TO MEET NEBRASKA

CORNHUSKERS WANT TO DEBATE IOWA

May take the Place of the Wisconsin Debate—Walker and Kunz Withdraw

The refusal of Wisconsin to debate Iowa University this year after all of the arrangements had been concluded for the contest may not leave Iowa out of a debate. President Ivins of the Iowa debating league is in receipt of a letter from the Nebraska debating authorities in which the cornhuskers offer to take on the Hawkeyes for a contest in forensics early in May. The Nebraskaites in their letter even went so far as to submit a question, inviting the Iowans to make a choice of sides. The question submitted relates to the Monroe Doctrine. There is every probability that the offer of the Nebraskans will be accepted and that the debating league will hasten toward the selection of a final team to appear against the new rivals.

The refusal of Wisconsin to continue in the contest with Iowa this year disorganized somewhat the preliminary contest which was to have been held between Irving and Zetagathia for the selection of a final team. Henry G. Walker and John F. Kunz two members of the Irving team in the preliminary have withdrawn from the contest leaving Irving with only one man on the preliminary team, Roy Redfield. At the meeting Friday night it was decided to go ahead with the selection of another team, Mr. Redfield to be included in the newly organized team. The new members of the team have not yet been chosen, however. It is probable that the two teams will hold an early preliminary taking for the subject the same question that has been submitted by Nebraska.

Senior Girls Organize

The attempt to organize a chapter in a national sorority of senior girls has been abandoned by the local seniors. This action was taken because members of local sororities would be debarred from such organizations as they are not allowed to belong to more than one intercollegiate secret society.

A permanent organization of the senior girls similar to Scimiter and Fez is now being formed. There was a meeting of the seniors this afternoon to consider and adopt a name for the newly launched organization.

The Octave Thanets will entertain the Philos at a party Monday night.

Scimiter and Fez has postponed the initiation of the new members to Monday night.

SCHOOL INSPECTION

WORK OF DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Important Records Made Accessible To Students—Forty Schools Inspected

The state high school inspection is that part of the work of the department of education upon which largely depends the standard of the freshmen on colleges. From the records in file in the rooms of the department of education and from the reports of the various inspectors the eligibility of the school's graduates for entering the standard colleges of Iowa is determined.

Thus far this year some forty schools of the state have been inspected by members of the faculty. Under the new plan of inspection adopted the department of education aims to have as many members of the faculty as possible, inspect the schools in the work connected with their departments. Professors Ansley, Andrews, Plum, Bolton, Potter, Seashore, Wilson and Macbride have each made one or more trips this year in the interests of high school inspection.

The accredited schools and many of the other schools of the state are each given a small compartment in the rooms of the department of education. These are systemized so as to be readily accessible. In them are filed the reports of the various inspectors the courses of study, the teaching staff and all other attainable and valuable records pertaining to the school. These files are open to the students and to all others interested in school work. From the individual reports the valuable data is selected, systemized and published in the bulletins of the University for distribution. Several of these have been published in recent years.

Dr. Gilchrist will Lecture

Dr. J. G. Gilchrist of the Homeopathic Medical College will deliver an illustrated lecture on "The Canterbury Pilgrimages" tomorrow evening in the liberal arts auditorium. The lecture which is open to the public will be of special interest to the students of English. The lecture will treat of the romantic, aggressive England that Chaucer knew. The means of travel of that time, the habits of domestic life, the spirit which took people on pilgrimages, and the old inns will be discussed. Of these things Dr. Gilchrist has made much study and speaks with authority.

COUNCIL BLUFFS MAN IS NOMINATED

Eighteen Ballots Were Required in Ninth District Caucus At Des Moines

The Ninth district republican caucus met yesterday for the purpose of determining upon a candidate for the regency of the State University and finally nominated Dr. V. L. Treynor of Council Bluffs. The decision was reached on the first vote, although seventeen ballots had preceded this one. On the final ballot; Dr. Treynor received eight votes, Dr. Brook of Audubon had one vote, and five votes were cast for P. K. Seever of Guthrie.

The contest which has just ended has proved the most vigorous of all the district caucuses that have been held. It has been a free for all fight right along, although the friends of Mr. Treynor claim they had him nominated on the last five ballots.

The original Council Bluffs candidate was A. T. Flickinger. He had developed considerable strength and would probably have lauded the place, had not a fight to elect a doctor been begun and the candidacy of Dr. Treynor announced. E. S. White of Harlin was one of the strong candidates in the fight at the outset, but dropped out before the final ballot.

Chess Tournament

In harmony with the custom of chess clubs to hold a tournament on Washington's birthday the Hawkeye Chess Club played a tournament Monday afternoon. While the meeting was not notable for the number of members present or the brilliancy of the schemes originated an enjoyable afternoon was spent and good fellowship promoted.

Messrs. Rink, Coyle, Payne, Daves, Naberhuis and French were present to play for the winning honors and the prize, "Lasker's Common Sense in Chess," which was offered by the club.

The members were divided into two groups consisting of Rink, Coyle and French and of Payne, Naberhuis and Davies. The winners of the groups Rink and Payne later played for first honors and the prize which were won by Payne.

An article entitled "Industrial Causes Affecting the American Commercial Policy Since the Civil War," by Jacob E. Conner appeared in the January issue of the Annals of American Academy of Political and Social Science. Dr. Conner formerly an instructor in Economics in the University, now occupies a similar position at the University of Pennsylvania.

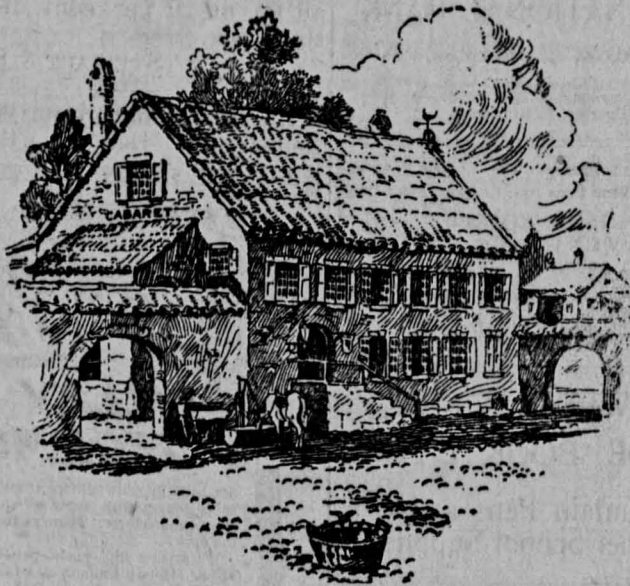
