## ZET-IRVING TONIGHT

### MINNESOTA PRELIMINARY IS THE NEXT

Both Sides Confident—Tariff Question—the Issue Great Interest Shown

The opera house will be the scene of a war of words tonight when the representatives of Irving and Zetagathian will compete for honors in oratory. And it will be a real war too, for never was more interest manifested in any preliminary contest. The men who will represent both sides are the debating cream of the entire university and they will be spurred on by the desire for scoring a victory over their rival literary society combined with the honor of a place on the team that represents the Old Gold at Minneapolis against the University of Minnesota.

The question that will be the bone of contention tonight is: Resolved that under existing conditions in the United States a tariff for revenue is preferable to a protective tariff.

Irving will have the affirmative of the contest being represented by O. R. Davis, John D. Lynch and A. C. Gordon. On the negative will be R. Files, R. R. Randall and R. C. Quigley for the Zetagathian society. Two members of the winning team and one member of the losing team will be chosen to make up the team to appear against Minnesota.

The opera house will be the scene of some mighty enthusiasm tonight. Both societies have held meetings and practiced their yells and will be able to turn them loose in a manner that will assist materially in raising the roof.

### Sims at Des Moines

In an interview at Des Moines Prof. Sims who is attending the meeting of the Iowa Engineering society and chairman of the committee on legislation, stated that the committee had not as yet decided upon the details of the legislation the association would apply for; but said that it was fairly well settled that one thing would be a demand for the enactment of a law which will make it necessary for all engineers in public positions, or who aspire to hold them, to take and pass a state examination as to their qualifications, in the same manner as other professional men are required to do. This is suggested in the interest of safety to the public, and to prevent incompetent men from taking positions in which they have charge of public buildings and construction.

## HARRIMAN IS WORSE

### TODAY'S CONDITION NOT ENCOURAGING

Reported this Morning that he Would not Survive the Day In a Delirious Condition

The condition of Dr. John W. Harriman is reported to be considerable worse today. He has begun to weaken from the effects of his long illness and it is reported from the university hospital that there is now very little hope for his final recovery. Dr. Harriman was delirious this forenoon and it was given out that he might not survive the day. However at the time of going to press this afternoon his condition was said to be unchanged from that of this morning.

### The Way to The West

Mr. Emerson Hough, a graduate of the University of Iowa, and already well known to the readers of the IOWAN, has recently given to the public a note-worthy little volume, entitled "The Way to the West." The book is strikingly original both inside and out. The somewhat unusual cover is merely an introduction to the still more unique method of treating the well worn theme of western history.

The history of western exploration and discovery is looked at from a somewhat new point of view. And yet the point of view is not so original, perhaps, as is the method of handling material within the range of vision from this point of view. The ax, the rifle, the river-boat, the horse, and the frontiersman himself, are the factors in the history of the west as treated by Mr. Hough. The four great boundries, the Alleghany Mountains, the Mississippi River, the Rockies and the Pacific are the second group of factors. Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett, and Kit Carson are the characters chosen to lend the story personality.

Probably no book which purports to teach American history has never been written so well adapted to the understanding of the average boy. If subjected to some of the more severe tests of scientific historical criticism the little volume might not emerge altogether unscathed, but the force, the originality, the life of the volume commend it to that wide class of teachers and parents who are anxious to place in the hands of children pieces of writing of attractive character and real inherent worth.—Bobb's-Merrill Company, Publishers, Indianapolis.

## WISCONSIN DECLINES

### BADGERS DO NOT WANT DEBATE THIS YEAR

Withdrawal Very Peculiar—Iowa May Debate Cornell Chicago and Northwestern

Iowa and Wisconsin will not debate this year. After everything had been arranged for the contest and Iowa was within two weeks of choosing her debaters word comes from Wisconsin that the Badgers will not be able to meet Iowa this year. Thus one of the contests upon which Iowa had counted largely is made impossible.

The members of the local debating league are up in arms over the action of the Wisconsin debating authorities. The lack of definiteness in the word sent here from Madison leads the local orators to believe that it is only a case of cold feet. Iowa and Wisconsin have engaged in debating contests for a number of years now and as far as victories are concerned stand about even.

The Iowa men have won regularly when the contests were held here and the Badgers have won regularly at Madison. It was time to hold the contest at Iowa this year which probably meant another Hawkeye victory.

Wisconsin's refusal however may mean that Iowa will have a still bigger contest. Sometime ago Cornell university, New York, asked for a debating compact with Iowa but inasmuch as Iowa's dates were filled it was not accepted. At a meeting of the debating league last night it was decided to communicate with Cornell to see if the matter could be reconsidered. Northwestern and Chicago will also be communicated with.

### The Cab Question

The university of Nebraska students are aroused over the growing tendency among the students to use cabs on every social occasion.

The Daily Nebraskan gives up whole columns to the discussion of the question and prints long letters from the students pro and con. It is said that the Nebraska students have the habit so bad that they employ a cab if going only for a distance of three or four blocks.

### Iowans Fought Well

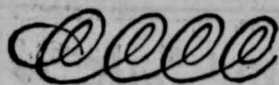
