EXCELLENT WORK DONE IN PRACTICE

GOOD PRACTICES BEING HELD IN SUCCESSION ON IOWA FIELD

Consistent Work Being Done by The Varsity—Poor Work At Illinois—Kansas Protests Nebraska Men

Excellent work is being done in practice on Iowa field this week. The Varsity is playing fine football every night. Heretofore the practices have varied from good to bad and indifferent, good practices not being held in succession.

Now the team is doing consistent good work.

Monday night saw some excellent playing. Tuesday evening the practice was the best that has been held on Iowa field this year. The play was fierce and exciting. Five of the varsity regulars were temporarily retired from the game because of hard bumps. None of them were injured and all were out for tonight's practice.

TEAM LEAVES TOMORROW.

The varsity leaves tomorrow afternoon at 4:53 for Columbia, Mo. It will travel in a private car. The route is to Grinnell over the Rock Island, then south over the Iowa Central and the Wabash.

POOR WORK AT ILLINOIS

This morning's Record-Herald contains the following dispatch from its Illinois correspondent:

URBANA, ILL., Nov. 10.—Illinois is in a bad way. To-night the varsity played high school ball, allowing the senior class team to score two touchdowns.

Those who saw the work to-night gave up whatever thin hope they had retained that the team could retrieve itself Saturday. The Minnesota game is not the only cause. Nebraska and Iowa are to be met and the games with these teams look like defeat.

NEBRASKANS PROTESTED

Telegrams from Lawrence, Kansas, state that Kansas has protested Bender, quarterback and Wilson, end, of the Nebraska team because of professionalism.

It is hoped that Nebraska will be able to show that Bender and Wilson are not professionals as Kansas charges.

COLLEGE LIFE OF WOMEN DISCUSSED

DEAN YOUNG RETURNS FROM CONFERENCE OF DEANS OF WOMEN

Favor Dormitories and Student Government but Disapprove Intercollegiate Athletic Contests for Women

Dean Alice Young has returned from the meeting of the Deans of Women recently held at Chicago and Evanston. The first day was at Chicago and two days were spent at Northwestern. Eighteen were present and ten states were represented. Miss Mary Evans of Carleton College was chosen president.

The discussions were all informal, and were embodied in a set of resolutions. Miss Young was chairman of the committee, which drew up the resolutions. These resolutions are of value as they represent the various interests of college women throughout the middle west, and they represent institutions so widely different in character. Unanimous agreement upon any of these subjects cannot be expected, and they are only a majority opinion.

The conference in their resolutions favored three kinds of homes for young women at college who are away from their own homes. These were in order: 1st. Dormitories, preferably small; 2nd. Cottages, belonging to and controlled by the institution. 3rd. Approved lodging and boarding houses belonging to private individuals.

In all matters concerning the conduct of student life, they approved the principle of student government so far as it is practicable.

Social life should be regulated they said. The test of good health and high scholarship should be applied in extreme cases of social dissipation. In the opinion of the conference, the public have exaggerated impressions in regard to the amount of social dissipation existing in co-educational institutions. The facts brought out in the reports of deans from such institutions point to the conclusion that the proportion of women students who give too much time to social affairs is very small.

Intercollegiate athletic contests for women were not approved by the conference.

The conference welcomed the assistance given by the Young Women's Christian Associations in their work with students.

Maligns Professor Patterson

A publication "Greater New York Government" sent out by Tammany maligns Mayor Low and other New York officials. William R. Patterson '95 formerly assistant professor of statistics and economics in the university comes in for a share of slander. Prof. Patterson is "Register of Statistics" in the tenement department under Robert W. DeForest and has been a leader in the fight for reform government. The university should be proud of the fact that she has a man who is so powerful in the fight for good government that the Tammany ring aims her guns at him. Prof. Patterson is now deposed by the victory of McClellan but the good work he has done will live and reassert itself hereafter.

LITERARY CHAT

One of the cleverest comedies of the day is Quincy Adams Sawyer. It is a dramatization of that charming novel of New England life, whose hero plays the title role. The true author is hidden under the nom-de-plume Charles F. Pidgin. The inspiration which brought it fourth was Lowell's poem "The Courtin." Quincy Adams Sawyer's only title was plain "Mr." His ancestors were tradesmen, merchants, lawyers, politicians and presidents, and he was proud of his honored ancestry. From

Boston culture he went to meet the Mason's Corner folks, and the village gossips wondered "who he was, what he came for, and how long he intended to stay."

The dialogue of the story has many a neat witty surprise. There is the philosopher, Uncle Ike Pettengill who has a tinge of Morrisism, but whose rugged character wins admiration. There is pathos in the blind Alice Pettengill, whom all must love. To the wit, philosophy and pathos is added a strong delineation of New England life and character. It is a story that one loves, like honey, for its sweetness.

The play, based upon this story has packed the theaters of the east. It will be presented by a strong company in this city early in December.

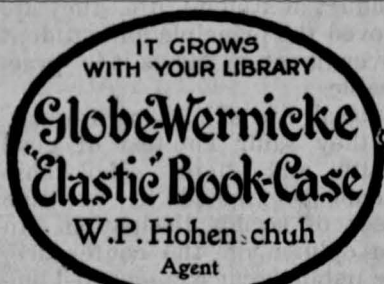
