## AWAY WITH EXAMS

SAYS SUPT. SHEAKLEY OF  
DES MOINES SCHOOLS

Examination Weaken Character  
and Teachers Should Rely  
More On Daily Work

Away with the monthly school examinations which lead to negligence, poor members and weak characters. was the keynote of an address by city superintendent of schools, S. H. Sheakley in an address at the regular monthly meeting of the teachers of West Des Moines Wednesday afternoon.

Superintendent Sheakley urged that the tests held at the end of each month lead the children to neglect their daily work, make careless and indifferent, and that when the end of the period arrives many of them know little more than they did at its beginning. Many of them realizing that by a little extra "cramming" they can make up all deficiencies, skim over the work and rely almost wholly upon the results of the test.

Lamentable is the fact, he said, that the examinations serve indirectly to weaken the characters of the scholars. He pointed out that character is the result of growth; that habit is the foundation of character, and that good habits cannot be formed by any spasmodic effort to cram for examinations.

If teachers will rely more upon the thorough daily work of their pupils," he said "much more good would undoubtedly result. If a pupil will do his work well each day he will form a habit that will last throughout his life, but if he skims over his daily work hoping to pass a final examination successfully, he is thereby bearing down any good traits of character he may have and laying the foundation for future negligence."

### Baconian Club

The paper at the meeting of the Baconian club last night was read by Dr. A. J. Burge on "Physics Applied in Medicine."

An extract from the paper follows:

The human body has come to be considered as a complicated and exquisite piece of mechanism.

Nature unaided has performed many remarkable surgical operations which command admiration. The need for medical men arises largely from the artificial condition of society, the departure from the natural manner of life.

The following are some of the applications of physical principles in medicine: In nature sunlight is as much a part of life as air and only recently it has been discovered that simple sunlight cures in many cases by destroying the bacteria in tuberculosis. Temperature is of great service.

The above schedule for the coming football season was announced by Manager H. E. Spangler this morning. The open date will probably go to Coe College. The schedule is regarded as one of the best that Iowa has ever had and will in all probability give the Iowa warriors all they can look after. Indiana will not be played as was formerly announced. Coach Chalmers believes that if Iowa defeats Chicago all the remaining games will be won with the exception of the Thanksgiving day contest with Minnesota.

By means of fixation, supports, splints and braces injured or diseased parts are protected and rested that nature may make repair. Electricity is much applied especially in nervous diseases. The principle of Osmosis applied, in cases where the processes of excretion or nutrition are impeded or reversed, has wrought remarkable results in preserving and supplying the tissues until nature can restore the normal processes. Simple physiological rest enables nature to make repair in cases of Peritonitis overworked nerves and wearied brains.

### Talbot Urges Bill

D. H. Talbot of Sioux City, the largest single contributor to the University Science Museum is urging the passage of a bill in the state legislature making it legal to kill birds for scientific purposes. In giving his reasons for urging the bill Mr. Talbot said:

"It seems to me that some provision ought to be made for the ornithologist or scientist who desires to look into the conditions of bird life, To the scientist is due the fact that discoveries have been made relating to birds, which have been an actual good, especially to the farmer.

"The bill makes provision for all persons over the age of 15 who desire to study birds for scientific purposes, providing he may secure the recommendation and signatures of two scientists, one of whom is an ornithologist, to a certificate setting forth the purposes of the holder."

Speaking of the arguments which have been brought up in favor of abolishing spring shooting, Mr. Talbot said it was not true that game birds are rapidly being killed out. He says he is positive that ducks and prairie chickens are more abundant than they were several years ago.

### The Kappa Party

Very novel and attractive and entirely distinctive in the social annals of the university was the leap-year party given at the armory last night, by the Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority. The spirit of the leap-year was carried out to the minutest detail and once more the young men were forced to give precedence to the ladies, and learn to stand and wait.

The distinctive feature of the evening was the German figures introduced at short intervals when fair maidens drove their chosen partners with bright hued ribbons or unlocked their great red hearts with golden keys. The favors were most varied and attractive, ranging from Chinese headgear to tiny fans and bells.

The decorations were artistic in the highest degree. Everywhere the dark and light blue of Kappa Kappa Gamma was apparent especially effective in the drooping of the attractive little balconies which lined both sides of the gallery. The stage on which the musicians were stationed was set as a palm garden and above it shone the sorority emblem, a golden key. Another key appeared at the opposite end of the hall above the refreshment table, artistically decorated in pink and white ribbons.

The Clinton orchestra furnished music of the highest order and responded most obligingly to repeated encores. Especially beautiful were the harp solos rendered at intervals throughout the evening.

## PROSPECTS AT AMES

AGRICULTURALISTS WILL  
HAVE STRONG TEAM

Many Old Stars are Back—Preliminary Training Begun—Poor Training Quarter

The first work of the season with track athletics at Ames has begun. Trainer Marsh of the Caledonian Athletic Club of Boston will have charge of the team that will represent Ames on the track this spring. Marsh is a pupil of Trainer Watson of Grinnell. About 100 men of various ability showed up for preliminary practice. Ames is seriously hampered by her usual lack of training quarters. At present track men jumpers and weight men are given practice for learning form in the old gymnasium in the basement of Morrill Hall. The squad proved very encouraging as far as numbers are concerned. Of last year's men Captain Williams and Jorgenson are out in the hammer throw; Fyler and Mattison in the shot put; Cave in the discus; Bickle in the pole vault; Backer and Curry in the broad jump, Barrett and Mattison in the high jump; Roe, Scott, Adamson, Packer and Thompson in the sprints; Cave, Scott, Mohanke and Bevan in the quarter; Cole and Ullbarri in the half, and Austin and Smith in distances. Promising in the list of new men and those who did not make the team last year are Eiler, Lyman, Warden and Cutler in the weights; Hook in the discus. Robey in the jumps and Okey in the vault. A splendid lot of men in the runs are out again, including Warreu, Budge, F. Campbell, Nichols, Ricker and Heberling.

Everett Sweeley of Sioux City who was the star end on Michigan's championship football team and who last fall coached the Morningside College team has returned to Michigan to enter the law department. He has already played his four years of football.

Ex-congressman Joseph Lane of Davenport father of Dick R. Lane of the senior law class was yesterday formally nominated for State University Regent by the Second District legislators. He had been appointed by Governor Cummins to fill a vacancy. His formal election will follow.

The weekly university assembly will be held next Tuesday instead of Wednesday because of the presence of Professor Moore in the city, it being hoped that he will address the assembly.

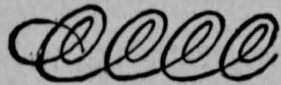
