ILLINOIS MUST BE DEFEATED

THE VARSITY LOAFED

UNSATISFACTORY FORM SHOWN AT COLUMBIA

Missouri Stood no Chance of Scoring—Tiger Defense Better in Second Half

Iowa played in unsatisfactory form against Missouri on Rollins Field Saturday.

Iowa 16, Missouri 0 was the score at the end of the first half and at the end of the game. Missouri played much the best game she has played this season. Iowa made the best showing against her of any of the state teams, Missouri having been defeated 12-0, by Simpson, 17-5 by Drake and 15-6 by Grinnell.

Missouri never stood a chance of scoring and gained first down only six times in the game. The Iowa offense loafed much of the time. Missouri's excellent defense, and two fumbles to Missouri by the Hawkeyes on Missouri's ten yard line kept Iowa from scoring in the second half. Griffith's attempts at drop kicks were unsuccessful.

Iowa's showing was disappointing to the Hawkeyes who have been looking for victory over Illinois next Saturday. Iowa utterly failed to have an offense equal to that which it has shown in practice. If it is to remain a matter of guesswork whether the Hawkeyes will play up to their practice form or way below it, the result of Iowa's game with Illinois will be one of those things that can never be foretold until they happen.

MINNESOTA 32, ILLINOIS 0

Minnesota defeated Illinois 32-0 on Illinois field Saturday. Coach Woodruff played many of his subs in the second half, saving the regulars for Iowa this coming Saturday.

AMES 11, SIMPSON 2

Simpson defeated by Iowa 35-2 a week ago, carried the ball over the Ames goal line Saturday for a touchdown. A fumble across the line gave Ames the ball for a safety. The weakness of the Ames defense shown in the Simpson game was expected by those who saw the Ames defense in the Grinnell-Ames game a week ago.

Ames and Drake will play in Des Moines Thanksgiving day for second honors in the state.

The lecture by Dr. Clark for tomorrow afternoon has been postponed to December 3. This has been occasioned by the death of Dr. Clark's brother.

The score was 6-4, 6-4, 7-5, 7-5.

BACK FROM OTTUMWA

Y. W. C. A. Delegates Return From Convention

The delegates from the Y. W. C. A. who have been attending the state convention returned yesterday, reporting an unusually successful convention. Among the speakers were, Miss Ben-Otil, a former missionary in Palestine, Miss Mary Hill, general secretary of the Madras, India, association, Dr. A. B. Storm, president of Ames College and Miss Frances Bridges, one of the national student secretaries. On their return the University of Iowa girls were entertained during a long wait at Oskaloosa by the Penn College girls, who extended to them the hospitality of the college.

Snappy Practice

The practice last night was faster and more promising than it has been for a long time. The plays went off faster and the defense was much better. The varsity carried the ball in something like the old style and on defense the fellows got into the play with the right spirit.

The weather was very cold and the practice was held on the old sod field as the regular field was too hard.

A few changes were made in the varsity lineup: Roy Buckley was shifted from tackle to right end and the guard, Schwinn played his place. Stoltenberg played left end, Coulthard and Waters were not out. In spite of this shifting the team played together in good shape and the scrubs could do nothing with them. If the team will play this same way all the week we may look forward to the Illinois game with more confidence.

Clyde Williams is back from Illinois where he referred the Minnesota-Illinois game. He says Illinois has a good team and played a good game but they were simply outclassed by Minnesota.

THE GRADUATE CLUB

ENTERTAINED AT HOME OF DEAN AND MRS. WELD

Addresses Made by Dean Weld, Prof. Wilcox, Pres. MacLean and Prof. Foster

The Graduate Club was entertained at the home of Dean and Mrs. Weld last Saturday evening. It was the annual open meeting of the club given the new members of the graduate college.

Dean Weld, in speaking of the objects of the Graduate Club, said "I believe it is a necessary organization. In the large universities of the east they are a strong organization. To make the club of the most value we must keep in touch with the National Federation of Graduate Clubs. To do this it is necessary to send a delegate to their meetings. We failed to do this last year and as a consequence lost touch with them."

Prof. W. C. Wilcox, a member of the executive council of the graduate college, said that there were two types of graduate students. The one specialized in a line in which no one was interested, the others have left a practical work behind them.

President MacLean then spoke of the work of the graduate college in general. "In spite of preceding opposition," he said, "no graduate college has ever had the wisdom of its organization doubted afterwards. If you wish your graduate college to grow, place the matter clearly before your legislator and ask his support."

Prof. T. Gregory Foster of University College London said, "the graduate work of the English universities is hard to compare with that of the American as they are founded on different lines. We, outside of Oxford, hope for much good from the Cecil Rhodes scholarship, from the contact of American and English ideas. Our universities are at present in a period of change and will probably be modeled along the newest ideas. Up to the last two years the University of London was but little more than an examining board."

After the program light refreshments were served. Several new members were admitted to the club, which now has seventy members.

Edward Yates, L. '03, is visiting the university today.

The executive committee of the Iowa Anthropological Association held a meeting last night preliminary to the general meeting in January at which the policy and purpose of the Association will be outlined.
