### HOAGLAND SAYS IOWA IS PLAYING BETTER

#### Noted Western Referee Says Iowa is Playing Better Football Than Illinois

"Iowa played better football in the game with Nebraska than Illinois is playing" said Ralph Hoagland, the noted western referee, when talking over the Iowa-Nebraska game.

"Iowa played a good game of football and, granting equal progress by Iowa and Illinois for the three weeks intervening, I do not see why Iowa should not expect to defeat Illinois November 21.

#### WESTOVER CARED FOR BY IOWA

Capt. Westover, the assistant coach of Nebraska, who accompanied the Nebraska team to Iowa field was remembered by Iowans as the Nebraska player who was helped by Iowa after the Iowa-Nebraska game of 1898.

After Nebraska had been defeated 6-5, the Nebraska players and Coach Yost left the field without thinking of Westover who was lying on the side-lines with a badly wrenched knee. He was carried by Iowa players to their bus and taken to the hotel, where his knee was dressed. He was cared for until he was able to leave the hotel.

## The Filipino and Education

A letter from Daniel R. Perkins, class of 1900 who is now teacher of physics in the Insular Normal School, Manila, P. I., will be of interest to our readers as well as the public in general. Mr. Perkins was appointed a teacher at the opening of the educational work in the Philippines. In 1901 he was teacher at Zamboanga, Mindanao, P. I. During 1902 he was Deputy Division Superintendent of schools in charge of Zamboanga province. Since that date he has been teacher of physics at the Insular Normal School in Manila. He says—"The educational outlook in the Philippines is most hopeful at present. The interest in most parts in the public schools and in the study of English is unbounded. In the Insular Normal School at Manila we have more pupils than we can well manage, and more than two hundred have been refused entrance. It seems to me that the stock in the Taft administration is appreciating a little from a Philippine standpoint. I am convinced from residence in the extremes of the archipelago, and from living in Manila that the American government is an unbounded blessing to the Filipino people."

### ILLINOIS PRELIMINARY IN AUDITORIUM FRIDAY

#### Contestants for the Team to Debate Illinois Discuss Primary Election Law

The first of the four preliminaries scheduled on Iowa's program for this year will be held in the auditorium, Friday evening November 6, at 8:15.

This is the contest, preliminary to the Illinois debate and will be upon the question "Resolved that the General Assembly of Iowa adopt a state wide compulsory primary election law." The following interpretation has been placed upon the question. "The term, 'Primary Election Law' shall be construed to mean a law which provides a system whereby, all party nominations shall be made by secret ballot under state regulations."

The contestants in this debate are members of the Philomathean Society. The members of the team which debates with the University of Illinois at Champaign January 15, will be chosen from the six participants of this contest.

H. E. Dow '06, E. R. Jackson '04 and A. C. McLane '04 will appear for the affirmative and J. W. Meyer '05, C. E. Moffitt '04 and Paul Dorwieler '04 for the negative.

In-as-much as the expense of the inter-university debate, by the terms of the compact, will fall upon the University of Illinois this year, the Philos have decided to give free admission to the preliminary.

#### Regent's Meeting

At a meeting, of the Executive Committee of the Board of Regents Friday, in addition to disposing of the general routine business the following appointments were made; C. H. Swift, assistant in internal medicine; Dr. Harriman, battalion surgeon; Grace Helen Kent, scholar in philosophy, Elizabeth Sherwood and May Shuck scholars in English to succeed Sarah Quigly who resigned her fellowship.

A committee of the Iowa City Commercial Club consisting of Geo. Carson, Chas. Welch and W. P. Coast appeared before the regents to discuss the feasibility of building a dam below the city.

At a return match Saturday forenoon, the Country Club again defeated the Cedar Rapids Golf team 16 to 3.

## Exposition Athletics

A number of Athletic events have been arranged for St. Louis Exposition next year.

The Interscholastic meet for schools in the states included in the Louisiana Purchase is scheduled for May 28. The Olympic College championship open to the athletes of western colleges will be held on May 30. The Olympic track and field college championship open to colleges of the world, has been scheduled for June 11. The Olympic gymnastic college championship has been scheduled for June 9 and 10. Interscholastic basketball July 15 and 16. College basketball championship July 13 and 14.

The Olympic Games, the feature of the year, are scheduled for August 29, 30, 31, and September 1, 2 and 3. College Fencing will be held in September, College Relay championship and School Relay November 10 and 11.

There has been arranged an Olympic championship at Baseball in the spring of the year for colleges and schools. An Olympic Football championship will also be held in the fall of the year, one for colleges and one for the schools.

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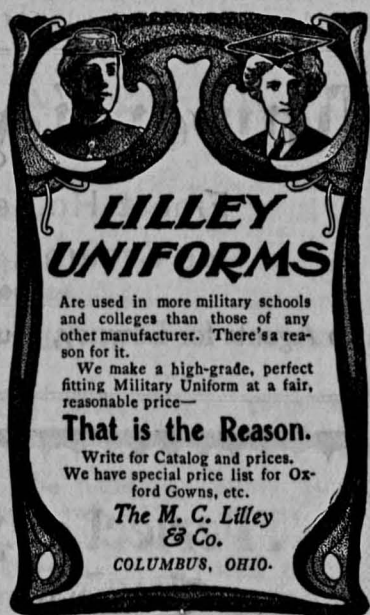

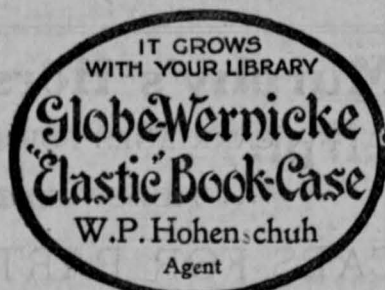
