HONOR TO MILE RELAY TEAM

WIN IN HARD RACE

Swift Again Breaks Record—Drake 40
Iowa 31 Grinnell 24 Ames 20 State
Normal 7

Iowa's mile relay team, Young, Briggs, Miller, and Crossan ran the best race at the state meet yesterday. Young ran a beautiful initial quarter, giving the tag to Briggs twenty feet to the good. Briggs finished strong on his four-forty getting Miller off well ahead. The pace on the third quarter was so hot that when Miller got to Crossan who ran the last relay for Iowa, Evans, of Grinnell, was six feet ahead and in his stride. Crossan filled up the gap and pulled ahead. Barnes the fleet quarter-miler from Drake pulled away from the bunch after him. He gained on Crossan till he was at his elbow but was unable to pass him. Down the stretch they came almost abreast for the last fifty yards, neither able to gain and Crossan broke the tape no more than two feet ahead.

In the high jump Parsons was able to make the best jump he has done this year clearing the bar at five feet seven and $\frac{3}{4}$ in. Barker tied him at this height. Swift's performance in the discus throw was the best work of the day, he throwing it within two feet of the world's record. Weinrich was able to vault over 10 ft. 5 in. winning second place against the great Chapman who did but an inch more. Crane's put of 38 ft. $7\frac{3}{4}$ in. won the shot put by one quarter of an inch. Iowa was disappointed in the running broad jump, Ross being unable to make his jump and Bair taking it at 12 ft. 11 in. In the half mile relay Iowa lost so much in the first relay that she could not pull up within winning distance.

In the fast 100-yd dash McCoy was able to take third place for Iowa, this together with the two hurdles and the mile relay being the only track events in which Iowa won points. The performance of Bair of Grinnell in the 100-yd. dash was phenomenal considering the heavy track and the fact that he was beaten here in 10 3-5. This great and consistent athlete won seventeen points for his college. It was the last time he can compete having completed his fourth year this year.

The final score was Drake 42, Iowa 31, Grinnell 24, Ames 20, State Normal 7. The track was slow and heavy. The outside of it was much better than the inside and the drawing for places had much to do some of the results. This was particularly true in the half-mile relay where McCoy had a very bad track.

THE TEAM'S COACHES

Highest praise for the excellent training they have given the varsity track team is due to S. H.

Bush, Dr. C. W. Eastman and C. H. Swift. Mr. Bush and Dr. Eastman have given the entire team an excellent spirit. Their work with the track men has been excellent, C. H. Swift did the same work, for the field men and to him is due great praise for his excellent coaching of Crane and McMahon.

FRESHMAN CONTEST

Contest Postponed Till Monday Night

The contest between the freshman representatives of the Irving and Zetagathian societies which was to have been held this evening in the liberal arts hall at 8:00 o'clock, has been postponed to next Monday evening. The change in date is caused by the absence of J. W. Crossan, one of the contestants, who has gone to Chicago with the track team to take part in the conference meet.

The contest will consist of a debate on the corporation question, two orations and two declamations. The men who will appear on the respective contests have been hard at work for some time and the result of this will be apparent Monday night in a hard fought battle.

The orators will precede the debate. J. W. Crossan of Irving speaking on John Brown and Healy of the Zetagathian society on Robert Emmett.

The question "Resolved that municipal corporations should acquire possession and control of the general public utilities at the legal termination of the present franchise," will be affirmed for Irving by G. J. McFadden and J. D. Lynch, and the negative will be upheld for the Zets by G. E. Breese and R. C. Quigley. McFadden and Breese will make the rebuttal speeches.

Declamations will be given by R. E. Jones for Irving and C. L. Brittel for Zetagathian the former giving "Spartacus to the Roman Gladiators" and the latter "Regulus to the Roman Senate."

Batteries; Iowa, Vos and Adams; Grinnell, Swalm and Marsh.

