The admission fee is nominal, being only, twenty-five cents for town people and ten cents for students. It is planned if possible, to have the concert take the place of the annual oyster supper, usually given in February. The program will be published later.

NEED ASSEMBLY HALL

SO SAYS JUDGE KINNE AT ASSEMBLY YESTERDAY

Never Can Have University Spirit Until We Have Meeting Place Large Enough for All

"The University should have an assembly hall capable of holding all her students," said Judge L. M. Kinne of the board of control yesterday in his address at assembly.

"I notice that this hall is full and that it can hold only a tenth of your students. You can not have the proper enthusiasm for a great university unless you have a place where all its students may come together with their president and instructors, any more than a father could rear a family of twelve children in a home built to hold three.

BOARD OF CONTROL WILL HELP

"The board of control, I pledge you, will do all in its power to help the State University of Iowa and to make it what it should be, ahead of the other universities of the western states in standing."

COWNIE WANTS ADVANCE

Hon. John Cownie, another member of the board of control, also spoke along the lines of the advance Iowa should make as a university.

"The state's charitable and penal institutions," said Mr. Cownie, "rank above those of other states. The State University should take a similiar ranking."

Extension Lectures

Prof. Nutting lectures at Clear Lake Friday evening on "The Evolution of the Human Body." On Saturday evening he will lecture at Garner, his subject being "On Board the Albatross."

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A Newspaper Matter

Although it is well known by all intimately connected with the university that, thus far, there has been unusual harmony between the members of the freshman and sophomore classes still reports continually get into circulation which may be anything but favorable to the university.

From the Kansas University Weekly we note the following.

"So intricate are the difficulties existing between the freshman and sophomores at the University of Iowa, the upper classmen are planning to organize a board of arbitration."

To reduce these probably unintentional injuries to the University we quote for the benefit of some university reporters the following from the weekly previously referred to:

"When a student reports university news for an outside paper, two duties devolve upon him which are in a measure contradictory. One duty is to the newspaper he represents, the other to his university. One concerns the interests of his paper, the other the interests of his alma mater. In the ordinary course of events these two duties do not interfere with each other, but at times there is a sharp and decided conflict.

"Occasionally things happen in the university which would make good news for an outside

paper but which if reported would injure the reputation of the university. At such times the student-reporter must decide which is more imperative—his duty to his paper or his duty to his university.

"Of course he must look out for the interests of his paper, for that is his business. But every student should always bear in mind that he is a part of his university and as such must do nothing which will injure her reputation. If he must report events which in any degree reflect discredit upon the university, he should confine himself to the plainest and simplest facts, carefully avoiding over-coloring or over statements; leave the public to draw its own unfavorable inferences if any are to be drawn. In this respect at least his duty to his university should always be first, [and at the same time he is fair toward all whose interests he represents."

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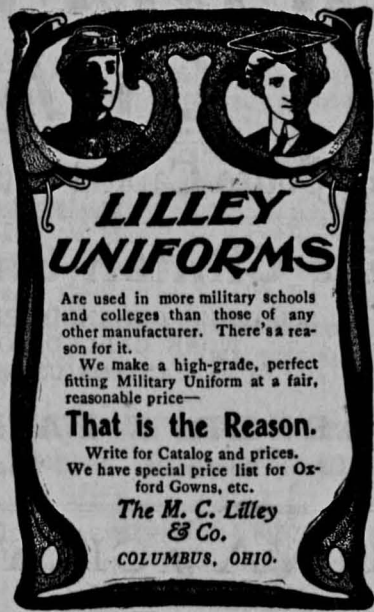
