LOWDEN MAY GET IT

S. U. I. MAN FOR ILLINOIS GOVERNORSHIP

Is Considered One of the Leading Candidates—Two Counties Instructed for Him

Col. Frank O. Lowden of Chicago an alumnus of the state university of Iowa is making a close race for the republican nomination for the governorship of Illinois. He has captured two counties in his race and is now counted one of the three leading candidates for the nomination. If he can carry Chicago, or even divide the city with Mr. Deneen, he will go into the convention with a very strong show to win. Mr. Deneen as prosecuting attorney has secured a strong popular hold in Chicago, and his opposition to the Lorimer machine adds to it. But on the other hand Mr. Lowden has many friends, and the political organization is for him, which is always a great element of strength. Monday night Mr. Lowden addressed 2,000 of his admirers in the auditorium, and he pledged himself to do nearly everything Governor Yates has not done, and to leave undone nearly everything Governor Yates has done. Mr. Lowden is making an aggressive canvass of the state, and he is certain to be formidable in the state convention.

Bill By Wade

Congressman M. J. Wade has introduced a bill in the United States Congress providing that historical societies in the United States supported and maintained by the State governments be designated as depositories of all public documents of the United States, provided, that there be not more than one such historical society in any one State; that such society maintain a library which is accessible to the public without charge.

The bill also provides that any such State historical society library making application to the superintendent of documents and giving evidence, verified by oath, that it complies with the requirements stated may be enrolled as a depository.

It also provides that any state historical society which may become a depository of public documents shall deposit in the library of Congress two copies of all publications published by or under the authority of such state historical society.

FOOTBALL GAME OFF

MGR. SPANGLER DROPS WASHINGTON

Accuses Missourians of Giving Hawkeyes Shabby Treatment Three Year Contract

Iowa and Washington Universities will not have their usual football game next fall, Manager Spangler having annulled the contract existing between the schools for a series of three games. The reason given by Manager Spangler is the fact that the treatment given the Iowa players last Thanksgiving when the contest was played at St. Louis was not satisfactory to the Iowans. The particular action on the part of the St. Louisans which Manager Spangler objected to was the conduct of Quarterback Suttle and his language on the field of play.

Iowa and Washington have met twice in football contests. Two years ago the Old Gold defeated the Missouri men by a one-sided score of 61 to 0. Last year, despite the fact that the Iowans had a stronger team than the year before, the Washingtonians put up a harder fight and managed to hold Iowa to a 12 to 2 score.

Despite the fact that the action of Quarterback Suttle were not satisfactory the Washington management insists that he will play through the next season.

Board Issues Report

The third annual report of the board of control of Iowa is at the President's office. Concerning the state university the report says that the old cumbersome system of bookkeeping has been done away with and the more modern methods employed. It says that the books at the secretary's office are in excellent condition and that the treasurer's books are entirely correct. All of the permanent fund of the university is loaned on notes drawing five percent interest except \$1,900.26. The report speaks of the work of Dr. Henry S. Albert a graduate of the S. U. I. medical department in the class of 1902, at the school for the insane at Independence. He is now studying in Europe.

Professor W. C. Wilcox will give a lecture at Muscatine Friday evening upon the Eastern Question.

A. O. Kuck, formerly leader of the university band, has returned from Oklahoma and is visiting in the city. He graduated with the law class of the university last June.

BIG PRIZE OFFERED

STUDENTS OF UNIVERSITY MAY COMPETE

Contest in Science and Literature—Prizes Aggregate \$10,000—Nobel Peace Prize

The students of the State University will have an opportunity for winning fame and fortune in the contest for the Nobel prize the details of which may be secured at the office of Pres. MacLean. For excellence in the requirements of the contest there is offered the sum of \$10,000 in prizes.

The nobel prize exists from a provision in the will of Dr. Alfred Bernard Nobel an eminent Norweigen who set aside the above named amount for the payment of prizes for competitors in a contest, the provisions of which were outlined in his will.

Prizes will be awarded to the persons making the most important discovery in physiology or medicine; to the author of the best literary work in the sense of idealism; and to the person having done the most toward propogating a scheme for international peace.

The judgement upon all of the contests shall be made as designated in the will by well known educational bodies of Norway.

Bill by Iowa Man

It remained for an alumnus of the state university of Iowa to present a bill to the present general assembly providing for a compulsory state primary law. The author of the bill is Senator J. A. Crossley of Madison county. The bill follows the recent disgraces in the capital city and is drawn with the idea of making a recurrence of these disgraces impossible. Senator Crossley presents a similar bill two years ago but it was defeated.

Basketball Saturday

Another big basketball game is scheduled for Saturday afternoon at Close Hall at 3 o'clock. This time the varsity men will clash with the basket throwers from Augustana college, Rock Island. The varsity men have beaten the Augustanians once this year upon the floor of the latter and expect to win again tomorrow. The game will be a sort of preparatory contest to the big game with the Kansas University team a week from tomorrow.

The junior and senior class teams will play a curtain raiser tomorrow.

Neal Jones a university alumnus who has been city editor of the Muscatine Journal has accepted a position on the Register and Leader at Des Moines and will take up his new work February 1. He was formerly city editor of the Citizen here.

A State Organization

The editor of the Cornelian suggests in a recent editorial that a state organization of college newspaper editors be formed. He suggests that such an organization would make it easier for the editors of the various college papers to deal with such events as state field meets, oratorical contests, and other organizations of a like nature.

Such an organization would in theory be an excellent thing, and if it could be successfully carried on, might result in a great deal of good. The students in all of the Iowa educational institutions are interested in what is going on in the other schools of the state and it is certain that a better acquaintance on the part of the editors would result in better state school news service. In addition, the scribes would be in a better position to exchange ideas and a better standard of papers would result.

The objection to the plan comes in the fact that there would be too many changes in the makeup of the organization, since for various reasons the official life of a college editor is short.
