## MAY MAKE CHANGES

### LAW STUDENTS MAY BE AFFECTED

May Change Recitation Hours to Make Review Work Possible—Other Changes

Next semester may see some changes of considerable importance in the conduct of affairs in the University Law Department. The changes which are proposed to be made may prove an advantage to the students of that department and will also add to the efficiency of the department.

It is said that there may be a general change in recitation hours throughout the department. An effort will be made to arrange the hours so that Juniors and freshman will not recite at the same time and also that Juniors and seniors will not recite at the same time. This is done to give upper classmen an opportunity to review any work they have gone over. It will enable them to attend the recitations of the classes just below them.

It is hinted that this is the first step toward a change in the method of promoting those students who have failed in any subject. At present when a law student fails in any subject he is not required to take the subject again in the classroom. All he has to do is to pass the examination at the next semester. Since the entrance examinations in the fall are usually easier than the final examinations at mid year or in June, many students who have failed in the final tests in the spring succeed in passing up the fall examinations without doing any additional work in the summer. It may soon be necessary for students who fail in any subject to take that subject over again in the classroom.

### FRATS WILL CONTEND FOR SUPREMACY

Fraternity men who are good baseball players will be at a premium this spring since they may be called upon to settle one of the greatest conflicts in history—another inter-frat baseball tournament.

The success of the three Pan-Hellenic baseball tournament, which have been pulled off in the past combined with the desire for a little outdoor sport has started the talk of the frat men in this direction. No definite plans for the arrangement of a schedule have yet been made but a meeting of representatives of the various fraternities is to be called in the near future.

It is said that there is considerable baseball material in the frats this year and it will be employed to good advantage.

In the tournament four years ago, Beta Theta Pi was the victor and last year the Sigma Nus were victorious. The Kappa Sigmas have also won a baseball tournament.

### Viewed By Others

## SIMPSON PROTESTS

### WILL FIGHT PROPOSED CHANGES IN I. O. A.

Faculty takes Official Action—Regarding Method of Judging Orations

The proposed changes in the laws of the Iowa Intercollegiate Oratorical association, whereby the orators at the state contest shall be judged solely by their work on the platform, has drawn forth the official condemnation of the faculty of Simpson college.

The change has received some notice in the press. It was embodied in recommendations for changes in the constitution of the state association, made at a meeting of representative of the colleges at Drake university in November. The scheme proposed provides for the judging of the orations by a set of five judges who shall judge on both thought and composition, and delivery at the time of delivery, never having read the orations. The scheme was fostered by the representatives of the State college from Ames, and in the meeting of the college representatives at Des Moines was urged by Professor Davis of the department of oratory of Drake university.

It is understood to be the opinion of the faculty of Simpson that the effort is being made to unduly emphasize the delivery of the orations, to the discredit of the thought and the composition. The faculty seems inclined to recommend the judging by one set of judges, provided the orations be read and marked on thought and composition before the contest. This plan they think would be an advantage over the present system of having different sets of judges for thought and composition and delivery.

Delegates from Simpson to the state meeting at Grinnell will be the orator, J. N. Colver, the winner of the second honors in the home contest, A. A. Fells-tronm, and E. E. Youtz.

## PLANS ARE READY

### DESIGN FOR NEW SCIENCE MUSEUM

Counterpart of Liberal Arts Hall To be Fireproof—The Museum and Auditorium

The first tentative plans for the new museum building provided for at the last meeting of the board of regents have reached the office of Superintendent Ellsworth. They were prepared by Proudfoot and Bird, designers of the liberal arts building. The plans will be submitted to the science men of the faculty for inspection.

The plans provide for a structure almost a counterpart of the present liberal arts building. The building is to be 210 feet long and 124 feet deep. It faces Clinton Street and is to occupy the north front section of the Campus south of the present science building. At present it will not be necessary to disturb the science building since the north wing of the new building will not be built at once. When it is built it is presumed that the science building will be moved across Washington street to the north.

The building will be three stories in height and of stone. It will be fire proof as near as possible.

The south wing which is to be the museum proper is 124X56 and three stories high. The auditorium will occupy the central part of the structure and will have a seating capacity of about 2000.

### Assembly

The assembly address this morning was by the Rev. George E. Walk, M. A., Rector of Grace Church, Cedar Rapids. Mr. Walk, who succeeded Dr. Green in the Cedar Rapids church, is highly esteemed there as a man and as a preacher. His talk this morning was a pleasing and forceful one on the "four-square life."

### Coach Chalmers To Marry

From Dubuque comes the news that Coach John G. Chalmers of Iowa is to be married early in February. The bride-elect is Miss Eleanor L. Rood, a member of one of the oldest and most highly esteemed families in Dubuque. Mr. Chalmers will have the united good wishes of all his many friends of Iowa.

Prof. G. W. Moore the noted archaeologist of the Harvard Divinity school is scheduled for an address here on February 8. He is making a tour of the west in behalf of the Archaeological Institute of America. He will appear at Des Moines February 9, and at Columbia Mo., the following day.

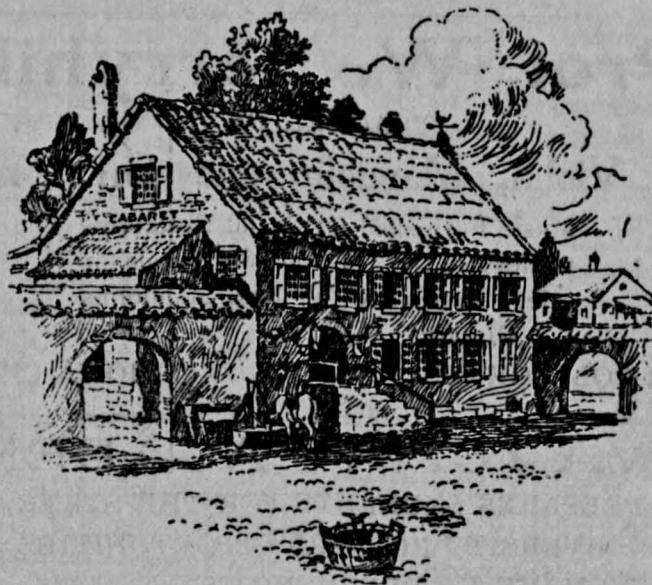
