## TIGERS TO ST. LOUIS

### PRINCETON TO SEND GYM-NASTIC TEAM

Drake Issues Athletic Statement  
Fitsimmons Not to be  
Gopher Trainer

Princeton has decided to send all her athletes who win places in the eastern inter-collegiate gymnastic meet at Princeton March 26, to St. Louis next summer to compete in events in connection with the exposition.

C. A. Fairweather was chosen to lead the Illinois eleven next year at the election yesterday at President Draper's dinner.

Drake University made \$283.83 on the Iowa game on Iowa field last fall. Her other profits were: Penn, \$27.35; Simpson, \$337.87; Cornell, \$31.25; Grinnell, \$48.72; Ames, \$730. Her losses were \$15.77 on the Missouri game and \$172.25 on the Michigan game.

Bob Fitsimmons will not train the Minnesota teams as reported. The Minnesota authorities deny indignantly that he was ever considered.

**BACONIAN**  
Prof. Wickham—Department of Entomology—Subject, Ants

Early in our study of insects, we have forced upon our notice the fact that these creatures do not develop in the same way as the larger animals, their growth instead of being continuous and in a direct line is marked by a series of more or less well defined stages. The life cycle includes the egg, larva, pupa and adult conditions.

Among ordinary insects the solicitude of the mother for her offspring is at an end when the egg has been laid. Among ants however it is different, the eggs larvae and pupae being objects of tender care. Upon this feature the whole life of ants may be said to hinge since in it we see the dawn of the social instinct, the beginning of colonial homes.

The ant colony begins with a female who lays a number of eggs in some sheltered spot. These are carefully tended by the mother and develop mostly into workers which assume the care of the home and the mother or queen. The queen now lays eggs rapidly and soon she is surrounded by literally millions of her offspring, forming a social fabric of a complexity little dreamed of by the world outside.

In general ants dig out their homes, the colonies occupying galleries underground or in logs. In these galleries eggs, larvae, pupae and frequently food as well are stored. We do not dream of the complexity of instinct or of the intelligence that is needed for the carrying on of the economy of the household.

It is now generally believed that their actions are controlled by something lower than reason but higher than mere instinct, a faculty which we call intelligence, a learning from sense experience without a real understanding of the relation between cause and effect.
