BECKY INDIFFERENT

ADVENT OF STEYNE MAKES TROUBLE FOR RAWDONS

Cross Examination of Garretson Results in Little Good to Defendants

Court today was taken up with the examination of witness Garretson. The plaintiff's attorneys asked leave to have all testimony in regard to Lady Rawden's presentation at court withdrawn. This was granted.

The witness said that Rawdon Crawley did not know where the wines came from which were used at the wine parties.

LADY CRAWLEY A SOCIAL QUEEN

"After the dinner party, at Gaunt House, the invitations to Lady Crawley became more numerous and to functions of a higher social order," said the butler. "With the advent of Steyne," said the witness, the demeanor of Lady Crawley changed. She even told him he could go where he pleased. Could drink ale and eat sawdust if he wanted to."

The cross examination although spirited failed to materially weaken the witness in his testimony. He said he did not know whether Lord or Lady Crawley invited Steyne. He knew none of the guests except Steyne and knew him only because of descriptions he had heard of him. As to whether he was a handsome man, the witness thought he would not call him one. As to the kind of gambling, witness could not state as he was unfamiliar with such games.

RAWDEN A GAMBLER

"Rawden," he said, "was always gambling, while his wife waited upon the guests. He was an expert billiard player and won considerable money at gambling. I never knew him to perform manual labor and do not know where he got his money."

"I knew little of the actions of the persons at these parties as I was busy serving. Lady Crawley was lavish in her entertainment of the guests, doing everything to please them. In the presence of Steyne she seemed to have a buoyancy of spirits that she did not have with others."

"I do not recall any agreement between Lord and Lady Crawley that he would fleece the guests, while she cajoled them."

"Crawley never, so far as I knew, objected to whom his wife entertained."

As to whether Becky Sharpe was a loving wife, the witness said it would depend upon what was meant by loving. "After Steyne came," he said, her disposition toward her husband was decidedly chilly.

BECKY DECEIVES STEYNE

"I saw Lady Crawley, when with tears in her eyes she asked Lord Steyne for enough to pay her debt to Mrs.

Briggs," said the witness. "When asked how much she needed, she told him double the amount, which he gave her."

The cross-examination tried to destroy the coolness of the witness but failed. After many objections the plaintiff's attorney finally shut off what Attorney Swindle styled pettifoggling questions.

Miner Visits Y. M. C. A.

A. B. Miner, state secretary of the Y. M. C. A., visited the local organization the first of the week. He said the college associations of the state are doing good work, especially along the line of Bible study classes, two Bible institutes having already been held, one at Cedar Rapids and another at Des Moines.

The special week of prayer which was observed everywhere over the state he said was of great interest and was marked by quite a number of conversions. In college work things are too unsettled to make out any reliable statistics, and nearly all his reports will be made out from later work.

During the year there will be two half-state conventions, the one for the north half being at Waterloo, February 18 to 21, and that for the south half, in which Iowa City is located, at Mt. Pleasant, March 10 to 13.

Medical Buildings Progress

The plasters have finished their work on the anatomical building and have moved their staging to the larger building. The work of placing the finishing work in the building will be started by the first of the week and will be rushed to completion. The contractors are confident of completing the building in the time required by the agreement with the regents of the university and it will no doubt be occupied by the medical students during the second semester of the year.

The 1903 football team will be banqueted by Clarken and Aumen at the University Place on next Friday evening.

Dr. Littig left last night for Kansas City, where he will attend the meeting of the Associations of Rock Island Surgeons. He will read a paper on "Spinal Injuries."

Stanford University gave six "S's" to football men this year. A black German lettered "S." was awarded the substitutes for the California game and a white one to the members of the second team.

Beginning January 11, Prof. Loos will give a course of six lectures on Monday evenings at Cedar Rapids. These lectures are in the university extension work, and will be on the general theme, "The Industrial Revolution in its Social Aspects."

ECHOES OF CIVIL WAR

Iowa History Depicted in Unpublished Biography of Parvin

Reference has been before made in these columns to the biography of the late T. S. Parvin, the preparation of which was committed by the grand lodge of Masons to J. E. Morcombe. It deals with a period of vast importance in the life of the nation. In its reading one gets glimpses of the individual struggles of men just before the outbreak of the civil war, and of the part which Iowa took in that

fateful conflict. The work is the life history of an individual, but the compiler has done wisely in going outside the narrower limits possible that he might show the greater issues which influenced the character and impelled the actions of his subject. "To present an isolated life story would be flat and unprofitable," says Mr. Morcombe. "It is only as we consider any life in relation to its environment that we can derive benefit from the study. The biography of any one man is of importance only as it serves to make more clear the conditions and problems of his generation."
