### IOWA'S BIG GAME

#### ILLINOIS MUST BE DEFEATED

Game Tomorrow Will Decide Standing of the Iowa and Illini Teams

Tomorrow will be the great game for Iowa. It will be the Derby day for Iowa football this year. The last game on the home grounds and the greatest of the year.

The game with Illinois tomorrow will practically decide the standing of the two teams for the year. If Iowa wins it will set her position for the year considerable above what it was last year.

Iowa can win the game. All she has to do is fight from start to finish. At least that is the opinion of those who have seen both teams play. Both teams have been badly defeated by Minnesota. Iowa's defeat however, came from a green inexperienced team early in the season. Illinois last Saturday reached the foot of the column after a series of slumps. The teams are evenly matched as to weight with perhaps a slight advantage in this regard in favor of Illinois. Iowa on the other hand has shown the better team work at times. All in all the game will be anybody's until time is up. Both teams will fight.

The game is attracting wide attention among alumni and many will be here tomorrow to see the game. A special train will bring five hundred people from Davenport.

Manager Spangler expects a record-breaking crowd. On account of the cold weather for the past few days large bon-fires had been arranged near the bleachers but, with the let-up today and with the weather-men's declaration to turn on a warm sun tomorrow, the time of having the large fires has been changed until after the game.

The high school game will be called at 1:30 and the big game at 2:30. The seats are on sale at Wieneke's. Reports on sale at tickets from Davenport indicate a large sale.

The trophy which the Columbia University of New York will probably send on to St. Louis to be exhibited in the Trophy Room of the Physical Culture Department during the Exposition, will be the old Henley shell, a four oared boat about fifty feet in length. The Henley shell is the only boat which as propelled by American oarsmen won at Henley. The Columbia crew of 1878 rowed in it and captured the Visitor's Cup.

### MAC IS PRESIDENT

#### ILLINOIS MUST BE DEFEATED

Earle MacGowan is Presiding Officer of the Freshman Law Class

### Sarah F. Loughridge

A teacher, of twenty years of service in the department of Latin at the university, Miss Sarah G. Loughridge, died this morning at her home on North Capitol Street.

Miss Loughridge served from 1872 to 1873 in the so-called Normal department. Then from 1874 to 1888 she taught in the university proper. Then after a vacation of two years, she taught until 1895. Since that time she has lived at her home in this city.

Miss Loughridge was a leading member of the Nineteenth Century Club, and has always been associated with movements for progress. As a teacher she was able and efficient.

### TURNER WINS SHOOT

#### ILLINOIS MUST BE DEFEATED

E. M. Turner Wins Commandant's Medal by Score of Forty-two Points

The competitive Battalion shoot was pulled off yesterday afternoon under the supervision of Major E. M. Turner on the University Range up the river. The target was the regulation elliptical target with a bull's eye 8 inches wide and 10 inches high. Each man was allowed 10 shots off hand at 200 yds. 50 points being the highest possible score.

The competition was much fiercer this year than last. The entire number of contestants being 16 while last year the Col. Burnett medal was won by a score of 89 from a small field.

Col. Burnett is very well satisfied with the score made as it compares favorably with many scores made on ranges throughout the country. The scores were not as high as the average work for the season. The cold weather made the day unfavorable for the best work.

Great interest has been taken in the target work this fall and the men have shown a steady improvement in their work. During the remainder of the season, position and aiming drills will be given in the armory, and if the weather will permit instruction at the range in long range shooting in the kneeling, sitting and prone positions.

There is some talk among the University marksmen of selecting a team to compete with the militia and rifle club teams at the state range next summer.

#### ILLINOIS MUST BE DEFEATED

Prof. H. G. Plum Finds Many Iowa Co-eds Teaching in Iowa High Schools

"Teaching in high schools is the profession taken up by a great many Iowa co-eds on graduation," said Professor Harry G. Plum today.

"In my recent trip to Sioux City, LeMars, Cherokee, Storm Lake and Ft. Dodge, I met a large number of university girls who are teaching in those high schools. They are all succeeding well and are receiving regular advances in salary, besides a constantly increasing regard and esteem from the parents whom they serve which makes the best reward of teaching.

"The University girl finds that she is finely equipped for high school teaching, just as the State Normal School graduate finds that she is excellently fitted for teaching in the grades.

"My especial task on the recent trip was to inspect the work being done in history.

"I found good work being done in all the high schools I visited.

"The Sioux City high school is doing especially good work in history. It is well prepared for the work and is obtaining good results."

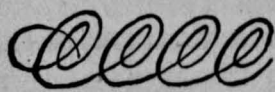
