THE LAST DEBATE

ZETS AND IRVINGS DISCUSS MONROE DOCTRINE

Last Preliminary Debate of Year in Opera House tonight— Judges Chosen

The last contest corresponding to the preliminary inter-university debates will take place at the Opera House tonight when Zetagathia and Irving will debate the Monroe Doctrine. While the debate is no longer a preliminary in the literal sense it was prepared as such and will undoubtedly be of equal excellence.

The question which will be debated tonight reads; Resolved, "That the interests of the U. S. no longer require the maintenance of the Monroe Doctrine as a principle of national policy."

Zetagathia represented by W. T. Brinton, Purly Rinker and F. E. Snedcor will support the affirmative and Irving represented by J. F. Kunz, H. G. Walker and E. R. Johnston, will uphold the negative.

The judges for the contest are Steven Bradley and W. M. Davis attorneys of this city and Professor Samuel Calvin.

Inter-Society Baseball

That inter-society baseball among the three collegiate societies and the two law societies will be of importance is evident from the interest taken in game at present. Last year the series of games could not be completed on account of the flooded condition of the field.

Iowa may soon have a chapter in the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. The statement is not made as positive but it is known that members of that fraternity have been in the city for the past couple of weeks looking over the field and interesting a number of students who are not members of any fraternity at present. The work of organization here is being conducted by the chapter of that fraternity located at the University of Minnesota.

Sigma Alpha Epsilon is a national fraternity of well organized standing and would make a good addition to the present list of fraternities represented here. There are many however who believe that the field here is too small to make the creating of another chapter practicable. Sigma Alpha Epsilon has a total sixty-four chapters in the United States. Some of the most important chapters nearby are those at Chicago, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Nebraska, Illinois and Northwestern.

Iowa already has seven fraternities all of which are represented by unusually strong chapters these being recognized for their strength in their own national organizations. Iowa fraternity history dates back to 1866 when the first chapter was established. Chapters have been added at regular intervals since that time.

Louisiana Purchase Exposition

Demonstration is the keynote of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. Life and motion characterize the exhibits. Education is its grand purpose. Of the exhibits, that known as the Irish Village will be of especial interest. In it will be depicted the "castles old in story," the arts and industries of the Emerald Isle. and in a play house with a seating capacity of 1800 will be given the popular Irish plays. In the "Empire of India" will be seen the gorgeous splendors of the Orient. Here will be seen the Rajah's Festival, in faithful reproduction, with white elephants, gorgeous costumes and sparkling jewels. Here too one may sip tea in the tea houses of Ceylon. "Jerusalem" will be a production from real life of the Holy City. From the Temple to Gethsemane, one may visit the places made sacred in the tragedy of the race. Ten acres of ground are required for this exhibit. Ancient Rome under the reign of Nero, with the Stadium and its games, with streets filled with tradesmen and senators, will be seen as of old. The Cabin in which Lincoln was born, and filled with relics of his life will also be presented. On a mammoth cliff over 100 feet in height will be shown the rude habitations of the Cliff Dwellers. Transported from the north is an Esquimaux Village, and from far away Russia a typical Russian. Old St. Louis of 1803 will also be produced. The evolution of dress from ancient Roman to modern Worth may be seen in the Palais du Costume. In the Battle Abbey will be depicted the battles of our nation from Yorktown to Manila.

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INCORPORATION NOTICE

Of the Daily Iowan Publishing Company

Public notice is hereby given that the undersigned with such others as may hereafter be associated with them have incorporated the DAILY IOWAN Publishing Company in accordance with Chapter I, Title IX of the 1897 Code of Iowa and Acts of the General Assembly amendatory thereto.

Article I.

The name of the corporation is the Daily Iowan Publishing Company and its principal place of business is Iowa City, Johnson County, Iowa.

Article II.

The object and general nature of the business to be transacted by this corporation is to be the editing and publishing of a college newspaper and in addition thereto to do a general line of job printing and in connection therewith such other and similar lines of work as the corporation may decide upon from time to time. To perform and do any and all acts necessary for the conduct of such business, such transactions and business to be governed by and conducted in accordance with the By-laws and rules of said corporation and in conformity with the Statutes of this state.

Article III.

The amount of the capital stock authorized is Ten thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars and Twelve hundred(\$1200.00) Dollars thereof shall be fully paid in and divided into shares of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars each.

Article IV.

This corporation shall continue for (20) years from March 1st., 1904, the date of its beginning with power to renew as provided by the laws of Iowa.

Article V.

The affairs of the corporation shall be managed and controlled by a Board of five (5) Directors elected from among the stock holders by a majority vote at the annual meeting held for that purpose. Said meeting shall be on the first Monday in June of each year.

Article VI.

The highest amount of indebtedness to which this Company may at any time be subjected shall not exceed two-thirds (2/3) of the amount of the capital stock paid in.

The private property of the share holders of this corporation shall be exempt from liability for corporate debts.

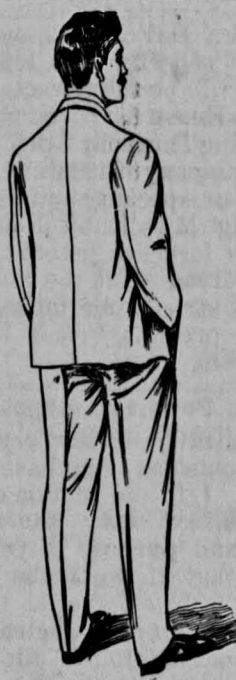
