## WILL MEET INDIANA

### HOOSIERS AND HAWKEYES TO PLAY FOOTBALL

Game at Rock Island Thanksgiving Day—These Teams Have Never Yet Met

A football game between Iowa and Indiana Universities has been arranged for next Thanksgiving. The contest will be played at Rock Island, Ill. This will be the first time that Iowa and Indiana have met in any kind of a contest.

The manager of the Kansas University team has asked for a game with Iowa but has been refused since from present appearances the schedule will be filled to good advantage with teams which Manager Spangler deem ed it more advantageous to play.

The report that the annual football contest between Iowa and Washington University is off may not be true. The story as printed in the DAILY IOWAN of last evening was from a special newspaper dispatch from St. Louis, and probably originated with the manager of the Washington team.

Manager Spangler says he does not understand the report inasmuch as negotiations for another game with Washington are still on, the St. Louis manager being very desirous of playing again.

The press reports had it that Iowa had called the game off because of shabby treatment given the Iowa men last fall when the two teams met at St. Louis. It said also that Manager Spangler had annulled a three years contract for games.

The contract as drawn up and signed provided for two games and gave Iowa an option on one additional game.

Manager Spangler announces that he has arranged an early season practice game with Augustana College. This will be played September 27.

## TEAM HAS HARD LUCK

### TWO BASKETBALL PLAYERS ARE OUT OF GAME

Newton and Brock Injured—Game Tomorrow With Augustana—Kansas Is Next

The varsity basket ball team is undergoing a period of extreme hard luck. Newton one of the star forwards of the team that has not yet lost a single game is out of the game for the remainder of the season he having broken three small bones in his foot. The accident happened during practice in the gymnasium and was extremely painful. Newton's playing has been a feature of the games this far this year. Brock another member of the star aggregation is out of the game with an injured foot and may be out for the remainder of the season. The loss of both of these men will weaken the team materially.

Notwithstanding the crippled condition of the team it is expected that the game with Augustana college tomorrow will be easily won. The Iowans have defeated the collegians on their own floor already this year and another comparatively easy victory's expected.

It is thought that the team will be back into form in time for the game a week from tomorrow with the team from Kansas university. The Kansans are making a tour of the country and are reputed to be fast.

Manager Ross has received word from the manager of the Minnesota university team that the Iowans will be given a game at Minneapolis this year. The date has not yet been fixed. The Wisconsin team will be here March 2.

#### To Choose Debaters

The contest for place on the Irving freshman debating team will take place tonight. There are about a dozen candidates. The Panama question and the ship subsidy question will be discussed. The Zetagathian freshman debaters are already elected they being Peterman and Wycoff. The Zets will submit the question for the freshman contest this year.

Irving will elect her representative to the Minnesota debate tonight.

A. C. Clapp '03 of the Shelby bank, has gone to Harlan, where he is vice president of the Security Bank.

Yale is to have three professional coaches for baseball. William Murphy, Captain of the Yale nine of '92 and later shortstop of the New York National League is to be head coach. Frank Donahue, the American League pitcher for Cleveland, and "Billy" Lush outfielder for the Detroit American League team are to be the other two coaches.

## FOR DEBATING TRUST

### ALL THE SOCIETIES MAY MERGE INTERESTS

For the Purpose of Conducting Outside Debates—Debating League Discusses It

The dreams of those who have labored toward the unification of all of the debating interests of the university may soon be realized. At the last meeting of the Debating League the matter of admitting the outside debating organizations of the school was considered and debated to some extent. A motion to name a committee to make recommendations was laid on the table and in the meantime the members of the Debating League which is made up of the membership of Irving and Zetagathian are seriously considering the matter among themselves. It will be brought up at the next meeting of the league.

In the past the debating interests of the university have been in the hands of about a half dozen organizations here. The members of Irving and Zetagathian composing the Debating League have carried on the annual contests with Minnesota and Wisconsin, and the Philomathian society has met Illinois for the past two years. The Law societies, the Hammond and Forum have been debating against the Northwestern teams so it will be seen that no debating team that has gone out has been representative of the full strength of the university. The proposed plan is the merger of all the local organizations into one so that all the members of all of the organizations will have an opportunity to make a place upon any of the contests.

