NOW THE DIAMOND

BIG BUNCH OF BASEBALL CANDIDATES

Old Men Say Prospects Never Were Better—Many Strong Candidates—Many Games

The State University of Iowa is about to enter upon the most promising baseball season it has ever had. The oldest men in the baseball business at Iowa declare that in their recollection there has never been a time when there was such a bulk of promising material.

Harvey Dye the star fielder of last years university team has been elected captain of the team for the coming year. He will continue to play a fielding position. Among the old stars is "Pink" Storey who has been an Iowa baseball star for the past half dozen years. He will probably play third base this year and it will be his last appearance for he is a senior law student and as soon as he graduates in the spring will join the Davenport Three I team with which he has contracted for the coming season. Other candidates for third base are Struble and O'Neal. Captain Dye has at least a half dozen pitchers at his disposal. Voss who did the twirling last season is still here as is also Kratzmeyer. In addition to these there are Roberts a freshman from Marshalltown, Gilbert a freshman law from Cornell; Topping, a freshman collegiate who has pitched for the crack Burlington high school team for the past two years; Yessler who has been playing on several amateur teams in middle Iowa and is said to be a regular whirlwind, and Sutherland.

For catcher there are two new men, both of them promising. One is Dennis of Cornell and the other is Brecke of Luther college. Hanson, last year's first baseman is still in school and Moore will also try for first. Van Der Skeg last years second baseman and Durkee will try out for the second bag. For short stop, Melzner and Seerley are likely candidates. For the outfield their are Capt. Dye, "Fuzzy" White of last years team, Burns, Rhynsberger and Will.

Manager Spangler says he is not yet ready to announce the complete schedule but he has said that thirty games are already arranged a number of which are with Big Nine conference teams. There will be the usual series of games in the Iowa Intercollegiate league. There are good prospects that Iowa will get the silver bat this spring over which there was so much quarreling last year and which is to be settled by a match game between Grinnell and Ames early in the spring.

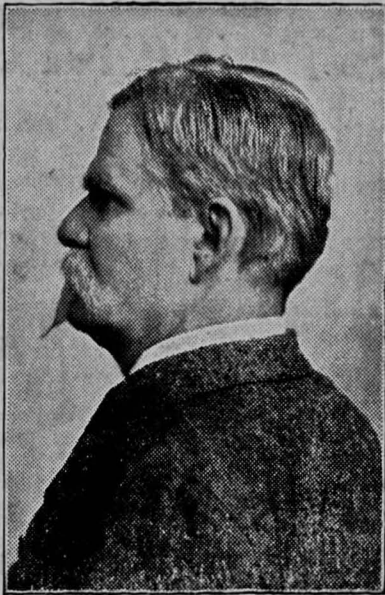
WATTERSON TONIGHT

was delivered originally in the auditorium at Chicago. Its greatness consists in the fact that behind it there is the deep feeling which Watterson had for Lincoln. It is said that he touches every phase of Lincoln's life. It is his firm belief that Lincoln could not have born the abuse and invective that was hurled against him unless he had been specially inspired.

IOWA BASKETBALL TOSSERS DEFEATED

Was Only an Exhibition Contest However and will not Count In Championship Series

Grinnell, Feb. 26—Iowa State University basketball team lost an exhibition game to Grinnell today by the score of 35 to 12. The game was played in the men's gymnasium before a large and enthusiastic audience of students, townspeople and state contest visitors. The first half ended with a score of 15 to 5 in favor of the Scarlet and Black. Grinnell's magnificent team work won her rounds of applause. All the locals played desperate ball and contributed almost equally either in guarding or the throwing baskets to win the game. All of Grinnell's points were earned save two. Iowa also secured points from two fouls. Rule of Iowa was umpire and Cole of Grinnell refereed the game.

The senate committee on judiciary killed a bill by Senator Gilliland to allow the members of the supreme court to lecture before the law classes at the State university. A spirited debate preceded the decapitation of this measure. It was stated that the salaries of the judges had been increased to \$6,000 in order to make certain that the state could command their time and to assure attorneys and litigants that every case decided would be determined by the full bench of six justices instead of a portion of the court only.

