MEETS WITH FAVOR

MAY SOON HAVE AN EDUCATIONAL BOARD

Suggestion of Mr. Berryhill Before Legislative Committee Is Seconded Widely

The suggestion of James G. Berryhill before the legislative committee Friday that all of the state educational institutions be placed under one board of control has created considerable interest throughout the state. The proposition seems to have met with favor. In an extended editorial Sunday, the Register and Leader declares in favor of the plan and the Sioux City Journal discusses it favorably. It seems to be the opinion that less strife between the schools would result if their management were placed under one head. The Register and Leader says:

"A board composed of three or even of five men of state-wide reputation as educators and business administrators, liberally compensated, would cost no more than the present boards of trustees, would bring order into state school management, would secure for the state just the support actually needed and no more, and would develop one great educational system in which each of the present institutions would have its appropriate part of the work.

The Sioux City Journal says: The announcement of James G. Berryhill before the appropriation committee that as a long time friend of the State University he was in favor of one board for the management of the state educational institutions was in the nature of a bomb. Mr. Berryhill is well known as a good and true friend of the university. He graduated there and is a type of the best business element educated at the State University. He has mingled with the alumni at many of their gatherings. He has watched the operations of the boards and is perfectly familiar with board methods in doing business.

Mr. Berryhill has devoted his life to business, and is a business man. He stated frankly his belief that some system other than that of the present management of colleges and universities by boards of voluntary friends, or what amounts to the same thing, should be devised.

Governor Cummins has issued a proclamation setting aside Friday, April 29 as Arbor day. He urges a general observance of the spirit of the day, and recommends such exercises in the schools of the state, as will stimulate a love of nature. The planting of trees in practicable places, the original purpose of the day, is given significant emphasis as an important service to the public and to future generations.

BAND PLAYS TONIGHT

FIRST ANNUAL CONCERT IN THE ARMORY

The much talked of band concert for which the University of Iowa band has been practicing for many moons occurs tonight in the armory. Every thing is in readiness for the event which promises to be the leading musical affair of the university year. The interest in the affair seems not to be confined in the members of the band and their friends, since the advance sale of tickets has been large.

Director Molsberry of the university band has arranged the program tonight so that it cannot help but please. The band will give six selections not including the encore numbers. In addition to the band numbers, W. H. Langenberg of Muscatine the well known clarinet artist of the Fifty-first regiment band will perform, and there will be vocal solos by Fred Bailey and Miss Anna Close.

The Iowa quartet composed of Messrs Martindale, Roberts, Bailey and Dunham will sing.

The band is trained to a state of proficiency never before attained by this organization. It now consists of thirty-five pieces, the largest in its history, and many of the members are well known musicians.

Friends of the band are very desirous of a large patronage this evening, since it is the first time the university has had an opportunity for displaying its interest in the organization. More than this, since the band is a self supporting organization it is felt that the students should join in aiding it tonight.

The program will begin at 8:15 o'clock.

RECORDS AT DRAKE

DES MOINES ATHLETES ARE GETTING FAST

Thompson Cuts Down His Own Mile Record—Other Records Made Last Saturday

"Bobby" Thompson again distinguished himself in the Drake indoor meet by winning the mile run. He also clipped off a second from the indoor record made by himself a week ago. On the twenty-six lap track, with its many crooks and turns, he reeled off the mile in 5:14.

Here are some of the other records made at the Drake meet Saturday:

Broad jump—Burcham first, 20 feet 7 inches; Hardesty second 20 feet 5½ inches; Kintz third, 19 feet 7 inches.

High jump—Wall first, 5 feet 6¼ inches; Stockham second, 5 feet 4¼ inches; Haggard third, 5 feet 1 inch.

Pole vault—Haggard first, 10 feet 5½ inches; Benton second, 10 feet 2 inches; Burcham third, 9 feet 10 inches.

Shot put—Kintz first, 37 feet 1¼ inches; Conaway second, 32 feet 8 inches; Robey third, 31 feet 7¼ inches.

Mile run—Thompson first, 5:14; Haggard second, 5:19; Sleeper third, 5:27.

DES MOINES WANTS IT

ASK FOR NEXT HIGH SCHOOL FIELD MEET

Capital City Thinks it Should Entertain Because of its Size And Location

According to the Des Moines Register and Leader the Des Moines high schools are preparing actively for the state high school field meet which will be held under the auspices of the State University at Iowa City, May 20. The discussion as to the holding of next year's meet is already being given attention and the Des Moines high schools will make a bid for the event. Last year Des Moines lost out by a division of forces, East high refusing to give its support to land the meet. Drake wanted to get it badly and offered the same inducement that finally gave the meet to Iowa.

First last and all the time East High has been in favor of Grinnell. Practically all of the East High graduating athletes go from that school to Grinnell. The main reason for this is supposed to be the surroundings of the high school students, there being ten alumni of Grinnell acting as instructors in East High.

And that raises the question to whether or not the Iowa State High School Athletic association will be in existence in 1905. The principals of the various high schools of the state met in December and formed an association which will be controlled by what is known as the principals' club. They intend to give a meet of their own annually and do well with the student managed association now running. The business meeting at Iowa City following the meet will probably bring forth a lively row between the students and pedagogues.

Baseball at Drake

Baseball at Drake is on the boom and many candidates for several weeks have been working out in the training shed getting into shape. The schedule will probably be completed by the last of this week. The contracting for games with other schools was delayed for some time until the Western league schedule was announced, when for the first time the Drake management knew when the open local dates would be.

The league schedule is highly satisfactory to Manager Bacon of Drake, the open dates coming at just the right time. Drake will play all of the larger schools of the state, two games with Iowa, Ames, Cornell, Grinnell and Normal, one there and one away. The Drake team's first game will be against the league team about April 5.

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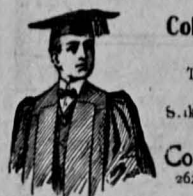
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AMUSEMENTS
