The regular schedule in the inter-fraternity whist league was not enough to decide the final disposition of the silver trophy. The results of the contests of last night which were the last of the regular schedule leave Kappa Sigma and Phi Kappa Psi tied for first place with a percentage of .800. Delta Tau Delta was put out of first place running last night by the Sigma Nu team composed of Steck and McNett. The score was decisive.

The disposition of the trophy will be decided by the tie games which both Kappa Sigma and Phi Kappa Psi have to play off. Phi Kappa Psi's tied game is with Beta Theta Pi and Kappa Sigma's is with Phi Delta Theta. Should both of the leaders win their tied games, the percentages will still remain the same and Kappa Sigma and Phi Kappa Psi will have to play it out against each other.

Louiseaux and Oelkers for Phi Delta Theta won last night over Alford and Whitley of Beta Theta Pi, and Law and Thornberg for Phi Kappa Psi won from Ross and Bond for Sigma Chi.

The tournament has been successful in every respect. Unusual interest has been aroused over the contests and the inter-fraternity associations have been strengthened. It is very probable that the affair will be repeated next winter.

Every two years the Iowa State College at Ames, and the State University, appear before the General Assembly and ask appropriations for carrying on their work. And in the endeavor to secure such funds as each needs, there inevitably crops out a certain enmity between friends of the two institutions. This year in what appears to us the very unfair treatment of S. U. I. in comparison with the treatment of Ames, many friends of the University including certain of the local papers, have indulged in tirades and invectives against the Agricultural College.

But it is the belief of the IOWAN, shared in by most of the supporters of S. U. I. that this is not a proper attitude to take. Every citizen of Iowa should be proud of Iowa's University. Every citizen of Iowa—including

students at S. U. I.—should be proud of Iowa's Agricultural and Mechanic Arts College at Ames. The two are not rivals and are not going to be. Both are necessary and valuable to the state and the success of one does not mean the failure of the other in any sense or in any degree. In the larger view of the situation there is no room for envy or jealousy. Both institutions are here to stay and to prosper; and if the General Assembly can not at this time see its way clear to give us all we ask we should not on that account refuse to rejoice with Ames in its success. Let us put away the idea of "Ames vs. University" and take up rather Ames and the University. Success to Iowa's two great schools!

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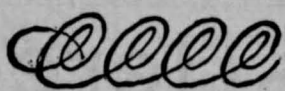

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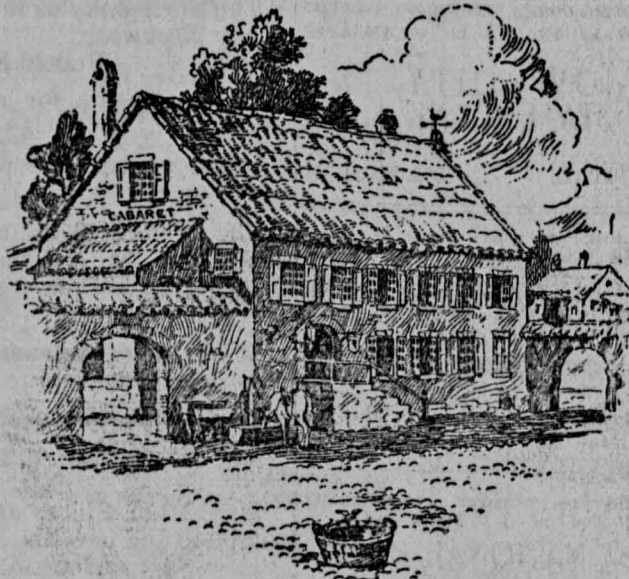
