HAWKEYE PRIZES

ART AND LITERATURE TO BE WELL REWARDED

Rules and Regulations Made by the Board to Govern Contest in Art and Literature

The business management of the 1905 Hawkeye offers a number of prizes in the literary and art departments.

A prize of \$20.00 will be given for the best short story connected with student life. All stories should be submitted to the literary editor, Miss Waterbury.

Three prizes will be given for drawings. A prize of \$5.00 will be given for the best six drawings. Two of which shall be full page headings for any of the following colleges: liberal arts, medical, law, dental, pharmacy or for any student organizations, such as societies.

A second prize of \$3.00 will be given for the second best set of six drawings two of which shall be full page headings. A prize of \$2.00 will be given for the best set of six drawings of any size.

All drawings must be made upon white paper with black ink, and must be directly concerned with student life.

They should be at least twice the size of the finished plate, and the smaller drawings should be larger. All drawings should have as few fine lines as possible.

Full page drawings will be 7x10 or in the same proportion.

Other drawings can be of any size or shape and of any nature; heads, cartoons, comic, athletic, forensic, or society. Drawings should be addressed to M. B. Call, art editor.

The art editor will be in the office, Room 112 L. A. on Friday from 1:30 to 2:00 of each week and will be pleased to give any information or assistance that may be desired.

FIRST COMPETITIVE RUN

Cross Country Competition to be Held November 5.

The first competition run of the Cross Country Club will be held on Thursday November 5th, at 4:30 P. M. The run will start from the corner of Madison St., and Iowa ave., near the athletic park. The man who wins the race will receive twenty points. The man coming in second will receive nineteen points, and so on. Three individual cups are offered for the men making the largest total in the three competition runs. A cup is also offered to the Freshman making the largest total. But the cup which should bring out every man in the different classes, is the class cup, which is similar to the one won last year by '06, L. A.

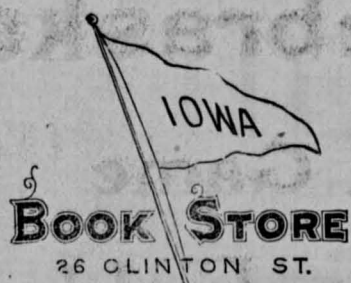

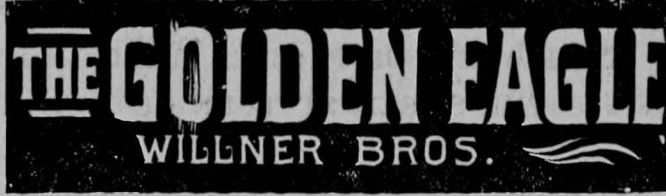
