MEET THIS MONTH

ORATORICAL ASSOCIATION PROGRAM READY

Grinnell and Ames Fail to Qualify—Will Change Constitution—May be Fight

The orators from the Iowa colleges which are members of the Iowa Oratorical Association will contest for supremacy at Grinnell, February 22. The judges upon thought and composition have already passed upon the productions entered and decided which eight schools shall be represented in the final contest. Both Ames and Grinnell failed to qualify.

The schools to be represented and the subjects of the orations are as follows: Hamilton and the Nation, Upper Iowa University "Child of Destiny," Parsons College; "Philosophy of the Race Problem," Cornell College; "The Ideal of Rienzi," Tabor College; "Robt. Lea of Virginia," Simpson College; "Greater Britain," Coe College; "The French Machiavell," Drake University; "The Policy of Progress," Iowa Wesleyan.

An interesting business session will be held on the morning of the 26th. The question of doing away with the double set of judges on thought and composition and on delivery will come up and will doubtless meet with warm opposition. Another change to be proposed is that of dividing the state into two sections for preliminary contests, the winners of which are to meet in final contest.

WINS ORATORICAL CONTEST LAST NIGHT

Johnston, Second, Johnson, Third—Walker Gets Two First's and Moffitt One

Henry G. Walker, first; E. R. Johnston, second; and J. O. Johnson, third were the ranks accorded the victors on the oratorical contest last night. The program was given before a very small audience. Less than four hundred persons were present. The various societies had not the expected delegations present and the usual demonstration of enthusiasm in behalf of their representatives was lacking.

CHICAGO ARRANGES A NOTABLE SCHEDULE

Only Minnesota of the Big Nine Not Included—A Precedent in Footballdom

With the scheduling of the Iowa game, a notable precedent was established for the history of football at Chicago; for out of the eight other colleges in the western conference association, the Maroons will meet seven,—all but Minnesota. These are: Northwestern, Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Purdue, Indiana, and Iowa. Such a list of games as this, as well as a number of smaller practice contests will keep the Maroon players on the jump next fall. In speaking of the schedule Mr. Stagg said: "It probably seems funny to have saddled so many games on the team for next fall, but I think that the boys will be able to take care of them all right. This having on our schedule the names of seven out of the eight conference colleges is a notable fact because of its seldom occurrence."

Were it not for the fact that bad feeling exists between Minnesota and Chicago the Maroons would probably meet all of the Big Nine teams next year. The Gophers and Maroons have had nothing to do with each other for several years. An effort was made to arrange a game for last fall but Minnesota refused to play at Chicago and Chicago declined the trip to Minneapolis. Both Chicago and Minnesota will play Northwestern however, next year so that a line upon their comparative strength can be secured.

AMES IS INCLUDED

FOOTBALL RELATIONS ARE RESUMED

Will Play on Iowa Field Oct. 29 Championship Cannot Be Disputed Next Year

Iowa and Ames have buried the hatchet. Manager Spangler gave it out today that he had arranged a game with the Ames management to be played on the Iowa field October 29. The announcement is greeted with a great deal of satisfaction on the part of Iowa students inasmuch as the much talk d of state championship will be resolved into something other than an interrogation point. Ames wanted to play the game on her own field.

It has come to light that Michigan has offered Iowa the choice of October 22, and November 5, with a possibility of Thanksgiving day at Ann Arbor providing the Michiganders do not go east on that day, a condition that seems quite unlikely. The Iowa management is considering the offer.

The date for the Grinnell game has been set as November 12.

Those Certificates

A committee of college men appointed for the purpose of agreeing upon conditions upon which graduates of Iowa Institutions would be permitted to teach held a meeting with the senate committee yesterday at Des Moines.

The committee consists of Dean J.H.T. Main of Iowa college at Grinnell, Dr. Frederick E. Bolton of the University of Iowa at Iowa City, Prof. G. F. Betts of Cornell College at Mt. Vernon President Shelton of Simpson College at Indianola, and President Hill M. Bell of Drake University of Des Moines.

The committee has agreed upon a plan of certification of the graduates of colleges. The plan is one which has been agreed upon by the college men, and is more liberal than anything that has yet been presented. It provides that the graduates of colleges and universities, including the State Normal School, at Cedar Falls, shall be granted a certificate upon graduation to teach without an examination. If they are successful in their work the certificates will be renewed.

The college men says there is no friction among them relative to the normal school and that the plan is harmoniously presented.

Dr. J. G. Mueller of this city is assisting Dean Guthrie in giving lectures.

Ben Wood and M. L. Whitley both of whom have been students at Grinnell the past semester are here to take up courses in the University.

Special Students and Athletics

The University of Pennsylvania has taken a radical step toward the purification of athletics and some of the faddists in the western institutions are advocating that the other schools adopt it broadcast. The reform at Pennsylvania consists in the barring of special students from all forms of university athletics. The Illini, the official organ of the university of Illinois is one of the western supporters of the idea.

The Illinis says that one fourth of the men composing the teams at the University of Illinois would be cut out of athletics if such a plan were adopted there. But still it advocates the change from a moral point of view. It says:

"Illinois may be proud to graduate men who are athletic as well as intelligent; but the acme of pride will never be attained when a man goes out into the world with the initial 'I' on his breast and not a single other quality to mark him as a college student. He is but a notorious advertisement of our gymnastic facilities and a sample of the coach's finished article."

This looks well on paper, but where is the contention? Is the Illini certain that all, or even the

greater part of those students pursuing special work who take part in athletics are in school just for the sake of athletics? Does the Illini mean to assert that the men who win athletic honors are all "notorious advertisements"?

Pennsylvania is to be congratulated on her moral stand. She probably realized that her special courses were being too much taken advantage of by those students seeking athletic honors alone. But the fact that Pennsylvania found it necessary to take this action does not argue that the movement should be broadcast. Let local boards deal with such conditions.

In the recent examinations at Minnesota an engineer was expelled for cribbing, making the eighth expelled so far this year for this offense. Many sets of papers also are being held up pending an investigation.

Several faculty members of the athletic council at the University of Wisconsin have threatened to resign on account of the action of other members of the council. The trouble arose over the ratification of Cochems as assistant coach of the football team, which was opposed by some of the council members.

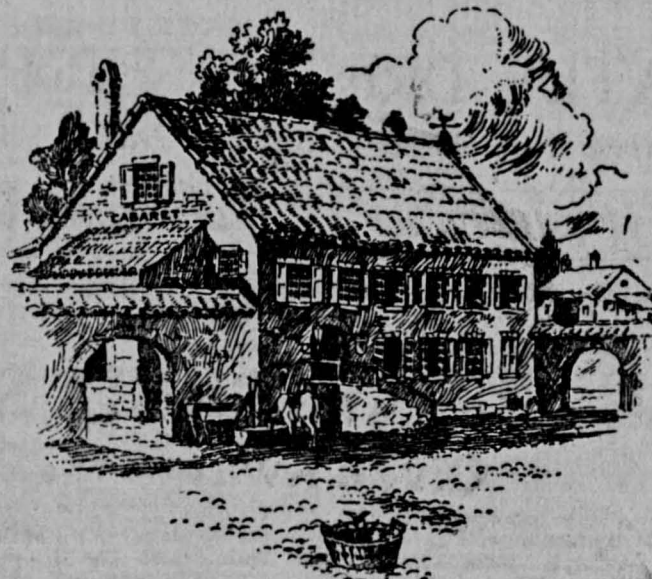

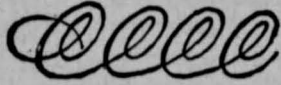