The strong argument brought against the proposed change in the debating league is the fact that it has been the keen rivalry between Irving and Zetagathian that has resulted in the excellence of the teams sent out by these organizations. This might be destroyed under the new regime.

The Baconian Club meets tonight at 7:30 in the Physics Lecture Room. The paper will be read by Dr. Eugene Talbot of Chicago on the subject: "Degeneracy—Its causes, signs and results"—Illustrated.

Harvard students have a new card game, called "Football Poker," which is universally popular just at present. Just where the game originated and who the inventor was no one is able to tell, but the students have not bothered themselves with these questions, being quite content to enjoy the pastime, which has become almost a passion with some of the men. ## ON AGAIN; OFF AGAIN

### H. B. GILBERT IS SECRETARY I. O. A. BUT ISN'T

Cornell College Undertakes Naming a Successor But Gilbert Enters Objection

H. B. Gilbert of the freshman law class figures conspicuously in a fight that is going on in the ranks of the Interstate Oratorical Association. Gilbert is at Mt. Vernon now attempting to straighten out the question of a disputed office.

Gilbert last year was at Cornell College, Mt. Vernon. Being somewhat of an orator he engaged in forensics and was sent as one of the Cornell representatives to the interstate contest. Inasmuch as the Iowa men were well to the fore in the final markings they were entitled to the office of secretary of the interstate organization and Gilbert was the man upon whom the honor fell. The books of the organization made up of practically all of the colleges in twelve states were turned over to him forthwith.

It happened that Gilbert decided to not return to Cornell last fall but came to Iowa instead to take up the law course. Iowa is not a member of the Interstate Oratorical Association and it followed that the I.O.A. had one of its principal officers in a school not a member of the body.

Upon the departure of Gilbert from Cornell College the ambitions ones at Mt. Vernon took it upon themselves to elect his successor. In other words Cornell undertook to choose a secretary for a body representing twelve states.

The action of the Cornellians was not satisfactory to Gilbert and he is now at Mt. Vernon attempting to fix things up.

It seems so be the disposition of all the other schools except Cornell to permit Gilbert to retain the office until the time for the next interstate contest at Cleveland when a successor will be elected.

The west Y. M. C. A. Team of Chicago gave Minnesota University the first defeat it has had for years. The score was 36-26.

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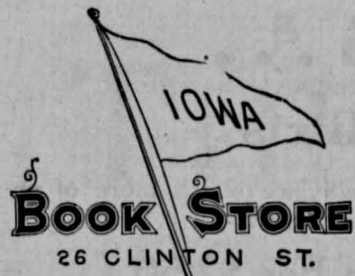

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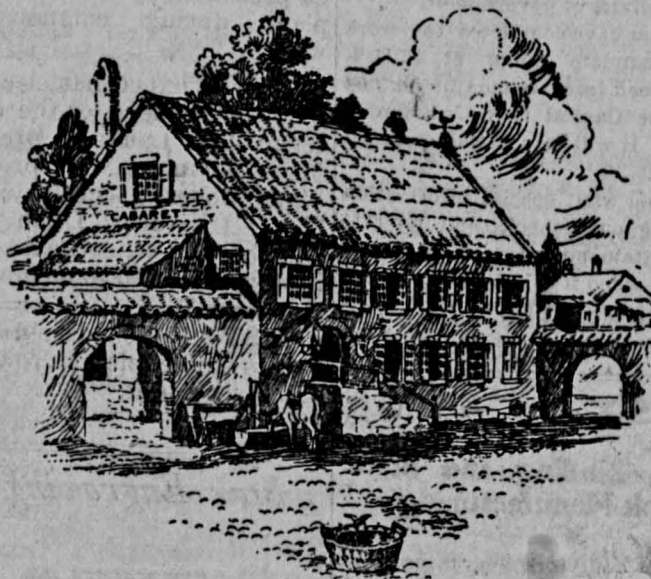
