## FINALS ARE TONIGHT

### LAST OF INTER-FRAT WHIST TOURNAMENT

The final series of games in the Fraternity Whist League will take place tonight at the house of Kappa Sigma. The games will be all important because it has been left to the final contests to determine the winners of the tournament. Kappa Sigma which has led throughout the tournament will not play tonight. However Delta Tau Delta which is now tied for first place will play and if victorious will lead the procession. Kappa Sigma will however have one more opportunity for tying for first by winning the tied game with Phi Delta Theta. A tied game between Beta Theta Pi and Phi Kappa Psi remains to be played off.

If Delta Tau Delta should lose to Beta Theta Pi tonight and Phi Kappa Psi should win from Sigma Chi, the Phi Psis will figure in the roundup, and it will be up to Kappa Sigma to win the tied game to get the trophy. If Phi Kappa Psi wins tonight and also wins its tied game from Beta Theta Pi, it will stand a good show for the trophy.

No dates have been set for playing off the tied contests.

### Ames Arranges Meets

Arrangements are going on apace for the scheduling of meets for the track team of the Iowa State college for the coming season. It is the plan to secure two dual meets at Ames, one with Grinnell and one with Drake. These two meets will take the place of the triangular that has been held until last year with the two schools at Ames. It is the wish of the management if possible to secure one away from home, and this meet will be if possible with some Iowa school. The dates of the meets with Grinnell and Drake are not definitely decided upon as yet. The dates may depend to some extent upon the date that a meet can be scheduled away from home for Ames, and as may be suitable to the other two schools.

If a meet can be secured for a trip, the Ames track team will be in four meets before the state meet May 28. The home meet will be held early to give time for the other dual meets that will be held.

## DEBATE CALLED OFF

### NEBRASKA MAKES FINAL STATEMENT

Corn Huskers Are too Busy With other Contests--Would not Debate at Bluffs

From present indications the proposed debate between Iowa and Nebraska is off for this year. Nebraska, according to the Daily Nebraskan will be unable to hold the contest because of the lack of time. Iowa's suggestion that the debate be held at Council Bluffs is not satisfactory to the Nebraskans. The Daily Nebraskan says:

Nebraska had stated that she did not feel warranted in venturing upon holding a second expensive debate at Lincoln on the same question so soon after the meeting with Kansas. Iowa, who for financial reasons, is unwilling to risk a debate at Iowa City, makes a new proposition, to the effect that the debate be held at Council Bluffs, the receipts to be applied to paying the expenses of the judges and that any money over and above the expenses be divided between the teams on the basis of railroad distance. If this fails to cover expenses, then, each team shall be responsible for its own remaining expenses. We have been informed unofficially that this novel proposition can not be accepted.

The DAILY IOWAN states that the Debating Board authorized its committee to consent to the debate being held at Council Bluffs or Sioux City. It also gives the impression that the Hawkeyes seem to be still making preparations. If the interstate debate does not occur, then the members of the literary society teams, the Irving and the Zetagrthian, who are about to contest for places, will debate the same question.

### Resolution Killed

In the house yesterday the Hambleton resolution for a commission to report on the practicability of concentration and consolidation of the educational interests at Iowa City and Ames of the university and agricultural college, was lost without a roll call.

A resolution of thanks to George Koontz, representative from Johnson County, to Iowa City and the State university for the entertainment of the excursion last Thursday was passed.

Professor Nutting gave one of his regular lectures in the auditorium last evening. His lecture dealt exclusively with his sea voyage from San Francisco to the Islands. With the aid of splendid stereoptican views he took his audience upon a voyage over the Pacific, which was connected with some very interesting incidents.

## NO BASEBALL TEAM

### DRAKE GIVES IT UP FOR THIS YEAR

Financial Support Was Lacking As Was Also Enthusiasm and Players

Drake's baseball hopes for the coming season are dead and with it her baseball team. The board of athletic control of the Des Moines institution held a meeting yesterday afternoon and decided to give up all efforts for glory on the diamond this year. This action on the part of Drake may result in the calling off one of Iowa's trips which was to include Drake, Simpson and Grinnell. Another team however may be substituted for the Drake team in Iowa's schedule.

The original understanding between the students who demanded baseball and the board was that the board would give consent and support of the players would sell \$150 season tickets at \$1 each and have the money turned in a week before the first regular game of the season. Thus far but \$6 has been turned into the board and it will be impossible to raise the remainder on time. The first game was to have been played with Highland Park on April 8, a week from Saturday. Accordingly the \$150 would have to be in by next Saturday. With all of the students at Drake away from Des Moines on the spring vacation the baseball enthusiasts were plunged into despair. Last Saturday and Sunday a hurried consultation was held and frantic efforts were made to raise the money, but the effort was a complete failure. Another impromptu meeting was held yesterday and the supply committee endeavored to fix things, but the baseball men had thrown up the sponge and were through for the year. Practice has ceased and Manager Bacon is cancelling contracts.

