TRIAL NOW ON CROWLEY VS. STYNE NOW BEING TRIED

The Affection of Becky Sharpe Has Been Alienated Says Lord Crowley

The Junior Practice Court of the College of Law opened yesterday with Judge Deemer in charge. E. P. Malmberg is sheriff and A. E. Miller, clerk. The first case on the docket was that of Sir Rowdon Crowley vs. Lord Styne. The cause for action was the alienation of the affections of Becky Sharp Crowley.

The plaintiff was represented by C. Knox, A. J. Swindle and Geo. Remley. The attorneys for the defense were C. F. Dickson, W. McNett and J. Lamprecht. It is agreed that no one impersonates the parties.

After exhausting peremptory challenges a jury consisting of J. E. McLaughlin, D. W. Rich, H. M. Algyer, Geo. C. Gorman, J. A. Hampson, C. F. Maenell, Guy Cox, F. E. Wray, N. W. Jones, R. R. Ramsell, J. S. Smith and L. G. Johnson were empanelled.

C. E. B. Miller, W. L. Baughn and T. F. Roche failed to appear as jurors and were cited for contempt of court.

Remley, opened the plaintiffs case but before he could finish court was adjourned until 11:00 o'clock today.

Attorney Remley finished the statement of the plaintiffs' case which was interrupted by adjournment yesterday. Attorney Dixon outlined the defendant's case and, then plaintiff called their first witness, G. G. Garretson.

Garretson, who was butler in the Crowley family, is the chief witness, and his testimony if unshaken will doubtless win the case. He had known Crowley in the guards and after leaving the service. Captain Crowley offered him the position in his household. Where he had been for ten years.

The witness testified that up to the time of the advent of Lord Styne, he had never heard a cross word pass between Lord and Lady Crowley. To him their married life seemed ideal.

The witness told of the many card and wine parties at the Crowley home. Crowley always applied himself closely to the game. Lord Styne seldom played but spent the time in talking, or singing with Lady Crowley. "The wines for these parties," he said came from the cellars of Lord Styne. In fact we had orders to go there for them.

The butler said, that when Lady Crowley was presented at court, her splendid diamonds, which attracted so much attention, were given her by Lord Styne, but that she told her husband she had rented them.

Attorney Lamprecht objected

to one of the questions put the witness, as he, Lamprecht didn't "know what he was talking about. Wait awhile and you will find out" retorted attorney Knox.

Before the witness finished his testimony court adjourned.

Dr. Erwin Schenk of Des Moines, Agnes E. Otto of Iowa City, L. D. Weld of Cedar Rapids, R. M. Arey of Muscatine, President Seerley of the State Normal and F. C. Ensign are members of our alumni whose names appear on the program.

Questions Submitted

The questions for Minnesota and Wisconsin preliminaries have been submitted but in the latter the sides have not yet been announced.

In the Minnesota preliminary the question "Resolved, that the United States should at once abandon her protective policy" will be supported affirmatively by Irving and denied by Zeta-gathian.

"Resolved, that the present statutes relative to the exclusion of the Chinese should not be re-enacted," will be discussed in the Wisconsin preliminary. Zeta-gathian submitted the question and Irving has the choice of sides.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY NOT A PART OF THE UNIVERSITY

Many Valuable Documents Re- lating to Iowa History in Collection

The State Historical Society is a distinct state institution whose organization has no connection with the university. For some time its location was not in a university building. The present quarters were furnished by the board of regents that its library and museum might be more accessible to the students and the public.

Though the society was organized in 1857 its present aggressive policy was not begun until its removal to the liberal arts building in 1901. Even now its lack of room prevents it from making the best arrangement and display of its material. During its existence this institution has gathered material pertaining to the development of Iowa and the Middle West until it has a collection of over twenty-eight thousand volumes. Its library includes all the documents of Iowa and the publications of all important similar organizations in the country. This material has been secured by gift, by purchase and by exchange.

Many valuable and rare books have been generously donated by patriotic citizens. The state has at various times made appropriations which have been used for the purchase of books and the publication of periodicals and other material. The state also furnishes the society twenty copies of the state publications to exchange with other similar organizations.

The library is especially rich in files of newspapers that are of great historical value for much of the early history of Iowa can only be obtained from such sources. These files now number over five hundred and are constantly being supplemented by the more important papers from every section of the state.

Until a few years ago the work of the society consisted in gathering a chaotic mass of historically valuable material. Now this is being definitely arranged, classified and made accessible. At present the society publishes not only the periodicals which are of high rank but also documentary and miscellaneous material pertaining to our commonwealth. In some of these publications as "The Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa" this organization takes the initiative as no corresponding work of any other state has yet been published.

On account of lack of room for exhibition of relics typifying Indian and pioneer days the museum has not been given so much attention though the society pos-

sesses many rare and interesting articles. It is planned to secure a more scientific museum as soon as the funds and room of the society warrant such an undertaking.

Gladstone in College

Dean Gregory gave the address at assembly this morning speaking on William E. Gladstone as a student.

"Gladstone," he said, "was a leader in football, cricket, debate, and literary. He was president of that great club and debating society, the Oxford Union, from which it is said, England chooses her prime ministers. In his finals he won two firsts, in mathematics and in classics."

The assembly next week will be on Thursday morning at 9:45.

Shambaugh Searches Archives

Professor and Mrs. Shambaugh started Monday on a journey to visit the historical archives in various places and search for material pertaining to the history of Iowa. During the journey they intend to visit the congressional library and the excellent libraries at Columbia, Harvard, Yale and Princeton and the Universities of Pennsylvania and Wisconsin.

On December 25 they will be members of a party of political scientists on an excursion to New Orleans to attend a national meeting of political economists. Mr. and Mrs. Shambaugh will return to the University shortly after the holidays.

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CO-EDS IN GERMANY

MUNICH NOW OPEN TO WOMEN

American College Girls Now Enrolled in the University—Lutheran College Burns

The University of Munich has opened its doors to women. Hitherto no women were permitted to matriculate in the German universities.

In several of them women have been permitted to attend lectures and have been allowed to take their degrees on examination by and with the consent of the faculties concerned. For the present the University of Munich limits its admission of women by regular matriculation to such as possess the abituria of the Germany gymnasium and they are admitted to this German high school on the same conditions as its male students. Lady students of foreign birth, graduates of colleges, but who do not possess the German gymnasial abituria, are admitted only as hearers, and with the consent of the faculty they may pursue a course of study and finally come up for a degree, but they have not yet been conceded the same rights that are accorded to that class of German female students having the gymnasial abituria.

The rector of the university has promised to second the petition of the United States consul general to the Bavarian ministry of cultus, that American lady students possessing diplomas from reputable American colleges shall be conceded the same advantages that have been conceded by German universities to graduates of reputable American colleges and universities.

Under the concessions temporarily made a number of American young ladies, graduates from American colleges, this term, have entered the University of Munich.

The Lutheran College at Jewell Junction was destroyed by fire Monday morning. The loss was \$25,000. Two students perished in the flames.

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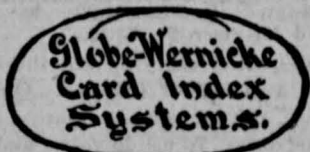
