G. Berryhill, Jr., E. B. Crane, W. F. Hellberg, H. D. Willis, W. M. Ball, H. L. Dye, R. H. Edgerton, and H. G. Walker, and to them the credit of the successful affair is due. The patronesses were: Mrs. George E. The armory was arranged with the music in the north gallery making the stage into a pretty bower and the steps leading up to it an amphitheater where the dancers gracefully grouped themselves during intermissions. The color scheme was green and white, the green being draped around the sides, above the gallery, on the gallery rail and gathered in converging strands at the center of the ceiling. The hall was illuminated with two hundred incandescent lights, pendant from wires falling from a large letter I overhead to the four sides and arranged around the central arch on the stage.

The program consisting of twenty-four carefully selected numbers and four extras was delightfully rendered and was brought to a close an hour earlier than at many armory functions. This innovation met with general favor.

Evidences of Virility

The number and character of new and advanced courses offered in the various departments of the college of liberal arts for next year show that those in charge of the work there are living, thinking, growing scholars fully abreast of progress in their several lines of knowledge. In some cases, more might be said, they are pioneers along lines of scientific discovery and in developing and leading human thought. A college course must of necessity follow at a great distance the advanced thinkers and investigators of new hypotheses. A theory must be proved and tested beyond reasonable doubt of its complete verity before it attains that dignity which deserves a place in a college curriculum or more than a passing mention in a lecture. The announcement of a new course in any line often comes after years spent in investigation. At the same time it is true that in many instances an equal

amount of deepest thought and labor never gives such results as can form the subject of collegiate lectures at all. Attention is called to these courses merely as one evidence of virility and progress, not as the only indication of it. Often as much learning can be put into an old course by way of addition and improvement as if it is announced as a new one; indeed there are few courses of lectures on subjects so exhausted, that they do not receive frequent revision, annotations and additions.

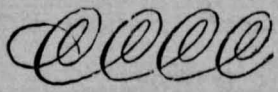

THE LOWDEN PRIZE

An examination for the Lowden Mathematical prize will be held on Saturday, May 30th, 1903, from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m., in room 116, hall of Liberal arts.

The prize of fifty dollars (\$50.00) may be divided equally between not more than two candidates, or may be withheld if it shall appear that the work of no candidate is of a superior order of merit. The subjects to be covered by the examination are Algebra, Geometry, Plane Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry of two dimensions, Differential and Integral Calculus.
