## UNIVERSITY NEEDS

### LARGER SUPPORT FUND NECESSARY

Board of Regents in Report Sent to the Governor Yesterday Ask For Increase of \$70,000

In their report which was sent to the governor yesterday, the board of regents stated that if our present income of less than \$240,000 were increased \$100,000 it would place the university with economical management on an advanced standing. This increase the board cannot hope to have at the present time but it ought to be increased \$50,000. With such an increase the university can provide for the hundreds of young men and women of the state who are annually seeking the best university training, and should find it within the state. Without it they will flock over the boarders where better accommodations are to be found. These schools will continue to rob us of teachers and students as they have done in the past.

A careful and conservative estimate of the university's needs is an additional income of \$70,000. There is required for general support \$50,000, for library \$10,000, for repairs \$5,000, for university extension \$5,000, and three special appropriations, of \$150,000 for fire loss and completion of medical buildings, \$50,000 for land and \$10,000 for walks and paving. All of these are necessary at once. The university should have and the state can well afford to give these in full. A creditable and really modern university costs money. Iowa can have and maintain such an institution only by providing adequate means of support. There is no question of the desirability of having such a university, nor of the state's ability to provide it, and the board urges that suitable provision be made to satisfy the wants of the institution.

### UNIVERSITY'S PROGRESS

The president's biennial report shows a steady growth and progress in all departments. This progress the regents will provide for if their requests are granted by the legislature.

The report shows a steady increase in the summer session since its beginning and has appealed to the leading school men of the state. The library school has opened a new avenue for public service in the proper conducting of libraries.

In addition to the previous sixty-two scientific expeditions of the university, we now have the fruits of Professor Nutting's deep-sea soundings in the Pacific, and of his study of the Hawaiian Islands. This coupled with the private work of other members of the science faculty has given a most valuable addition to our

natural history and museum collections.

The rise in the number of clinic cases to over 11,000 shows that we can not only afford abundant and proper clinical material for our medical and dental colleges, but that we are doing a valuable work in alleviating suffering and curing disease.

A continuation of the present era of improvement in campus and city will make what was always a picturesque spot one of the best cities in which a university could be located. Iowa City is free from the evils of the large city, with the exception of the saloons. To this latter an undue prominence has been given by the sins of a past generation. The large majority of the students are church members, and they are here in an environment of churches and citizens that is both healthful and helpful.

### EDUCATION CONFERENCE

Prof. F. E. Bolton and Dr. Brown to Represent Iowa

Prof. Bolton and Dr. Brown have been appointed to represent the University of Iowa at the National Conference on Education to be held at Northwestern University at Chicago Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week.

Prof. Bolton will have a paper on "The Scope and Function of High Schools," and Dr. Brown will have one on "The Accredited System."

### Drake's Fine Game

"Drake University played a fine game on Ferry field last Saturday," said Geo. Sueppel who has lately returned from Michigan.

"The Michigan rooters were a very much surprised lot when Drake held the score to 12-0 until within a few minutes of the end of the first half. Drake was so big and she played in such a determined manner that Michigan was given a good scare. In the second half Michigan's scoring ability improved and the totals began to climb up. The halves were twenty-five minutes, I believe.

"Drake was not expected to play such a good game because of her defeat by Iowa; but now Iowa stock stands higher at Michigan and the rooters understand that the Michigan team will have the game of its life at Minneapolis Saturday."

The political science club held their first meeting of the year, last night at the home of Prof. Loos. Dr. Ward Read a paper on the "Iowa Mound Builders."

The sixth Iowa State Conference of Charities and Correction will meet at Des Moines, November 10-12. Dr. Cady will read a paper on the importance of organized charity.

## BEST WORK IN WEEKS

### VARSITY PLAYED IMPROVED GAME YESTERDAY

Coach Chalmers Changed Schwin to Tackle and Buckley to Fullback

"The practice on Iowa field last night was the best that has been held for two weeks past. The defense presented by the varsity was very strong. The scrubs were unable to make any headway against it in six downs.

Changes in the varsity line-up may have had considerable to do with the marked improvement. Coach Chalmers took Shwin, the fast, shifty guard, and played him at right tackle. Fred Buckley was moved back to fullback, a position that he played for a year under Knife. Atkinson who has been playing a steadily improving game this year, played right guard. White was out for practice last night after a two weeks' absence on account of injury. He played right halfback. Knipe played left end and Bateman right end. Roy Buckley was at left tackle.

### JONES IN UNIFORM

Jones was out in uniform but did not line up. Adams, quarterback on Oregon two years ago, played quarterback on the third team. Durkee, one of last year's promising halfbacks, played right halfback on the scrubs.

Coulthard, Watters, Allen, Gibb and Magowan were not in the line-up yesterday, being given a rest in order to facilitate their complete recovery from bruises received in the Minnesota game. They, and Jones, the only player injured in the Grinnell game Saturday, will all be ready for the scrimmage tonight.

### READY FOR NEBRASKA

The Iowa team will present the best line-up of the year against Nebraska Saturday. The new men who came out last week and the old men who have recovered from injuries, make a bunch of material from which Coach Chalmers will be able to pick an abler team than the one which represented Iowa on Northrup field.

### Scrubs to Play Coe

The Iowa scrubs will play Coe College scrubs on Iowa field November 14, the day that Iowa plays at Columbia, Mo. This is the second game that has been scheduled for the scrubs, the first being the game with Independence high school October 31.

John Muir of Chicago is visiting Carrol Smith. Mr. Muir is on his way to the China Inland Mission.

Clarence Wassam, of the graduate college gave a very interesting address to Y.M.C.A. Sunday afternoon upon the Value of Meditation or Thinking.

## First Faculty Picture

There will soon be exhibited a picture which is of great interest to the students, both old and new, of Iowa. It brings back old memories to the alumni and revives the stories of the past. It was taken probably in 1861 at the stirring times prior to the civil war.

At that time the State Normal occupied a small building to the east of the University park. On this park the two hospitals and chemical laboratory have been built. It was affiliated with the University proper much as it is today.

The University occupied the old State House, the old South Hall ("the Zetagathian Hall we called it then") and the chapel which stood where the Science Building now stands.

There were no professional colleges then and the course would not have satisfied the present High School requirements.

## EXCURSION RATES

One and One-Third Fare or Less Can be Obtained October 31.

Rates of one and one-third fare for the round trip can be obtained on the Rock Island road within a radius of 75 miles of Iowa City for the game with Nebraska Saturday.

This is a special rate made so that every student can subscribe for the paper and thus support a very necessary part of the university.

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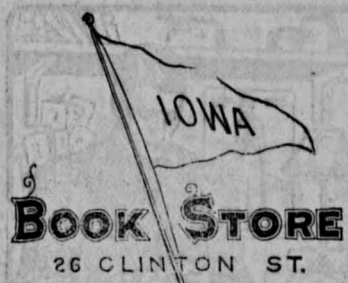
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**AMUSEMENTS**
