BIG GAME TOMORROW

IOWA AND GRINNELL TO SETTLE CHAMPIONSHIP

Interest at a High Pitch—Iowa's Team Crippled—Girls' Team To Play Curtain-Raiser

After several weeks of quiet in the basketball world, interest is at a high pitch in anticipation of the Grinnell-Iowa game here tomorrow. The game will be the last in Iowa's schedule and may settle definitely the state championship as between Grinnell and Iowa. Neither team has been beaten by any other team in the state. Three times during the season they have met, but only once in the regular schedule. That was the game at Grinnell when Iowa won by a score of 22-18, the game having been twice tied before Schenck made the winning basket for Iowa. The other two games were a practice game at Iowa City, which Iowa won 39-33 early in the season, and an exhibition game later at Grinnell, which was won by Grinnell 34-12. Thus if Iowa wins Saturday the State University will hold the state championship, and if Grinnell wins Iowa and Grinnell will be tied for the championship.

Consequently both Iowa and Grinnell will do their utmost to win. Iowa's team is in constant and heavy training. Ross will not be able to play and the team will not be as strong as it has it has been earlier in the season, but Iowa expects to win nevertheless. Manager Ross announces that the following will be the lineup:

Officials will be Udden and Jamison of Rock Island

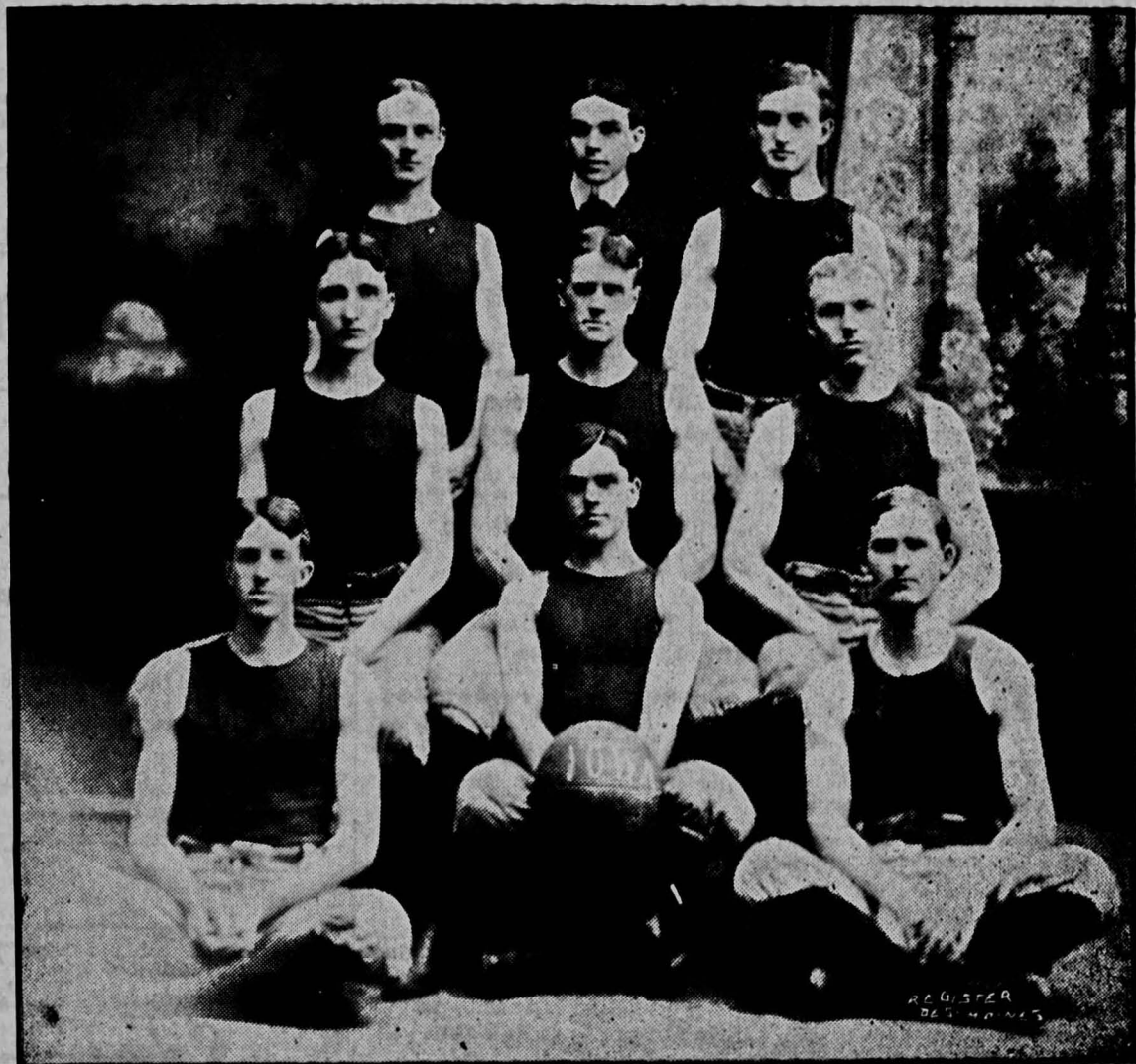

TO HOLD TRACK MEET

FRATS GIVE UP PAN-HELLENIC BASEBALL

Greeks to Repeat Olympian Contests—All Fraternity Men Will Have to Enter

The Pan Hellenic baseball league of the university of Iowa last night received its quietus. At the business meeting held by the fraternity representatives at the Beta house it appeared that four of the fraternities were opposed to the baseball proposition. These were the Sigma Nus, Delta Tau Deltas, Phi Delta Thetas and Sigma Chis.

However the idea of a test of athletic prowess was not entirely given up. Some of the fraternities which were not in favor of baseball tournament were in favor of a track meet and in all probability this plan will be adopted. It was figured that the track meet could be pulled off in one day and would then be over, while a baseball tournament would drag through the whole spring. Some sort of rules will probably be drawn up to govern the track meet. It seemed to be the sentiment last night that every fraternity man should be required to take part in at least one event.

Senator Maytag and Representative Jones of the subcommittee of the joint appropriations committee of senate and house, which was commissioned by the Iowa legislature to visit the State university and report on its needs filed the report yesterday.

Of the \$480,000 asked by the university to be appropriated, including \$80,000 additional annual support fund, the committee named recommended that \$80,000 only be allowed.

It also is recommended that the engineering department at the university be entirely abandoned, because duplicated at the

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CONVENTION TONIGHT

ZETS WILL NOMINATE
A PRESIDENT

Platform Will Be Bone of Con-
tention However—Roose-
velt Sure to Win

Amid the enthusiasm appropriate to a national political convention the Zetagathians will tonight place in nomination a candidate to lead the republican ticket and name a platform of principles upon which the party will seek victory at the polls. The platform promises to develop the most excitement because of the desire of some to favor the Iowa idea.

The reference to the Iowa idea will not be the only thing of more than ordinary interest to come up in the making of the platform. It is expected that there will be a declaration in favor of the action of the administration in the Panama controversy. It is expected that the action of the administration in pushing the case against the Northern Securities company will receive commendation and the platform may call for a general enforcement of the laws which have been given additional strength by the recent decision of the United States Supreme court. There may also be a clause favoring the reenactment of the present Chinese exclusion laws which are about to expire. It is predicted that the course followed by the present administration will be generally commended.

The convention will be conducted just as would any other republican national convention. There will be a committee on credentials and that it will be more than a mere figurehead is certain from the fight that is being made over the seating of the Utah delegation. It is believed that the committee will report against that state. All of the other states will be represented including the new island possessions.
