The death of Miss Edith H. Sterling which occurred February 10, was a great shock to her many friends in the University; some had not known that she was seriously ill.

Miss Sterling's connection with the University as an under-graduate student closed in June 1901, when she received the degree of B. Ph. The next year she was enrolled for graduate work in the departments of Psychology, English and Public Speaking.

It was a pleasure to have Miss Sterling in one's classes. She was always responsive, always interested; student as well as teacher felt the influence of her cheery disposition and ready sympathy. Polygon was the better for her energetic work and wise counsel. The girls of the Hesperian Society enjoyed the benefit of association with her and knew the inspiration of her warm friendship. The Y. W. C. A. had in her a devoted member and unwearied worker, always eager to carry forward good work she often exerted herself beyond her strength; her interests were many and varied and it was only a lack of physical endurance that fixed a limit to her efforts. Honesty of purpose, sincerity of feeling, and genuineness of action were evident in all that she did and her friends felt the force of these qualities in her.

Even after Miss Sterling's formal connection with the University ceased, her heart was still with us; her interest in her former instructors and in her Alma Mater never lessened. In her death we have all lost a true friend.

SHOULD HAVE WON

IOWA DEBATERS DID WELL FRIDAY NIGHT

An Iowa Man Who Heard it Thinks Result Should Have Been Different

"The judges must have been hypnotized Friday night at Minneapolis" said an Iowa City man who happened to be in the flour city and heard the annual debate between the representatives of Iowa and Minnesota universities on the protective tariff question. "After I had heard all of the arguments I fully expected that the decision would be unanimous for Iowa. The force of arguments presented seemed to surely point to an Iowa victory. The Minnesota men had not presented a single argument that was not knocked sky high by the Iowa debaters. Why you should have heard that rebuttal Davis gave. Files had a brilliant production, and there was nothing to equal Randall's logic. I was never quite so badly surprised as when that decision was given."

Despite the fact that they lost the debate the Iowa representatives speak very highly of their treatment at Minneapolis. They say that they could not have been treated better by the Minnesota University people. Though they are not complaining they evidently feel that the judges treated them roughly.

Sensation at Fairfield

The students at Parsons College are up in arms over a sensational editorial which appeared last week in the Jefferson County Republican. It is entitled, "Parsons College as a dancing Academy" and claims that the students of the college have gone wild over dancing and have held several college dances in a downtown dance hall and that they hurry through the business at the society and class meetings to spend the remainder of the evening in dancing. It denounces the college for permitting such things to be.

The students claim that though there were two college parties at a dance hall this winter they have not gone crazy over the terpsichorean art.

Cornell's Gifts

The Cornelian announces that President W. F. King has secured some very substantial gifts to Cornell College. Among these are a \$10,000 bequest to the library, which already contains some 17,000 volumes. Also a \$2,000 drinking fountain and some ornamental iron gates for the campus. The Cornelian reports that the assets of the college have reached \$750,000, \$175,000 already in sight toward the next \$250,000 which it is proposed to raise before Cornell's semi-centennial.

REFORMERS WIN OUT

NEW SYSTEM OF JUDGING ORATIONS

New Methods Will Be Adopted If the Interstate Association Accepts It

The reformers of the Iowa Collegiate Oratorical association who favor a change in the existing methods of judging contests won in their preliminary fight in the business meeting of the association. In the face of determined opposition, they captured a majority of the delegates and adopted a strong resolution in support of the change and instructing Iowa's delegates to the Central Interstate association to work and vote for it.

The association placed itself on record as favoring the movement to have thought, composition and delivery all judged by one set of men at the time of delivery, instead of by different sets of men at different times. It postponed adoption until all the states in the Central association should adopt it. It was urged that it would not be wise or productive of good results if Iowa were to adopt a plan for its local contests different from that used by the inter-state association.

However, Iowa will leave nothing undone to bring about a change at the approaching meeting of the inter state association. This state will unite with Ohio and Colorado, which are on record in favor of the change, and out line a determined plan of campaign that will be conducted from now until the interstate meeting with vigor and be prosecuted in debate on the floor of the interstate meeting.

Should Not Feel Bad

Council Bluffs Nonpariel:—Those Iowa debaters who were defeated at Minneapolis Friday night need not feel too bad about it. They were contending for a continuance of the protective system and they will see their position sustained by American people next November. Minneapolis was a bad place for such a debate, anyway. Had it been held in Iowa the result might have been different.

Sioux City Journal:—The "tariff rippers" of Minnesota University talked tariff with the protectionists of Iowa University and after the flow of eloquence had ceased the three judges decided in favor of the Minnesota contention that the "The United States should now abolish the protective policy." The only explanation of this absurd outcome is that the Minnesotans, by their ornate delivery, must have hypnotized the judges.

LOOK OUT FOR AMES

SO SAYS "DOC" HARRIS OF GRINNELL

Says Iowa Cannot Win Easily Marsh Should Be Feared An Experienced Trainer

"Doc" Harris the old Grinnell star who always manages to keep posted in athletic affairs in the Iowa institutions has given his version of the coming state meet. He does not think Iowa will have an easy victory but rather fears Ames. This is what he says:

"I have been reading the dope stories that have been published during the last month, and I don't agree with the sentiment that Iowa is going to walk off with the state meet. I think that all the 'pipe dreamers' who have been talking have been overlooking a bit when they count Ames for last place. Ames, you will notice, is laying back not saying a word, but I have it pretty straight that they are doing things up there which will count for more than talk when the meet comes off.

"I can't speak as one with authority, of course as I have not been up to see what the actual conditions at Ames are; but my information is, and I believe it to be perfectly reliable, that Marsh has a squad of more than a hundred men at work and that he is simply delighted with the material he has found there.

"I don't think anybody is going to win this year's state meet by a margin of twenty points. Iowa may win, but she'll never get the fifty points that "Bill" Bremner is so confidently counting already. I think that Grinnell will be good for twenty-five to thirty points. Drake will be good for at least that many, and in my opinion, Ames will take about the same. You can count on ten points for the smaller schools. That leaves Iowa about thirty points, with the others. I think that the meet this year will be a contest in which at the present writing, Iowa may have the best of it on paper, but when the starter gets the pistol ready to send the men off for the hundred, the 'dope eaters' will have to make some big changes in their present estimates."

Congressman J. A. T. Hull defeated Judge S. F. Prouty in the Des Moines congressional primaries yesterday after the most disgraceful campaign Iowa has ever seen.

An intercollegiate gymnastic meet will be held at Madison, Wisconsin, on March 19, in which teams from Chicago, Minnesota, Grinnell and Wisconsin will compete. Handsome silver cups will be given to the individual winners in all of the events and a banner to the winning team.

It would be well if Iowa could begin her debating relations with Nebraska with a victory. A victory over the corn huskers will not be easy for Nebraska now has a debating craze. More than that the Nebraskans will make their greatest effort against Iowa.

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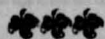
