Realizing the lack of suitable songs which state university students can appropriately sing at public demonstrations a patriotic student has offered a prize of \$5 for a good university song. He has asked the IOWAN to make announcement of the offer and to withhold his name. The results of the efforts of those who wish to compete in the contest may be left at the office of the DAILY IOWAN. The results of the contest will be announced in a later issue.

There are no restrictions or regulations in the competition other than that the production must be a university song and one suitable for Iowa. The words must of course be original but they can be set to any suitable tune. The promoter of the venture suggests that some popular, catchy tune be employed in order to make it easy for the students to become familiar with the song.

The instigator of the scheme hopes that this plan will be successful in providing Iowa with something which she is greatly in need of.

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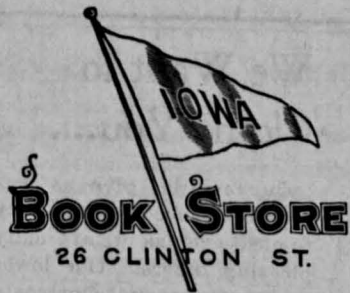

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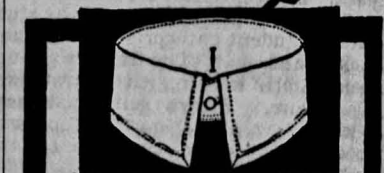
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
