CHANGE IN MANAGEMENT OF THE DAILY IOWAN

The Old Gold Stock Company Purchases a Two Thirds Interest in The University Daily

The Old Gold Stock Company which was organized for the purpose of publishing a new university daily newspaper to be known as the Old Gold has purchased a two-thirds interest in the DAILY IOWAN and negotiations are now in progress for the purchase of the remaining interests owned by H. M. Pratt. A meeting of the shareholders in the Old Gold Company will be held tonight at 7:30 o'clock in the Old Capitol building when an effort will be made to complete negotiations.

THE DAILY IOWAN at present is in charge of Frank R. Wilson as editor-in-chief. The entire editorial board will be announced in tomorrow's issue.

The Old Gold Stock Company is composed of fifty students as shareholders, representing practically every department of the university. The officers are as follows: A. C. Johnston, president; F. J. Cole, vice president; Carl W. Ross, secretary; Nile Jones, treasurer. The board of directors consists of five members as follows: A. C. Johnston, Carl W. Ross, D. R. Lane, W. R. Law and Henry G. Walker.

WALKER GETS THIRD MICHIGAN AND KNOX GET FIRST PLACES

Iowa Representative Commend-
ed for Force and Logical
Construction

Henry G. Walker the Iowa university representative in Hamilton Club contest did not succeed in carrying off first honors last night but his effort was the subject of special commendation. He is said to have excelled in "direct, logical construction." First place went to Halliday of Michigan and Lampe of Knox College got second place. The Chicago Record Herald tells of the contest as follows:

first annual Hamilton Club prize oration contest, held in the assembly-room of the club last night. The two seniors blushed with pleased embarrassment when the club president, James Jay Sheridan, handed them the little morocco purses containing the \$100 in gold, comprising the first prize, and the \$50 in gold, which constituted the second prize, with the remark that the contest was of sufficiently high order to have warranted prizes many times larger, a sentiment that the audience greeted with applause.

James F. Halliday, winner of first honors in the contest, which had for its subject "Alexander Hamilton," is a resident of Fenton, Mich., and stands at the head of the senior debaters in the University of Michigan. Willard Lampe, a senior of Knox College, lives in Omaha, Neb. The other two contestants were Henry G. Walker of the University of Iowa and Thomas J. Meek of the University of Chicago.

In the judgment of many of the hearers, the effort of Mr. Walker surpassed in direct, logical construction, and the oration of Mr. Meek was char-

acterized by rhetorical beauty. The fine presence and graceful delivery of Mr. Halliday and the earnest enthusiasm of Mr. Lampe, however, turned the scale in their favor, although in the judgment of the judges the orations were of almost even merit.
