HOAR AND ALLISON DOCTORS OF LAW

ADDRESS BY SENATOR HOAR

Over Three Hundred Graduates—Venerable Statesmen Pay Tribute to Each Other—Address on Patriotism

Commencement exercises of the colleges of the university were held this morning in the tent on the west campus.

At ten o'clock the gowned procession of the faculty entered the tent from between the long rows of graduates. After an overture by the orchestra and invocation by the Rev. Dwight W. Wylie. Hon. Wm. B. Allison was called upon to introduce the speaker of the day Senator George Frisbie Hoar.

Senator Hoar after laying a glowing and eloquent tribute at the feet of his senatorial colleague Senator Allison, spoke for an hour and a half to an audience eagerly listening for every word of the grand orator and statesman, from New England. His theme was American citizenship and patriotism.

President MacLean announced the awarding of prizes and honors as follows:

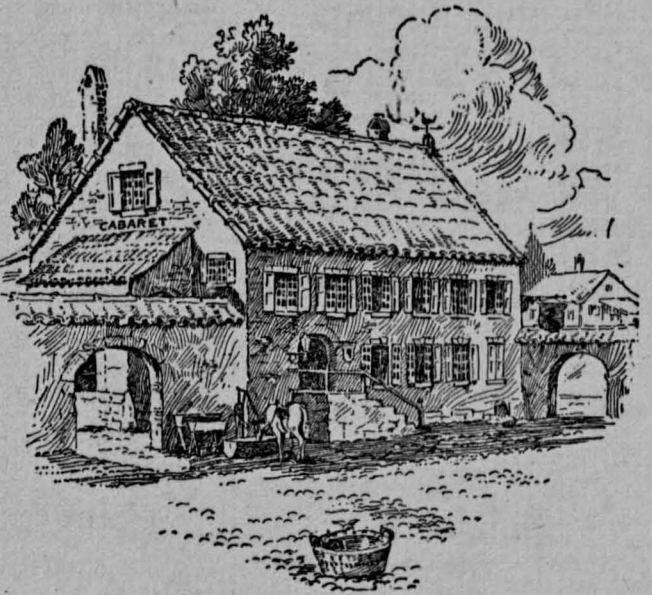
