## BASEBALL AT AMES

### AG'S SAY THEY'LL HAVE A STRONG TEAM

Only Two of last Year's Team Not Back and Much New Material—Schedule

Ames baseball enthusiasts are taking their turn in showing up their strength of their baseball team. It is said that the state college lads believe they will have the strongest team in their history.

Of last year's team, only two men are not back—Whistler at third base and left fielder Carrier. Tener who played in the varsity as a substitute last year and at short after Parsons was injured, will try for the place made vacant by the graduation of Whistler. Pitts a substitute last year, is the most likely candidate for the vacant place in the outfield.

"Yank" Brown is back in his old place in the box and will captain the team. Reese will pitch, thus affording Ames two pitchers as good as the best that Iowa colleges afford. Cotton will be back behind the bat, Evans will hold down the initial bag and Deshler, last year's star second baseman, will be at his old position. Parsons at short and Smith and Paine in the outfield will be out for their old places. In addition, there will be a choice lot of new men, and last year's second team men are trying for places. Among these some of the best are Liefers, Sticken and Shreve, all candidates for first; Mitts and Woodman for second, Cutlar and Brintnall for third, and Brunnier, a substitute pitcher last year, who will be a candidate for the box position or an infield job. Pitts, Liefers and Tellier are all likely candidates for the vacant place in the left field.

"Dad" Green of Rock Rapids has been retained to coach the baseball squad again this year.

## HIGH SCHOOL MEET

### DATE HAS BEEN SET AT MAY TWENTIETH

To be Held Under Auspices of the University—Nonpareil Says Bluffs Will be Here

The date for the annual meet of the Iowa State High School Athletic association has been definitely decided upon for May 20. The meet will be held at Iowa City under the auspices of the State University. It is thought that all of the leading high schools in the state will be represented by strong teams.

The Council Bluffs Nonpareil says: The date for the annual meet of the Iowa State High School Athletic association has been set for May 20 at Iowa City. The event will be under the direction of the State University and will be attended by many high school athletes from all quarters of the state, the annual outing for their special benefit being one of the strongest incentives for good hard work in high school athletics. The Council Bluffs high school will probably send a large team to compete, having this year the largest track team in its history with a good percentage of probable point winners. The announcement of the date for the Iowa City meet now makes it possible for the various schools of the state to set their preliminary meets. From ten days to two weeks is regarded as about the right length of time between the preliminary meets and the state meet, so that it is probable that the local meet will occur about May 1.

### Chapman after a Record

Thurman Chapman, for the past four years Drake's star pole vaulter, will make an effort soon to have the Amateur Athletic Union give him credit in the records for having vaulted 12 feet at the Drake home meet last spring. He is confident that he will be given the record. To acquire it he must secure affidavits from the judges and at least five spectators, a survey of the runway leading to the standards and the weather bureau record of the wind velocity. The vault of 12 feet was made at the annual Drake home meet last spring. The vault exceeds by two inches the present world's record, 11 feet 10 inches, held by Clapp of Yale.

### Zets Choose Debaters

The Zetagathian society has elected two of the debaters who will represent it in the preliminary Minnesota debate next year. They are Ray Files and R. C. Quigley. Both of these men were members of this year's preliminary team and Mr. Files was a member of the final team which went to Minneapolis. The third man will be chosen next fall.

## DRAKE HAS FAST MAN

### THOMPSON MAKES MILE INDOORS IN 5:15

Monilaw Thinks he Will Win State Meet if Properly Coached and Trained

The regular weekly inter-department indoor meet at Drake yesterday afternoon brought forth several surprises which make the prospects of a winning track team at Drake more bright than ever before this season. R. Thompson, the new man who has been doing good work in the distance events during the indoor meets, won the mile yesterday in 5:15, making the best record of the season. Dr. Monilaw thinks that with the outdoor work in the coming weeks Thompson will develop into a winner.

In the pole vault yesterday Haggard won, with a vault of 10 feet 9½ inches breaking the season's record. Buntin also showed up well, failing at a try for 11 feet by a very narrow margin.

### No Thanksgiving Game

Manager Baird of Michigan announces that there will be no Thanksgiving football game next year. His reason is that it is better for the men not to play so late in the season. He says:

"No one realizes better than a manager what a financial loss this move will involve. Yet I am willing to stop the game on the grounds of safety, both to the men, sport and finances.

"It is physically dangerous to the teams to continue these games, for never does a year pass without one of them being played in the snow. Still worse all western fields are likely to be frozen for two weeks before Thanksgiving, even when not snow covered. The worst football injuries usually come from this hard ground, and in the last two years practically all Michigan's injuries came from frozen earth."

### Iowan Incorporates

The articles of incorporation of the DAILY IOWAN Publishing Company were filed with the county recorder yesterday. They state that the corporation will be known as the DAILY IOWAN Publishing Co., with its chief place of business at Iowa City.

The company is incorporated with an authorized stock issue of \$10,000, \$1,200 of which is to be paid up in cash. The entire stock is to be divided into 1,000 shares of \$10.00 each, and the present share holders are to have the first privilege of the further purchase of stock.

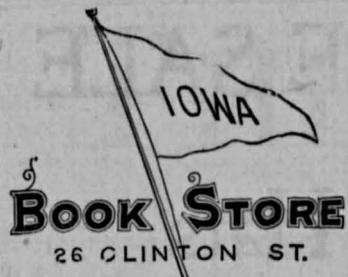

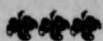
