BASEBALL MEN OUT

BIG SQUAD REPORTS FOR OUTDOOR PRACTICE

Old Stars and Much New Material—Practice Every Day Hereafter

About thirty candidates answered the first call for outdoor baseball practice. Despite the bad condition of the ground in the athletic field, due to the recent rains, a very successful workout was held yesterday afternoon under the supervision of Captain Dye and Coach Chalmers. A large number of old Iowa stars were out in suits in addition to quite a large number of freshmen and some older students who have not heretofore made the team.

The first outdoor work was very encouraging. The men went at the game like veterans. Among the familiar figures on the field yesterday were "Pink" Storey, Durkee, Melzner, Dye, Dennis, Kratzmeyer and Voss. Among the promising new men who appeared in suits were Yesler, Topping, Peirce and a large number of freshmen. The practice yesterday consisted in both batting and fielding. Owing to the softness of the regular diamond the practice was conducted on the rough out-field which made the handling of grounders exceedingly difficult. Despite this fact some excellent work in short fielding was done by Melzner, Durkee and Finkbine.

Practice will be conducted every afternoon from now on. It is thought that there will still be more candidates for the team as large number of those who have signified their intentions of getting out for practice have not yet shown up.

BIG SCIENCE MEETING

UNIVERSITY MEN ARE ON THE PROGRAM

Meeting to be Held Here April 15—Large Attendance Predicted—The Papers

The eighteenth annual meeting of the Iowa Academy of Sciences will be held April 14 and 15, in the Physics Lecture Room of the University. The meetings of this the foremost scientific organization of Iowa, have hitherto been held in Des Moines, and the meeting in Iowa City is an opportunity which is welcomed by all students and citizens.

A program of twenty-five papers has been prepared, of which six are by Iowa University men, namely:

"The Animal Cell in the Light of Recent Work," by Dr. Gilbert L. Houser, Professor of Animal morphology.

"The Importance of Vital Statistics in the Study of Social Science" by Dr. Gershom H. Hill, of Des Moines, lecturer on Insanity in the College of Medicine.

"The Aftonian Gravels and their Relation to the Drift Sheets about Afton Junction and Thayer" (illustrated with lantern slides) by Dr. Samuel Calvin, Professor of geology.

"Action of Sodium Thiosulphate on Silver Halides," by W. M. Barr '01, Instructor in Chemistry in Grinnell College.

"Regeneration in the Cragfish," by John J. Lambert, Instructor in Animal Morphology and Physiology.

"Additions to the Iowa Flora," by Professor B. Shimek, of the Department of Botany—A discussion and report of plants not hitherto known from Iowa, or recently recognized as distinct species.

NEW STATE MEDALS

WILL BE AWARDED WINNERS THIS YEAR

Games Committee Holds Meeting in Des Moines—New Cup Also Necessary

The games committee of the Iowa Inter-collegiate association held a meeting in Des Moines and practically decided to change the style of medals to be given the winners this year. The old medal has been used for four successive years, thus placing several medals of the same pattern, with the exception of a change in the date, in the possession of the athletes. One of the reasons for not making the change heretofore has been the cost of making the dies.

The new medal will be in the form of both medal and watch fob charm. It is to be of heavier gold than the present emblem, having a rough edged base of light colored metal with a secondary plating in the form of a wreath to be of darker color, inside of which will be a blank space. The bar above will be for a suitable inscription indicating the year, event and name of the winner. This bar may be removed, making a permanent fob. This will be the style for the present year, but the intention of the games committee is not to adhere to the style longer.

Another change in the collegiate emblems which is now being discussed by the games committee is a championship cup for the coming field meet. The cup won by Drake university last year had been in service since 1897. Under the rules governing its permanent ownership, no college could hold it until winning it three successive times. The last cup was won by Drake in the 1903 meet, which completed the series of three successive championships and therefore the permanent ownership.

The cup to be held up for the next meet will be emblematic of field events in the form of a runner, hurdler or other athlete. In the event that such a cup is not obtainable, a loving cup of suitable size will be chosen for the next championship cup.

Teachers Are Needed

In an interview in the Register and Leader Prof. J. F. Brown says: "The success of our public schools depends on the teachers. The elaborately equipped buildings and laboratories, the well ventilated, sanitary, steam heated and modern buildings are helps, but the prime thing is the teacher. PASSED THE SENATE

WOULD HAVE ONE EDUCATIONAL BOARD

Vote Was 31-14—Senators Gilliland and Molsberry Its Chief Opponents

After a fierce parliamentary struggle the bill providing for a state board of regents for the educational institutions of Iowa was passed yesterday afternoon by the senate by a vote of 31 to 14.

The bill is now up to the house, where a fierce fight is predicted, with the chances about even for its success or failure.

Such strong house leaders as Representatives Wright and Temple announce their intention of fighting it. However, the friends of the measure predict its passage.

The debate on the bill began early in the morning and a cross fire of discussion was started, in which Senator Gilliland, who has been with Senator Molsberry the chief opposition, was a chief figure. Senator Brooks made a speech in favor of the bill in which he called attention to the extra expense per student incurred at the State University.

An effort was made during the morning session to kill off the measure by the introduction of a concurrent resolution to appoint a committee to examine into the feasibility of the plan and report at the next session of the legislature.

The Military Ball

A new feature will be introduced at the military ball next Friday night. The receiving line will be composed entirely of officers of the battalion. The object of this is to make the ball as distinctly military as possible. The officers will be in full dress uniform with side arms. In addition to the battalion officers a number of the local officers and out of town guard officers, also several members of the governor's staff will be present.

The decorations will be in red, white and blue, with corresponding colors in the lights. The national emblem will be every where in evidence. Several novel features in decoration have been promised as surprises.

Bandmaster Molsberry will furnish an orchestra of fourteen pieces. Two expert musicians, outside of the regular orchestra, have been hired for the occasion. The program will consist of twenty-four numbers.

No expense will be spared to make this the greatest social function of the post lenten season. If possible, the magnificent affair of last year will be excelled.

Students of all departments of the university can obtain tickets, as formerly, without special invitation. The gallery will be open to the public a small admission fee being charged.