ACCEPT CHALLENGE

IOWA AND NEBRASKA WILL DEBATE

Debating League Acts Promptly Irving Chooses New Team Debate Will be Early

The debating league made short work of Nebraska's proposition for a debate last night. They decided to accept the proffer and made arrangements for the preliminary between Irving and Zetagathian for the purpose of selecting the members of a team to go against the Corn Huskers. The six members of the two preliminary teams were made a committee to go ahead with the negotiations with Nebraska arranging for a date and place for holding the debate. It was the opinion of the debating league that the debate if possible should be held at Lincoln in view of the financial outlook here now.

No date for the preliminary has yet been agreed upon, this also being left to the members of the two teams. It is likely that it will be held early inasmuch as Nebraska wishes to hold the finals before May. The Monroe doctrine question will be the bone of contention in the preliminary as well as the final.

In view of the fact that two members of the Irving preliminary team had withdrawn when the Wisconsin debate was called off, Irving Institute elected a new preliminary team to meet Zetagathia last night. Henry G. Walker was chosen leader and E. R. Johnston and John F. Kunz were chosen as the other two members.

F. J. Beatty has been elected to membership in Philomathia.

Prof. G. L. Houser will address the young men at Close Hall tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock.

C. V. McCluskey principal of Sharon Center High School is visiting in the city.

H. K. Evans of Corydon will decline the offer of appointment as regent of the state university and will become a candidate for district judge to succeed W. E. Miller of Bedford, who was recently appointed by Governor Cummins to the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Parish. Dr. J. W. Lauder of Afton will be candidate for the regency.

The announcement that Captain Rogers left end on the University of Minnesota for the past three years, will coach the Carlisle Indians next year is ample confirmation that Pop Warner will be the leader of Cornell. The selection of Rogers as the Indian's coach means that the Gophers will have another place to fill the coming year and that the magnificent team that represented them last year will be seen only in part the coming season.

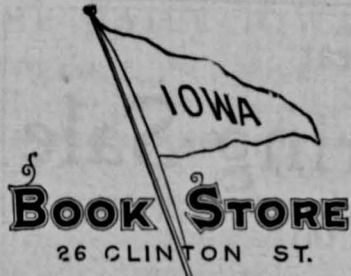

CORNELL IS WINNER GETS FIRST PLACE IN ORATORICAL CONTEST

Simpson Gets Second and Iowa Wesleyan Takes Third Honors—State Divided

Special To The Daily Iowan Grinnell, Feb. 26—Cornell college represented by Fred A. Clark won the state oratorical contest here tonight. Clark's oration was a meritorious production and was presented with earnestness and eloquence.

Second place was awarded to J. Newton Colver of Simpson, and Frank M. Beatty, Iowa Wesleyan's representative, carried off third honors. Simpson won the contest last year.

At the business meeting of the association it was voted to divide the state into two districts, each to hold a contest for the selection of four orators to take part in an annual central contest.

The protest of Upper Iowa university against the Coe College orator was not sustained.

Physiology of Sleep

The "Physiology of Sleep" was the subject of the paper given before Baconian last night by J. J. Lambert. A synopsis of it follows:

This is a practical age. Course of study which have a practical application to the problems of every day life are rapidly increasing. By the application of the statistical method to the study of the cell many biologic problems are being solved.

One of these problems is how to live longest and best. That sleep is necessary no one will deny. We spend on an average one-third of our lives in sleep. Only as we understand sleep, will we be able to understand waking conditions. Systemic conditions are much changed during sleep. Some glands, muscles and nerves never rest. The digestive organs and most digestive glands are less active during night sleep, though this does not apply to sleep in the daytime. In the circulatory system the heart's beat becomes slower falling from about 75 to 50 beats per minute, the blood vessels carry less blood per minute, the blood pressure falls, and the peripheral arteries become larger owing to relaxation of the muscles of their walls so more blood flows to the surface of the body.

The first two hours of sleep are most important. The amount of sleep required varies with age, activity, sex and climate, the least sleep being required about the age of 20 years. Excessive sleep may lead to various ailments as poor digestion, heart failure and partial paralysis. The most favorable surroundings for sleep are: A spacious bedroom simply furnished, pure air, freedom from draft, temperature 10 to 12 degrees below normal.