## MAY ENLARGE MEET

### INCLUDE ATHLETES FROM ALL DEPARTMENTS

Freshmen and Sophomores from All Colleges May Be Admitted This Year

This year is liable to bring forth a radical change in the conduct of the annual freshman-sophomore field meet which is scheduled to take place in April 23. The change which is proposed comes in the way of admitting students from the freshman and sophomore classes in all the departments of the university in addition to those from the regular liberal arts classes.

Heretofore only those students who are members of the two two first years classes in the college of liberal arts have been permitted to enter in the freshman sophomore field meet. There is no particular reason for this except that it has been customary, and no class has ever undertaken to break away from the custom. In view of the great growth of the university it has come to be that the athletes in the lower classes in the college of liberal arts constitute but a small fraction of the number in all of the departments. In view of the fact that the meet is held merely for the sake of bringing out men who otherwise could not be made to compete it is urged that there should be no objection to the admission of athletes from all of the departments.

If such a change should be made the freshman-sophomore meet will become one of the most important athletic events of the year, since some of the best athletes in the school will be permitted to compete.

Those who favor the proposed plan also argue that the class meets are conducted in this manner in all other universities and should also be here.

### What Each Will Get

If the original recommendation of the senate committee that the special appropriation for the state university remain at \$149,000 is approved the total amount of money to be received by the university the coming biennium will be \$846,500. This includes the permanent appropriation of \$320,000 and tuition amounting to \$125,000.

The special appropriation for the agricultural college at Ames is \$379,000, which will make the total income at Ames \$901,000. The normal school gets \$84,000.

The editor of the Clarinda Herald is a humorist. Perhaps he does not pose as such but such he is. In one of the recent issues of his esteemed paper he takes up the discussion of the appropriations for the state university. The IOWAN does not regularly run a funny column, but it will reproduce a few of the Clarinda man's assertions. Here they are:

The legislature is now struggling with the problem presented by the state schools in their demands for money. These schools have for a long time been veritable white elephants and every year the demands are becoming greater and more unreasonable. But there has a sort of foolish sentimentalism developed that makes it almost worth a man's political life to oppose the demands of these elephants. The result is that every year the tax payers of the state are becoming more and more deeply involved

in extravagant expense. In addition to the tuition paid by the students it costs more to keep up the expenses of the State university than it would to put every student who completes the course through one of the old universities of the eastern states. But there is no reason why students should be sent east, for if it were not for the money squandered by the state of Iowa City there would be a number of schools in Iowa that would be capable of doing just as good work and would soon have just as good reputations as the eastern schools now have.

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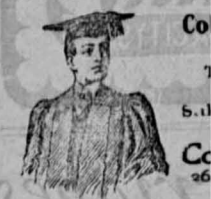
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#### A Warning

The Cedar Rapids Republican warns the legislature against relieving the governor of any more of his state duties and responsibilities, as seem to be contemplated in the educational board of control bill. "It can not be said," says the Republican, speaking of this matter, "that the governors of Iowa in recent years have devoted the attention they should to state affairs. Drake didn't, Shaw didn't, and Cummins certainly hasn't. Drake was not extensively acquainted with state matters and Shaw and Cummins have been too busy with national questions. Shaw's success set a bad example in some respects. He landed in the cabinet, and his success will continue to be a temptation for governors to devote attention to national subjects in the hope of landing farther up."

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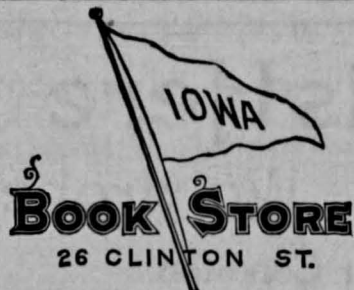

**Journal Favors It**

In a long editorial in the Sioux City Journal Hon. George D. Perkins discusses the merits of the proposed board of control plan for the government of the state educational institutions as follows:

The main idea of the proposed law is sound. All the state schools should co-operate in the general field of education. The state owes a common duty to all of them. The different schools virtually represent departments in the educational work undertaken by the state. There are many reasons why the five departments should be placed under a central business management. They would be if a great corporation owned them all. The purpose to be conserved would be economical administration. Why should not the state apply the same methods that any company of business men would utilize? The state has found the principle to work well in connection with other institutions. Why not with the schools? \* \* \*

Although the general principle of the Garst bill may be indorsed it is not at all sure that the measure itself is not open to objection. There is ground for the argument that too much responsibility is likely to be lodged with the chairman, who is the only member to devote his entire time to the work. Also it is doubtful if a salary of \$3,000 per year is large enough to enlist the services of the right sort of man for the place. If the board of control is to acquit itself creditably of the large responsibilities entrusted to it the board must be made up of the best available material and adequately equipped for its work. As to details the legislature should make sure it is right before going ahead.