Brockman has been suffering from an injury to his leg muscle but it is stated that it is not this that is keeping him out of the meet, but the fact that he expects to go to Yale or Harvard next year where he can probably make the track team. Should he run Saturday he would be barred from this under the four-year rule. So Brockman will remain at home. That an athlete who is capable of winning for his alma mater should refuse to do so for such motives is inconceivable. For him to measure and calculate for that which will bring him the greatest personal glory and to forget all else in this, to forsake his university,

to forget what she has done for him, to refuse to win for her because, forsooth, he may be able to win more laurels elsewhere—Faugh! Such spirit is despicable! Where is loyalty, where is college spirit if it has come to this? We commiserate you Minnesota.

May it be a long distant day when Iowa shall be thus forsaken by those in whom she places her trust.

Parsons at state meet yesterday jumped higher than he ever did before. Such performances as his and that of the mile relay team whose race was an exhibition of sportsmanship seldom seen are what make college traditions.

Whoever got up the programs for state meet and had the poor taste to put the picture of one of the competing athletes on the front page must have had his judgment swayed by his loyalty.

Not to the winners alone belongs the glory but to every one who runs a good race out to the finish such as Schenck did yesterday in the half-mile and Anderson in the hurdles.

Swift has increased his discus throw two feet in the ten days since the Grinnell meet. According to this ratio in ten days more he should be able to beat the world's record.

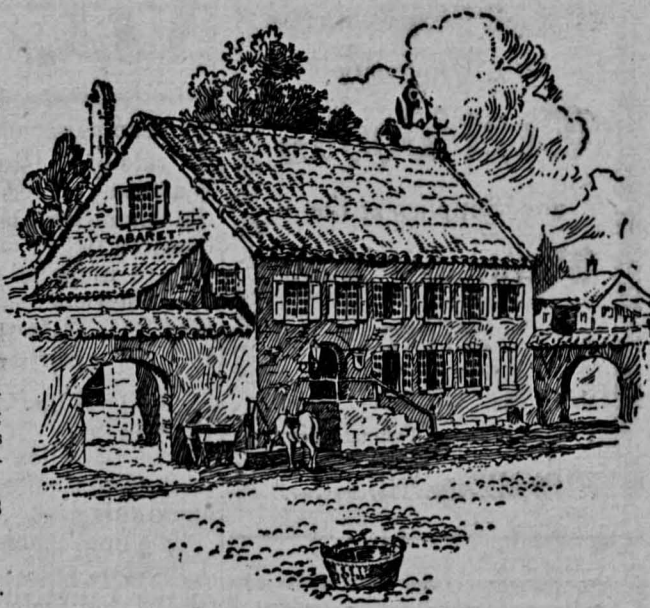

The conditions governing are: team of ten men; ten shots each off hand; two hundred yards; man target "A"; Springfield rifle with regulation trigger pull; no sighting shots or other preliminary firing on day of contests; match to be shot on home range and results, (original score sheet and bulletin) certified by commandant. Attention is called to paragraphs 436 & 535 in firing regulations for the U.S. army.

The competition is open to all members of the battalion and Commandant's medal will be awarded for one year to the man making the highest score. All cadets desiring to take part should report at once to Major H. E. Hadley, Inspector of rifle practice.

THE LOWDEN PRIZE

An examination for the Lowden Mathematical prize will be held on Saturday, May 30th, 1903, from 9:00 to 12:00 a. m., in room 116, hall of Liberal arts.

Competition is open to all students who are finishing with the current year, the sophomore work in pure mathematics. The prize of fifty dollars (\$50.00) may be divided equally between not more than two candidates, or may be withheld if it shall appear that the work of no candidate is of a superior order of merit. The subjects to be covered by the examination are Algebra, Geometry, Plane Trigonometry, Analytical Geometry of two dimensions, Differential and Integral Calculus.

The members of the committee charged with the award are Professors Weld, Veblen and Sims, ex officio, Mr. Lorenz and Mr. Mitchell. The questions submitted in previous examinations will be found upon the bulletin board in the mathematical library.

Those intending to compete are requested to submit their names to Professor Weld at an early date.
