## FINE GAME SATURDAY

### GRINNELL IS CONFIDENT OF WINNING

#### Making Great Preparations to Defeat Iowa Next Saturday by Good Score

Grinnell is confident. She hopes to achieve Iowa's defeat Saturday.

All fall, Grinnell men have been talking of the things they would do to Iowa. Minnesota's defeat of Iowa has given Grinnell greater confidence in her ability to beat the Iowa team, crippled and disorganized by their defeat.

Grinnell did not play Saturday, laying off a week to prepare for Iowa.

Laying aside the fact that Minnesota trained for the Iowa game and was in prime condition for the Hawkeye contest save for Schacht, her tackle, Grinnell's game with Minnesota three weeks ago looks much like Iowa's Saturday. Minnesota defeated Grinnell 39 to 0 in one twenty minute and one ten minute half. Minnesota defeated Iowa 75 to 0 in two thirty-five minute halves.

## University Rallies Round Team Believes it can Win Out

The team will pull together and win out the rest of its games. That is the sentiment about the campus this week.

The stage fright which overcame the players in the Minnesota game was an astonishing psychological case, but the team learned much from it. The men will work harder and will remember the game they are coached to play in the future.

As soon as it was generally understood that the team did not quit, that it played grittily, that the men came out of the contest having played to the limit, and some of them crying because they could play no better, there was a unanimous expression of confidence in the team and a resolve by everyone to support it to the finish for the rest of the season.

### WHAT THEY ALL SAY

The DAILY IOWAN has gathered the following interviews from prominent university and city people which express the sentiment in regard to the team:

### TEAM NEEDS SUPPORT

Coach Chalmers: "We have arrived at the stage where we need the support of every student in the University. When we win all our games, we don't need the support that we have to have now when we're losing some of our games. It's the duty of every man in the University to rally round the team and show the men that they are interested in them. As long as the team does its best, whatever the outcome may be, they are worthy of every student's heartiest support."

Assistant Coach Clyde Williams: "The team will do all right. Don't worry."

Manager Spangler: "The team will get together this week and win out. They won't have a second attack of stage fright I am sure. They were a green team when they went to Minneapolis, but I think they learned a good deal in the game. It will

take very hard work, however, and good strong support till the end of the season to retrieve our record."

President G. E. MacLean: "We had a team that was yet in the making when we went to Minnesota. That game will make the team better. The boys have the right stuff in them and their future games will show that it did them good to go against a ton or ton and a half team. We will have better work from now on."

### TEACHES GOOD LESSON

"Pink" Storey: "The game will be a good thing. It taught the men what kind of football to be prepared for and probably suggested to them that it would be well to keep what little football they do know in mind while playing a game. I haven't a doubt but that they'll improve."

Max Mayer: "The university and all people interested in athletics need to back the team now more than ever. I can't understand the Minnesota game but it makes no difference. I am just as loyal to the team as I was to the 1900 team. We've all got to be."

### A HEARTY SUPPORT

F. E. Fortner: "We're going to forget the past and start over. We'll support the team to a finish."

Miss Harriet Holt: "I didn't expect to see the team play as it did but every one who saw them admired their grit. I know we're going to support them to the end of the season."

Prof. I. A. Loos: "Of course we're going to back the team; we'll support them clear through the season."

R. G. Tobin: "The boys had some hard luck in the game last Saturday but I believe that they have ability. Every one should be loyal to their university team at the time they are even unsuccessful. Let every one say a good word for the boys. The Citizen will support the team through the season."

### Target Practice

The target practice this year is in charge of E. M. Turner, who has made a good record as a member of Company I. The practice thus far has begun at 100 yards, with one day spent at 200. The best record made at 200 yards was 41. The prospects are good for an excellent team. At present only the juniors are shooting.

#### Strong Competition for Every Place—New Men Stars Backed by Old Experts

With the entrance of so many stars and new men into the basketball field the problem of choosing a team has increased in complexity for trainer Rule. Every practice has demonstrated the ability of the new men in speed upon the floor, and throwing of goals. Captain Parsons remarked upon the number of good candidates for all positions. "In fact," he said "we are going to have the fastest basketball team Iowa has ever seen." The greatest fault observable in all practices at present is the lack of team work. However trainer Rule is gradually instilling the principle of "Help each other" into the minds of the players. Schenck one of last years splendid players is layed up by a sprain received at practice game. There is not a position on the team for which there will not be a struggle.

Captain Parsons will probably hold center. At guards Brock's place will be contested for by Newton, Des Moines star center and Neagus. Neagus is probably the fastest man on the floor but he should be a little heavier. At forwards Schenck, Kingsbury, another Des Moines man, Munger from the Cedar Rapids team and Royal will fight for places. Besides these there are a number of men who are showing up surprisingly well. Dwight Griffith will probably play after football season.

One thing, most commendable, in all the men is the steady consistent practice. Every noon you may find several passing the ball and throwing goals. A better trainer and coach could not be had than E. A. Rule. Secretary Fellingham of Marshalltown, who has seen many basketball trainers of the state in speaking of him said, "He is the most efficient basketball coach in Iowa. Last year Rule coached the Des Moines team when it won the state championship."

Manager Ross is trying to secure a game with Minnesota which will be played here. Probable games are with Kansas, Illinois, Grinnell, Des Moines, and Wilton.

There is one thing the basketball team, that is chosen to represent Iowa, needs as much as any other college team and that is recognition and support of the student body. When Minnesota comes down we want a large crowd and some enthusiastic rooting. In fact the same thing for all games.

This too in the face of the fact that everywhere more substantial prizes, and more of them are offered for oratory than for debate.
